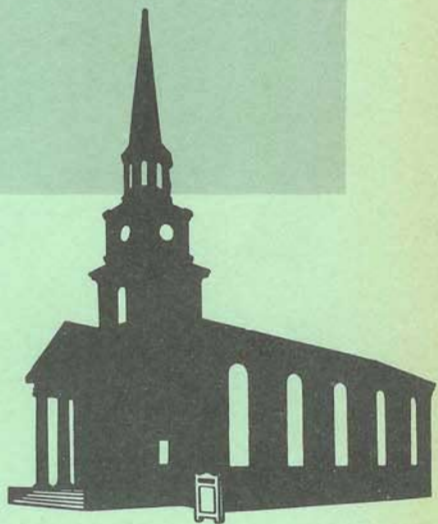

## CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the Association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.



Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article IV) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

## BY-LAWS

### ARTICEL I - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and shall make monthly and annual reports to the Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to

audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

## ARTICLE II - COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.

6. Each committee shall be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

## MORNING SESSION

## SALEM BAPTIST CHURCH

Promptly at 9:30 a.m., Moderator W. R. Beard called to order the Ninth Annual Session of Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists, meeting with Salem Baptist - Day and Campbellsville Baptist - Night.

Dr. Forest Shely, Associational Chorister, led the group present in singing "Stand Up For Jesus" and "Jesus Saves". Mr. Dee Wayne White was at the piano.

## 7. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

In 1965 the Annual Convention of Kentucky Baptists directed the Executive Board to study the possibility of a loan "up to \$6 million" and recommend its findings to a Special Convention.

The Executive Board referred this to the Christian Education Committee who recommended that a \$3.5 million loan be authorized to build at least one building on each Baptist campus. The Special Convention, on June 27-28, which met at Walnut Street Baptist Church, approved with the added recommendation that "each school or institution be instructed to borrow from private sources only." Thus, \$300,000 allocation will be given each year for 20 years. This means approximately \$60,000 annually for Campbellsville College, which means another new building for us.

The churches are being asked to raise their gifts to the Co-operative program in order to pay this increase.

A new program is being initiated at Campbellsville College--"A quest for friends" or "one thousand and ten" club. This promises to be a wonderful plan for the support of this college for both the immediate future and the years to come. Campbellsville College had an enrollment of 977 last year, and is planning for a steady increase annually.

We rejoice in our Educational programs of both our churches and our college. Our most valuable asset is our young. Our greatest hope of the future lies in education and training of our people to help other people carry the Gospel around the world. This is, of course, the most efficient method of carrying out the Great Commission of our Lord.

## 8. BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

The objectives of the Baptist Student Union work on Campbellsville College campus are (1) to lead students to commitment to Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, (2) to involve them in responsible church membership and in worship and devotional experiences, (4) to involve them in the study of the biblical faith and Christian life, (5) to guide them in Christian witnessing, (6) to involve them in experiences of Christian community, (7) to involve them in Christian social life and recreation, (8) to lead them to participate in Christian world missions, (9) to lead them to accept and practice the principles of Christian stewardship, (10) to lead them to examine academic disciplines

from a Christian perspective, and (11) to enlist and train them for a life of Christian service.

Baptist enrollment on campus this year was 582 students with 276 of this number as campus residents. Involvement in the BSU program and activities were as follows: Sunday School, 162; Training Union, 77; Y.W.A.'s, 67; Ministerial Association, 52; Vespers, 85; and Morning Watch 27.

The BSU sent out 43 youth teams to churches in Kentucky, Indiana, and Ohio which resulted in 48 professions of faith and 262 total decisions.

The following students are serving in summer missionary work: Sheila Williams, Oklahoma; Ona Mae Haynes, Michigan; Peggy Troutman, New Mexico; Ralston Crowder, Eastern Kentucky; Cecil Campbell, Hindman; and Bob Elliott, Livermore.

