CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article IV) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I – DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and shall make monthly and annual reports to the Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II – COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.

6. Each committee shall be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION WORK

Christian education is a term used to describe the work which our churches do outside their walls, through the denomination, in the colleges, schools and Bible schools. In Kentucky we have a Christian Education Committee of the Executive Board to coordinate the work of our five Baptist colleges and schools. Each school has a Board of Trustees, all Baptist, and all elected by the messengers at the annual Convention.

This Fall all schools will hold an OPEN HOUSE SEMINAR on campus the one scheduled for CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE is Friday, October 3rd. All Baptists are invited to attend these seminars.

Our Baptist school and college work is supported to some extent through the cooperative program but this support is far too short of the growing increased costs. At present, Campbellsville College must raise \$200 per student per school year over and above convention gifts, tuition, board and fees charged in order to break even. During the fiscal year ending July 31st, only THIRTY-NINE (39) churches in our area made any GIFTS to Campbellsville College over and above cooperative gifts. The College must have this "over and above" gift support or be forced to raise tuition charges which may price it out of business. Unless at least ONE HUNDRED (100) churches in the College area are willing to make sacrificial contributions direct to this program of Christian Education, the College will be obliged to seek help from other sources.

Of our SEVENTEEN Taylor County churches only EIGHT made direct gifts to Campbellsville College during August 1, 1968 through July 31, 1969. The other NINE churches are urged to share in this important need. If the 750 churches in the College area with 100 or more resident members would put the college in their budget for 5%, no tuition increase would be necessary.

CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE
Campbellsville, Kentucky

REPORT

Campbellsville College has completed its tenth year as a senior college. It is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and is approved by the Kentucky Department of Education for teacher education.

The curriculum has been expanded to provide for the training of ministers of music and ministers of education for the churches. Art has been increased from a minor to a major area and a minor has been added in Dramatics. New courses have been added in the Bible Department with twelve semester hours in Greek.

The health and physical education building is being completed and will be ready for use for the current year. It is being financed from

funds provided by the Kentucky Baptist Convention. The building is 243½ ft. x 120 ft. and has a standard gymnasium with a seating capacity of about 2,000 and will serve as an auditorium and for recreational activities. It has a Junior Olympic swimming pool, air conditioned classrooms, and offices. Upon recommendation of the Student Government Association, the Board of Trustees named the building "The J. K. Powell Athletic Center" in recognition of Dr. J. K. Powell, retiring president.

Dr. W. R. Davenport of Davidson, Michigan has been elected President of the College. He received the A.B. degree from the University of Louisville and the Masters and Doctorate degrees from the University of Arkansas. He has had several years experience in education at the University of Arkansas, Butler University of Indianapolis, Indiana, and the University of Michigan at Flint, Michigan. Dr. Davenport has been very active as a Southern Baptist churchman. He is an ordained deacon and has served as chairman of the Executive Board of the Indiana Baptist Convention and chairman of the Mission Committee of the Michigan Baptist Convention and is a member of the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. He has served as Zone Trustee of Gideon's International and is currently serving as Vice President.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT
Taylor County Baptist Association
August 28, 1969
Kentucky Baptist Convention

Dr. J. Chester Durham, director of the Baptist Student work in Kentucky, reports that there are more than 24,000 Baptist Students enrolled in Kentucky colleges and universities. Approximately 15,000 of this number are enrolled in the five major state universities.

The K.B.C. provides thirteen full-time Baptist Campus Ministers to serve 17 colleges and universities throughout the state. The BSU program on the campuses took the form of devotional programs, lectures, missionary speakers, discussions, study groups, films, missionary emphasis and service projects, evangelism and youth teams, social and recreational activities.

Campbellsville College

The BSU at Campbellsville College was able to enlist last year, for leadership responsibility, one of every 4 Baptist students residing in the dormitories. These students were responsible for leading 2 students to Christ, planning and carrying out programs of worship, fellowship, mission youth teams and personal visitation in the dormitories.

In the churches of the association, there were approximately 78 students enrolled in Sunday School and 64 in Training Union. Approximately 80 of an average of 150 students in the dorms on the week-end attended church somewhere within the association and/or city.

The BSU sent twenty youth teams to churches throughout the state. These churches reported 18 professions of faith and 122 other decisions.

There were six Campbellsville College BSU'ers who served as summer missionaries this year. One served in Oregon/Washington, one in California, and four in Kentucky. The BSU contributed \$1,000.00 to the BSU Summer Missions Program this year.

The next three Reports were given by three visitors who gave reports about Kentucky Baptists at work. The reports consisted of George Price speaking for the Western Recorder, Grady Randolph speaking for the Cooperative Program, and D. M. Aldridge from Clear Creek Baptist School.

