CONSTITUTION

Article

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superseded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee name, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article IV) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I – DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An Auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II - COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

5. The term of no committee shall exceed one year unless by special vote of the Association.

6. Each committee shall be automatically discharged when its final report is accepted by the body.

PROCEEDINGS THIRTEENTH SESSION TAYLOR COUNTY
ASSOCIATION OF KENTUCKY BAPTIST 1970 MEETING
WITH ELKHORN BAPTIST CHURCH, DAY
MT. GILBOA BAPTIST CHURCH, NIGHT

MORNING SESSION

The Taylor County Baptist met for their annual meeting August 20th, 1970 in the Elkhorn Baptist Church at 9:30 A.M.

J. B. Crawley called the meeting to order and Herman Rowlette, Jr. lead the congregation in two hymns. George Gaddie, pastor of the Salem Baptist Church, read the scripture and lead in prayer.

The program was adopted and the roll call of churches was read. A welcome to the new pastors in our association got the meeting on the way.

The Budget for the new year was read and L. D. Kennedy made a motion to adopt the budget. The motion was seconded by Isadore Childers, and was passed.

The Moderator appointed the following committees:

1. Time, Place and Preacher: Dr. Badgett, Jerry Davis, and Milton Jones.
 2. Committee on Committees: Hollis Bugg, Omer Kirtley, and L. D. Kennedy.
- Herman Rowlette, Jr. then lead the congregation in two more hymns.

After the treasurer's report the new officers were elected; these can be found on Page 3 of the annual minutes.

The reports (which can be found in the annual minutes) were given, then Joe Asher and Randy Davenport spoke about Campbellsville College.

After the reports L. D. Kennedy preached the morning message, which was dismissed in prayer by Hardin Hosey.

AFTERNOON SESSION

After the congregational and special music, we were blessed by the presence of David C. Jackson, President of Oneida Baptist Institute.

After the rest of the reports were made, Marshall Black made a motion for Herman Rowlette, Jr. to appoint a committee to start a music program in the association. The motion was seconded by J. V. Mullen and passed.

Harden Hosey, the Assistant Youth Director, asked each church to appoint a Youth Chairman from their church.

There was a discussion concerning the role of the mission pastors in the Executive Board meetings. It was accepted that Article 7 explains that the missions and their pastors can take part in the Executive Board meetings.

Dr. Badgett reported that the government would not lease any land around the lake to any private group. If we get any land it will have to be bought.

Brantley Parsley asked that there be a change in the program of the annual meeting in future years.

Dr. Badgett moved that J. B. Crawley appoint a committee to bring back a recommendation. The motion was seconded by Harden Hosey and passed.

There was a motion by Gene Hall to adjourn. The service was dismissed in prayer by Coy Kidd.

THURSDAY EVENING

The evening session was opened with Herman Rowlette, Jr. leading the congregation in a song.

Tommie Williams read scripture and lead in prayer.

All the reports were given and approved.

Dr. Randy Davenport, President of Campbellsville College, introduced the speaker, Mr. David Jester who is now employed at Campbellsville College. Dr. Jester had just returned from missionary work in Nigeria. Dr. Jester blessed our hearts by the message he brought.

The meeting was dismissed in prayer by Dr. Jester.

This budget is presented with the hope that it will serve as a challenge to the churches of Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists. It does not offer a particular challenge for the coming year 1970-71, but the hope is that it will set a standard of challenge for the coming years. The budget as presented is both needed and realistic. For example, \$1,500.00 is on deposit in the local Building and Loan for the coming School of Missions and another \$2,000.00 can be expected as a balance on hand at the close of this Associational Year. This means that only \$3,455.00 will be needed from the churches during the year 1970-71 in order to meet the proposed budget.

The Budget Committee takes this opportunity to strongly urge each church to consider percentage giving as the fairest way to equally support the Association work. If each church would consider percentage giving, in the amount of 3% as a minimum, there would be no limit to the new horizons of challenge which the churches of this Association could rise up to meet.

Gentlemen, we are living in a day where withdrawal is no longer an acceptable method of function. If we are to present the cause of Christ, if we are to lift his banner, if we are to take up our cross and follow him, we must be willing to start where we are, right here, on the local level at home.