Significant events of the year were as follows: 15 students were won to faith in Christ, 81 students registered at the BSU State Convention in Elizabethtown, BSU revival led by Grady Wilson, and BSU Installation Banquet with Dr. Verlin C. Kruschwitz as the speaker and 96 in attendance.

## 9. CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE REPORT

Report on Campbellsville College by the President to the Taylor County Association.

The year 1965-1966 has been a year of record achievement at Campbellsville College. The College had an enrollment of 968. An enrollment of between 1,000 and 1,100 is assured for the year 1966-1967.

Several important developments have taken place during the year. The College has been admitted to the Kentucky

Independent College Foundation which means additional funds. Most significant has been the inclusion of the colleges in the Cooperative Program budget for capital funds. A new interest in education has been manifested by the Kentucky Baptist Convention. This has been seen in the call of a special convention to deal with the problems of our colleges and the above mentioned inclusion for capital funds.

The College will complete a new residence hall for men before Thanksgiving. This will house 176 students.

A new residence hall for women will be begun immediately after Thanksgiving. There is also scheduled for construction soon the new combination health, physical education and auditorium building.

One of the most significant achievements of the year is the coming of Dr. Druen to the College to assist the administration in promotional work and public relations.

In addition to the already established programs of the College and Dr. Druen, Colonel Halsell has joined the staff to lead in the 1000 & 10 Club. Remarkable progress has already been made in this.

## HOSPITAL REPORT

Kentucky Baptists operate 3 hospitals, supported in part by the Cooperative Program. H. L. Dobbs is the Executive Director.

CENTRAL BAPTIST HOSPITAL IN LEXINGTON is a 233-bed short-term, acute hospital dedicated to render service to patients without regard to race, creed or color. During the past year adult admission totaled 9,049; newborn 1,685; outpatients 11,137; and a total of \$16,482.23 was paid by the Sunday School Cahrity Fund. B. R. Brewer is Administrator.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST HOSPITAL IN LOUISVILLE has been in operation since November 1924. At the present time the bed capacity is 322 adult beds and 33 bassinets. Last year 15,605 patients were admitted including 1,939 newborn babies; 7,562 operations were performed. It charged off for charity, discounts and bad debts \$133,773.91 during the last twelve months which does not include \$21,643.73 free service under

the Sunday School Charity Fund.

With its 107 student nurses in the School of Nursing, 12 students enrolled in our School of X-Ray Technology, 3 in the School of Medical Technology and 832 full and part time employees the hospital furnishes many and various opportunities for Christian service representing a merciful and compassionate Lord. Homer D. Coggins is Administrator.

WESTERN BAPTIST HOSPITAL IN PADUCAH completed and opened the new surgical wing, housing tow major operating rooms and tow delivery rooms, as well as an adjoining medical room, as the last phase of building approved by the Kentucky Baptist Convention. Last year 9,460 patients including 811 newborn infants were admitted. \$59,993.66 was charged off for charity, bad debts and discounts, \$6,604.09 in hospital bills was paid by the Sunday School Charity Fund. James V. Dorsett, Jr., is Administrator.

One of our increasing needs is that of greater support for the MOTHERS DAY OFFERING in May of each year when our churches and Sunday Schools are asked to contribute to the Sunday School Charity Fund in order to help more of those who are unable to pay for hospital care. Last year \$31,825.67 was paid for needy people who were unable to help themselves.

## 11. CHILD CARE REPORT

Last year we extended help to 775 children. Services were given to 63 unmarried mothers. Forty-one infants were placed for adoption. Glen Dale had 298 children in care; Spring Meadows, 274; and Pine Crest, 72; 71 children were saved and baptized; 16 of our boys and girls were assisted financially in colleges and trade schools. This spring 17 young people living in our 3 Homes graduated from high school. We are planning with them for the future. Spring Meadows had one girl to graduate from college. Glen Dale had a girl to complete her business college course. We are thankful that Kentucky Baptists

approve of our ministry. Each year an allocation (\$100,000 now) comes from the Cooperative Program. They showed their love last fall by giving a record Thanksgiving Offering amounting to \$262,111.79. However, this was nearly \$3,000 short of the goal. Come fall we are going to need \$265,000.00. Not only is inflation upon us, we simply must do more. We are going to continue to count on you. Remember "Your Help Is Their Hope!" C. Ford Deusner, Middletown, is the General Superintendent.