CHILD CARE REPORT

In the year of 1968 Kentucky Baptists ministered to 1,028 needy children through the Child Care Program. This task was accomplished through the combined efforts of the three homes: GLEN DALE, SPRING MEADOWS, and PINE CREST, and services rendered through foster homes, and through professional social services.

Many changes have come about during the last decade in the child care program. Greater attempts are being made to meet the needs through professional social services. For example, 115 young mothers and their babies were assisted in medical care and in finding adoptive parents. Christian compassion goes a long way in rebuilding new lives for those who have been less fortunate than many of us.

Our Child Care Programs have changed and continue to change to meet the needs of our times. OUR OBJECTIVE REMAINS THE SAME:

To give to Children and families that seek help the best attention and care which can be given in the Name and Spirit of Christ.

We urge you to continue this needy work through prayer and by giving through the Cooperative Program and the Special Thanksgiving Offering.

The Kentucky Baptist Foundation is an agency set up to encourage the giving of donations, trusts, bequests and endowments to Baptist institutions and agencies in Kentucky or supported by the Kentucky Baptist Convention. The Foundation is incorporate dunder the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and has a Board of nine directors. Those currently serving are: Joseph K. Beasley, W. D. Edmiston, George M. Trout, C. Wells Burr, Thomas E. Pfau, Wayne Dehoney, Paul B. Massey and Williams A. Lamkin, Jr. It is the purpose of the Foundation to insure that your accumulated possessions will continue to serve the cause of Christ after your death. Christian witness and Christian Stewardship need not end with death.

The faith that Kentucky Baptists have in the Foundation is demonstrated in the growing number who have established trusts, made gifts or prepared wills favorable to the work and ministry of the Kentucky Baptist Foundation. The Foundation Secretary is ready at all times, on request, to advise any person who wishes to extend his Christian stewardship in this manner.

They attempt, through personal appearances, reports, conferences, and the Western Recorder to keep Kentucky Baptists informed about the work and ministry of the Kentucky Baptist Foundation.

As of August 31, 1968, the total funds handled by the Kentucky Baptist Foundation amounted to \$4,683,975 as over against \$4,150,150.00 for 1967. The income distributed amounted to \$142,415.83 or a 5.89% and benefited twenty-two agencies or institutions. The expenses of the Foundation came from the Cooperative Program.

Due to not having an Executive Secretary for the past year and a half, the growth in assets has not increased as rapidly as in the past. Grady L. Randolph became the Executive Secretary in March, 1969 and Mrs. Mary Catherine Campbell became the Office Secretary. They stand in readiness to serve you. Many persons in our own churches should consider placing our Baptist causes in their wills. Let us pray for the work and ministry of the Kentucky Baptist Foundation.

TRAINING UNION REPORT — 1969

As Baptists we have long stated our belief in the Great Commission of our Saviour. We note that there are really two commands in the Great Commission. Certainly evangelism must be first, if we do not win there will be none to teach. But having won them we are to go on teaching and developing that they may not remain as babes on the bottle with baby attitudes and characteristics but that they might grow and develop into mature servants of the Lord.

Leading the decrease in the Sunday night attendance of the church is the failure to utilize the Training Union as the best hour each week to teach and train our people for Christian service. When we throw the Training Union out the window the Sunday evening service will go with it.

Surely every church needs an hour on Sunday night for training new members in the meaning of their profession of faith, their work and labor of love for the Lord, and in the meaning of church membership. Surely every church needs an hour on Sunday night when they can train prospective workers for the various organizations of the church and for the new church year. Surely every church needs an hour on Sunday night when they can get several groups involved in a depth study of some book of the Bible. Surely every church needs an hour on Sunday night when groups can be studying suggested material in the quarterly and social, moral and spiritual problems of our day.

The Training Union Department is making various types of literature available for various approaches to study and training. Material was offered this past year for young people to study and discuss case studies in moral

dilemmas where they would be discussing the use of narcotics, gambling, pornographic and obscene literature and racial prejudice.

No longer does the Training Union need to be a group involved in a quarterly with written parts to be read word by word, but there is a cafeteria-like display of useful and appropriate materials from which to choose. All that the Training Union needs today is dedicated leadership for planning with the guidance of the Holy Spirit in materials and methods for developing those who have been won.

Our Association is showing *little interest* in the "M" night attendance, in youth work by not being involved in the drills and events, and in the use of study course materials. Two of our girls participated in the regional events, they were Cherie Allen Cave and Karen Davis.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society is a missionary non-profit organization, serving churches of many denominations in the U. S. A. and abroad. It helps missionaries translate the Bible. It distributes without profit, usually

below cost, and without charge in cases of special need. For the Blind it supplies Scripture in Braille and other raised letter systems.

