## Constitution

**Article 1.** This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

**Article 2.** Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

**Article 3.** The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the Association.

**Article 4.** This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

**Article 5.** This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hands, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superseded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

**Article 6.** An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

**Article 7.** The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

**Article 8.** In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

**Article 9.** The body shall meet annually, according to adjournment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

**Article 10.** This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article IV) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

**Parliamentary Rules:** Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

## By-Laws

### ARTICLE I — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.
2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distributing of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.
3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and shall make monthly and annual reports to the Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.
4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

### ARTICLE II — COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.
2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.
3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.
4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.
5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.
6. Each committee will be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

**FIRST DAY — MORNING SESSION**

THEME: "Teaching Them To Observe All Things"

Moderator J. Chester Badgett called the second annual session of the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists to order and recognized the Clerk, Mr. W. T. Chandler, for a personal privilege.

Mr. W. T. Chandler called attention to the fact that upon the organization of the Russell Creek Association of Kentucky Baptists in 1804 meeting with the Pitman Creek Baptist Church which is now the Campbellsville Baptist Church, his great grandfather, Rev. John Chandler, was elected as the first Clerk and served the Association as Clerk sixteen years.

When the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists was formed in 1957 meeting with the Campbellsville Baptist Church, the great grandson, Mr. W. T. Chandler was elected as the first clerk and has served until the present time.

Mr. W. T. Chandler presented a gavel to the Association to be used in presiding over the sessions of the body. With appropriate words of appreciation the Moderator, Dr. J. Chester Badgett, accepted the gavel on behalf of the Association and used it in presiding.

Rev. W. E. Miller, Associational Music Director, was in charge of the song service.

The Devotion was led by Rev. Lillard Dunn, Jr., Pastor of the Elkhorn Baptist Church, using Psalms 126. Rev. Dunn then led in prayer.

1. Roll call of Churches:

A call of the churches was made with 14 of the 15 churches having messengers present at this time. Total messengers present 59, and 71 visitors present. It was then moved and passed that the messengers be accepted by the body.

2. Adoption of Order of Business:

The suggested Order of Business was presented and adopted by the body, plus any other changes that may arise.

3. Recognition of Visitors:

The Moderator recognized Rev. Carl Dugger, Pastor Fairview Mission, Central Association.

4. Introduction of New Pastors:

Rev. Lillard Dunn, Jr., Pastor Elkhorn Baptist Church.

5. Invitation to Churches for Membership:

There were no Churches presented for membership in the Association.

6. Report of Executive Board:

The report of the Executive Board was given by Woodruff T. Chandler and adopted by the Association.

**REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD**

Your Executive Board met every month during the past Associational Year, with average attendance 18.

September 8, 1958 — The Board voted to make survey of all churches in the Association, November 2 through 7, 1958.

December — Brother Abel Harding, Sr., was appointed by the Board to represent the Churches of Taylor County Association in "Operation Baptist Biography."

January — The Board was delighted to have Rev. J. S. Compere, Associational Missionary from Carol County, Arkansas. Rev. Compere gave a very interesting talk on his work in Carol County.

February — The Board voted to meet with Liberty Baptist Church March 2 and Salem Baptist Church April 2, 1959.

March — We had the privilege to have Bro. B. B. Hilburn, Chaplain of Kentucky Baptist Hospital, speak to us on "Mother's Day Offering for Hospitals." The Board set a goal of 100% of our churches participating. Am happy to say this goal was reached.

April — The Board voted to give financial backing to Associational Booth at the Taylor County Fair. Brother George W. Hayes of Louisville gave a very interesting and inspiring message at this meeting.

May — The Board voted to combine their June meeting with Hymn Sing at Good Hope.

June — The Board voted to pay traveling expenses of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Superintendent of Training, Group Leaders and Secretary to the Leadership Work Shop to be held at Birmingham, Alabama August 19-21, 1959.

August — The Board voted to buy 25 Baptist Hymnals for Eunice Mission. Voted to purchase 16 MM Bell & Howell sound projector to be used by churches in Association.

The Board expresses gratitude and appreciation to our Lord for the gracious year he has given us.

