CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be

members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall have charge of the work between the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee name, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

#### BY-LAWS

##### ARTICLE I – DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

##### ARTICLE II – COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings, and shall report as far in advance as possible.



3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W. M. U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

#### PROCEEDINGS AT THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION

##### Morning Session

The Taylor County Association met for its annual session on Thursday, September 9, 1971. The morning and afternoon sessions were held at the Good Hope Baptist Church.

Landon Hadley, moderator, called the meeting to order at 9:30 A.M. The following persons were recognized: Richard Clemmens, visiting missionary; Harley Archer, Jim Hatfield, and L. D. Kennedy, new pastors in the association.

Marshall Black, host pastor, brought a word of welcome to all messengers and visitors. Dr. J. Chester Badgett made a motion that all messengers who had already registered plus those who would later register make up the body with power to transact business.

Joe Asher led in the singing of a hymn. This was followed by digest of letters from the clerk.

The next item was the election of officers. This was followed by the following reports: Finance Report, Budget Committee Report, Auditor's Report, Clerk's Report, and Program Director's Report.

Since the meeting was proceeding ahead of schedule the moderator called for the Report on Public Morals and the Training Union Report.

Dr. Badgett announced that on the First Sunday in November the Campbellville church would observe its one hundred and eightieth anniversary.

There was special music by Ralph Phillips and Jewel Gene Hall brought the Introductory Sermon.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

L. D. Kennedy led in the singing of a hymn and Hardin Hosey read scripture and led in prayer.

The Cooperative Program Report was given by Paul Prather and Robert Jones, state missionary working with mountain people, spoke to the report.

The Sunday School Report was given by William R. Beard and Frank Smith from the State Sunday School department spoke.

L. D. Kennedy led in the singing of another hymn and J. D. Herndon spoke on child care in Kentucky. Jerry Kibbons read the Hospital Report and Walter C. Jackson spoke to the report.

The Bible Society Report, the Stewardship Report, and the Evangelism Report were given. Dr. Badgett spoke to the Evangelism Report.

At the time for miscellaneous business the following business was transacted:

First, William R. Beard read the report of the committee concerning changes for the annual meeting. Brother Beard made a motion that the 1972 sessions begin with a Monday night session followed on Tuesday with an afternoon session with a fellowship dinner following the afternoon session and conclude with a night session. Dr. Badgett amended the motion to the effect that the sessions consist of a Monday night session and a session on Tuesday to start a four o'clock p.m. followed by a fellowship dinner and conclude with a night session. Both the amendment and the original motion carried.

Jerry Kibbons moved that the Stewardship Committee be separated from the Missions Committee and be combined with the Budget Committee, and that the

committee be instructed to take into consideration the major thrust for the year considering the main emphasis for each year at least four years in advance. The motion carried.

Isadore Childers moved that Jerry Kibbons be retained as Missions Director on the same basis as he has served for the past year. The motion carried.

#### EVENING SESSION

After the singing of a hymn Roy Hewlett, pastor of the host church read scripture and led in prayer.

The following reports were given: Time, Place, and Preacher Committee; the Committee on Committees; the Nominating Committee; the Report in Memoriam; the Western Recorder report; the Brotherhood report; and the W. M. U. report.

Douglas Crawley provided the special music and the Missionary Sermon was delivered by Richard Clemmens, missionary to Ecuador.

William R. Beard suggested that the congregation stand in recognition of the fine work of Brother Hadley, retiring moderator. The new officers were installed and Lonnie Turner, the new moderator, closed the session in prayer.

#### HISTORICAL EVENTS

MT. GILBOA BAPTIST CHURCH celebrated its 60th Anniversary with a homecoming on July 25, 1971.

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

Kentucky Baptists have three senior colleges which are fully accredited, Campbellsville, Cumberland, and Georgetown. Clear Creek provides training for ministers who are not qualified to do college work, and Oneida Baptist Institute is a boarding high school training about 200 boys and girls annually in a Christian atmosphere. All of these schools are seeking to provide quality education in a Christian environment and are rightfully considered a part of the missionary outreach of Kentucky Baptists. From these schools should come trained and dynamic leadership for our churches.

While none of these schools have adequate support, it should be noted that the largest single item in the budget of Kentucky Baptists is for Christian Education. The difficulty is not at the state level, but at the individual and church level. If Baptists would honor God with their full tithe and offerings through their churches and if the churches would place an unselfish part of their income through the cooperative program, not only would Christian education receive adequate support, but all phases of the Lord's work would prosper.

During the 1970-71 year, Campbellville College has studied, redefined, and restated her purposes for being. These basic purposes have not been changed. Rather, they have been strengthened and undergirded. Above all else, it is our purpose to give our Lord the place of preeminence in a Christ-centered college operation. I believe that inclusion of our Statement of Purpose will be helpful to all friends of Campbellville College.

#### Christ Centered

“Campbellville College seeks to be a Christ-centered co-educational senior college of the liberal arts and sciences that combines a sense of high moral and spiritual values with a sense of academic excellence.

“We want to communicate to students not only the important facts and principles of life but also a Christian sense of purpose and meaning. We hope to challenge students to study for the glory of God, to master the learning process, to increase knowledge and intellectual competence through general education, and to develop skills in special fields.

#### CHILD CARE REPORT

Our Child Care Centers served 669 children last year. Over 400 of these were in the care of three children's homes. These homes reported 25 conversions and baptisms. There were 60 infants placed for adoption.

