CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article IV) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I – DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and shall make monthly and annual reports to the Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II – COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.

6. Each committee shall be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

The eleventh annual session of the Taylor County Baptist Association was called to order by Joe R. Hampton at 9:30 a.m. August 22, 1968 in the sanctuary of the South Campbellsville Baptist Church for the Morning session.

The Christian Education Report was presented and read by Dr. J. Chester Badgett after which the Association adopted the report.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

“Christian Education” includes our Baptist seminaries, colleges, academies and Bible Schools. In Kentucky we have now three Senior colleges—Georgetown, Cumberland, and Campbellsville; one mountain academy—Oneida; and one adult preacher school—Clear Creek.

The prime purpose of Christian education is to provide the church and the world with Christian leadership. To do that best, we train youth in a Christian context, through Christian teachers. We also give specialized training to those who will enter church-related full-time vocations—pastors and missionaries, minister of education and music and youth, doctors and nurses, evangelists and denominational leaders.

The “Lord of the Harvest” is answering the prayers of those who asked Him to send “forth laborers into the harvest”—the number of church-related volunteers has increased. Reports from the seminaries, colleges, and schools show a gain of 119 for those interested in all church-related vocations.

Enrollment in our Kentucky Baptist Schools is on the increase. Many new buildings are being erected on all campuses from funds being provided by Baptists and their friends. The \$300,000 per year added last year for capital funds is quite helpful, in addition to their operating funds from the Co-operative Program. Also, many friends are continuing to give through the CEA Campaign which ends December 31, 1969.

Bethel College left approximately \$100,000 to be divided according to the CEA formula to Georgetown, Cumberland, and Campbellsville colleges.

CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE

Campbellsville College had a total enrollment of 1029 students from twenty states, two foreign countries and sixty-three counties in Kentucky. 218 students were from Taylor County.

The chief objective of the College is to provide a good program of higher education under Christian principles and within a Christian environment. A special committee has been appointed composed of ten faculty members and five trustees to study and analyze the strengths and weaknesses of the program in Christian education and to recommend guidelines for our future development.

The In-Service Guidance Program under the direction of Mr. Jerry Kibbons with a grant from the Kentucky Baptist Convention and the Home Mission Board is in progress and is making an excellent contribution to the training program for ministers.

A new program is being considered to offer a combined major for ministers of music and education for Christian vocations.

The College is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and approved for teacher education by the State Department of Education.

In view of the fact that more than two hundred Taylor County students are enrolled at Campbellsville College and the further fact that our tuition charges average \$200.00 per student less than actual cost, every church in Taylor County Association should include the College in its budget. It is suggested that each church place the College in the budget on a percentage basis rather than on a fixed monthly sum. The current record indicates that less than one half of the churches in the Taylor County Association are regularly contributing to Campbellsville College over and above their cooperative program and C.E.A. gifts. We will welcome an opportunity to present the appeal of the College to your church.

We request your prayers and we urge you to support the College financially and with your influence.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Kentucky Baptist Foundation is an incorporated agency of the Kentucky Baptist Convention. Created at the 1944 annual meeting of the convention, the Foundation was organized and began operation in 1945.

The Foundation exists solely for the strengthening of the other agencies and institutions of the Convention. It offers to serve any Baptist agency or any individual who would like to contribute to the perpetual maintenance of some Kentucky or Southern Baptist Ministry.

In addition to serving the investment needs of Baptist institutions and agencies, the Foundation is authorized to receive and administer gifts and bequests for their benefit. The Foundation has no assets of its own. Property or funds are held in trust for designated Baptist causes.

The market value of all the Trust Funds handled by the Foundation as of August 31, 1967, was \$4,150,150.00; income was \$173,348.00.

The Kentucky Baptist Foundation conducts a dependable and prudent investment service completely consistent with the higher ideals of Christian stewardship. We have consistently averaged a 5% rate of return. The investment policies of the Foundation are determined by nine successful Baptist business men who are elected by the Convention.

Many Kentucky Baptists have established Trusts with the Foundation during their lifetime. Others have done so through properly prepared Wills. They will continue to benefit Kentucky Baptist and Southern Baptist Convention institutions and agencies for all time to come.

