CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article IV) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE 1-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and shall make monthly and annual reports to the Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.



## ARTICLE II - COMMITTEES

L. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.

6. Each committee shall be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

The tenth annual session of the Taylor County Baptist Association was called to order by W. R. Beard at 9:30 a.m. August 24, 1967 in the sanctuary of the Saloma, Ky. Baptist Church for the Morning Session.

The Christian Education Report was presented and approved and ready by Mr. Homer Kirtley after which the Association adopted the report.

#### 7. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

When Southern Baptists speak of "Christian Education", they are speaking of seminaries, senior colleges, junior colleges, academies, and Bible schools.

The purpose of Christian education is to provide Christian leadership, to teach young people in a Christian atmosphere, and to give special Christian training to those who will enter church-related vocations - pastors, teachers, nurses, doctors, evangelists, church staff members, denominational workers, and missionaries.

Christian Education in Kentucky centers in our schools. Enrollments this past year were up in all schools - Cumberland, 1,466; Georgetown, 1,361; Campbellsville, 961; and Kentucky Southern, 618. Oneida Institute was 230, and Clear Creek, 149. Total was 4,785.

The support of Kentucky Baptists in Christian education took a major step upward during the past year. \$300,000 was added to the budget to enable the schools and colleges to repay loans on an annual basis, loans amounting to approximately \$3.5 million. This, added to funds provided for operation and CEA, adds up to more than a million dollars a year for Christian Education in Kentucky.

The matter of permission to borrow funds from a government agency was a problem for Kentucky Baptists. The Executive Board recommended in May, 1966, that the schools borrow as they wish. The Special Convention June 27-28 restricted borrowing the \$3.5 million "from private sources only." The regular Annual Convention on November 12, lifted this restriction by leaving the matter to the discretion of the Convention's trustees for each institution. Not everybody was satisfied with either action.

The Cooperative Program is the primary source of aid for Christian education, as well as all other mission causes. Also, many are giving extra through the ECA program and the 1,000 and 10 Club Campbellsville College.

#### 8. BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

The Program of Baptist Student Work in Kentucky has continued to expand in many ways. It is directed by J. Chester Durham, and supported by the Cooperative Program.

Community Colleges: One of the areas of expansion has been in the establishing of a Baptist ministry on community college campuses. In some places it has been difficult to get started due to the lack of mature leadership. In other areas the community college effort has progressed splendidly.

Campus Ministries Committee; At the December Executive Board meeting a special standing committee of the Board was designated as the Campus Ministries Committee. This thirteen-man committee is to work with the strengthening of the Baptist ministry on college and university campuses throughout Kentucky.

The committee has studied all facilities and some decisions have been reached regarding the improvement of our inadequate Student Centers. Procedures for the employment of new personnel have been refined.

This Year: Twelve full-time Baptist University College Ministers served on campuses in Kentucky.

The campus program was emphasized under the six core areas of Enlistment, Study, Fellowship, Evangelism, Mission and Worship. These emphases took the form of devotional programs, lectures, theological speakers, missionary speakers, discussions and study groups on various subjects, colloquiums, films and discussions, missionary emphasis and service projects, evangelism and youth teams, social and recreational activity.

In addition to the above there was a coffee house ministry, counseling, International Student Ministry, choirs, social action groups, conventions, conferences and retreats.

## REPORT TO TAYLOR COUNTY ASSOCIATION

AUGUST 24, 1967

We thank you for the opportunity to bring you a report on Campbellsville College.

First, I want to thank the pastors and the churches of this Association for all that you have done for us. We request your prayers for our College family as we enter the new school year September 6, 1967. This report will be presented in two sections. I will give a general report on the College to be followed by Mr. Asher who will report on our financial program.

Campbellsville College is a four-year liberal arts institution, fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and by the State Department of Education for the training of teachers. We had a total enrollment the past year of 1079 students. These students came from 71 Foreign Countries, 21 States and 65 counties in Kentucky with 286 from Taylor County.

We have an excellent faculty for this fall. 33% have the doctorate degree. All of our faculty members are committed to a good program of higher education within the Christian environment and under Christian principles.