### REPORT ON ANNUITY BOARD

#### The Southern Baptist Protection Plan

For the first time in two years, all ministers who are not enrolled in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan are being informed about its benefits. A direct mail campaign has been conducted to give ample information to prospective ministers in each state convention.

The Southern Baptist Protection Plan provides benefits for age, disability and widow. Cost for the protection is based on the minister's salary, and is 10 per cent of any amount up to \$4,000 a year.

#### The Health Benefit Plan

Enrollment has reached 10,054 in the Health Benefit Plan. During the past year, promotional emphasis has been placed on this plan.

The Health Plan is an all-inclusive program of hospital, surgical and major medical benefits.

There are seven states with 70% or more of the churches in the program. At this time, Kentucky has but 42% of the churches in the program. Our Association, with 17 churches, has only 50% churches in the Protection Program.

The Annuity Program is supported by the Cooperative Program--for every church in the program. your state budget includes 5% for each pastor and worker. The state department budget only is shared by the Annuity Board.

### 13. KENTUCKY BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The Kentucky Baptist Foundation can help you to insure that your accumulated possessions will do what you want them to do after you are through with them. Death need not destroy your Christian witness. Your last word for Christ is written into your will. A Christian will is a kind of legal resurrection.

Many Kentucky Baptists have established Trusts with the Foundation during their lifetime. Others have done so through properly prepared wills. They will continue to benefit Kentucky Baptist and SBC institutions and agencies for all time to come.

The Kentucky Baptist Foundation conducts a dependable investment service. They have consistently averaged a 5% rate of return for our Baptist causes.

The Foundation Secretary will advise, on request, any person who wishes to make a will leaving part of his estate to a Baptist cause or causes; or any person who wishes to establish a Life Income Trust Agreement.

As of March 1, 1966, the market value of the funds that were handled by the Kentucky Baptist Foundation amounted to \$3,932,236.35. It will be pressing the 4.5 million dollar mark



as we reach the end of this fiscal year on August 31. During the past year, assets increased \$412,024.97.

Income distributed amounted to \$124,700.79 for this period. The anticipated income for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1966 will total above \$150,000.00.

Twenty-eight wills were written during the first eight months.

Twelve Gift Annuities and Life Income Contracts were written in the amount of \$199,565.00.

#### 14. Training Union Report:

Bro. Boone spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

Ephesians 4:12 talks about the perfecting and the full equipping of the saints (His consecrated people); that they should do the work of edifying, ministering to, building up the body of Christ which is the church. The purpose or job of the training union in a church is concerned with these very things. We study the truths about God and His relationship with man. We seek to organize these truths in such a way as to understand what we believe so these truths can guide our daily living. Training Union also seeks to help one develop skills needed to serve the Lord. There seem to be at least three distinctive types of training for equipping of the saints.

One is NEW CHURCH MEMBER TRAINING. That is to meet the needs of members who have just accepted Christ, or just come into our church.

The second is CHURCH MEMBER TRAINING. This is the

continual development or growth of church members.

The third is CHURCH LEADER TRAINING. This is to equip church members to serve as leaders. Often this will include special training for those who are already leading.

In June this year five new Training Union Manuals became available. These books present in detail the ways a church can have all three types of training. The books are:

THE TRAINING PROGRAM OF A CHURCH  
A CHURCH TRAINING ADULTS  
A CHURCH TRAINING YOUNG PEOPLE  
A CHURCH TRAINING INTERMEDIATES  
A CHURCH TRAINING JUNIORS

All Training Union leadership, members of adult and young peoples unions are urged to study their appropriate books.