The Foundation attempts to inform the membership of the churches regarding the importance of *estate planning* and *will making*. This is being through personal appearances in the churches, reports to the Convention, the Stewardship-Foundation Conference, the Western Recorder, displays, brochure, tracts, and bulletin inserts.

Representatives of all our Kentucky Baptist Agencies will gladly assist any person who may be interested in using the services of the Foundation to assist in any way the ministry of Christ.

CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE
CAMPBELLSVILLE, KENTUCKY
FINANCIAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Something over two years ago a financial development program was initiated by Campbellsville College under the name of ONE THOUSAND AND TEN PLAN, designed to appeal for both individual and church support over and above gifts through existing channels. This financial assistance is needed because at present tuition charges, per student cost to the college, runs \$200 per year more than tuition receipts. This simply means that on current enrolment of one thousand, we must have from other sources TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS annually.

Taylor County students average 225 to 250 each year, which says that we MUST have from Taylor County citizens and churches the sum of FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS each year OVER AND ABOVE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM AND CE9 gifts. To the degree that our churches fail to meet your share of this added cost of providing an education for your children in a Christian environment, we must go elsewhere to obtain that added cost. Where shall we go? Ask State and Federal help?

At the present time ONLY 7 out of 17 Baptist churches in Taylor County Association give us anything over and above Cooperative Program gifts, and the average present giving percentage-wise of your total MISSION gifts is only 5 percent. In order to give the support to your college that is absolutely necessary, *every church* in Taylor Association needs to include the college in their BUDGET for 35% of your current Mission gifts. Will you dare to reach for this goal in your support of the foundation of all Missions, college education in a Christian environment?

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

The Program of Baptist Student Work in Kentucky is directed by J. Chester Durham and supported by the Cooperative Program.

There were over 23,000 Baptist students enrolled in Kentucky colleges and universities during this school year. The largest concentration of Baptist students were at the University of Kentucky, Murray, Eastern, and Morehead.

There are thirteen full-time Baptist Campus Ministers on the college and university campuses in Kentucky.

The campus program emphasized six core areas. These areas of emphasis were Enlistment, Study, Fellowship, Evangelism, Missions, and Worship. These emphases took the form of devotional programs, lectures, theological speakers, missionary speakers, discussion and study groups, colloquiums, films and discussion, missionary emphasis and service projects, witnessing and youth teams, social and recreational activity.

Specialized approaches included a coffee house ministry, counseling, International student ministry, summer missions service, choirs, social action groups, conventions, conferences, and retreats.

The churches of our association can help our own college students by encouraging them to relate themselves to the college Baptist churches and the Baptist Student Union on the campus. We could send the name and address of students to the BSU director with the hope that they get into this important work for Christ on campus.

We can strengthen our student work, as well as all other mission work, by increasing our gifts greatly for the Cooperative Program.

Mrs. Paul Smith, accompanied on the piano by Mrs. W. R. Beard, sang a special number for the Association.

HOSPITAL REPORT

Kentucky Baptists have three hospitals under the management of the Hospital Commission with H. L. Dobbs as Executive Director. These hospitals are in Lexington, Louisville, and Paducah. The Convention allocates \$80,000 annually from the Cooperative Program to supplement the income received from the patients who are treated and cared for. Then the Mother's Day Charity Offering taken through the churches over the state help with those who need treatment but unable to pay for it. This need has been greatly relieved since the advent of Medicare.

The full-time and part-time personnel employed in these three hospitals total 1,979. These employees are instilled with an attitude of working together as they serve others. They are taught to recognize and accept as their mandate to serve God in this healing ministry.

Much has been said concerning the critical need for a County Hospital here in Taylor County. As an Association of Christian people who know the teaching of the Scriptures concerning a healing ministry I feel we should do more than discuss this all important subject. I think we should undergird a movement by which a well-equipped hospital could become a reality in our County.

CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

The child care program is designed to meet the needs of homeless and dependent children. Last year care and services were provided to 904 children. Last year 30 children living in our children's homes made professions of faith.