We have completed three new residence halls, North Hall for 88 women, Stapp Hall for 202 women and South Hall for 172 men. All of these buildings were financed by a private agency and are to be amortized from income from these buildings.

We have recently signed Letters of Intent with Tandy Industries of Tulsa, Oklahoma for a Health and Physical Education Building, a Student Activity Building and we plan to convert the present Student Union Building to a much needed classroom building. These buildings will be financed by a private lending agency at 5-5/8% interest and amortized by the \$51,330 from the Kentucky Baptist Convention. The Architectural Department of the Sunday School Board in Nashville is completing an overall campus plan for the development of our College. The two buildings mentioned are located in this plan.

Time will not permit a full report on the College, however, I want to comment briefly on our Department of Bible and Religious Education. We will have two full time and one part time professor of Bible this year. Dr. Paul G. Horner and Dr. H. E. Coker will be teaching full time and Mr. Jerry Kibbons part time. Mr. Robert Richardson will be a full time Director of Religious Activities on the campus. All students are required to have six semester hours in Bible for graduation. A course in "In Service Training" for ministers will be directed by Mr. Kibbons.

Our Department of Religious Activities sent youth teams to 40 churches in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. During these visits they reported 58 professions of faith, 12 transfer of membership, 117 rededications and 11 commitments to church related vocations.



This Sunday afternoon from 2:00 to 4:00 the local trustees and wives will hold Open House in Stapp Residence Hall. We not only invited but urge you to be our guests on this occasion.

Mr. A. Joe Asher of Benton, Kentucky, a prominent attorney and Baptist layman has been employed as General Counsel and Director of Financial Development of the College. Mr. Asher will take the remainder of our allotted time to conclude this report.

### CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

1. Campbellsville College has not applied, and has no plan to apply for FEDERAL LOANS or GRANTS for capital improvements. The final decision rests not with the Trustees but with potential donors.
2. The following facilities have been obtained with funds from private lenders:
 

North Hall for women, housing 68	cost \$ 350,000.00
South Hall for men, housing 172	cost 663,000.00
New Stapp Hall for women,	
housing 202	cost 1,050,000.00
(amortized entirely from rentals)	
3. Science and Student Union buildings, being amortized by funds from C. E. A. program.
4. Kentucky Baptist Convention has allocated \$51,330.00 per year for 20 years to assist in financing capital needs but this sum meets only part of requirements.
5. Plans are being finalized for construction of Physical Education and Student Activity buildings (converting present Student Union Building to needed classrooms). Funds for construction are now available from private lenders at reasonable rates.
6. A full time financial development office has been established to promote and direct an annual sustaining financial support program to meet the needs for capital improvements, to provide funds to supplement student costs and to provide scholarships.

## ANNUAL SUSTAINING FINANCIAL PLAN

1. The Board of Trustees has developed an annual sustaining financial plan by which it will seek to secure 1500 units of \$100 annually for the next ten years by designated gifts through and from churches and friends within the College area, and from all friends, alumni, corporations and foundations in all areas.

2. An appeal is being presented to the churches who are now in the C. E. A. program to designate one or more units of \$100 each per year of these funds to Campbellsville College, NOW.

3. Churches not now participating in the C. E. A. effort will be urged to include the C. E. A. program in their budget this year and designate one or more units of \$100 each annually to Campbellsville College.

4. For each \$200 contributed through the church under either of the above suggestions or by individuals in the church community, the College will make available \$25 scholarship to a student or students attending Campbellsville College, chosen by the church.

## HOSPITAL REPORT

In the absence of Dr. Roy Wilson, Dr. Forest Shely read the hospital report. The report was adopted by the Association.

The Baptists of Kentucky own and operate three good hospitals located in the largest Metropolitan areas of Kentucky. They derive practically all of their income from the patients they serve. They are controlled by the Baptist Hospital Commission. The Cooperative Program allocates \$80,000.00 to the Commission and also sponsors the Mother's Day Charity Offering in all the churches to defray the expenses of those needing care and not able to pay for it. However, since the advent of Medicare and Medicaid, the need of Charity is greatly reduced, and it is the aim of the government program to overcome this need.

