Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each church member in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first 100 (one hundred) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the Association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hands, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superseded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. The body shall meet annually, according to adjournment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distributing of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources: shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and shall make monthly and annual reports to the Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II — COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The program committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The nominating committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, All Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers, all Associational Music Department Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.

6. Each committee will be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Since Christian leadership is directly related to and dependent on Christian education, each local Baptist Church in the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky has reason to be greatly concerned about these educational institutions operated under the auspices of the General Association.

The General Association, at its meeting in Lexington, appointed a Christian Education Committee of fifteen voting members, including members of the clergy and laymen. This committee has held two meetings, but several sub-committees are at work developing plans for a much more effective and efficient program of Christian education for Kentucky Baptists. Included in the projects presently under study are an evaluation of the program of Christian education offered by each college or school, a fair and more equitable formula for distribution of Cooperative Program funds, and a uniform reporting system for enrollment and financial data from the colleges and other schools.

Following is a brief statement concerning each of our colleges and other schools:

Bethel College at Hopkinsville has a 1959-1960 enrollment of 220 full-time students. A new physical education building has been erected and opened in 1959.

Campbellsville College is now a four-year college and it now has more students than ever before. The college is planning to build a library

building this year and also to remodel and put an addition to the music building. The industry is also making progress.

Cumberland College will graduate its first four-year class in May of 1961. A library building is under construction.

Clear Creek Baptist School is a three year theological school and continues its great ministry of training pastors.

Georgetown College is our oldest co-educational institution of higher learning in the South. The enrollment during the nine month academic year (last) was 1,414. A new girls' dormitory has recently been completed.

Magoffin and Oneida Institutes continue to render service to young people from Kentucky and from elsewhere.

Our newest college is the Greater Louisville College. Prospects are bright for the growth of this institution.

Now is the time for Kentucky Baptists to rally to the support of Christian education.

14. Campbellsville College.

In the absence of Marshall Lyons the report on Campbellsville College was given by Dr. John M. Carter and adopted.

REPORT ON CAMPBELLVILLE COLLEGE

The college enrolled for the school year beginning September, 1959, 967 different students. Also, 301 students were enrolled for the summer session. The college, although finding it necessary to limit enrollment because of the facilities, will have a slight increase in enrollment in the fall. The first senior class was graduated from Campbellsville College with 49 students receiving the B. A. and B. S. degrees.

The present building program of the college included a new library — two stories 60 x 120 feet, to accommodate a student body of over a thousand, and five additional class rooms; a music building to include ten practice rooms and five additional class rooms.

The Industry Program continues to move forward and is providing work for a number of students at eighty cents and one dollar an hour. Many students are able to attend college because of the industry who originally could not enroll.

The college also has enlarged the faculty and employed additional persons holding the doctorate degree with a total number on the faculty at present of 37 and 9 holding the doctors degree.

There is urgent need at present for dormitory space for men. The college has no housing except for freshmen boys. The other students must find rooms in town, and because of this we lose quite a few.

The college also has approximately one-third of the money for the library. An additional forty thousand dollars must come in from pledges from the campaign fund. The college is hoping and praying that some friend or friends will be led to help us in securing the remaining forty thousand. The library must go up this year or our accreditation will be in danger.

15. Hospitals.

The report on Hospitals was given by Dr. J. Chester Badgett and adopted. Dr. Badgett spoke to the report.

REPORT ON HOSPITALS

Baptists feel that if we are to emulate the pattern of Christ's ministry that it must include Teaching, Preaching, and Healing.

On the Southwide level we have two Baptist Hospitals: Southern Baptist Hospital, New Orleans and Memorial Hospital, Jacksonville. A small amount of Southwide Cooperative receipts is allocated to these hospitals. Each receives \$12,500.00 for charity work and \$25,000.00 each for capital improvements. Last year these hospitals treated 40,669 patients at a total operating cost of \$7,610,448.39. The staff of Chaplains made 24,575 bedside visits. Of special interest to us is the fact that these hospitals last year treated 34,664 patients. There were 5,672 babies born with \$46,380.32 spent from the Charity Hospital Fund provided by the Sunday Schools over the state.