### REPORT ON DISTRICT MISSIONS

Churches With Missions: The Campbellsville Baptist Church has six missions at the following locations: Acton, Eunice, Raikes Hill, Yuma, County Jail, and Mitzmeir Nursing Home. They have finished a new building at Acton and have remodeled and bought new equipment at Yuma. In these missions the past year they have baptized 17 and have had 12 additions by letter. The enrollment for Sunday School is 159 and for Training Union is 49. They report many more prospects on each of these fields.

The Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has a mission at the Pitman Valley School site and are now in a building program. In the past year they have baptized 26 and have 63 enrolled in Sunday School with an average attendance of 65, and with 125 total prospects on the field.

## Minutes of Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists

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New Work: In November of 1958 there was a survey made in Taylor County with the report that there were approximately 1,000 lost people. It is also believed by those who know the county that there is another 1,000 lost people in the section not surveyed making the total 2,000 who are condemned before God. This reveals there is much work to be done in our county.

The following points are being considered for mission work by our Superintendent of New Work and some of the churches: Southwest Campbellsville, Clemmerville, and Ireland (Burdick) School Community on the Columbia Road.

We commend the churches whose vision has lead them to reach out with the message of Jesus and rejoice with them that God is richly blessing.

The Digest of Letters and Historical Interests was given by Woodruff T. Chandler, showing what the Association had done in all phases of work during the past year.

### EVENTS OF HISTORICAL INTERESTS

Campbellsville — New Educational building constructed at Acton Mission.

Elkhorn — Rev. Lillard Dunn, Jr. was called January 1959. Built a new outside rest room, purchased 50 new Broadman Hymnals, organized Cradle Roll and Extension department, elected Superintendent of Training, added new light for piano and pulpit.

Frienship — Added new Sunday School room, finished remodeling church brick on outside, new furniture in children's Sunday School rooms and new walk around church.

Good Hope — Added folding doors and chairs in Sunday School Annex.

Liberty — Three Sunday School rooms completed in basement, new piano and song books, driveway blacktopped, parking space covered with rock.

12. Campbellsville College.

The report on Campbellsville College was given by Dean Roy O. Chumbler and adopted. Dr. John R. Carter and Dr. D. L. Druien spoke to the report.

**REPORT OF CAMPBELLVILLE COLLEGE**

Campbellsville College started its fourth year work on September 14, 1959, with an enrolment of 590 day students and approximately 80 evening and Saturday students. This is an increase of 100 students over a year ago. This is a capacity enrollment for the present facilities..

The college has bought a new music building and made a total of twenty-four new offices for teachers. It has increased its teaching personnel from twenty-two teachers to thirty-six full time and part time teachers.

Campbellsville Industry for the first time will be able to break even on its work program. It is catering to the average income student.

The college is training from 60 to 100 ministerial students and its ministers are scattered throughout the state. It has enrolled students from four foreign countries, twelve states and sixty-six counties of Kentucky.

Its greatest field is teaching, and the job here is to cause teachers in this area to be Christian teachers and the leaders in Christian principles.

The Baptists in this area will be proud of a college which stands for something. We believe in having Baptist teachers to minister to the school which is 75 per cent Baptist in enrollment and has three-fourths of its teachers Baptist. We shall give first opportunity always to Baptist teachers, and our last resort will be to hire teachers of other denominations.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is provided by institutions whose teachers are dedicated Christians and whose students are, for the most part, the same. Now, mathematics, languages, or short hand in a Christian school will not differ materially from the same courses in a secular school; but the teachers doing the teaching and the atmosphere on the campuses make the difference. Such subjects as science, history, literature, or philosophy, however, taught by a Christian in Christian college may differ diametrically from similar courses in public schools. Certainly there are many fine dedicated Christians teaching in public or secular schools for which fact we thank God fervently; but by law they are forbidden to teach the Bible or religion, and they should be because of denominational differences.

**REPORT ON HOSPITALS**

Kentucky Baptists operate three general hospitals within the state. Central Baptist Hospital is located in Lexington and ministered to 8,411 patients during 1958. It has 320 employees on the staff and last year charged off \$114,444.63 for charity, bad debts, and discounts to ministers.

Western Baptist Hospital located in Paducah cared for 6,489 patients last year and charged off \$16,851.73 for charity, bad debts, and discount to ministers.

The oldest of our three hospitals, called Kentucky Baptist Hospital, located in Louisville. Last year this institution cared for 18,814 patients and charged off \$104,025.18 to charity, ministerial discounts, and bad debts.