The paramount problem facing Taylor County Baptist is our own local hospital program. The Catholic Sisters have said that they do not feel justified in further expenditure on their local hospital which needs enlarging and some modernization to meet our basic needs. They recommend that a County hospital be built by the proceeds from a bond issue. I think this deserves serious and prayerful consideration and prompt action. This should have been done years ago, but we failed to do our duty. Now is the time for an all out concerted drive by everyone.

## CHILD CARE REPORT

Each of us has a tenderness for children who are without homes. Our Kentucky Baptist Board of Child Care operates three children's homes, Glen Dale, Spring

Meadows, and Pine Crest, and the Child Care Center for maternity care. During 1966, 715 children were cared for in these homes. We had forty-one baptisms from children's homes. During 1966 the homes operated under a deficit of \$119,575.

In 1967, the first three months showed a better year ahead. On Jan. 1, 485 children were under care in our three homes. Glen Dale had 197 children, Spring Meadows 191, Pine Crest 51, and the Child Care Center 53, a total of 492 children. The three homes had 61 children living in fosterhomes, and 14 enrolled in colleges and vocational schools.

The last Thanksgiving Offering broke all previous records, and was \$297,159.54. Receipts from settlement of estates have exceeded those of last year. We are expecting an increase in our cooperative program allocation from \$100,000 to \$103,000.

We hope you share our feeling of encouragement since you are largely responsible for it. We receive our support from pastors, churches, and individual Baptists, and we pray that you will continue this ministry of Christian love and benevolence. As we share this responsibility to society, thereby we reap the joys and rewards for serving others.

#### ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Response to the new program of family and retirement protection during the first quarter of 1967 indicates enthusiastic acceptance by ministers and denominational employees. The new Program, called the Southern Baptist Protection Program, provides additional benefits for children, education of children and dependent parent. The new Protection Program incorporates the three plans into one certificate, which formerly required separate certificates for each plan.

In 1966, more than \$4,256,244.00 was paid in age retirement, disability or widow benefits to persons who had participated in the Protection Program.

The cost of living continues to climb. A retirement program based on \$4,000 salary is no longer adequate to meet the needs of a minister when he retires. The new Protection Program was started so churches could help their pastors increase their retirement protection. Now a church may participate on the total salary of its pastor or other employees. Ten per cent dues on total salary are recommended as minimum.

As of December 31, 1966, some 1,492 persons had joined Plan "A" of the Program. A total of 18,328 churches were providing the Protection Program for their ministers and staff members. Almost 12,600 of these churches were paying both member and church dues.

#### KENTUCKY BAPTIST FOUNDATION

It has been a good year for the Foundation. New assets received during the fiscal year ending August 31, 1966 amounted to \$314,614.09. An additional \$181,462.77 in new assets have been received during the first six months of this fiscal year. The market value of all the Trust Funds handled by the Foundation as of February 28, 1967 was \$4,031,007.04.

During the past fiscal year we distributed \$143,783.15 in earnings. The first six months of this fiscal year we distributed \$66,112.18 in earnings to our Baptist causes. The expense of the Foundation, however, comes from the Cooperative Program.

More churches used "Make Your Will Month" materials during January, 1967 than ever before. Churches continue to use the thirty-minute color film, "God's Will Through Yours" and the filmstrip, "Generations to Come."

The Foundation Secretary, James C. Austin continues to visit churches to speak on "Stewardship of Accumulated Possessions," and to counsel with interested individuals upon request. The Foundation has assisted in the preparation of 35 wills since September 1, 1966.

#### TRAINING UNION REPORT

Training Union is concerned with that part of the Great Commission that speaks of making disciples. Just as we would insist that our men in the Armed Forces should have training before committed to combat, even so we should see the necessity of training disciples of Christ who are engaged in combat with Satan. The task of training is the responsibility of each church. The Associational Training-Union organization, as such, has as its basic purpose to assist the churches in the association in having a comprehensive, purposeful, training program.

This past year we witnessed a change in our literature. At the present time a new program of training is being launched called ACT. This stands for Advanced Church Training and is an attempt to make our training program more effective.