The hospitals receive \$144,000.00 annually from the Cooperative Program, but this must be applied on the debt. The funds for charity work must be provided through the Mother's Day Offering. Last year all our churches took this offering, but all did not specify the purpose of the offering as it was sent in.

We have a teaching ministry through our Southwide and State Hospitals which includes Nursing, Medical and X-ray Technology. We should be eager to encourage young people to explore the possibility of hospital careers as their vocations.

16. Children's Homes.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOMES

On June 30th, Kentucky Baptist began their 92nd year of service to Homeless and dependent children.

Spring Meadows at Middletown, Glen Dale at Glendale and Pine Crest at Morehead, cared for a grand total of 557 children last year. On June 1st the Homes were caring for 450 children. During the year more than 50 children accepted Christ and were baptized.

Outstanding developments in our Kentucky Baptist Program of Child Care during the past year include the following:

1. The setting up in Middletown of a Central Office for the Board of Child Care with Sam Ed. Bradley, Superintendent of Spring Meadows since 1947 and of Pine Crest from its establishment, being named General Superintendent. Rev. J. D. Herndon, Owensboro pastor, was made

Superintendent of Spring Meadows, and Mrs. Virginia R. Fields, Resident Director of Pine Crest was made Superintendent of that Home.

2. The erection of a splendid new administration building and two new cottages at Glen Dale. Three new buildings replaced old ones. This completes the rebuilding of the facilities at Glen Dale.
3. The inauguration of case work service at Glen Dale with the naming of David Brown, 1960 Carver School of Missions and Social Work graduate as Director of Case Work.

We would remind you that the wonderful work of our Baptist Homes for Children is made possible by a portion of Cooperative Program funds, designated gifts, bequests in wills and the annual Thanksgiving Offering. Each church in our Association is urged to do their best in the Thanksgiving Offering.

17. Relief and Annuity.

The Report on Relief and Annuity was given by Rev. R. S. Moore and adopted. Rev. Moore spoke to the report.

REPORT ON RELIEF AND ANNUITY

The Annuity Board has been in operation forty-two years. In 1959 benefits amounting to \$2,267,455.85 were paid to more than 5300 retired or disabled ministers and denominational workers or widows.

A ten per cent increase in new members in all the retirement plans, 3026, was recorded in 1959. 20,741 ministers and denominational workers in 12,000 churches or agencies are now cooperating.

Approximately twenty per cent of the churches enlisted are now paying the full cost of the Protection Plan for their pastors.

Every state convention has pledged support in trying to reach the goal of 75 per cent of Southern Baptist pastors and churches enlisted in the protection plan by January 1, 1961.

March 1, 1960, 793 pastors and 780 churches in Kentucky were actively participating.

During 1959, \$107,901.73 was paid to 123 annuitants. Thirteen ministers retired from age, and four widows were added to the annuity roll.

Relief benefits totaling \$21,192.76 were paid to 41 ministers and 55 widows.

Brotherhoods in Kentucky are working in cooperation with Rev. Baynard F. Fox, Field Representative, in holding meetings in every Association to present this matter to the laymen so that they may bring it before the churches.

Of churches with memberships of 300 or more, 60 percent are enlisted in the retirement program; whereas the churches with fewer than 300 members show only 16 per cent in participation. Of the 2269 churches in Kentucky, only 793 — or 35 per cent — are actively participating.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

The Western Recorder rejoices with you in a long and honorable history of faithful service to Kentucky Baptist and the year of 1959-1960 is by no means an exception.

Financially enjoyed the best year in the history of the paper. Their total income for the year 1959 amounted to more than \$241,000 and from all indications will surpass the quarter-of-a-million mark by the end of this associational year.

Circulation continues on an upward trend. More than five thousand new families were added to their list to receive the paper during the month of May.