The Budget Committee proudly offers this challenge in the name of Jesus Christ to God's people of Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists. Jesus said, "Lift up your eyes to the fields that are white already to harvest." May God help each one as we search our soul concerning these matters.

CLERK'S REPORT

Taylor County Baptists were active in missions this past year. Two hundred dollars was sent to Ohio in relationship to the work of J. L. McNeal. One hundred dollars was sent to Rev. Stacy Shields in Indiana. Jerry Kibbons was secured as part time director of our Associational work.

These words of God seem very appropriate as we begin a new year at Campbellsville College. There is a ready supply of problems and difficulties, but God's grace abounds the more, and we praise Him for a constant supply of blessings.

Campbellsville College counts it a privilege to be invited to report annually to The Taylor County Association. From the founding of our institution to the present there has been a closeness to the churches of the local association which is very gratifying.

God has provided wonderful new additions to our staff for 1970-71 in several positions. These include: Dr. David Jester, Academic Vice President; Dr. Roy Ray, Student Life Vice President; Mrs. David Jester, Dean of Women; Dr. Reginald Shiflett, Chemistry; Mr. J. Foster Eldredge, French and German; Mr. Eladio Bolanos, Spanish; Mr. Howard Williams, Speech and Drama; and Mr. William Bennett in Political Science.

At the college, we continue in the commitment of our founding: to provide quality education, training, and strengthening in the Christian faith to the young people from our churches who wish to pursue this education within the framework of a Christian environment. It is our purpose to be unapologetically Christian in concept and operation.

During the 1969-70 year the college experienced a further decline in enrollment which contributed to a financial deficit in operation. We are trusting that God will provide a stabilized enrollment for the 1970-71 year. (At printing time for the MINUTES, enrollment was up for the fall of 1970 with 914 students.) We continue to look to friends of the college to support this Baptist ministry in these ways:

- a. Referring and encouraging students to attend.
 - b. Supporting financially by placing the college in your church budget.
 - c. Personal investment in this aspect of God's work by gifts to the operating fund.
 - d. Including the college in wills, bequests, trusts, insurance, and other forms of estate planning.
 - e. Praying faithfully for the college and those of us who serve there.
- It is expected that during 1970-71 we will announce and launch a long-range development program designed to meet some of the financial problems and to move ahead with development of the college program. There will continue to be problems, but I am confident that we will have a wonderful year in the Lord.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

Campbellsville College

The BSU at Campbellsville College had an enrollment of 195 this year. These students were responsible for leading 12 students to Christ, the planning and carrying out of various programs of worship, fellowships, evangelism, youth teams, and most of all the work with the juvenile delinquents in this area; a program which we hope to strengthen and to get more involved in.

In the churches of the association there were approximately 103 students enrolled in Sunday School and 47 enrolled in Training Union. Approximately 85 of an average of 175 students in the dorms on the week-ends attended church somewhere within the association and/or city.

The BSU sent out 32 youth teams to churches through-out the state and several in Ohio and Indiana. These churches reported 32 professions of faith and 166 other decisions.

There were three Campbellsville College BSU'ers who served as summer missionaries this year. One served in Detroit, Michigan, one in the Northern Plains, and one in California. The BSU, reaching their goal, contributed \$1,000.00 to the BSU Summer Mission Program this year.

We had a very challenging and successful year.

CHILD CARE REPORT

The Kentucky Baptist Board of Child Care has a new Child Care Center. It is located on the campus of Spring Meadows. This is more than an office building housing the executive staff of the Child Care Program; it is a facility where services are given to families in need of help.

Institutional care continues to be the principal service we provide for children. We have three excellent children's homes. These gave care to 512 children last year. Of this number, 27 made professions of faith and were baptised. This spring 16 home children graduated from high school and 2 from college.

For other services the Child Care Center is the focal point of activity rather than the Children's homes. Last year through the Center help was extended directly to 132 children and young people. In summary it may be said that Kentucky Baptists were involved through their Child Care Program in giving some help last year to 1,086 dependent children.

REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITALS, INC.

The three Baptist Hospitals in Kentucky are managed by the Board of Directors of Baptist Hospitals, Inc., H. L. Dobbs, President. While most of the income is from patients, the Convention allocated \$80,000 this year from the Cooperative Program and promoted the Mother's Day Charity Offering through the three hospitals, had depts, discounts and charity amounted to more than \$900,000.00.