The Mother's Day offering for charity work last year amounted to \$34,309.65. Thus, you see we greatly need to increase our Mother's Day offering for charity work.

We in Taylor County Association are proud of the fact that every church in our body had part in the Mother's Day offering this year. The committee would like to suggest that we increase these offerings on next Mother's Day.

17. Relief and Annuity.

The report on Relief and Annuity was given by Dr. J. L. Robinson and adopted.

**REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY**

The responsibility of this Board is to promote and administer all matters pertaining to providing an income for retired preachers, their wives, and denominational workers.

In 1958 the 4000 annuitants received an average monthly benefit of \$60.00 plus, and the approximately 1300 on the relief roll received a monthly benefit of \$15.00 plus.

The annuitants in Kentucky, 119 in number, received the same average payments of all participants, \$60.00. On the relief roll the 97 beneficiaries received an average monthly grant of \$23.00 plus.

Averages are deceptive but from them the fact can be gleaned that

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a serious need confronts the churches in supplying the physical needs of the servants of the Lord when they are no longer physically able to carry on the work.

To meet this need the churches are being requested to enroll their pastors in the lately agreed annuity plan, the churches paying 2/3 and the General Association 1/3 of the monthly cost. Association Brotherhoods have been enlisted to work with Rev. B. F. Fox in holding meetings to present the plans to the laymen who will in turn present them to the churches. Such benefits as provided for in the plan mean so much to the ones who served you through the years and should be a source of rejoicing in the churches for the privilege of a continued expression of their gratitude to these servants of the Lord who labored with them.

**REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE**

Information is a vital link in man's relationship with his fellowman. We as Baptists of course have realized this fact and therefore have made provision to provide information links among our people in various forms of "religious literature" publications. There are many and varied pieces of denominational print for our use. I think we have been very fortunate to have access to the capable writers who have a part in these publications.

As to a report on these various materials, we would mention only a few, namely "The Commission," as it deals with events and experiences of our foreign mission work, "The Home Mission Magazine," as it deals with happenings in our own homeland, and the magazine with which we are most familiar, our own "Western Recorder." The Western Recorder has reported this year, one of its best years in its history; showing a financial profit for one of few times in its history. Circulation has been increased and the paper is now reaching 63,000 subscribers in all 50 states and about 30 foreign nations. Each foreign missionary from Kentucky receives the paper free of charge. In the modern Western Recorder print shop, the paper did a \$103,000 business last year making possible the producing of the paper on a better financial basis and also aiding in the acquiring of new and better equipment.

These words from Dr. C. R. Daley, the editor, state: "informed Baptists are interested Baptists and interested Baptists are active supporters of the world wide Baptist enterprise," and that is of course, the winning of lost souls for Christ.

I would further recommend the "Home Life" as an article of literature for daily use as a guide for family devotion, as well as for the other inspiring articles which it contains.

In closing this report, "may God's Holy Word be the lamp unto your feet and the guide unto your pathway."

**REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS**

The Temperance League of Kentucky is deeply indebted to the 3,000 member churches which have supported their four point program against the liquor traffic.

Here is a summary of the program's accomplishments.

1. Information Bureau:

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Each Sunday through out the year (except the Sunday preceding Christmas and Easter Sunday) speakers participated in field days in some part of Kentucky. The information bureau also distributes printed materials.

### 2. Legislative Work:

During the past eight years no wet legislation has been passed by our state legislature. The wets will do every thing in their power to elect wet leaders in 1960. Let us be sure that our county is represented by a Christian dry.

The Temperance League will promote a program of dry legislation in 1960. A few of the bills they would like to see enacted are:

- (a) Close all drive-in windows at liquor stores.
- (b) Strengthen our salacious literature laws.
- (c) Eliminate all Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages.
- (d) Stop proposed bill to sell alcoholic beverages on college campuses.

### 3. Local Option:

Local option will work: A county gets the type of law enforcement its people desire.

### 4. Educational Program:

Temperance League men have presented the visual education program to approximately 50,000 students in Kentucky's high schools this year. The program is free to any school.

The Temperance League asks your continued support for the greatest advances of the Temperance movement.

## **REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS**

In 1958-59 Kentucky Baptists made approximately \$500,000.00 available for State Missions. Of this amount \$400,000.00 came through the Cooperative Program and the remaining \$100,000.00 came from designated special offerings and interest on trust funds.

The Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Student Union, and Church Music Departments have received almost 40% of the State Mission money.

Payments on the Kentucky Baptist Building, the Student Center, Building Program, and Cedarmore, along with insurance, repairs and maintenance, operations and Social Security and other miscellaneous expenses have accounted for about \$65,000.00.

Approximately \$260,000.00 has been spent in the Direct Missions Pro-

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gram and in the promotion of Colored Baptist work, Evangelistic Clinics and other related enterprises.

The Direct Missions Program is composed of the Secretary of Missions and Evangelism, three General Workers, two City Superintendents, 12 District Missionaries, 37 Associational Missionaries, 14 County Missionaries, 19 Local Missionaries and 4 special workers. This program touches 72 of our 82 Associations. The Missionaries are paid jointly by the State Board and local groups, with the exception that in one case the total amount is paid by the State and in two other cases the total amount is paid by the local group. During the year June 1, 1958 through May 31, 1959, our Missionaries reported the following:

### REPORT ON KENTUCKY BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The work of the Kentucky Baptist Foundation continues to expand in assets and usefulness to Kentucky Baptists. In the 15 years of existence of the Foundation much of the promotion has been in seed sowing, but we are now beginning to reap the harvest from the seed sown. The Foundation is administering a portion of the endowment of all our Institutions.

This cooperation of the heads of our Institutions with their boards is an indication of the faith they have in the Administration and operation of the Institution.

The latest figures reveal \$1,422,723.43 on which it earned 4.7% or a total of \$61,233.43 for the year. During the years of its existence it has paid to our institutions over \$250,000.00 in earnings.

The foundation has contributed much to our work in the years that have passed.

Loans are made to churches for buildings and improvements, and even to the Relief and Annuity Board to supplement relief to Baptist Ministers or their widows in Kentucky.

The Survey Committee appointed by Kentucky Baptist last year at Elizabethtown to study all our Baptist work in Kentucky is making some significant recommendations to the meeting of the General Association

which will greatly widen and extend the work of the Foundation if passed. The chief thing is the electing of a full time Secretary and be made a Department of our work.

We encourage our people and Institutions to look with favor upon the Kentucky Baptist Foundation.

The report on Evangelism was given by Rev. J. V. Mullen, Jr. and adopted. Rev. Mullen spoke to the report.

### REPORT ON EVANGELISM

Jesus Christ is depending on His churches to be instrumental in preaching the gospel to every creature. Churches are to use every available means to get the message of the Bible to the people.

The answer to this is "Church-Centered Evangelism" — "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1:8.

It is tremendously important that followers of Christ understand clearly what they are commissioned to do while here on earth. New churches not only have the message, they have the mission. Christ Himself is the message, and He assigned the mission. Churches know how to reach people with the message of redemption. They know the best tried, successful methods of reaching people with the message. The school of the church is adequate for this task. The work of evangelism has no parallel. Nothing can take its place. A church cannot neglect it and prosper.

All the preparations for the world's greatest Simultaneous Evangelistic Campaigns came to its climax in March and April of 1959. Kentucky Baptists had joined other Baptists throughout the world in an intensive program looking forward to the 1959 Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade.

The various organizations of the churches followed the general plans as outlined in the Revival Plan Booklet. This involved a religious census, personal evangelism, much prayer and an unprecedented amount of Spiritual preparation on the part of church members.

Complete reports were obtained from 67 Associations, indicating that half of the local churches in Kentucky entered the Simultaneous Crusade. These churches reported 6,000 baptisms during the campaign. They also reported that approximately 2,500 Baptists moved their letters in March and April.

Kentucky Baptists now face the challenge of conserving the results of Evangelism during this year by making use of every person won and by entering heartily into the emphasis on Teaching and Training for 1960.

In our Association this year we have these facts: that gives us this picture. There were 13 churches that were in the Simultaneous Crusade, and 15 churches holding a revival meeting. From these there were 342 baptisms and 285 letters moved.

The "M" Night for this year will be held at the Campbellville Church with the attendance set at 900.

Four mass meetings were held with a total attendance of 1147. The 1959 Kentucky Honor Church Program, a plan designed to strengthen every Training Union and encourage growth, has made a worthy contribution to the work in our Association. We have had 11 churches to earn the diploma and 18 seals.