In cooperation with the Department of Evangelism. They plan to publish in the early fall, a series of articles designed to help reach the lost of our State. They are asking several prominent laymen from over the South to write an article giving their testimony as to what Christ has meant in their life, along with these articles. They are also planning another series written by Kentucky pastors, explaining the Plan of Salvation as it is recorded in God's Word. Papers carrying these articles will be mailed directly to the homes of lost people whose names will be furnished to them by the churches. Further details will be coming our way as the plan develops, in the meantime please let us join in prayer asking God's help and guidance as they seek to reach these who are lost and do not attend the services of our churches.

19. Report on Temperance and Morals.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

The progress of the past year shows that the cooperating churches through the Temperance League have added to our "knowledge temperance" by financial support, active participation and prayers.

The following information is a resume of such progress.

1. Information Bureau.

Each Sunday through out the year (except the Sunday immediately preceding Christmas and Easter Sunday) the members of the Speakers Bureau have participated in Field Day preaching engagements in some parts of Kentucky.

The League has available on a loan basis the latest booklets and pamphlets on how to help alcoholics.

2. Legislative Work.

No wet legislation has been passed by our State Legislature during the past ten years. Kentucky leads the nation in the Temperance Legislative Field.

Each Association should vote to endorse the League's Legislative objectives: To close all drive in windows at liquor stores, make it illegal to carry alcoholic beverages anywhere except in the trunk of the car in wet territory, eliminate wet bill boards in dry territory, strengthen our laws against pronographic literature, eliminate pin-ball gambling, restore the County unit plan of local option, eliminate all Sunday sales of alcoholic beverages in wet territory and strengthen anti-bootlegging laws.

20. Report on State Missions.

The report on State Missions was given by Mr. W. T. Blevins and adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

Kentucky Baptists made it possible for a total of \$1,584,000 to be budgeted to State Causes. \$546,640 of this went for all departmental work. The Direct Missions Department received an appropriation of \$266,812, and all other departments received \$279,828. Payments on the Kentucky Baptist Building Student Centers, and Cedarmore were carried in the budget for \$36,800.

The District Missions Department has a staff or personnel and missionaries of 140. Through their efforts in one year they made 49,797 visits, preached and taught in 18,498 services, traveled 1,486,798 miles, had 1,778 professions of faith and 504 additions to churches by letter.

Within the four years Kentucky Baptist will assume the entire responsibility for Home Missions in our state.

Southern Baptists are in the fourth year of the 30,000 movement. The purpose of the 30,000 Movement is to establish 10,000 churches and 20,000 missions by 1964, to reach, teach, and win individuals to Christ, and train them to live Christian lives. This movement began in 1956. Since then we have, in Kentucky, begun 103 new churches and 225 missions. Kentucky and Missouri are virtually tied for fifth place in the number of new preaching stations. The grand total of all new churches and missions reported during the first three and one half years over the entire Convention is 9,601.

Your state Superintendent of Missions and Evangelism will be happy to help in any way possible in the location, establishment, or constitution of new preaching stations and churches.

REPORT OF KENTUCKY BAPTIST FOUNDATION

This agency was created in 1945 for the purpose of soliciting, receiving and administering trust funds for all Kentucky and Southwide Baptist institutions.

All of its funds come from wills and gifts. No part of the principal is ever spent, only invested. The principal will always be held as a sacred trust. The Foundation now administers all, or a portion of, the endowment of every Kentucky Baptist institution. This year (1960) the Foundation will distribute \$64,000.00 to the various institutions, in proportion to their deposits with the Foundation.

Through the Foundation is the best way to make a gift or bequest perpetual. The income from the invested principal will equal the original amount in twenty years, and the principal will still be working when the Lord comes.

22. Report on District Missions.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

Kentucky Baptists have marched forward in evangelism in 1960. The churches have been engaged in a campaign to conserve the results of the Simultaneous Crusades of 1959 and to reach more people for the Lord.

An unusually good state Evangelistic conference was held in January and Evangelism Clinics were conducted in fifty of the Associations.