Statistical highlights for our Association during 1965-66 would include.

1. The "M" Night attendance for 1965 was 340.
2. Youth week was observed by several of our churches.
3. This year 3 juniors and one young person participated in the associational drills and events. One of our juniors was a state winner.

#### 15. Sunday School Report

It has been the custom since the formation of the Taylor County Association to hold monthly Sunday School meetings. During the first years of the new association, attendance at these meetings was good. But as time passed, attendance and interest at these meetings declined until only a few pastors, workers, and visitors took the time to be present.

At the July meeting, 1966, held at Mt. Gilboa Baptist Church, those in attendance voted to recommend to this associational body that the Sunday School meetings be held on a quarterly basis. By doing so, it is hoped that the quality of programs can be raised to the level which will serve the needs of a greater number of Baptists in the Taylor County Association.

Should a renewed interest in these meetings be manifested, then a return to a monthly basis could be made.

I move the adoption of this Sunday School report and a switch from monthly to quarterly Sunday School meetings.

## 16. REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday Schools are engaged in a most worthy phase of extending the kingdom of our Lord. The five major tasks of the Sunday School are: (1) teach the Biblical revelation; (2) lead in reaching all prospects for the church; (3) lead all church members to worship, witness, learn, and minister daily; (4) provide organization and leadership of special prospects of the church; (5) provide information regarding the work of the church and denomination.

The major emphasis this year will be the Church Growth Plan. Church growth depends largely upon consistent outreach for prospects. It is designed to increase Sunday School enrollment to the end that more persons will be taught the Bible, will be won to Christ, and will unite with the church. As the Sunday School performs its tasks, evangelism will have its greatest opportunity in an environment of purposeful Bible study and warm fellowship among Christian witnesses.

Many churches are planning to use the new quarterlies, "Life and Work Curriculum," for their Adults and Young People. This curriculum unites the study of Sunday School, Training Union, Church Music, Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood. This curriculum written by Southern Baptists for Southern Baptists relates individual and church actions more directly and meaningfully to the major tasks of the church. The Life and Work Curriculum is Bible-based, church-oriented, and action-inducing.

Our association reports this year 19 Sunday Schools; a Sunday School enrolment of 3,848. This is .02% decrease in enrolment over last year. There was 6 Standard Sunday Schools; 19 Vacation Bible Schools; 19 churches doing training. Our association did not reach the standard.

#### 17. WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

Woman's Missionary Union has for its tasks: (1) teach missions; (2) lead persons to participate in missions; (3) provide organizations and leadership for special mission projects of the church; (4) provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and the denomination.

In keeping with the denominational emphasis for the year, we gave special consideration to proclamation and witness. Our watchword: "Having the everlasting gospel to preach unto them that dwell on the earth, and to every nation, and kindred, and tongue, and people". Revelation 14:6b, has been a constant inspiration.

Progress has been made in our work this year. There has been an increase in the offerings during the Weeks of Prayer. This is an indication of more interest and prayer for missions.

Reports show a large increase in the number of persons taking the basic leadership courses.

Our Association has eleven (11) W.M.U. organizations. One of these, Green River Memorial, was organized last September. This organization has a W. M. S. with fifteen (15) members and a G.A. with ten (10) members. One Junior G.A. has completed the "Maiden Step" in the Forward Steps.

The Campbellsville W.M.U. has received recognition in several organizations for work done according to Aims for Advancement.

Some, from our association, have served as counselors at

Cedarmore this summer.

We thank God for all His blessings this past year. Let us never forget that our Lord said, "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me."

## 18. CHURCH MUSIC REPORT

Serving Christ. "Ministry" means service in the New Testament. The musical service in every Kentucky Baptist church is its music ministry. Therefore every Kentucky Baptist church has a music ministry, however small it may be considered by its leaders. The aim of our state and associational music organization is to help our churches better to fulfill the Great Commission of Christ through its music ministry.

