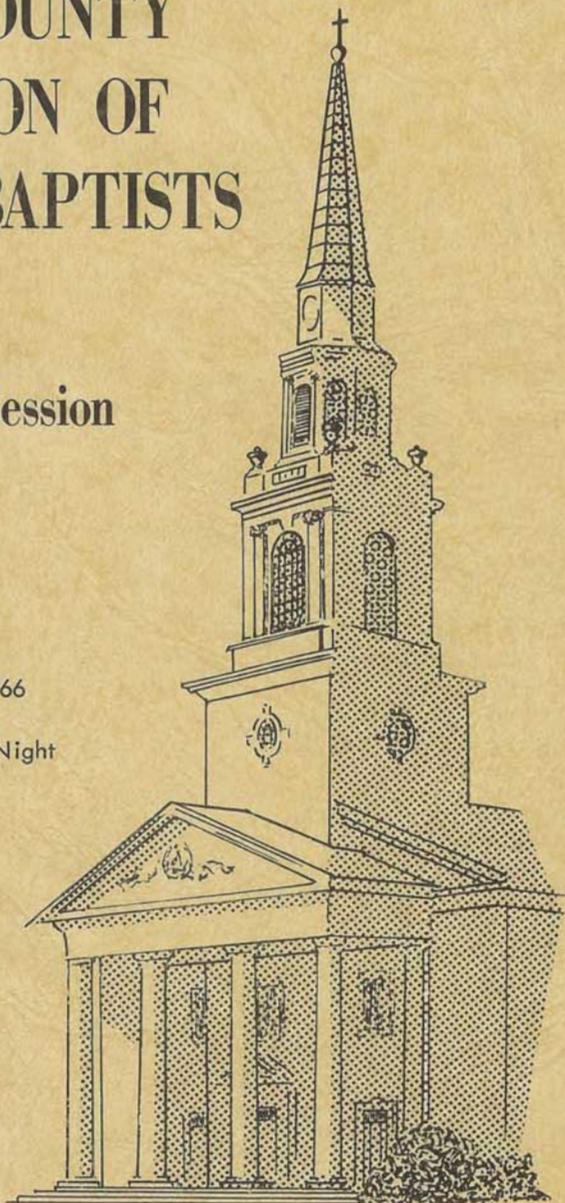

CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the Association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article IV) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and shall make monthly and annual reports to the Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II - COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.

6. Each committee shall be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Christian Education Committee, a special committee of the Executive Board of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, is again this year giving very much of its time and efforts to the Christian Education Advance Campaign. By virtue of the earlier organized efforts and the promotional activities under Dr. Joseph R. Estes, C. E. A. Secretary, new pledges are still coming in daily from individuals and churches. Many of these new pledges are coming from sources which until recently have delayed participation due to various personal and local situations. The new pledges of this current year are a reflection of the excellent work of Dr. Estes and the C. E. A. Campaign Committee. Total pledges and cash May 25 was \$2,847,214. The total goal was \$9 million.

The C. E. A. Campaign has now moved into an emphasis on major gifts, because we have not realized the receipt of pledges that normally should have come from the most able individuals, corporations, industries, etc. With substantial success in their area and a continuation of our progress in new pledges from individuals and local churches, we can hope to ultimately realize much more than the three million dollars now pledged.

We now have four senior colleges, one secondary school and one preachers' school. Each has made some progress in this past year, and each is challenged daily to rise up more nobly in its service to Kentucky Baptists.

Our colleges are: Campbellsville College, Dr. John M. Carter, President; Cumberland College, Dr. James M. Boswell, President; Georgetown College, Dr. Robert L. Mills, President; and Kentucky Southern College, Dr. Rollin S. Burhans, President.

Oneida Baptist Institute, our secondary or high school, is headed by David C. Jackson, Rev. D. M. Aldridge is the president of Clear Creek Baptist School, which trains preachers who have not had the formal education required by our seminaries.