Although three years, 1950, 1951, and 1955, had seen more baptisms reported by Kentucky churches than were reported last year, when the fact that two state conventions, Ohio and Indiana, have been formed from churches reporting baptisms through the General Association in past years, it becomes obvious that last year was the best year in evangelism that Kentucky Baptists have known.

It must be pointed out, however, that in 1950 Kentucky Baptists reported baptisms at the ratio of one baptism for each 24.4 members. If the same ratio had held for 1959 as that of 1950, Kentucky Baptist churches would have reported almost 33,000 baptisms instead of the 24,000 which were reported.

If the ratio of baptisms to church membership in Kentucky is to be improved Kentucky Baptists must experience a genuine concern for the lost and must be much in prayer for fellow Christians and for lost kindred and acquaintances.

The reports provided by our churches indicate that in our Association during this year we have been able to make the following accomplishments:

3 of our churches have had two or more revival meetings.
15 of our churches have had one revival during the year.
10 of our churches reported baptisms during the year.

The total number of baptisms reported by the churches during the year was 179.

It has been recommended that every church prayerfully consider setting a goal for the minimum number of baptisms during the next year of one baptism for every 20 members of the church.

REPORT ON DISTRICT MISSIONS

District Missions endeavor to help the local churches in Evangelism, Teaching and Training, this work is growing in the churches of Taylor County Baptist Association.

Your Board partly supports the pastor at Eunice Mission, paying \$12.50 a week on his salary and the Campbellsville Baptist Church pays \$45.00 a month and furnishes the literature and other supplies.

The Eunice Mission had average Sunday School attendance of 19, one baptism and held a Vacation Bible School. This mission is under the leadership of Rev. Kirby Kinman.

The Pleasant Hill Church supports Mission at Pitman Valley, Rev. Joe Brown is pastor. This Mission was constituted a church Sunday, September 4, 1960 and will be called Pitman Valley Baptist Church.

The Campbellsville Church has the following Missions:

Acton Mission — Average Sunday School attendance 33, baptisms 8 and 10 received by letter. New church building 28 x 80 feet completed this year.

Yuma Mission — Average Sunday School attendance 49, four baptisms and 5 received by letter. Have new building 28 x 82 feet ready for the roof.

Raikes Hill Mission — Average Sunday School attendance 30 with one baptism.

The Campbellsville Church also sponsors Mission at County Jail, and Mitzmeir Nursing Home.

26. Brotherhood Report.

In the absence of Dr. Roy G. Wilson, the report on Brotherhood was read by Bro. Samuel L. Crawley and adopted. Dr. D. L. Druen spoke to the report.

REPORT ON BROTHERHOOD

The enrollment in Kentucky Baptist Brotherhood is now 29,486 of which there are 10,831 boys enrolled in Royal Ambassador Chapters. The enrollment in Taylor County Baptist Association has likewise gained but probably not in as high a porportion of men to boys as in the state. The progress has been rather slow but is definitely growing. It is now accepted in the minds of the members of over half of our churches as the men and boys organization just as the W. M. U. has been accepted as the organization for women and girls. This new concept of Baptist Church life also encourages the other organizations of the church.

There were only one Brotherhood when this Association was founded. Now there are six which have regular meetings and a definite program. There were three associational meetings during the year which had a better attendance than previously. I believe this was partially due to the fact that an associational calendar was made and distributed early in the year, thus avoiding some of the conflicts that are bound to arise.

This Association had the unique privilege of having the first State-wide Brotherhood Meeting held at the Campbellsville Baptist Church in October 1959 at which time the State Brotherhood was organized.

I believe the Associational Brotherhood should encourage an associational calendar for the year, to be made as soon as possible and before the various churches make their calendars so there will be no conflicts with Associational meetings. Second, I believe more emphasis should be placed on the planning of the Brotherhood activities and programs, both of the church and associational meetings. Thirdly, the future of our denomination and of our country depends upon how we educate and develop our young people.