Through Hymn Sings and Conferences. A total of 4,158 people representing 366 churches attended 44 hymn sings in 19 associational meetings during the past year. Our association had one hymn sing with 75 people present representing 6 churches.

Through Music Schools. At least 787 people from 103 churches in 16 associations attended the 18 music schools and earned a total of 1,401 music awards in Category 19 in our Church Study Course. Our association had no people in any of these schools.

Through Music Festivals. Kentucky had 6,045 people singing in 153 choirs from 84 churches in 35 associations in our state, regional, and associational music festivals. Our Association was represented with 80 people singing in 3 choirs from one of our churches.

Through Leadership Conferences. At least 826 Kentucky Baptists attended Ridgecrest and Glorieta Music Conferences, the Kentucky Baptist Leadership School, and Junior Music Camp. They represented 61 churches in 35 associations. Our association had 6 singers from 1 of our churches in this great choir.

Each year there are continuing areas for enlarging the music ministry in each of our churches.

## 19. BROTHERHOOD REPORT

A New Testament church has the divine imperative of missionary education and missions promotion . . . for all its membership. In a very real sense, a church's understanding and acceptance of this obligation, coupled with her planning, will determine the extent to which a church's manpower is involved in the mission of the church.

The tasks assigned Baptist Brotherhood are: (1) to teach missions to all men, young men, and boys, (2) lead all men, young men, and boys to participate in missionary activities, (3) provide the organization for special projects of the church, and (4) provide and interpret information regarding the work of a church and its denomination.

Our State Brotherhood Secretary is Forrest R. Sawyer, and the associate is Calvin Fields who is also Camp Director. They and the State and Associational officers stand ready to assist any church in its missionary work with men, young men, and boys.

Our missionary education at the Boys' Camp (Rabro) is growing. This year we added 2 cabins and 4 wagons to our camp. This makes 14 covered wagons and 3 cabins. We need about 17 more cabins. We also added 3 weeks to make a total of 11 to our camping season for our boys ages 9-17.

Our Association has 5 churches with active Brotherhood Organizations; 6 churches with RA work. Every church needs missionary education for men and boys.

Our Association recommends: (1) That every church give prayerful consideration to electing a Brotherhood Director (and share his name and address with the Associational Director and

State office); (2) That we encourage each church to budget funds each year to send its pastor, church officers, youth boys and girls to our State Camps and Assembly at Cedarmore and other such meetings.

## 20. REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

"Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us . . . it seemed good to me also . . . to write . . . that thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed."

These excerpts from Luke 1:1-4 set the pattern for the writing of the Gospel so that the early Christians might be more perfectly instructed in their faith.

The Bible (The Holy Scriptures) is the most vital source of information for the 20th Century Christian. This Book is the appropriate foundation and background for the work of those who edit and publish Baptist literature that has become vitally important to our Christian living and to our churches and denomination. Not only do these publications seek to instruct us more perfectly in our faith and doctrines, but they become an important stream of valuable information about the religious and moral trends in our swiftly changing world.

One will not find any denomination's literature surpassing that of Southern Baptists in its quality, attractiveness, doctrinal soundness and ease of understanding. The quality of our Baptist literature has increased and will as long as the readers demand this type of sound and informative material. Our two Kentucky Baptist Book Stores have been able to supply this type of literature to its customers.

The Western Recorder has been outstanding and continues to be outspoken in expressing the religious convictions of the

majority and minority of Kentucky Baptists.

Let us continue to read and use literature that will turn our eyes and mind to a God-guided vision of the spiritual decay of the world in need of the life-restoring Christ.

## 21. STEWARDSHIP REPORT

It is with grateful hearts to God that we can come to the end of this year in our association. We must admit that we have not achieved all the things that we would like to have accomplished, but we have been stewards.