This year one Junior and six Young People took part in the associational events. Joe Warren representing Friendship took part in the Junior Memory Work and Bible Drill.

Those taking part in the Young People's Speakers Tournament were: Judy Garnett representing Palestine; Bill Moxley representing Robinson Creek; Diane Dewitt representing Campbellville; Darrell White representing Campbellville; Ovalen Wade representing South Campbellville; Eugene Overstreet representing Yuma. Diane Dewitt won the B section and Eugene Overstreet won the A section. Eugene won the regional and went to the State Training Union Convention at Bowling Green.

We observed Youth Night June 9th at Friendship. 135 Young People attended representing 12 churches.

We had two churches in our Association to report a Youth Week.

Our Association helped break all records for Training Union Study Course awards in Kentucky by fourteen churches requesting approximately 530 awards. October 1, 1959 the Training Union plan for Study Courses will be combined with that of the Sunday School and Music phase of our Baptist work. The system will be called "Church Study Course for Teaching and Training." The Kentucky goal for awards during 1960 is 100,000.

Of the fifteen churches in Taylor County Association fourteen have Training Union. We hope to have a Training Union in this remaining church by next year.

**REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION**

The progress of Woman's Missionary Union throughout the past year makes it obvious that the W M U Watchword was appropriate: "Sing unto the Lord, bless His name; shew forth His salvation from day to day." Psalm 96:2.

There has been a gain in number of organizations, but the WMS and YWA membership has dropped slightly. Let us study our organizations to determine the cause and seek its remedy. A splendid scholarship program gave assistance to 37 students and six Margaret Fund students, children of missionaries, studied in Kentucky and received the ministry of Kentucky WMU. A very successful Camp program was had at Cedarmore with a total of 1228 attending, some camp full time with an additional 200 being present for one or more days. Lack of space prohibited a larger camp program. The Kentucky WMU erected two new cottages at Cedarmore and plans two more next year. The WMU hopes that individuals, churches and associations will follow their example and help provide more space at Cedarmore.

The progress of the work in Taylor County is encouraging. Under the faithful leadership of the WMU President, Mrs. James Hunt, all phases of the WMU work has made progress. Two new WMU organizations are reported at Salem and Pleasant Hill. Mrs. Edwin Parrott, YWA leader, reports progress from one to three organizations. Mrs. James Bennett, GA leader, reports advance in the GA work with three new organizations at Palestine, Pike's Ridge and South Campbellville. The Sunbeams have had a good year under the guidance of Mrs. Wesley Parrott.

Let us pledge our prayerful cooperation to this important phase of the Lord's work.

32. Baptist Student Union

The report on Baptist Student Union was given by Darriel White, B. S. U. President, Campbellsville College and was adopted.

**REPORT OF BAPTIST STUDENT UNION**

Kentucky Baptists have a two-fold approach to the challenge of seeing that the spiritual element is present in the education of every college student. This is provided through our own Baptist college and through the Baptist Student Union.

We now have approximately 10,000 Baptist students in colleges and universities in the state. About 2,000 of these Baptist students are in our own Baptist schools. The other 8,000 are in non-Baptist schools. However, college campuses have been in and will continue to be in an unprecedented growth in enrollments.

By 1970 reliable surveys predict that there will be about 22,000 Baptist students in college. Dr. Harley Fight, President of Carson Newman College says, "Predictions are that by 1977 three-fourths of all college students will attend tax-supported institutions." This leaves only one-fourth to be educated in church and private schools.

Concerning the effectiveness of the Baptist Student Union last year, there were 244 Kentucky college students converted. The Sunday School and Training Unions have increased considerably. We have been able to start a very intensive ministry among the International students attending colleges and universities in this country. The core of this program centers around the International Retreat held at Thanksgiving time. Since 1954, 520 Internationals have attended these retreats. They have represented 67 countries and political areas.

The use of B. S. U. Directors and better facilities has made some tremendous increases, also, in the number of full-time Christian workers and foreign mission appointees.

## REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOMES

### Glen Dale Children's Home

The big news from Glen Dale is "the new look". Two new cottages were completed in December and have been occupied since the Christmas holidays. The grounds surrounding the new cottages have been seeded, walks and steps have been poured, and shrubbery has been planted. Ground has been broken for a new administration building and two additional cottages. These new building are expected to be finished next year.