Child welfare work is expensive. At Glen Dale a new sewer disposal is being built which costs \$47,000. Spring Meadows has replaced 48 beds over 18 years old which cost \$3,096.00. Pine Crest has a new 54 passenger bus on order which cost \$5,814.00.

We need an increased income, and we expect \$103,000 in the next 12 months from the Cooperative Program. Our Thanksgiving offering goal is \$330,000. The remaining \$300,00 must come from gifts and other incomes.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

The three plan Southern Baptist Protection Program has one provision in Plan "A" that will affect prospective new members soon: It is called "Delayed Participation", or "Grace Period". The Grace Period is established in three ways. The first is, you must join by January 1, 1969, or on the members' 26th birthday, or one year from the time he becomes eligible. It will reduce the benefits proportionately, if the date is not met.

The continued inflation and decrease in the buying power of the dollar makes it necessary for more churches to pay more toward the retirement of their pastor. It is now in the plan to pay on the total amount of the salary. Churches are urged to take the 10% of the total salaries of their pastors and make a better provision for them when they no longer can labor.

There are 859 churches in Kentucky in the program, and 989 pastors and workers covered by one of the three plans. Our Association shows eight churches participating in one of the three plans. For information on how you can be in this program, contact Dr. A. W. Walker, Kentucky Baptist Building, Middletown, Kentucky.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

In Ephesians 4:11 and 12 we read, "and He gave some apostles; and some prophets; and some evangelists; and some pastors, and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ."

This Scripture passage helps us to see clearly one of the purposes of a church—"prepare all God's people", that is, the development of the members of the church "for the work of Christian service, to build up the body of Christ.

Training Union is at the very heart of preparing all God's people or "the perfecting of the saints". A church, if it is to be a New Testament church, must assist its members in becoming all that Christ expects them to be. This is a church responsibility. According to the digest of letters, all churches in our association have a Training Union that is helping the church meet this responsibility.

Training Union has literature and other helps designed to assist churches in 3 specific ways : (1) To acquaint new church members into the fellowship which they have joined—New Church Member Orientation. (2) To provide leadership training opportunities for the entire church program. (3) To provide training opportunities in needed areas for the entire membership, as well as younger children not yet church members.

Some churches have reported observing Youth Week in the calendar year. This is a plan for a church to use its youth in all the official positions of church life for one full week. Free materials for helping plan such a week are available from the State Training Union Department.

This year 7 young people participated in the Associational Drills and Events. Those that went on to participate in the Regional Events were: Kenny Phillips, Betty Phillips, David Hampton, and Judy Russell. Of these Judy Russell was a Regional winner and David Hampton a State winner.

The Associational Organization, along with the Kentucky State Department and Southern Baptist Convention's Training Union Department, want to assist churches in developing members, not just to establish or have an organization.

Your Associational Training Union officers and the personnel of the Kentucky Training Union Department want to help each church to have the kind and type of training program it needs. Actually, they are asking for an invitation to work with you.

RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION

During the past year the Radio and Television Commission was on the front lines of our nation's spiritual warfare. When the world's population is measured against the potential audience of a given religious radio program, the task which lies before the Christian World takes on positive aspects. The most promising path to any form of world evangelism lies in radio and television and with the past decade.

Several major events took place in the life of the Commission last year. One: Six separate awards were won by three Commission-Produced-Programs for television, showing the basic film production skills on the organization. Two: The American Broadcasting Company's selection of the Commission to produce two different radio programs in 1968 for weekly broadcast on the network was some proof that professional broadcasters have faith in the quality and content of the denomination's programs. Three: Another major development in the daily routine of the agency came with the discontinuation of BEAM, International, the Commission's monthly magazine of religious radio and television. The Baptist Hour sermons, which were featured each month in BEAM, International will be offered separately in a quarterly compilation.

Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission now claims approximately twenty percent of all religious public service time on stations

scheduling one or more of the Commission's programs. The potential audience for this time each week is estimated at 60 to 75 million, with programs in every state and major city in America and some 40 other countries.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society is a missionary, non-profit organization, serving churches of many denominations. It works with Baptists in mission work at home and abroad, translating, publishing and distributing the Bible without profit. The Society shares our concern for the Crusade of the Americas in 1969 and will be our active partner in distributing the Scriptures in the language of the people.