REPORT ON MUSIC

The ultimate purpose of the Associational Church Music Department is to help every constituent of our churches to play and to sing with the Spirit and understanding also 1 Corinthians 14:15.

During the past year Kentucky Baptist Associations have held 116 Hymn Sings, which have been attended by 12,982 people representing 994 churches. We have had four (4) Hymn Sings which were attended by 489 people who represented 43 churches.

A total of 2,393 Music Awards were earned this year by members from 317 churches. In Taylor County 2 churches gained 17 Awards. The state goal for music awards to be earned in 1961 is 4,449. May we earn 50 in Taylor County this coming year. If each of our churches will have one music class, we can far surpass this goal. Please contact your Music Director of the Association to assist you with your school, or help from the Music Department at Middletown for financial aid.

The Associations having the largest number of churches present is as follows: First, Graves County — 47 churches; Second, Nelson Third, with 44; Third, Taylor County with 43.

Thank you for your support of the music ministry of Taylor County that you have these past 3 years while I have been your Music Director. I appreciate all the assistance we have received.

May the Music interest continue to grow in the association among the churches. We urge that more of the brethren and sisters join in the work of singing for His glory.

28. Training Union.

REPORT ON TRAINING UNION

The primary purpose of the Training Union is to help build a Baptist Church. This year the Training Union has sought to re-emphasize the meaning of training in church membership, or developing mature Christians. The program of the Associational Training Union has been to help the churches achieve their aim.

Kentucky "M" Night attendance was larger and more churches were represented than in the previous year. Our meeting was attended by 901 people from 16 churches. The "M" Night meeting this year, using the theme, "Be Thou Faithful" (Rev. 2:10d), will be held at Campbellsville. The attendance goal has been set at 925.

This year 8 Juniors and Young people from 5 churches participated in the associational events. Miss Jane Carol Kessler, representing Friendship Baptist Church, was our participant in the Regional Junior Memory Work and Bible Drill.

Those taking part in the Young People's Speakers Tournament were: Misses Louise Russell and Ann Coakley representing Pleasant Hill; Mr. Billie Tillett representing Campbellsville; Misses Wilma Lee Leslie and Faye Fawcett representing Palestine; and Miss Carol Overstreet and Mr. Eugene Overstreet representing Yuma Mission, with Miss Wilma Lee Leslie from Palestine, representing the Association in Section A at the Regional Rally and Miss Ann Coakley from Pleasant Hill was our representative in Section B. The South Central Regional Training Union Rally was held at Pleasant Hill. Our Association was represented by 170 people from 10 churches.

Dr. J. Chester Badgett, pastor of the Campbellsville Church, served as president of the Kentucky Training Union for the past year, and has been elected to fill that position again this year.

We are happy to report that Miss Wilma Lee Leslie of the Palestine Church also represented the state of Kentucky in the Young People's Speakers Tournament at Ridgecrest, and was awarded second place honors there.

It has been by the spirit of the Lord of hosts that the Taylor County Woman's Missionary Union is today able to report gains in most every phase of work.

With an increase of 20 new members, we have had increases in Mission Study Classes, in tithers, in members giving through the Cooperative Program, in five day observance of the Week of Prayer and in gifts during the three Weeks of Prayer as follows: Lottie Moon offering, \$2023.61; Annie Armstrong offering, \$689.82; State Mission offering, \$328.72; gain over last year \$805.56. There have been gains in subscriptions to Royal Service, The Window and Tell.

There has been a slight loss in organizations participating in planned Community Missions.

The report of the Kentucky W. M. U. shows increases in membership in Mission Study, in tithers, in number of organizations observing the three Weeks of Prayer and a gain of more than \$43,000 in offerings during the three Weeks of Prayer.

This year again brought splendid camping programs at Cedarmore. There were 852 registered for four weeks of G. A. camps (12 of these from Taylor County) with 11 conversions, 21 rededications and 42 decisions for special vocational Christian service. There were 352 registered during W. M. U. Week, 103 for the W. M. U. week-end and 91 for the Y. W. A. week-end. Beginning October 1st, Mrs. Roy Wilson will take over the leadership responsibilities of the Taylor County Woman's Missionary Union. Pray with us for her as she labors in this capacity.