Literature, methods, and new ideas will not guarantee a successful training program. Much will depend on the attitude of each local church. As has often been stated, "We get out of Training Union. . . What we put in it."

According to reports all of the churches of our association have a Training Union. Some of the highlights of the past year was "M" Night with Dr. Dehoney, past president of the Southern Baptist Convention, as our speaker. Most of our church participated in the January Bible Study and reported a good study in the Book of Amos. Four Young People, Four Intermediates, and 11 Juniors participated in the Training Union Drills and events.

A total of 347 awards for study courses were earned by the churches of our association.

#### RADIO AND TELEVISION REPORT

While other areas of Southern Baptist life are showing some decline, radio and television has grown by leaps and bounds. Chiefly manifest in 5000 letters (among 75000 received) indicating spiritual decisions - professions of faith, as well as other deep spiritual commitments to Christ.



More than 9000 letters have been received praising THE VINE, a film on the Life of Christ, produced by the National Broadcasting Company. Some have indicated it to be the greatest single presentation of the Christian faith ever to appear on television. The overwhelming number of decisions for Christ bear testimony to its effectiveness. Newspapers as well as lay people have praised it. It is estimated that approaching 40,000,000 people will see it at "prime time" on N. B. C. The Television media is called a "world-wide" ministry reaching out into more homes to more families and so, to more lost people than any other gospel endeavor of our denomination, every year. This information, paraphrased from a report given by Paul M. Stevens, Executive Director of Southern Baptist Radio-Television Commission, an agency of Southern Baptist life, is said to help fulfill the great void in this greatest area of mass-communication. It is potentially a great curse or a blessing. How it is used and what constitutes the teaching and values it represents is the determining factor.

Southern Baptist need to utilize all means to witness to all men everywhere, or in the words of Paul, "I am made all things to all men, that I might by all means save some".

#### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

The American Bible Society shares the concern for world-wide missions which Southern Baptists are expressing in plans for "The Crusade of the Americas" and World Missions Year in 1969. The entire program of the American Bible Society is Missionary in principle.

There is no substitute for the Bible in presenting Christ to men. Each person must have the Bible in his own language. The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The aim of the "society" is to place a Bible in every Christian home, a testament in every Christian hand, a scripture portion for every reader, and supplies of scripture for Christians to share.

Because the Bible Society serves mission work and Southern Baptist Missionaries depend on the society for scriptures needed for the people, therefore Southern Baptist believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

In 1966 Southern Baptists gave \$233,896 to the A. B. S. and ranked first among all denominations in gifts from all churches which amounted to \$1,472,307.

It was decided by the Association to leave the number of meetings of individual departments of the Association to the discretion of the groups, so that they would be free of regulations that might prevent them from most effectively transacting their missions.

Mr. R. F. Richenburg introduced the subject of alcoholism which was extensively discussed from the floor. A motion was made by Rev. McNeal that a committee on Alcoholism which was extensively discussed from the floor. A motion was made on Alcoholism be appointed to work on the problem and bring a recommendation to the Executive Board. This is to be a continuous study. Motion seconded by R. F. Richenburg and passed. The full text of the discussion is recorded on "Tape #3" TCAKB, 10th S.

With no further miscellaneous business the afternoon session of the 10th annual meeting adjourned until the evening. Closed with prayer by Dr. C. R. Daley.

It includes the attitudes, thoughts, words and actions of the Christian. The basic purpose of the Church, Association and Convention is to carry out the Commission of our Lord.

Several methods have been used in making Jesus Christ known to the people and that is through music, teaching, preaching and witnessing. This is Biblical Evangelism. Evangelism is soul-winning. Soul-winning is telling the secret of how and by Whom his life was transformed and drawing for a decision.

Most of us will agree with the above statement but some how we have lost the urgency which the New Testament places around this task. Hard, cold facts about the worlds population must impress us again along with the teaching of the New Testament that the urgency of Evangelism in our day must be restored.

It took 26 resident members in Kentucky one year to win one preson to Christ. In our Association 16 of our churches reported baptisms during the year. These churches baptized 232 people. This is a ratio of one baptism for 24 resident church members.