Last year 230 children were cared for. 21 made professions of faith in Christ, and were baptized. At the present time there are 200 children under care. This spring 5 were graduated from high school and one girl received her A.B. degree at Georgetown.

With a program of expanded services, with operating costs gradually increasing in these inflationary times, and with a new and expensive building program under way, Glen Dale is in need of increased support.

### Spring Meadows

On June 30, Spring Meadows began its 91st year of service to children, the home having been founded in 1869, only four years after the ending of the Civil War.

During the past year Spring Meadows has cared for a total of 263 children. 60 children were admitted to the Home, a total of 74 children were returned to their families during the year. This high number is due largely to the effective work of the two case workers on the Spring

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Meadows staff who work diligently to sustain and strengthen family ties and to re-establish broken homes.

One of the most significant developments during the year was the granting to Spring Meadows a license as "a child placing agency" by the bureau of Children's Services, Frankfort. The granting of this license will enable the Home, to expand its boarding home program and to launch a greatly expanded adoption program. Since the granting of the license, 8 children have been placed for adoption.

Every Kentucky Baptist is urged to have a part in the Thanksgiving offering this year.

36. Home Missions.

**REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS**

1959 has been marked with some striking advances in missions and evangelism among labors of cooperating churches through the Home Mission Board. Dr. Courts Redford, our Executive Secretary-Treasurer reports that on May 1, 1959 we had a total of 1,383 Home Mission personnel. In addition we have 450 student summer missionaries and 382 Southern Baptist Chaplains. During 1958 our Home Missionaries reported 41,859 professions of faith and our Chaplains reported 11,203 professions of faith, we constituted 399 new churches and 564 new missions during the year.

The Home Mission Board has been reorganized this past year into five divisions: Missions, Evangelism, Education and Promotion, Church Loan, and Chaplains Divisions.

Our work in Cuba and Panama continue to make progress toward self-support.

Our new mission work in the states of the north continue to receive God's blessings of growth. The work is being centered around the great Metropolitan areas.

The Church Loan Department has been increased to provide more pastoral aid to the new pioneer fields of the north.

Over 29,000 churches participated in the Simultaneous Crusades in 1959. Evangelism and personal witnessing was the theme of the 1959 Home Mission Graded Study Series. The Books had a circulation of over 335,000. The number of churches conducting schools increased to 2,500. Two "How To Do It" filmstrips were produced on Evangelism.

Southern Baptist Convention growth is Home Mission Progress. We must continue to claim our land for Christ.

37. Foreign Missions.

The report on Foreign Missions was given by Rev. L. W. Fishburn and adopted. Dr. D. L. Druien spoke to the report.

**REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS**

Appointments totaling 137 during 1958 and 36 from January to May 1959, brings the number of foreign missionaries in active service to 1,305. The appointment goal for all of 1959 is 140. The Board expects to reach its Advance Program goal of 2000 missionaries by January 1, 1964. At the end of 1958, there were 742 urgent requests for new missionaries.

During 1958 Southern Baptist had resident missionaries in 39 countries.

Mission work is carried on through a varying number of institutions on each mission field — churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants, good will centers. But all are interactive and the goal of each is evangelism. Whatever their institutional duties, all missionaries participate in the work of the churches in their stations.

Pastors on mission fields include 122 missionaries and 1,955 nationals. Almost all the churches have Sunday Schools and many of them have other church affiliated organizations. The 3,229 churches and 6,116 out-stations report 4,384 Sunday Schools with 341,115 enrolled. The churches report 416,750 members, with 29,990 baptisms during the year.

Medical mission institutions include 17 hospitals and 58 clinics and dispensaries with a total of 124 buildings and 854 beds. Personnel includes 46 missionaries and 54 national physicians, 55 missionary and national nurses. They served 331,121 patients during the year of whom 25,734 were in-patients.

The foreign mission board received \$15,334,738.58 from all sources during 1958. \$6,762,448.63 of this amount was received from the Lottie Moon Christmas offering.

Educational work not only offers opportunities for evangelism, but also trains a strong national leadership. The 887 Baptist Schools, which enroll 129,210 students, are served by 4,995 national and 305 missionary teachers. Among the schools are 28 theological institutions with 1,152 students and 4 women's training schools with 256 students.