11. Campbellsville College:

In the absence of Dr. John M. Carter the report on Campbellsville College was given by Dr. D. L. Druien, Dr. Otis Amis spoke to the report.

REPORT OF CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE, CAMPBELLSVILLE, KY.

The year 1964-65 has provided the most significant development in the history of Campbellsville College. A record enrollment of 837 full-time students for the fall has been achieved. For the following semester an expected enrollment of 950 students will continue the expansion of the college. 66 counties of the state are represented, 22 states of the union, and 4 foreign countries make up the enrollment.

The present faculty numbers 42. 40% of the teaching and personnel of the college now hold doctoral degrees. All other faculty members hold Master's degrees or above.

Four New Positions have been created in the development program of the College beginning with the fall semester. Dr. D. L. Druen will be Vice-President in charge of Development; Dr. Otis Amis will be Vice-President in charge of Institutional Development and Fund Raising. Mr. Herbert Brown, C.P.A., will be Controller and Teacher in Business Administration; Mr. Robert L. Richardson will be Director of Religious Activities.

A number of improvements in the physical facilities of the College have been made during the year of 1964-65. These include a New Girls residence hall which will be completed and in use for the fall semester. This building will be air-conditioned thru-out, will house 88 girls. The first unit of the Student Industry Complex is in the last stages of completion. This will greatly facilitate production and expedite the employment of more students this year in the "self help program"

The following plans are being submitted for the year 1965-66:

- A. Men's residence hall with 200 bed capacity.
- B. Second unit of the Industry Complex.

Over 400 students have been helped in their college education by the Industry since its beginning. \$15,000.00 dollars is now available for the second unit.

The second unit of the Library Building is now in the planning. Library facilities must keep pace with the increased enrollment and broadened curricula. The policy of Campbellsville College has been and shall continue to be, to meet the challenge of quality education.

Plans are being projected for other new buildings, for increased dining room space to take care of increasing residence students.

We are in dire need of a Physical Education and Health Building. This need has been postponed until the need is pressing and we must do something in the near future.

We also face a complete renovation of many of our older buildings with new furniture, plumbing, floor coverings with other needed improvements.

We ask for your prayerful consideration during these months and years of advance and development.

The devotion and prayer was by Rev. Jimmy Neal, reading from 1st Chapter 1st Thessalonians.

At this time we had a solo by Dr. Forrest Shely.

13. Hospitals:

In the absence of Rev. Burton Cosby, the Hospital Report was given by Rev. Wm. R. Beard. Dr. J. Chester Badgett spoke to the report.

HOSPITAL REPORT

Last year Kentucky Baptist Hospital in Louisville admitted 16,503 patients, including 2,193 newborn babies, Western Baptist Hospital

in Paducah admitted 8,679 patients, including 1,060 newborn babies, and Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington admitted 10,780 patients, including 1,739 newborn babies, and also treated 11,084 outpatients.

One of the greatest needs of our three Baptist Hospitals is the need for sufficient funds with which to care for charity patients. The 1964 Mother's Day Offering for the Sunday School Charity Fund which was divided among our three hospitals amounted to a net of only \$36,048.64 from all the Kentucky Baptist churches that contributed, and many churches did not contribute at all.

It is indeed a great tragedy that in a Christian land of plenty some who should be healed go on suffering and some even die simply because they cannot afford hospital treatment. Our Baptist Hospitals are doing much in this field to help those who cannot help themselves, but they could do more if more of our Kentucky Baptist Churches would heed the words of our Lord and Master who said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35)

That the great healing ministry of our three Baptist Hospitals may increase and be extended freely to those who need treatment but cannot afford it, we wish to encourage each local church in our association to contribute more to the next Mother's Day Sunday School Charity Fund.

14. Childrens Home:

The report on Childrens Home was given by Rev. L. M. Hamilton in the absence of Rev. Carl Dugger.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOMES

Last year a total of 759 children were cared for in our three homes. Of this number Spring Meadows gave care to 348 children, Glen Dale to 287, and Pine Crest to 63. Our Child Care Center placed for adoption this past year 43 infants. During the first three months of this year, 63 new children were added to our rolls, and as of April 1, 1965 there were 516 children under the care of our childrens homes.