Our State Secretary of Evangelism, Thomas Hicks Shelton, desires to assist our Association and Churches in any way possible.

Authorities tell us that the world's population is one-third Christian. However, comparing the population growth with our rate of baptism, by 2000 A. D. the world will be only one-fifth Christian!

#### THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The work of Woman's Missionary Union for this year has been built around the denomination's emphasis: "A Church Fulfilling It's Mission Through Education." Our watchword has been, ". . . grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." -- 2 Peter 3:18.

We have had some increases in our work this year. We have 11 WMS organizations. A new one, Elkhorn, was organized this year. We have 3 YWA's - 10 GA's (Elkhorn and Salem newly organized) and 7 Sunbeam Bands. We had increases in our offerings during the weeks of prayer which we trust indicates more interest and prayer for missions.

Our association was represented at GA camps at Cedarmore. One of our leaders served as a counselor. Miss Anna Mary Hack, Campbellsville Baptist Church, was selected to be the State Sunbeam Director for Kentucky WMU.

One of our greatest needs is enlisting our young women to serve through WMU. Also we would encourage the churches that do not have WMU, organize one to provide the missionary leadership and participation each church should have.

We thank God for all His blessings this year but we remember the words of our Lord when he said ". . . Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest."

22. Brotherhood Report: Presented by Brother Darrell Hunt and Approved.

#### BROTHERHOOD REPORT

A New Testament Church has the task of promoting missions and of missionary education for its members. In a very real sense, a church's understanding and acceptance of this task will determine the extent to which a church's manpower is involved in the mission of the church.

For those churches without organized Brotherhood we would urgently recommend the election of a Brotherhood Director who would be responsible for beginning either one or all of the three units of Brotherhood work for which we have the materials. These three units are Baptist men (25 yrs. up), Baptist Young Men (18-24) and Royal Ambassadors (9-17). With the changes in record-keeping and reporting brought about by the mission study and mission action approach, our Brotherhood enrollment figure is not very accurate. The estimate is 86 men enrolled and 78 boys in Royal Ambassadors. There are three other churches in Taylor County Association interested in Ambassador work.

During the coming year it is planned to continue study of the Brotherhood changes and become familiar with all the materials available to help our churches carry out their responsibility to provide missionary education opportunities and encourage men, young men, and boys to become involved in all their church and denomination is attempting to do.

#### REPORT ON DISTRICT MISSIONS

One of the primary missions project of the Taylor County Association for the 1967 year was the \$100.00 a month assisting the mission at Celina, Ohio. Several contacts were made during the year by laymen of the Taylor County Association. All reports were highly favorable of the significant progress being made in this pioneer mission area. The church mission has a beautiful building, and parsonage purchased by the Kettering Baptist Church, from another denomination who were moving their location, and gave the Kettering Church a very attractive price on the property. A group of laymen, with Clifford Strader as chairman, conducted a weekend laymen Evangelistic Program at Jackson Center, Ohio. The brotherhood furnished the transportation and Lynn Montgomery, Robert Richardson and Clifford Strader led the religious emphasis in the mission.

Another major mission project sponsored by the Taylor County Association of Baptists was assisting the First Baptist Church of Beverly Hills, California by 100.00 a month. This church lies in the heart of the Beverly Hills area and has tremendous witness in the nations entertainment capitol. The church reciprocated by sending a revival team to Taylor County Association for a weeklong Revival

held at Campbellsville Baptist Church. Members of the team were Rev. Blake Woolbright, evangelist and pastor of the Beverly Hills church, David King, Minister of Music at the church, and Tom Lester, Training Union director at the church and character actor on the television show "Green Acres". There was 100% participation of all the churches of the Association in the effort and the revival was blessed with large crowds each night.

Perhaps, one of the greatest efforts of the Association, at home, was the School of Missions conducted on March 19-24. With 20 state, home and foreign missionaries, this week-long emphasis implanted in our minds vividly the increased need for missionaries now at home and abroad. There was 100% participation in this effort and all churches were greatly blessed.

Budget spent in 1966-67 was \$4,990.92.