The Society has published some parts of the Bible in 1,280 languages; the full Bible in 240; a Testament in 301 more; a gospel or other complete book in 739 more. But there are still over 1,000 languages in which not one book of the Bible has yet been published. The Society is accelerating its translation program which is engaged in Bible translation and revision in more than 500 languages.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all of his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay after he must leave—and keep on speaking to a person's heart. But it must be in his own language for him to understand.

In spite of the strategic importance of the Bible, there is a world wide shortage—because in many countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The members of the committee and members of Alcoholics Anonymous conducted talks on alcoholism at the Campbellsville College and at 12 churches in this area.

In our association with 17 churches there were 165 baptisms reported during the last year. This is a ratio of one baptism for 35 resident members.

STATE MISSION REPORT TO THE TAYLOR COUNTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Direct Missions Department under the leadership of Dr. A. B. Colvin provides co-operative and direct mission activities throughout the state. These range from missionary assistance for 65 associations and leadership for 15 others. Next year 15 District Missionaries, working in 33 different associations, 22 Associational Missionaries, 8 County Missionaries, 5 Communities Missionaries and 26 Local Missionaries will receive support through the department.

The department's cooperative ministries assist in the work of several Baptist centers as well as work with the deaf and retarded.

A new mission program made possible by the department and the Home Mission Board is the In-Service Guidance ministry at Campbellsville College, Cumberland College and Clear Creek. This program is designed to give practical training to those training for the ministry in order that they will be better equipped to carry on the Lord's work as they serve our churches.

The Director of In-Service Guidance at Campbellsville College is Mr. Jerry Kibbons who will be calling on the pastors and churches of this area to assist him in making this a meaningful program.

Now with the cooperative program we have a channel for giving to all our causes at one time. For years we have been striving to teach our Baptist people that we do not give "to" the cooperative program but "through" the cooperative program. Just as a letter when dropped into a slot at the local post office goes through the post office and out to the place designated on the envelope, so our gifts given through the cooperative program go out to various places of concern and need.

So we see that the cooperative program is only a medium by which we work with other churches in the support of a WORLD MISSION PROGRAM.

During the past associational year the churches of our association gave \$45,407.00 through the cooperative. This is an increase of \$12,490.00 over the same period last year. According to our records one of our churches did not give through the cooperative program last year.

We would recommend that as many churches as possible in our association increase their gifts to world missions during this year of emphasis and dedication on the Crusade of the Americas.

We would also recommend that our churches use every means available to instruct and educate our people concerning the importance of being a part of a World Mission program.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

At the close of 1967 the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,277. This included 91 missionary associates, 3 special project medical personnel, and 102 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 222. Between January and May, 1968, 115 more were added, 73 of them journeymen.

The leading of people to new life in Christ Jesus is the ultimate purpose underlying all our missionary endeavors. Years of foreign mission labor have taught us that the cultivation of New Testament churches is the wisest investment of missionary resources. At the year's end, reports showed a total of 4,918 churches, 6,463 mission points, and 4,119 national pastors. Also reported were 46,275 baptisms, 571,647 church members and 515,631 enrolled in Sunday School.

Foreign Mission Board shared in seven major evangelistic campaigns in which more than 17,000 decisions were reported.

We have 1,295 schools in 42 countries with 181,639 students. We also have 44 theological institutions with 1,766 students. Medical institutions include 20 hospitals and 86 clinics with a total of 1,438 beds. Last year they treated 47,580 inpatients and 597,711 outpatients.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$28,286,597 as 1967 closed which was an increase of \$1,239,397 over 1966.

The 1967 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering had a total of \$14,664,679 by May 1, 1968.

During 1966-67 Kentucky Baptist Churches contributed to Foreign

Missions through the Cooperative Program \$553,735, and through Lottie Moon Offering \$480,178: Total of \$1,033,913.

Still needs continued to be far greater than resources, unfilled requests from the Missions for urgently needed land, buildings and equipment amounted to several million dollars.