30. Baptist Student Union.

In the absence of Rev. Kirby Kinman B. S. U. report was read by Dr. J. Chester Badgett and adopted. Dr. Badgett spoke to the report.

BAPTIST STUDENT REPORT

STATE LEVEL: The Kentucky Baptist Student Union Department continues to be most proficient in the convention in ministering to the 11,407 Baptist Students in Kentucky colleges and universities. This is done in spite of having the fewest employees at the lowest salaries in the South. There were 271 college student conversions in Kentucky last year, second only by 41 to the leading state of Texas.

Outstanding is the service to the International student. The International Retreat, held this past Thanksgiving, was attended by 302 separate Internationals from Kentucky and Tennessee schools. At the retreat, 802 students from 72 countries and political areas, representing thirteen non-Christian religions have been presented the message of Christ.

CAMPBELLSVILLE CAMPUS: With above 60 students attending the B. S. U. convention at Georgetown in November, the year of Christian work on campus received great impetus. The effects were shown in a yearly average attendance in Vesper devotionals (held daily) of above 100.

Highlighting the years activity was the Religious Focus Week held in February, under the auspices of the Student Department. Prominent Baptist leaders from varied occupations lived on campus for five days, bearing testimonials of vital Christian living in prepared programs as well as class and dormitory discussions. Campbellsville Baptist Student Union led all the state in student evangelism. Our Youth Teams were sent out on 24 occasions with visible results totaling 28 conversions, 70

rededications, five committals to Christian service, and four church letters moved.

This years planning includes a student led revival, February 12 - 19, with Rev. Bill Cody, of the Foreign Mission Board as evangelist.

Several other programs will emphasize our objectives in evangelism, total commitment, Christian nurture, Vocational dedication, practical experience, missionary experience, and denominational loyalty.

33. Home Missions.

The report on Home Missions was given by Rev. Henry T. Parrott and adopted by the Association. Rev. Parrott spoke to the report.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Southern Baptists support a missionary force of more than 2,000 on Home Mission Fields. In addition there were 470 student summer missionaries. These missionaries reported 44,649 professions of faith in 1959.

The Annie Armstrong Offering and the Cooperative Program provided \$4,151,389.58 for Home Mission work during 1959. Our Association gave \$796 designated for Home Missions and \$26,989 through the Cooperative Program in 1959 and \$803 to Home Missions and \$27,573 through the Cooperative Program in 1959-60.

A major emphasis of Home Mission work, which is active in all states, is evangelism, church loans, chaplaincy, pioneer and associational missions, city missions, National Baptists and language group missions.

Pioneer missions received about \$1,312,000. The Church Loan Division has majored on pioneer areas. Loans amounting to almost \$2 million and totaling 155 were made during 1959. The Southern Baptist Convention has made \$4 million available to the Board for loans for the next 5-year period.

In 1959, Southern Baptists baptized 430,000. The Division of Evangelism will give increased emphasis on personal soul-winning and Christian growth.

More than half the Home Missionaries work with language groups, deaf and migrants.

Growth in hospital, institutional, and industrial chaplaincy was reported by the Division of Chaplaincy.

The expanding work of Home Missions depends on personnel, as well as money.

May we pray that God will send forth laborers into the harvest and may we give liberally of our material possessions.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

To the Taylor County Baptist Association:

Missionary Personnel: 1959-1960

Appointment totaling 144 in 1959 in the first quarter. In 1960 31 were appointed, with a goal of 150. The total Missionaries now in active

service are 1,407. The Board expects to have 2,000 Missionaries under appointment by the close of 1964. We now have 675 urgent requests in the field of Evangelism, Church Development, Nursing, and Religious Education Missionaries.