Our three Baptist hospitals were very busy last year. From Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington we have the following statistics: adult admissions—11,476; new born—1,552; outpatients—14,116; operations—6,130. Central also has several educational programs such as training nurses, X-ray thechnology and hospital administration.

Kentucky Baptist Hospital in Louisville rendered 140,598 patient days of care last year. This hospital also provides for X-ray technology and nurses' training.

Western Baptist Hospital in Paducah has operated this past year with an average occupancy of 97.2% of its 214 beds. 11,054 surgical operations. The hospital has a program for nurses' training. It also has plans for a 6.7 million dollar project that will provide for more than 100 more beds.

This brief information and statistics point out the usefulness of our Baptists hospitals and the need for additional beds and supporting services.

REPORT ON DISTRICT MISSIONS

For a number of years Taylor County Association of Baptist have been very faithful in extending the reach of the Gospel through the work of the Association. Through the years the mission committee has been made up of dedicated and mission minded men with a vision for the Lord's work.

During the year 1969-1970 we assisted in the following areas:

DIRECT MISSION REPORT

When we think of State Missions we usually associate the thought with the Direct Missions Department. We think about Associational, District, County, Local and special Ministries of missionaries. Often times we think about Student Mission Workers, Student Pastors, Baptist Center workers, or Directors of In-Service Guidance.

From every \$100.00 sent thru the Cooperative Program from our Churches, \$7.72 is used by the Direct Missions Department. With this money we help support the ministry of 34 Associational Mission Programs, 14 District Mission Programs in 27 Associations, 9 county Mission programs, 26 local Mission Programs, 5 Communities Mission Programs, a Ministry to the Deaf, work in 8 Baptist Centers 3 In-Service Guidance programs, and approximately 40 special Student Missionaries.

Last year our Missionaries in 7,000 Conferences, 231 Revivals, 1,333 Training Schools, 1,600 Radio and Television programs, 21 World Missions Conferences, 17 Church surveys and 189 Vacation Bible Schools.

13,000 sermons were preached by Missionaries, distributed 289,000 peices of literature, helped start 44 units of new work, organized 7 new missions and helped constitute 4 new churches. They counselled with 5,000 people and led 854 people to public confessions of faith in Christ and Baptism. More than 3,000 made other decisions for Christ.

By our gifts and by our prayers we had a share in all this work done in this phase of our Missions Program.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

1969 has been a good year for the Home Mission Board. Significant advances are noted as follows:

BAPTISMS—Southern Baptist Churches reported 368,225 baptisms for 1969.

Out of this number 69,359 were reported through the Home Mission Board.

NEW MISSIONARIES—The Home Mission Board appointed 585 new missionaries bringing the total to 2,235. Need for Missionaries for 1970: Language, 96; Social Ministries, 45; Others, 50; Pastors for CPA, 125; Total, 316.

BAPTIST CENTERS—Through materials and counseling, two hundred churches have been helped to begin Church Community weekday programs.

MIGRANT MISSIONS—The spiritual and other needs of migrants were ministered to by fourteen state conventions, twenty-six associations and ninety churches.

PRINTED MATERIALS—Over 160 pieces of printed materials were produced to give information to aid missions and evangelism leaders.

WORLD MISSIONS CONFERENCES—102 conferences were conducted with 116 associations participating.

In 1970-71, Kentucky's goal will be \$4,100,000 through the Cooperative Program, with \$1,279,000 for Southern Baptist causes, or 31.2%.

Let us seek to do our part as individual Baptists and in the budgets of our churches in the amount set apart for the Cooperative Program.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Jesus said that the field is the world, and the Biblical injunction for world missions is expressed in Matthew 28: 19-20, and Foreign missions is part of this worldwide program. The Cooperative Program is the life line for this missionary endeavor of Southern Baptists, plus the Lottie Moon Christmas offering. Dr. Baker J. Cauthen, executive secretary of the Foreign Mission Board said, "We cannot, in any accurate way, put down the measurement of the love, dedication, courage, sacrifice, patience, and stability manifested by God's servants carrying on its ministry of love."