Our home at Glen Dale is celebrating its fiftieth anniversary this year, having opened its doors on June 23, 1915. During this time the home has provided help, and given a home to over 1,900 girls and boys. Glen Dale is now in the process of renovating Siler Cottage, at a cost of \$35,000.

There is concern this year as to whether the income of the homes will meet the budget for the year. Only 1/6 of the income comes from the Cooperative Program. The Thanksgiving Offering, which exceeded \$250,000 last fall for the second consecutive year, provides about 40%. The endowment provides another 10%. The remaining 1/3 must come from special gifts.

We are happy to report a total of 61 baptisms from our homes last year, and to report that two of our homes have students for the ministry enrolled in Kentucky Baptist Colleges.

15. Annuity Board:

In the absence of Rev. Ralph Boots the report on the Annuity Board was read by the Clerk and Adopted.

REPORT ON ANNUITY BOARD

The Life Benefit plan was inaugurated on October 1, 1964, to meet the need for supplemental life protection for our pastors and denominational employees, and has already achieved phenomenal success with more than ten thousand active participants.

The target for the Health Benefit Plan is October 1, 1965. Five thousand applications are required by September 1st in order to put this program in effect.

Since the beginning of the Annuity Board in 1918, almost 47 million dollars have been paid. In 1964 alone 3 1/2 million was paid.

Today more than 16,352 churches are in the protection program approximately 10,000 of these churches are paying 10% dues.

In Kentucky we have 892 churches actively participating in one or more retirement plans with 1,060 pastors and ministers of music and members of education.

Last year \$137,976.18 was paid to some 190 annuitants and \$6,184 to 29 relief beneficiaries.

Dr. A. W. Walker is jointly employed by the Kentucky Baptist Convention and the Annuity Board.

16. Report on Temperance and Morals:

In the absence of Rev. Louis Lightfoot the report of Temperance and Morals was read by the Moderator and adopted.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

The Temperance League, located at 2309 Taylorsville Road, Louisville, has continued to receive support of the churches with about 1,300 churches inviting speakers for the League's Field Day services, which keeps the churches informed as to the work of the League. There are about 250 budget churches of which 130 sent in their contributions during this fiscal year.

EDUCATION - The League has provided speakers for a Visual Aid Program of alcohol education to high schools throughout Kentucky.

LOCAL OPTION - Kentucky continues to lead the nation with the highest percentage of counties in Local Option dry territory with 94 dry counties.

ALCOHOLISM - The League has emphasized abstinence and containment of this liquor traffic and urges the churches to show more concern about alcoholism.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT - All candidates for the Senate and House of Representatives in the May primary were sent questionnaires concerning their attitude toward and interest in the Temperance League's cause. The results of these questionnaires were sent to churches and individuals.

THE SWEEPSTAKES ISSUE - The League encourages churches throughout the state to sign petitions in opposition to the sweepstakes and to express their objections to their legislators and local officials.

1965 LEGISLATIVE NEWS AND VIEWS - The news service which was begun during 1964 Legislature will report in 1966 on all Legislative activities pertaining to moral legislation.

THE 1966 LEGISLATURE - Investigate the candidates' position on items pertaining to the liquor traffic, gambling (especially the sweepstakes issue), and other moral issues. Don't let the wets and gamblers control the 1966 legislature.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR - Rev. Walter House, Director of the League for 15 years, resigned in February 1965 but is retained as Consultant. Rev. Delbert Butts is the new Director.

17. Report on District Missions:

The Report on District Missions was given by Dr. Forrest Shely and approved as follows:

DISTRICT MISSIONS

For the past associational year Taylor County Association of Baptists in Kentucky have assisted the First Baptist Church in Celina, Ohio with one hundred dollars a month. The work in Celina has been quite difficult and altogether different from the pioneer work in Ohio as a whole since there has been no great concentration of Baptists from the south to settle in the area. Celina has been one of the few situations where work has been started with no great support from Baptists living in the community.