Southern Baptist now have Missionaries in 44 countries: Argentina, Bahamas, Brazil, Chile, Columbia, Costa Rica, Equador, France, Gaza, Ghana, Guatamala, Guiena, Hawaii, Honduras, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Isreal, Italy, Japan, Jordan, Kinya, Korea, Lebanon, Macao, Malaya, Mexico, Nigeria, Northern Rhodesia, Nyasaland, Okinawa, Pakistan, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Singaport, Southern Rhodesia, Spain. Southern Baptist reached six additional countries in 1959. There was 28,228 Baptisms in 1959.

Education:

The 1,002 Baptist Schools with enrollment of 151,276 students, with expansion for a small Seminary in Arusha, Tanganika, in 1960. The Seminary in Beriut, Lebanon will open in September, 1960, in temporary buildings. They will move to their new buildings in 1961.

Medical Work:

Seventeen hospitals and 80 clinics, with a total of 1,060 beds served 263,376 patients in 1959. At present a hospital is under construction in Hong Kong. The first medical Doctor for Thailand was appointed in December, 1959.

Receipts:

For Foreign Missions -- \$15,985,116.39 during 1959.

Lottie Moon Offering total -- \$7,706,847.29 during 1959.

The advance section of Cooperative Program was \$1,575,912.51 in 1959.

Home Office:

115 people work at the Foreign Mission Board Home Office, located at 3806 Monument Avenue, Richmond, Virginia.

The Board's magazine **The Commission** reported an average circulation of 107,024 last year.

35. Stewardship.

In the absence of Bro. Vontress Jones, the report of Stewardship was given by Rev. Marshall Black and adopted by the Association. Dr. D. L. Druien spoke to the report.

REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP

The Cooperative Program is all missions. It includes Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and State Missions. It includes hospitals, our children's homes, our minister's relief and retirement plans, our Radio and Television Commission.

The Cooperative Program has served Southern Baptists and the world for thirty-five years. This year the messengers to the Convention adopted the following resolution: "It is our conviction that the Cooperative Program of Southern Baptists is the fundamental, effective, and

indispensable channel of providing for the needs of all our work; and that we urge all Baptists to join in giving the Cooperative Program their loyal and undivided support."

Southern Baptists have given approximately \$483,354,000 through this primary channel. The total Cooperative Program receipts reported by all our states in the year of 1959 amounted to approximately \$47 million dollars. Of this amount \$17 million was given to SBC causes, such as Home and Foreign Missions, our six seminaries, etc., and nearly \$30,000,000 was given for state causes in all the states.

Last year Kentucky Baptists gave \$2,207,000 to the Cooperative Program. The goal for this year is \$2,400,000. Our churches are averaging only 9.5 cents out of their total offerings for the Cooperative Program. This proportion must be increased if we are going to do our duty for missions.

We recommend that our churches be requested to increase their Cooperative Program giving each year by at least 2% of their total offerings and that each church, which does not have a budget, plan to take offerings at least once a quarter for this cause.

The Forward Program has rendered wide service to Southern Baptist Churches and it is recommended that primary attention be given in our association in 1961 to lead our smaller churches to study and utilize one of the three applications of the Forward Program.

As Baptists, we cannot say, "Christ for the whole wide world" until we given stronger support to world-wide missions.

REPORT ON RADIO AND TELEVISION

The world is on the threshold of the "Golden age of communication." Worldwide Radio and Television are now realities. Southern Baptists must be alert and must prepare themselves adequately to make use of these facilities for preaching the gospel. This is the only method of witnessing in many areas of the world. The Radio and Television Commission preaches the good news of Christ almost daily somewhere, reaching individuals who might otherwise never hear the message of life.

There are three main facets to the work of this Commission: (1) Preaching the gospel on Radio and Television, (2) Building an audience for the programs, (3) Providing counsel and filling requests which come in response to the programs.

The Commission now produces five weekly radio programs, with a children's program and a counseling program in the planning stages. This radio ministry continues to bless thousands of listeners the world over.

Televangelism has been termed the greatest single advance in evangelism since the institution of personal witnessing. A new series of 13 films for use in 1961 are currently being produced, which will bring to more than 60 available to Television Stations. Letters are received daily which tell of the good of this work.