Through the combined efforts of our associated churches, Taylor County Association of Baptists sent more than \$26,500 through the Cooperative Program to spread the Gospel of our Lord to a world hungry for spiritual truths. Nearly \$18,000 more was designated to favored projects. It is significant to know that every church in our association participated in this stewardship of over \$44,000.

We may feel justly proud that only 7 associations of the 84 in our state had 100% participation in gifts to world mission causes. Only one association exceeded us in per church giving. Bethel Association had an average per church giving record of \$2,800 while Taylor County Association was second in the state with \$2,200 per church gifts.

We must not rest on last year's accomplishments but attempt greater things for God in the year ahead.

### RADIO AND TELEVISION

Today the most powerful tools we have to promote Southern Baptist works are Television and Radio. Through these we have a mass communication with people who are unable to attend Sunday School and Church. Percentage wise, television homes run well over 94% with a mass number of 51,400,000 televisions. There are 53,500,000 radio homes (96% of all homes).

Our voice is heard in almost every country of the free world. We are only excelled by the free-voice program. In the area of programing started in September of 1963, four half hour programs were started on NBC-TV. CBS-TV scheduled three programs for the denomination. ABC-TV previous to 1963 was producing two programs.

In Kentucky we have two TV programs; "The Answer" WAVE-Louisville, Kentucky, Sunday 8:30 a.m.; WPSD Paducah, Kentucky. Sunday 10:30 a.m. also 56 radio programs by Southern Baptists. These do not include programs from our local churches.

The Report on the American Bible Society was read by Rev. Carl Duggar. It was spoken to by Dr. J. Chester Badgett. It was approved.

### 23. REPORT ON THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Woodrow Wilson once said, "Give the Bible back to the people, unadultrated, unaltered and unexplained. Then see it work for the whole nation."

As it celebrates its 150th anniversary this year, this has been the work of the A.B.S. for 150 years.

During this period of time the A.B.S. has shared with the people of the world 750 million copies of the Word of God.

The A.B.S. was founded on May 11, 1816. Its purpose was to see that, 'every man everywhere shall have the Word of God in his own language.' In working toward that goal the A.B.S. has translated, to date, the Scriptures into 1,250 languages which are distributed throughout the U.S. and in nearly 150 countries abroad.

These Scriptures are distributed in America by churches and church organizations, welfare organizations, orphanages, hospitals, prisons, rest homes, campus groups, branches of the military, and etc. As well as by the regional offices of the A.B.S. in seven major cities.

Abroad, distribution is through Bible headquarters usually located in the capitals. of the countries.

Although the A.B.S. now offers translations of the Bible in well over 1,000 languages, translations in 1,000 more languages and dialects are desperately needed. In trying to meet this need, the A.B.S. has established a ten million dollar Anniversary Fund. Of which, six million dollars is to be used in printing and distributing the Scriptures. The remaining four million dollars is to be used for the new Bible House in New York, which was dedicated on April 3, 1966. Of this goal \$4,268,000 has been raised and pledged as of May 13, 1966.

If the goal of 75,000,000 copies of the Word of God to be distributed in 1966 is to be met, the A.B.S. must have the support of many more of the people.

Let us give so that others may say of the Bible as one has already said, "I thought it was just another book but it was a new life.

### CAMPBELLSVILLE BAPTIST CHURCH

The session opened with the singing of "Wonderful Words of Life" and "Love Lifted Me", led by Dr. Forest Shely with Miss Ann Coakley at the piano.

Scripture and prayer by Rev. Eugene Smith.

The Temperance and Morals report was read by Rev. Floyd M. Short. Rev. Paul Prather spoke to the report. It was approved.

#### 24. TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

The preaching of the Gospel and the ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ is a continuing process and the church must be continually witnessing to the life, death, and resurrection of Christ with a sense of urgency that lost souls may be led to saving faith in Him.