The Celina church is pastored by Brother W. Ken Forman. Brother Forman is a graduate of Campbellsville College and has served as pastor in the Taylor County Association.

In addition to the support of the work in Celina the Executive Board of the Association responded to an emergency call from Dr. Ray Roberts, Executive Secretary of Ohio Baptists to assist in the moving on the field two new pastors to serve in Western New York State in the communities of Orchard Park and Grand Island.

The Association also paid the plane fare for three of our men to California to participate in the West Coast Laymen's Crusade. Serving on the missions committee for the past year has been J. B. Crawley, Forrest Shely, Jack Arvin and William R. Beard.

At the last meeting of the Executive Board it was voted to extend its support of \$100.00 a month to the Celina Church through September of this year with the recommendation that the new Mission Committee evaluate the work in Celina and report back to the Executive Board.

18. State Missions:

STATE MISSIONS

Direct Missions in Kentucky is the term applied to mission work done by churches and associations in cooperation with the Kentucky Baptist Convention. It is the method by which the Convention helps Kentucky Baptists respond to the missionary emphasis of the New Testament. A. B. Colvin is the secretary.

During the year, the Direct Missions program has assisted with work involving 2 City Mission programs, 13 District Mission programs, 31 Associational Mission programs, 15 County Mission programs, and 37 Local Church Mission programs. It has assisted in many other special mission programs.

The missionaries reported the following activities during the year.

During the summer, 34 students work in 17 associations. They conducted 70 Vacation Bible Schools, assisted in many revivals and shared in various mission opportunities.

The final report of the 30,000 Movement showed Kentucky with 188 new churches and 536 missions during the period June 1956 to December 1964.

An anonymous gift has enabled the Direct Missions Department to place five men in remote sections of our state where they can spend full time ministering to the people in small communities.

The personnel and programs of the Direct Mission Department are available for assistance to our churches and association.

19. Evangelism:

The report on Evangelism was given by Dr. D. L. Druien and adopted.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

An Evangel is a bringer of good news. Evangelism means the proclaiming of good news. Evangelism is not something new; it is as old as the Gospel. The History of the Cross is the history of evangelism. It was heard the first Xmas morning when the angels made heaven ring with "glory to God in the highest--peace on earth--good will toward men." The message of evangelism was heard in the voice of John the Baptist, when he pointed out the Galilean stranger, saying, "Behold the Lamb of God" -- Evangelism actuated Andrew to go for his brother Simon and bring him to Jesus; it sent Philipp into the chariot to preach Christ to the Ethiopian Enoch. Evangelism quivered from the lips of Simon Peter on the day of Pentecost and men and women were cut to the heart saying, "What must we do?"

Evangelism means Soul-winning. Southern Baptists have always believed in Evangelism. The brightest days of our denominational life have been the days when evangelism has been emphasized. The emphasis in the Great Commission is on Evangelism. We should never substitute anything for evangelism. Streams of contributions will come from rocks smitten with the fires of evangelism.

While people are led to an acceptance of Jesus Christ as Lord and Master in the main thru the ministry of the local church, the Association is a critical point of emphasis for evangelism. An active, compassionate spirit of evangelism in the life and organization of the association will lead and assist many churches in a dynamic program of evangelism. Four Associations in our state last year reported baptisms in every church, our Association was in the group, for which we are grateful. 414 churches in our state reported no baptisms during the year. Nine churches in our state reported more than 75 baptisms last year South Campbellsville in our Association was one of the nine--reporting 88.

May we remind you of the creation of the new department of evangelism in our state with Bro. Thomas H. Shelton as our Secretary.

In our Association 14 of our churches reported baptisms during the year. The total number amounted to 190 people. This is a ratio of one baptism for each 29 1/2 church members.