The Commission now has over 60 regular employees and is looking toward a new building in 1965. You are urged to hear and view the programs which are on Radio and Television in your area. And above all, pray for us as we attempt to wisely use these divine opportunities to spread the good news.

REPORT ON AMEIRCAN BIBLE SOCIETY

If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible.

Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

But, in most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists, in 1959 Southern Baptists gave \$144,200 to the American Bible Society. It serves every form of Southern Baptist mission work at home and abroad. It helps missionaries to translate the Bible. It publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost.

During 1959 the American Bible Society —

—donated more than a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed Forces and to patients in Veterans Hospitals, providing a vital link between the home churches and the men and women in services.

—approached its 125th anniversary of supplying Scriptures for the Blind, far below cost, in Braille and other raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

—rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1151 languages, the full Bible in 219, a Testament in 271 more and a Gospel or other complete book in 661 more.

Because the Bible Society serves mission work — and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people — Southern Baptist churches believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

1. BE IT RESOLVED: that we hereby express our sincere and grateful appreciation to the Good Hope Baptist Church and the Liberty Baptist Church for their gracious hospitality, good meals, and the use of their facilities for our Annual Associational Meeting.

2. BE IT RESOLVED: that we express our appreciation to Dr. D. L. Druien, our Moderator; Mr. W. T. Chandler, our Clerk, and to all who

made reports concerning our work the past year and to those who so earnestly spoke to us during the meetings.

3. BE IT RESOLVED: that we continue our support and cooperation to the Campbellsville College as they develop into a four year Senior College, especially looking toward the erection of the new library building and that as a means of extending this support we recommend that the Executive Board of the Association appoint a Committee of laymen to contact churches to encourage them to utmost financial assistance at this time.

4. BE IT RESOLVED: that we put forth greater effort in advancing the work of the Saviour in our churches.

5. BE IT RESOLVED: that in view of the current discussion on the so-called "religious issue" injected into our national political life, we the messengers of the Taylor County Baptist Association representing a total of 16 Baptist Churches, composed of approximately 5,000 members, submits the following resolution:

As Baptists we unhesitatingly reaffirm our faith in our historic position that God alone is Lord of the conscience, and that he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it.

We believe that Church and State should be separate, that a Free Church in a Free State is the Christian Ideal, and that this implies a free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, with the right to form and propogate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference from the Civil Power.

We also reaffirm our unalterable devotion to the constitution of the United States of America, which guarantees the inalienable right of all citizens to absolute religious liberty, freedom of speech, freedom of press, and freedom of worship.

We reaffirm furthermore, our belief in the principles of public school education which is the foundation of our freedoms.

Therefore, recognizing the crucial significance of the coming presidential election for our nation and the world, be it resolved:

1. That we call upon our Baptist people to engage in mature and lively public discussion of all important issues in the election, including that of the religious faith of the candidates; to participate fully in the democratic process, including voting; and to make decisions less upon the basis of personalities and political parties, and more upon the avowed principles, public statements, and voting records of the various candidates.

2. That we, as Baptists, being rooted historically in the belief of liberty of conscience, declare our belief in the right of individuals to aspire to all public offices and that a man's personal religious faith shall not be a test of his qualification for office.

3. That in view of the fact however, that the Roman Catholic Church is a international religious-political organization whose religious and political dogmas are in absolute conflict with the American constitutional principles of the separation of Church and State, Religious Liberty, the prohibition against the use of public tax money for sectarian (denominational purposes; and in view of the fact that a loyal Roman Catholic

is bound by a prior allegiance to his church and its Heirarchy, we do not believe that if such a person became President of our nation he could impartially defend these basic freedoms of the United States while remaining true to his religion.

4. That we use our influence in every way honorable and wisely possible to prevent a Roman Catholic from becoming President of the United States of America.

5. That space be purchased in our local paper for the purpose of presenting this resolution regarding the coming election to the people of our area.