24. Direct Missions Report: Presented by Dr. Lynwood Montell and approved.

#### DIRECT MISSIONS

The missionary interests and desires of Kentucky Baptists outside our own church fields are carried out mainly by the Kentucky Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. In our own state, the Direct Missions Department acts for us. It uses Cooperative Program gifts and other special gifts to provide mission services.

The Direct Missions Department assists in Metropolitan, District, Associational, County, Local, and Community Missions. Its services are available to all associations.

It also assists with Goodwill Center and Weekday programs, Juvenile Rehabilitation and other Special Ministries, Work with Deaf and Retarded, Health and Welfare, Clinics and Conferences, Schools of Missions, Church Development Ministry and Church Surveys, and training sessions for the Chaplains Career Course. It should be noted that Taylor County Baptists conducted a very successful School of Missions this past year.

This Department also provides Student Summer Mission Workers (Campbellsville College provided five (5) summer mission workers) and Student Week-end Workers to associations and churches. It offers assistance in the organization of local missions and the constitution of new churches.

The Direct Missions Department provides In-Service Training at Clear Creek Baptist School. Two new In-Service Training Programs will be initiated this fall, one at Cumberland College and one at Campbellsville College. Men trained in these programs will be available to serve our churches.

During the past year, the services of the Direct Missions Department have been used by the Taylor County Association and churches, and others in Kentucky as follows: Miles traveled, 1,690,000; Visits made, 55,510; Revivals conducted, 300; Sermons and addresses delivered, 17,500; Literature distributed, 335,000; Baptisms, 1,050; Other decisions, 3,700; New units organized, 90; Church Surveys, 115; Schools of Missions, 80; Associational Schools, 13; New Missions organized, 15; New Churches constituted, 14; Vacation Bible Schools conducted, 285.

The Secretary of the Direct Missions Department is A. B. Colvin. Working with him are J. Edward Cunningham, Associate Director of the Mountain Mission Program and Schools of Missions; G. R. Pendergraph, Director of Church Development Ministry, Church Surveys, and Chaplains, Career Course, and William N. Goble, Director of Work with the Deaf and Retarded and other Special Ministries.

Let's make use of these services in our Association this year.

25. Home Missions Report: Presented by Dr. Shely and approved.

#### HOME MISSIONS REPORT

A HOME MISSIONS FORCE of over 2,100 assist Southern Baptists in their efforts to bring men to God through Jesus Christ in a period characterized by national and international tensions, inflationary economy, growing population, moral problems, and mounting social changes. This force was reinforced in 1966 by the appointment of 427 missionaries.

RECORD SUPPORT came during the year through the Cooperative Program (\$4.7 million) and the Annie Armstrong Offering (\$4 million).

FUNDS FOR DISASTER RELIEF, which started with \$50,000 in 1966, will reach \$235,000 during 1967 with increased funds coming through the Advance Section of the Cooperative Program.

METROPOLITAN AND ACADEMIC EVANGELISM ministries received intensive study to plan Southern Baptist approaches in both areas. Metropolitan crusades in Denver and Phoenix are planned for 1968, and the Dayton (Ohio) for 1967.

VIETNAM MILITARY FORCES were served by 100 of the 849 Southern Baptist military chaplains serving on active duty. Strengthened efforts have been made for ministries by chaplains with hospitals, institutions, and in industry, and with churches in meeting the needs of military personnel near them or from their membership who are away on active duty.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE went to 270 churches for loans totaling more than \$4.5 million, many of these to Kentucky churches.

THE NORTHEAST CRUSADE, a concerted emphasis on missions for the ten-state northeastern area through 1970, was launched in 1966 with most of the agencies of the SBC participating, under the leadership of the Home Mission Board's Department of Pioneer Missions and the State conventions of Ohio and Maryland. This department also reported marked advance in work in all of the twenty-four states it serves.

METROPOLITAN MISSIONS is implementing a significant and comprehensive pilot program for the Miami Beach area, and the department also is cooperating in an urban studies seminar in Washington, D. C. with Southeastern Seminary and the District of Columbia convention.