The church must also take a stand against the evils of the day and speak out in boldness against any and all influences that destroy lives and lead men away from Jesus. The results of the drinking of alcoholic beverage is such an evil among us. Automobile drivers under the influence of alcohol were involved in accidents that killed at least 25,000 people in America last year; alcoholism is rated as one of the four leading health problems; up to three-fourths of the divorces can be related to use of beverage alcohol and some reports state that 90% of the crime in America is alcohol related. The liquor industry is spending \$1/2 billion per year on advertising and has done such a good job that over \$13 billion was spent on alcoholic beverages last year, which is 2 1/2 times as much as was given by all religious denominations for all religious and charitable causes.

The Temperance League continues to oppose this industry and believes that total abstinence is the only attitude to take toward beverage alcohol.

League speakers have shared information concerning the work of the league as well as seeking the prayerful support in 1,000 churches. The Director has presented 44 programs of alcohol education in 34 schools in Kentucky to over 16,500 students.

The League is an organization belonging to the churches of Kentucky and is wholly dependent upon them for its existence. A portion of its directors are elected by the Kentucky Baptist Convention, but it is not supported through the Cooperative Program, but by individuals and churches.

Then sharing Christ with the world means that we are evangelizing. This is the most rewarding work we can do in our Christian lives.

## 28. REPORT ON DISTRICT MISSIONS

The primary missions project of the Taylor County Association for the 1966 Associational Year was the \$ 100.00 month

assisting the mission at Celina, Ohio. Several contacts were made directly by laymen of Taylor County Association, including Dr. Shely, Mr. Willard Wise, Mr. Homer Kirtley, Dr. Paul Horner, Mr. J. B. Crawley and others. All reports were highly favorable of the significant progress being made in the face of serious difficulties. The church mission has a beautiful building, and parsonage, purchased by the Kettering Baptist Church, from another denomination who were moving their location, and gave the Kettering Church a very attractive price on the property. Several improvements in the property has been made, along with some remodeling in the church basement to make it more effective for Sunday School growth. The pastor, a Campbellsville College graduate has made unusual progress through the leadership of the Holy Spirit and has become an outstanding Christian leader in the Ohio Association of which he is a member. Several Association-wide projects have been led through him, including Bracero Mission work among the Latin American harvest laborers. The Mission has shown steady and unusual growth and the pastor has accepted many positions of responsibility in the community. The members have expressed sincere appreciation for the assistance that has come to them through the Taylor County Association.

Another major project of the Taylor County Association has been a young Baptist Church in the Hollywood area of California. Negotiations are still pending for reciprocal action between the Taylor County Association and the Hollywood Church. Due to illness of one member of the "Team" and other commitments of other members and lack of time to rearrange an appropriate date, the settlement of the project activities are still pending.

Budget spent in 1965-1966 was \$2,267.62.

## STATE MISSIONS

The State Missions Department of the Kentucky Baptist Convention stands ready to assist our Association through the CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM funds which our churches provide. It is prepared to assist the Metropolitan, District, Associational, County, Local, and Communities Missions.

It offers assistance with National Baptists, Goodwill centers, Week-day programs, Juvenile Rehabilitation and other Special Ministries, Work with Deaf and Retarded, Health and Welfare, Clinics and Conferences, Schools of Missions, Church Development Ministry and Church Surveys, and training sessions for the Chaplains Career Course. It also provides Student Summer Mission Workers and Week-end Workers to associations and churches and offers assistance in the organization of local missions and the constitution of new churches.

During the past year, the services of the State Missions Department have been used by our Association and churches and others in Kentucky as follows: Miles traveled, 1,650,000; Visits made, 55,000; Revivals conducted, 400; Sermons and addresses delivered, 20,000; Literature distributed, 330,000; Baptisms, 1,300; Other decisions, 4,000; New units organized, 86; Church Surveys, 23; Schools of Missions, 11; Associational Schools, 25; New Missions organized, 36; New Churches constituted, 29.