No work is so rewarding as that of winning the lost to Christ.

We read in the word of God, "They that turn many to righteousness shall shine as the stars forever and ever."

20. Kentucky Baptist Foundation

The report on Kentucky Baptist Foundation was given by Dr. James W. Mallard and adopted. Dr. Mallard spoke to the report.

REPORT KENTUCKY BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Kentucky Baptist Foundation is primarily a Service Organization established for the purpose of projecting the Stewardship of possessions from the present, on into the future--making sure the desires of the person, regarding the use, in God's work, of these possessions, are respected, long after, as well as during, the lifetime of the individual.

Many Baptists have established trusts during their lifetime; others, through properly prepared wills, are continuing to benefit Kentucky Baptists and SBC Institutions after they are gone.

The Foundation conducts an investment which has consistently averaged a return of 5%, in harmony with the highest ideals of Christian Stewardship. Foundation personnel will advise with anyone wishing advice regarding any question or problem relative to his estate and a Life Income Trust Agreement may be established. Speakers will be furnished churches, or other appropriate meetings. Baptist literature advertizes and supports the Foundation. Bulletin inserts are furnished on request.

March 1, Foundation funds amounted to \$3,628,238.92 and will probably be \$4 million by the end of this fiscal year. During the past 6 months \$60,751.83 were added. \$145,000.00 is expected for the year.

The first six months of this year, there were 20 wills drawn up and many other inquiries were made. Gifts amounting to \$48,000 were received. Those annuitants who have gone on to be with the Lord this year include Mrs. Jennie Kruwener, Falmouth; Mrs. Lavisa Mitchell, Henderson, Ky. 6 estates were settled during the past year.

James C. Austin is Executive Secretary. The Foundation is

supported wholly by the Cooperative Program. LET US IN ALL THINGS GIVE THANKS UNTO GOD FOR HIS MARVELOUS GRACE.

21. Home Missions:

The report on Home Missions was given by Dr. J. Chester Badgett, in the absence of Mr. Earl Barnett.

HOME MISSION REPORT

The 30,000 Movement's final report, following the close of a nine-year emphasis on church extension, showed 18,285 missions and 6,682 churches were established. The emphasis is being continued through the program of church extension of the mission agency.

Chaplains - in all fields of the chaplaincy - have made positive contributions to the 30,000 Movement.

Missionaries serving with the Home Mission Board and state Baptist convention, number over 2,400 as of May, 1965. They work in all fifty states, Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rico.

Student Summer Missionaries, numbering 639, spent 10 weeks in mission service in 1964.

More than \$7 million came from Southern Baptists for Home Missions through the Cooperative Program, the Annie Armstrong Offering, and other sources.

For the first time in some years, the Cooperative Program reached the advance stage, and the Home Mission Board received \$426,070.

Emphasis went to new work and the pioneer areas during the year, when more than 66% of the budget of the Division of Missions was spent for work with the newer conventions.

Church loans, through the Church Loans Division, went to 421 churches for a total of more than \$6 million.

Present plans are being made to assist state conventions to establish loans funds through a methods of guaranteeing the loans made.

Work with National Baptists was expanded in New Mexico,

Indiana, Alabama, and Michigan through joint committees of the two Baptist groups.

22. Foreign Missions:

In the absence of Mr. Bernard Fain the report on Foreign Missions was given by Dr. J. Chester Badgett. Dr. Badgett spoke to the report.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

A call for 5000 missionaries at the earliest possible date was set before Southern Baptists at the convention. The foreign mission board's mission staff was 1901 at the end of 1964. There were 159 appointments in 1964 and 49 in the first half of 1965. The total now is 2048.

Many urgent requests are being made for people in the field of evangelism, church development, theological education, nursing, student work and religious education. In 1964, preparation was made for the missionary journeyman program for single college graduates under 27.

Mission work is carried on through churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants, and good will centers. All are introactive and the goal is evangelism.