Our missionaries are now working in seventy one countries with a missionary staff of 2,490. Appointments during the year number 261, (139 career, 49 associates, 62 journeymen, 10 special project people, and 10 career reappointments.

The missionary endeavors include winning people to Christ, and cultivating New Testament churches. There are now over 5,000 churches that reported almost 60 thousand baptisms this past year, and a membership of 631,259.

There are 758 schools in 43 counties with a pupil enrollment of 93,000, staffed with 3,150 national and 460 missionary teachers and administrators. Of this number 60 are theological institutions with 2,562 students and five women training schools with 597 enrolled.

Medical missions includes 21 hospitals and 92 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,538 beds. They treated 64,408 inpatients and cared for 815,512 outpatients.

In the meantime forty-six good will and community centers reached people in varied ways: literacy classes, homemaking courses, Bible study clubs, and evangelistic services.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$31,005,797 as 1969 closed. The Lottie Moon Christmas offering was more than 15½ million dollars. Thus the spiritual needs of the world challenge every Southern Baptist to be more personally involved in bringing the multitudes, who sit in darkness, to Christ. Thus by the dedication of lives in the local community and bringing of our tithes and offerings into the storehouse, we will be able to see the kingdoms of this world becoming the Kingdom of our Jesus Christ.

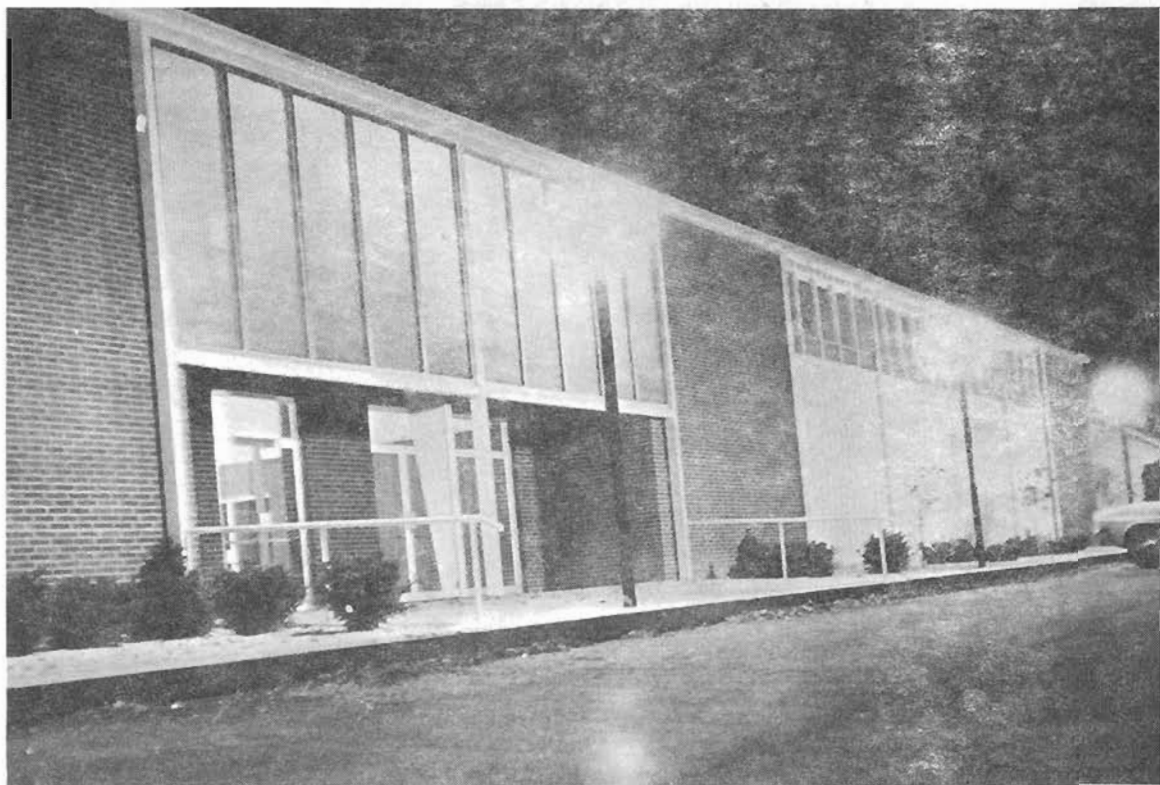