An announcement was made of the special Missions Week Program scheduled for March 19-24, 1967. The announcement was made by Rev. William Beard, Moderator of the association.

### 30. HOME MISSION REPORT

A new creative approach is the desire of the Home Mission Board according to Executive Secretary, Arthur B. Rutledge.

Changes within the agency included the addition of work



related to Non-Evangelicals, Administrative Services, Christian Social Ministries, Special Mission Ministries, Art Services, Mission Property Service, Emphasis on Metropolitan and Academic Evangelism. An Associate Director in the Division of Mission, and the Division of Education and Promotion was renamed Division of Communication.

In supporting Missions in the United States, Cuba, Puerto Rico, and Panama, Southern Baptists channeled more than \$7,900,000 through the Home Mission Board. The Cooperative Program provided \$4,365,353 (Kentucky gave \$172,802), including the largest Advance Section in history, \$911,753; and the Annie Armstrong offering promoted by Woman's Missionary Union provided a record \$3,573,146 (\$158,824 from Kentucky). \$50,000 was allocated from the Advance Section for aid to hurricane stricken areas in Louisiana.

The Missionary Force of over 2,000 is mostly employed under the Cooperative agreements with state Baptist Conventions. In Kentucky about \$90,000 in work is shared 47-53%. 656 students were employed for ten weeks for the summer of 1966. Right now 186 more missionaries are needed. There are 528 active chaplains in hospitals and industry.

The Twelve Programs through which the Home Mission Board seeks to bring over land to know Christ are the following: Evangelism Development, Chaplaincy, Ministries, Church Loans, Establishing New Churches and Church-Type Missions, Associational Administration Services, Pioneer Missions, Rural-Urban Missions, Metropolitan Missions, Language Missions, Work with National Baptists, Christian Social Ministries, Work Related to Non-Evangelicals.

### 31. FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

**MISSIONARY PERSONNEL:** At the close of 1965, the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board had a missionary staff of 2,070.

A new dimension in missionary service was initiated in the summer of 1965 with the Missionary Journeyman Program. These single college graduates under 27 years of age went to 27 countries for two-year terms in assignments under career missionaries.

**MISSIONARIES AROUND THE WORLD:** Southern Baptist Missionaries were under appointment to 61 countries or political entities at the close of 1965. Work was begun in Austria and Libya during the year, and missionaries were appointed for English-language work in Turkey.

**EVANGELISM:** Leading people to Jesus Christ is the ultimate purpose underlying all our missionary endeavors. At the year's end there were 4,410 churches (2,529 self-supporting), 7,131 mission points, and 3,816 national pastors related to our Southern Baptist work. These reported 48,080 baptisms, 492,148 church members, and 571,590 enrolled in Sunday School. China, closed to missionaries at present, was last estimated as having 392 churches and 123,000 members.

**SCHOOLS AND STUDENT WORK:** The 1,095 schools related to our missions in 41 countries had an enrollment of 184,180 students with a staff of 4,703 national and 382 missionary teachers.

**HOSPITALS AND MEDICAL CARE:** Medical mission institutions include 20 hospitals and 52 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,379 beds. In 1965 there were 106 national and 63 missionary physicians serving with 288 national and 56 missionary nurses.

**PUBLICATION WORK:** Literature in the language of the people has become increasingly important. Our 21 publication centers overseas and at El Paso, Texas, (Spanish) produced over 18 million pieces: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, and hymn books.

**CONTRIBUTIONS:** Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$24,983,924.53 as 1965 closed (\$564,652 from Kentucky). Still, needs continue to be far beyond financial resources. The 1965 Lottie Moon Christmas offering reached a total of \$13,194,356.92 (May 1, 1966)--\$413,840.83 from Kentucky.

**HOME OFFICE:** 153 people work at the Foreign Mission Board's home office, 3806 Monument Avenue, Richmond, Virginia 23230.

**THE COMMISSION:** Foreign Missions journal of the Board, reported an average circulation of 106,000 in 1965.