AILING CUBA MISSIONARY, Herbert Caudill, was reported recovering in a satisfactory manner from an eye operation performed by Dr. William Hagler of Atlanta, who flew into Cuba to help save the sight in Caudill's one good eye. The veteran missionary is confined to his home in Havana, and is now doing some light reading. The Clifton Fites of Waynesboro, Georgia, parents of David Fite who is a prisoner, met with high Cuban officials seeking David's release and returned to say, "We believe that the government will deal kindly with the matter of his release."

CHANGES IN ATTITUDES among Southern Baptists toward the race problem and cooperation with National Baptists are slowly beginning to emerge—more open discussion, more involvement, and a seeking after better relationships is reported by the Department of Work with National Baptists, a work begun in Kentucky March 1, 1967.

IN CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES there has come a new awareness among Southern Baptists of the necessity to minister to all the needs of man; especially has this been noticed in the interest in week-day ministries. They cooperate with our Direct Missions department in several projects.

THE VOLUNTEERS for special supporting missionary work swelled in number as 670 students from 212 colleges and four seminaries participated as student summer missionaries.

26. Cooperative Program Report: Presented by Rev. L.N. Hamilton and approved.

#### COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

Kentucky Baptists answer the prayers of people around the world as we share through the Cooperative Program. This channel is an open door to pro-



vide a helping hand, a welcoming voice, a promise for a glad tomorrow for the sick, homeless, helpless, friendless, lonely, forgotten and the lost of the world.

The Cooperative Program gives us a part in all the Lord's work every week. It is missions in the local church, missions in the district or association, missions in the state, missions in the nation and missions around the world.

Churches giving thought to Cooperative Program minister to the physical and spiritual needs of mankind throughout the world.

Each church, under God and before a lost world, decides what percentage of the tithes and offerings of the people will go to missions. This is sent to Harold G. Sanders, the Treasurer, Kentucky Baptist Convention, Middletown, Kentucky 40043. He uses it according to a budget approved by Kentucky Baptists, both in Kentucky and through the Southern Baptist Convention, around the world.

The secret of the success of this plan of missionary enterprise is found in the word "cooperation." By cooperation this program works. From their beginnings Kentucky Baptist churches have demonstrated a spirit of fellowship and cooperation. From this the very idea of the Cooperative Program was begun. Ten years before the Southern Baptist Convention adopted the Cooperative Program, Kentucky Baptists had adopted a budget plan for the support of all denominational objects, state and southwide. The Cooperative Program has proved to be our best means of meeting humanity's need.

The 1966 minutes of Taylor County Association reveal that 17 of the 18 churches gave through the Cooperative Program. The amount given was \$32,467. While one church may give to some mission cause, it cannot give to all mission causes except through some plan of cooperation--we call it the Cooperative Program. This year's goal is \$3.5 million; starting September 1st it is \$3.75 million.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The many trouble spots which have developed around the world with multiple crisis developing simultaneously make mandatory that we take seriously the command of our Lord to carry the Gospel to all the people of the world. We believe Christ is the answer, and never has the message of the Prince of Peace been more needed.

The past year has been both an inspiration and a disappointment. The inspiration has come from the continuous response from our people of mission volunteers

and the commitment of the financial resources to make their going possible. At Glorieta, the Board took action to enter the sixty-sixth country with foreign missionaries. Southern Baptists continue to increase their financial support of missions, as is indicated by the total amount of \$27,047,200. contributed in 1966, which was an increase of \$2,063,276. over 1965. The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering had reached a total of \$13,760,146.80 by May 1, 1967.

In spite of the fact that we have an increase in the money dedicated to the Lord for foreign missions and a continuous stream of volunteers, it is necessary for Southern Baptists to turn a deaf ear to appeals amounting to more than two million dollars each year. This is the disappointment.

We must have a continuous enlargement of support through the Cooperative Program from all of our churches, and such a vital spiritual atmosphere in our churches that our young people can hear and respond to the Lord's Call to give themselves in foreign mission service. There is no way for continued missionary advance than by the involvement of more mission volunteers and more dollars to support mission activity around the world.

God grant that every church in Taylor County and every Baptist within the framework of the churches will be involved to the maximum in the support of world missions.