"*God's Word for a New Age*" is the theme of the program of world-wide advance being carried on by the American Bible Society in cooperation with 34 other national Bible Societies around the world.

During 1968 the Bible has been published in 1,392 languages, spoken by 97 per cent of the world's people *full Bible in 242, a Testament in 320 more, a Gospel or other complete book in 830 more*. In 1968 Scriptures were published in 67 new languages. There are still over 1,000 languages in which not one book of the Bible has yet been published.

In 1968 there were 2,153,015 volumes of Scripture distributed to our Armed Forces and Veteran's Hospitals. This was an increase of 80.8 per cent over 1967.

Southern Baptists believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society. In 1968 Southern Baptist churches gave \$222,937 to the Society and ranked first among all denominations.

Even after hearing this report, there is still a great need for God's word. *People must have the Bible because it presents JESUS CHRIST, the one hope of men and nations.*

Our churches can help send the gospel to hungry hearts around the world through our gifts to the American Bible Society. Send your gifts to our state office marked, "for the American Bible Society."

TEMPERANCE AND MORALE

The League believes that the alcohol problem is a problem of concern for God's people and therefore the League is a church organization supported by churches and individual Christians throughout Kentucky.

One answer to the alcohol problem is to present the facts about beverage alcohol. The Director of the League presented 55 education programs to 21,000 Kentucky school students.

There was no Legislative Session in Kentucky in 1969 but the League will be active in the 1970 session as there will be many liquor bills favorable to the industry that must be opposed. The League is seeking support for a bill in Washington that would ban the advertising of alcoholic beverage on radio and television.

There was one city-wide local option election held during the fiscal year. Ashland, Kentucky, on December 29, 1968, voted to remain dry by a vote of 6,590 dry to 4,048 wet votes. The Director has met with seven other groups in the state where possible petitions and elections might be held.

Drinking drivers were involved in automobile accidents that killed over 25,000 American citizens last year. Alcohol is related to over 60% of crime and three-fourths of the divorces, and alcoholism is one of Amer-

ica's four leading health problems. The rising use of narcotics and drugs by teenagers is an outgrowth of the use of beverage alcohol by adults. One out of ten adult drinkers is an alcoholic. Abstainers do not become alcoholics. With the knowledge of the problem in mind, the League urges our churches to maintain certain controls by law of the liquor traffic and teach abstinence as the only sure solution to alcoholism.

The firming up of the understanding that BROTHERHOOD is the main channel used by churches to provide missionary education for the men and boys is resulting in a new attitude. There is a fresh vitality toward using every available means to impart missionary education. There are more men and boys actually engaged in mission activities which stem from knowledge of Christian missions. Contrasts, between those churches who have men and boys in mission action and those who do not, point up the need for every church to provide opportunities for the men and boys to acquire missionary education.

The State Brotherhood Department and its' personnel will assist any church and/or association in the work of Baptist Brotherhood — which is to say "MISSIONARY EDUCATION AND MISSION ACTIVITY FOR MEN AND BOYS". The department and its work is financed from Cooperative Program receipts and because of this there is no charge for their services.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The concept of the Cooperative Program seems best expressed in I Corinthians 3:9 "We are workers together with God." It seems to be the best way to carry out the injunction of our Lord to make disciples of all nations. Every individual and church can have part in fulfilling this command by bringing their tithes and offerings into the church, and then the churches sending a worthy part of the gifts to the Treasurer of the Kentucky Baptist Convention. At the present time our Convention keeps 69% for work in our state and sends 31% to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention. This coming year there is to be one tenth per cent increase to South-wide causes. Nearly 50% received by the Executive Committee goes to Foreign Missions.

The Cooperative Program has meaning and significance for our churches, and if we are to reach the state budget goal each year churches must give more to missions through this channel. It means we do not meet, work and worship just for ourselves, but rather we are giving for others in the name of Christ. We go to the five continents, we sail the seven seas, we speak over the Radio-TV air waves, we print Bibles and God's truth—we go through our missionaries. FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Dr. Baker James Cauthen, Secretary of the Foreign Missions Board, recently said, "Aware of great opportunities to be served throughout the world and of ever-increasing crises which complicate the world situation, we press forward with assurance that the gospel of Christ is the power of God unto salvation."

With about 2,300 missionaries under appointment in approximately 70 countries Southern Baptists report a foreign membership of about 600,000 with from 46,000 to 50,000 baptisms each year over the past several years.