We have 2,980 national pastors, 4,231 churches and 7,482 chapels with 538,103 enrolled in Sunday School. We had 43,403 baptisms making a total of 549,921 church members.

Total contributions from Southern Baptist for 1964 was \$23,891,502.85. The Lottie Moon offering totaled \$11,870,649.35. There was still an urgent request for \$3,000,000 for land, buildings and equipment.

Educational work offers opportunities for evangelism and trains a strong national leadership. 1,110 Baptist schools enrolled and had 5,412 national and 362 missionary teachers.

The aim of missionary medicine is to heal the whole man--both spiritually and physically. We have 20 hospitals, 49 clinics and dispensaries with 65 missionary and 104 national physicians, 50 missionary and 256 national nurses. They served 434,571 patients during the year.

This is one way we can help fulfill the GREAT COMMISSION so we should work and pray toward this end.

23. Sunday School Report:

The Sunday School report was given by Rev. W. R. Beard and adopted.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The associational Sunday School organization met in various churches of the association for monthly meetings. A number of the meetings consisted of departmental conferences with regular monthly emphases while other meetings were general meetings with emphases on Enlargement, Evangelism, Visitation and the church library work.

The Sunday School organization sponsored a one night review of the January Bible Study Book with Dr. Clyde Francisco of Southern Seminary teaching. Plans are in progress for a Central Training School to be held the 27-30 of September.

The theme for our Sunday Schools this coming year is "THE SUNDAY SCHOOL HELPING THE CHURCH TO FULFILL ITS MISSION THROUGH PROCLAMATION AND WITNESS." There are many ways whereby our Sunday Schools can increase their ministry to people in the framework of the emphasis for the new year:

1. Every Sunday School should adopt a worthy goal.
2. Every Sunday School should plan to increase Bible teaching.
3. Every Sunday School should lead its members into a daily witness for the Lord.

Our Association reports this year 21 Sunday Schools with a total Sunday School Enrollment of 3931. This is a decrease over the enrollment last year. There were 18 Vacation Bible Schools.

We recommend that the churches, Sunday School and their workers cooperate with the leaders of the associational Sunday School organization during the coming year.

24. Baptist Student Union:

The report on Baptist Student Union was given by Rev. Roger Cox and adopted. Rev. Robert Richerson spoke to the report.

REPORT ON BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

ENROLLMENTS:

Increased to 62,464. The enrollment in state tax-supported institutions increased from 54.4% to 57.3%.

We had a similar increase in Baptist enrollments. We now have 16,464 Baptist Students enrolled in Kentucky colleges. Of these Baptist Students, 2,425 were enrolled in Baptist Colleges and 14,039 in non-Baptist schools.

BSU DIRECTORS:

Eight full time student workers are employed by the Kentucky Baptist Convention. They are Joseph M. Smith, Berea; Jackie Fortune, Murray; Dwight K. Lyons, Eastern; Glenn Yarbrough, Georgetown; Emery Smith, Morehead; Calvin Zongher, University of Kentucky; Wayne Welch, Western. We are happy to report that in September full time Directors of student work are to be placed at Campbellsville and Cumberland.

STUDENT CENTERS:

There are seven convention-owned Baptist Student Centers in Kentucky. We are grateful for these. All are inadequate. Additional and improved facilities are needed.

RESULTS:

To a limited extent the effectiveness of Baptist Student Union is shown by the number of Missionaries sent out. On February 11, 1964, the Foreign Mission Board informed us that at the time under appointment were 50 missionaries who had attended Kentucky Baptist schools and 61 who had attended non-Baptist schools in Kentucky. There were 16 more who had attended both a Baptist and non-Baptist schools. This makes 127 different people. Of this number 113 had been a member of the BSU while in college, 57 served as BSU-Council members and 22 were BSU Presidents.

25. Religious Literature:

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

"The state paper is the best, the only, way to reach a vast number of people with needed information week by week...There

never was another agency so well devised for and adapted to the needs of the masses as a weekly paper. The limits of the circulation of the denominational state paper coincides almost exactly with the limits of the denominational efficiency." These are the words of Dr. J. B. Gambrell, one of the foremost Baptist statesmen of all time. And they are just as true today as they were 50 years ago.