38. Radio and Television.

**REPORT ON RADIO AND TELEVISION**

In 1958 and early 1959, a project called TELEVANGELISM took shape and gave new impetus to the television series THIS IS THE ANSWER. It was a new slant on visitation coupled with television which captured the imagination of individuals and churches all over the nation.

Because of the success of Televangelism, 1959 has been proposed as

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one facet of the entire Baptist Jubilees Advance for the next five years.

With a vast background of experience in how to use television programs in connection with a program of church visitation, now it is hoped that Televangelism, 1960, will reach more people and have an even greater impact for Christ.

During the first six weeks of the TV series, mail to the Commission had reached the highest proportion in its history.

THIS IS THE ANSWER continues in popularity and effectiveness. Thirteen new films were produced and distributed for use in 1959.

Larger Cooperative Program allotments will make it possible to produce 13 new films annually now with prospects of eventually reaching 26 yearly dramas.

A new project launched in April, 1959, is a new concept in religious radio called "Master Control." The 30 minute program has a "magazine" format with a variety of music, comments on the news, features about people, ideas and places, classical and semi-classical music, challenging interviews, and, most important, a period of brief but direct gospel preaching.

This new program brings to five the major productions produced weekly for radio. Total number of stations broadcasting these will soon run to 800.

An average of 100 television stations have scheduled "This is the Answer" throughout the year. The Baptist Hour fluctuates but maintains a steady average of 460 stations. More than 1,000 tape recordings are mailed every two weeks to all parts of the world as Southern Baptists have a vital part in missions through radio.

The Television Program "This is the Answer" can be seen over WAVE-TV, Louisville, on Sunday at 1:00 P. M.

The Baptist Hour is heard over WTCO Campbellsville, Kentucky at 5:00 P. M. each Sunday.

The South Campbellsville Baptist Church is in their thirteenth year of Radio Broadcasting. This program is heard each Sunday morning over WTCO at 8:30 A. M.

A look at the last year to see if we are faithful and wise stewards.

The Churches of Taylor County gave \$151.32 more to the cooperative program in 1959 than in 1958. \$1644.15 more total mission expenditures,

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and \$9755.09 more total expenditures for all purposes. This represents almost 3.2% increase in total gifts to missions. While this is very good, how much would it be if all churches were using the forward program of church finance as reported by Bro. Chaney:

"Most Kentucky Churches that have used the Forward Program have stepped up their giving to world missions through the cooperative Program. According to the report of our Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Dr. W. C. Boone, in the June 4-11, 1959 issues of the Western Recorder, Kentucky Churches using the Forward Program gave \$54,144.00 more for world missions through the Cooperative Program during the first six months of this associational year than they did in the corresponding period before use of the Forward Program. Projected over the year and, assuming they continue the same level of increase, these churches will give over \$108,000.00 more than they gave in the year before using the Forward Program."

We must believe God has given us the answer by which we can go into all the world and preach the Gospel, so let us be found faithful and wise stewards.

### REPORT ON AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society rejoices in Southern Baptist plans for the Baptist Jubilee Advance 1959 - 1964, because Southern Baptists thoroughly recognize these basic missionary principles: People must have the Bible because it presents Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations. Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

In most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay after he leaves, and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

During 1958 the American Bible Society — — — —

—distributed around the world a record total over 16½ million volumes of scriptures.

3. Motion by Rev. T. H. Harding seconded and passed, Chairmen of all organizations, Moderator and Clerk, meet and draw up a calendar of Associational activities for the coming year and present at the next board meeting.

4. Motion made, seconded and passed authorizing Executive Board to name additional members to the Budget Committee. The Board named Bro. Willard Kendall, Rev. Gilbert Sapp and Rev. W. E. Miller.

5. Dr. D. L. Druien presented the following Memorial Resolution, which was adopted:

**A MEMORIAL RESOLUTION**

Be it resolved that we, the Messengers from churches of the Taylor County Association, in regular session with the Friendship Baptist Church on the 25th day of September 1959, take note of the fact that the first offering ever taken in Kentucky for Foreign Missions was taken here at the church during the session of the Association in September 1815 by Luther Rice, agent for the American Baptist Foreign Board. The amount received and turned over to the Missionary was \$114.40.

We gratefully recognize the spirit of those who have gone before us in the desire to support our Foreign Mission Work.