In addition to our 5,000 churches and more than 6,000 other mission points, the Foreign Mission Board operates more than 1,300 schools, a number of hospitals and clinics, orphanages, and goodwill centers.

Needless to say all this calls for a great deal of money. The 1969 Foreign Mission Budget calls for \$32,000,000. The principal source of funds for Foreign Missions is the Co-operative Program. Though many churches in Kentucky fail to contribute through this Program, other churches have increased their gifts—some giving more than 40% of their total budget to Missions.

Generous support to Foreign Missions is also received through the annual Lottie Moon Offering, a project no longer supported solely by the W.M.U. but by the entire membership.

Kentucky Baptists through the above mentioned sources give well above \$1,000,000 to the support of Foreign Missions.

This, on the surface, seems to be a generous contribution. However, in order for us to fulfill the Great Commission, Southern Baptists of Kentucky, yes Taylor County Baptists, must do a greater thing than share our financial gains. "The gift without the giver is bare." We must realize anew that leading people to new life in Christ is the ultimate purpose underlying all our missionary endeavors. Let us hope that many more will

feel led to say, "Send me," and may the rest of us respond willingly with our prayers and financial support.

There was a congregational hymn led by Arnold Moon. The missionary sermon was brought by Roy Fowler on furlough from Brazil.

Dr. Druien made a motion to refer visual aids to the Executive Board. Dr. Badgett also made a correction in the Budget due to including \$100.00 for the Treasurer.

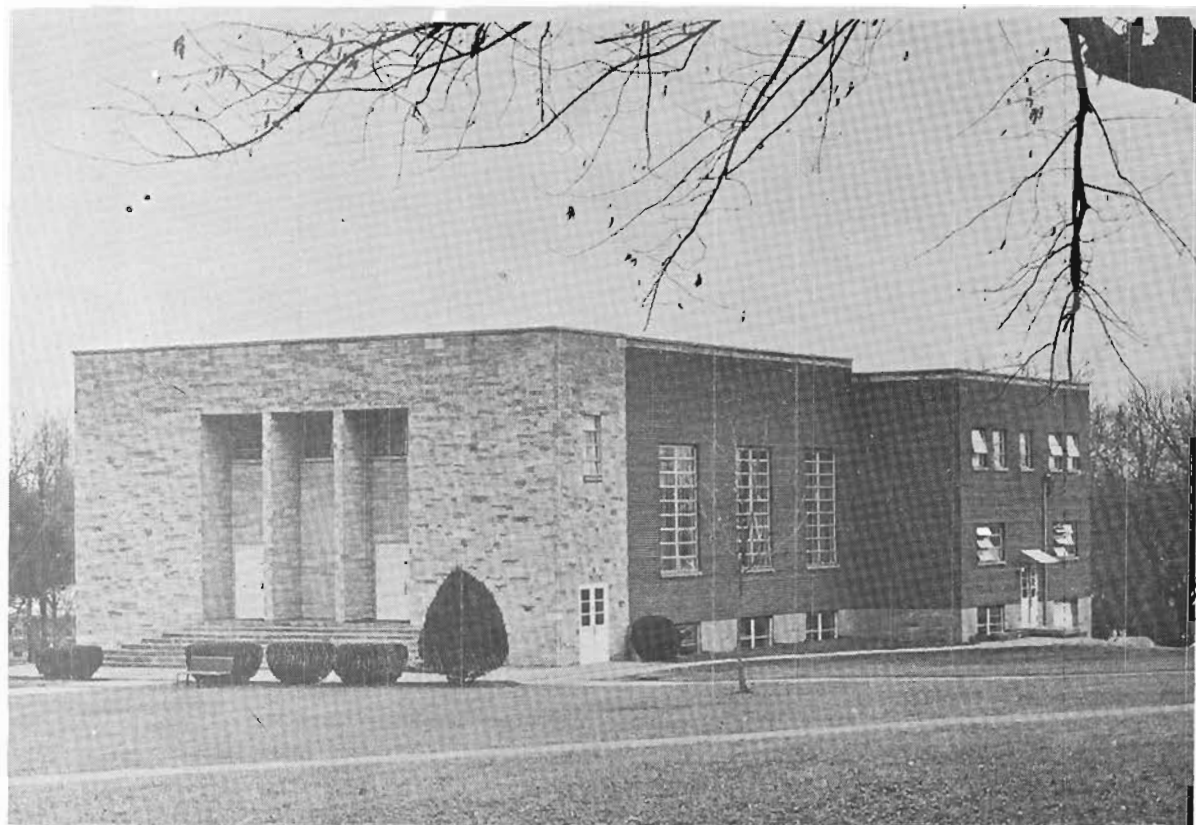