The "Western Recorder" remains the only means whereby the more than 600,000 Baptists in Kentucky can be informed concerning the accomplishments and challenges of Baptists all over the world.

The "Western Recorder" has two main goals. One is to produce the best possible paper each week; the other is to get the paper into the hands of every Baptist in Kentucky. The "Western Recorder" needs the help of every fellow Baptist to reach both goals.

The "Western Recorder" is valuable to all laymen and women in Kentucky. In the matter of getting the paper into the hands of every Baptist in our state, we are entirely dependent upon the church and its leaders, who know and see the need of the paper.

Recently the "Western Recorder" made a slight change in subscription plans. They no longer use a club plan in which the paper sold for \$1.80 a year. Now the paper is only \$1.50 a year, and the individual plan for \$2.50 a year.

The present circulation of the "Western Recorder" is approximately 63,000. C. R. Daley is the editor.

The number of Churches using the plan for providing the "Recorder" for their members is 903.

The numbers of churches in our association with the state paper in the budget is 7. They are Campbellsville, Friendship, Good Hope, Lowel Ave., Mt. Gilboa, Palestine, Pleasant Hill.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The Cooperative Program is to our denomination what the unified budget is to the local church. It is a fair and equitable method

whereby mission monies from the churches are divided among our various causes--missionary, benevolent and educational.

The Cooperative Program is the heartbeat of our compassion and concern for a lost world. Our churches channel their mission money through the Cooperative Program not because they are compelled to, but because it is a wonderful avenue of expression of their love and concern.

1965-66 will also see a percentage increase in the amount we share with convention causes. 35.8% as (compared with 35.6% of this year). Thus as the churches increase their gifts, Kentucky in turn is able to share more with the world.

In order to make possible a continued missionary advance both in Kentucky and around the world, your committee respectfully recommends:

1. That we commend those churches in our association which give regularly through the Cooperative Program.
2. That we urge each church to step up by at least 2 percentage points its Cooperative Program gifts.
3. That we encourage each church to give its Vacation Bible School offerings through the Cooperative Program.
4. That we encourage each church to observe Cooperative Program Sunday on June 26, 1966.

Total gifts from our association for the Cooperative Program last year was \$35,366. This year was \$36,641.

27. Training Union:

The Training Union Report was given by Mr. Darrell Hunt and adopted.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

To Worship has been defined as "to experience an awareness of God, to recognize His holiness and majesty, and to respond in loving obedience to His leadership." During the past year Training Union has emphasized Worship through curriculum materials and through special studies such as Church Membership Study Week. It is hoped that as a result of this, many people are more aware of the opportunities for worship and the need to worship. This will help as we turn our attention to the 1965-66 emphasis on Proclamation. As members experience an awareness of God, and respond in loving obedience to His leadership, they will share this experience with others. Training Union looks forward to the challenge of training church members to do this sharing; that is witnessing.

At the State Training Union Convention this year, it was voted to have two week-end Training Union Conventions in 1966. These will be held at Cedarmore Baptist Assembly. April 22-24 will be the Young People's Convention, and May 6-8 will be the Intermediate Convention. The drills and events finals will be held at these conventions as in the past. The Junior Memory Work will end at the Regional level and those receiving first place recognition at the regions will be declared state winners.

Our association has been without a director since March, when Bro. Joe Hargrove resigned to accept a pastorate in Lakeland, Florida.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

Woman's Missionary Union, with the object of promoting Christian missions through a program of mission study, prayer, community missions and stewardship, has been giving special emphasis to worship this year.

There was an unusually large attendance at camps, conferences and conventions held during the past year for missionary education, leadership training and promotion of concern for our Christian witness. More girls attended G.A. camp at Cedamore; two women served as G.A. counselors at camp; three women attended W.M.U. conferences at Cedamore; and many of the women in our association attended the W.M.U. state meeting at Harrodsburg, Ky.

There were thrilling increases in giving through our offerings during the weeks of prayer and in giving through the Cooperative Program.

We have only ten churches of the 16 churches in our association with W.M.U. organizations, but we pray soon there will be other churches who will form these organizations. The organizations that attained recognition for their work last year were: the WMU of the Campbellsville Baptist Church, the Y.W.A. of the Palestine Baptist Church, and the Junior and Intermediate G.A.'s of the Lowell Avenue Baptist Church. 29. Radio and Television:

The report on Radio and Television was given by Rev. Robert Orr and adopted.

REPORT ON RADIO AND TELEVISION

The Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention is now twenty-five years old. The first official broad-

cast was presented on January 5, 1941 in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church of Shreveport, Louisiana. Southern Baptists are only outranked by Radio Free Europe and Voice of America in total number of broadcasts and in hours of broadcasting.

In 1962 about 1200 radio stations were broadcasting the programs of Southern Baptists while in 1964 a sharp increase of over 500 stations were sending forth the programs of the commission. In the past ten years the number of hours which the Commission broadcasts has risen by more than 400 percent and the estimated audience has risen by more than 500 percent.

Our own association has available several filmstrips as well as various help in visual aid. The particular titles may be investigated and the associational director of visual aids can be of considerable assistance to any church desiring to use these facilities. They are available on a loan basis to any church in the association. It is recommended that each church that does not already have such a committee investigate the possibility of appointing a director of visual aids and increase the use of this method of presenting the gospel of Christ.

32. Stewardship

The report on Stewardship was given by Rev. Marshall Black and adopted.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Christian Stewardship includes the total capacities of a Christian or a church, dedicated to the service of our Lord. In the light of the above statement Taylor County Baptists are not doing too good. Six of our sixteen churches do have a W.M.U. to support and promote missions, and only half of our churches use the Brotherhood to enlist the men in support of youth work and the total church program. We have 194 fewer enrolled in Bible Study in our Sunday Schools than at this time last year. This loss exceeds the total number won to Christ this year. It took 27 plus members to win one to Christ this year. We had a loss in Training Union, baptisms and tithers as compared with last year. Only in gifts to Missions did we show an increase over last year. The 5,255 members of our sixteen churches gave \$33,000.00 less than last year to all causes for a per capita gift of \$95.93, of this \$11.58 was sent to all mission endeavors. Was Jesus speaking of us when He said, "This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoreth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me."?

33. Brotherhood

In the absence of Gene Money the Brotherhood Report was given by Mr. Everett Lee.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

A recent study of Brotherhood work in 45 Associations revealed that during the first six months of the Associational year, Associational Brotherhood Leadership had presented the work of Baptist Brotherhood to 86 churches that did not have their Brotherhoods organized. Plans had been made to present the work to another 89 churches. During the first six months of the year, 29 churches had reported organizing new brotherhoods.

Activities engaged in by Brotherhoods on the local church, associational, and state levels indicate interest and efforts in (1) Laymen sponsored Revivals; (2) Promotion of Royal Ambassador Week; (3) Observance of Baptists Men's Day; (4) Royal Ambassador Recreational Activities (5) Stewardship Promotion; (6) Promotion of Home and Foreign Missions; (7) Regular services conducted in

The County Homes, Jail services, etc; and (8) the promotion of CEA as a definite project.

In our Association, there are 7 Organized Brotherhoods. They have a total of 221 men enrolled in Brotherhood and 110 boys enrolled in Royal Ambassador Chapters.

As we submit this report this year, we would earnestly ask that the members of the churches in this Association join our State and Associational leadership in praying that the Spirit of God will claim the lives of 100,000 Baptist men who aren't ashamed of an old-fashioned, heartfelt religion. The results of such praying staggers the imagination when one considers the impact of such a cooperative effort in the name of Christ coupled with the desire that this will bring glory to our God.