Services offered include the placement of children for institutional or foster home care, family counseling and financial assistance, help for unwed mothers, and infant adoptive placement. The new Child Care Center is located on the front campus of Spring Meadows, Middletown.

The Thanksgiving Offering and the Cooperative Program provide the bulk of the income for the financial support of this program. More than \$360,000.00 was given in 1970.

Every pastor and member of church staff should be covered by his church. The Annuity Board continues to up-grade the benefits over and above the benefits set forth in their certificates. Increased benefits are made possible by earnings in excess of anticipated interests rates by the Acturial Bureau. These benefits come to members in Good Experience Credit in the form of increased benefits.

Retired persons also get Good Experience Credit. Persons receiving benefits equal to one month's salary and in some instances even more. This has been coming in the form of an extra, thirteenth, check at the close of the year. This amounted to more than \$500,000.00 this last year over our Convention.

In the 54 year history of the Annuity Board an excess of \$85 million has been paid in benefits. Nine million was paid in 1970.

We urge all pastors in our Association to enter the plan as quickly as possible. We urge churches to insist that their pastors enter and do all they can to help in the plan. Those who do not enter will later regret it.

In Taylor County Association, during the first nine months of this year, fifteen churches requested 1114 awards in all categories. We did not have an "M" night service. There were not any children and youth participating in associational drills and events.

During our Church Readiness Clinic, which was held at the Campbellsville Baptist Church, there were nineteen people present, representing eight churches. We studied the new Training Union Manuals for all age groups, with conferences for each group of workers.

This year we plan to have an "M" night service and a "Drills and Events" for our youth.

A very fine Vacation Bible School Clinic was held at the South Campbellsville Baptist Church in March. Departmental leaders did a very fine job in planning for and conducting the clinic. The clinic was well attended and interest in Vacation Bible School work was very high.

The Sunday School organization provided a Clinic for the January Bible Study Book with Rev. L. D. Kennedy as teacher.

A great deal of our time has been used this year in preparation for our Sunday School Revival during the month of November. Taylor County Association is one of some three or four associations in the state of Kentucky participating in Director-led Enlargement campaigns this year. At this date we have almost one hundred per cent cooperation on the part of the churches and missions in the Sunday School Revival.

Your Associational Sunday School Superintendent attended the Sunday School Leadership week at Ridgcrest as well as the Associational Superintendents Workshop at Cedarmore.

We would like to recommend that our association plan an Associational Bible Conference for the fall of 1972. The Bible Conference would be held in a central location with conferences Monday through Thursday or Friday night. We would hope to be able to secure one of the leading Bible teachers of our convention to lead us in our Bible study.

We also recommend that we support the People-to-People means that we major on reaching out to other people with our Christian witness.

### STEWARDSHIP REPORT

According to Dr. Harold Sanders, Executive Secretary for the State Convention of Kentucky Baptists, for the year ending August 31, 1971, Baptist churches in Kentucky broke all records in gifts to missions through the Cooperative Program. The total amount received for the year was \$4,059,402.60. I am sure we all rejoice because of this good report. However, we need to realize that this is far below what it would be if more of our people were good stewards of their material possessions.

From figures given in the church letters there are 4,677 resident church members belonging to churches in the Taylor County Association. The total combined gifts of all these members was \$460,257.00 last year. The total number of tithers reported was 688. If all the resident members had tithed the total amount would have been approximately one and one half million dollars.

A report from Sales Management Survey of Buying sets the average family income of a Taylor County family at \$8,494.00. The average Baptist family gave less than \$300.00 to the Lord's work through their church.

I believe that there is a desperate need for more stewardship emphasis in our churches. If more of our people were good stewards of their material possessions, not only would our churches receive much more money but many lives would be greatly enriched. I have never found many dedicated Christians who are not tithers. When a man learns that "it is more blessed to give than to receive" he will not only do more financially but will also make greater contributions in other ways.

### HOSPITAL REPORT

There are three Baptist hospitals operating in Kentucky under the management of Baptist Hospitals, Inc. These hospitals are located at Lexington, Louisville, and Paducah, Kentucky, and have a total bed capacity of 859 beds.

These hospitals provide the same services that any general hospital provides in the state of Kentucky. Statistics from the three hospitals are impressive, but not outstandingly different from any other hospital of similar size and location in the state. Certainly the healing ministry is a vital ministry, but there is a question whether or not Baptist money brought into the "storehouse" should be allocated to this type of ministry.

In Taylor County Association the information is available through the church letters that would tell what funds have been provided by our churches for the Sunday School Charity Fund. This continues to be an important part of our church program, but has rapidly diminished in importance as programs of Federal and State Aid have become available.

### W. M. U. REPORT

The first year of the new organization of W. M. U. (Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Acteens, Girls in Action, and Mission Friends) has been most gratifying. The simplified, flexible, plan or work has proven adaptable to all sizes of churches and the content of study materials conducive to informed praying, compassionate mission action, and more generous giving. Our operational funds are provided by the Cooperative Program. Other projects are supported by the State Mission offering; Miss Kathryn Jasper is the executive secretary.

Mission action has been strong emphasis for the year and the weeks of prayer offerings continue to grow. Of special note is the state mission offering which reached its goal for the first time since 1962—the goal was exceeded by \$4,500. Total offering was \$124,558.81. The additional amount was given to help the mountain mission work.

Taylor County W. M. U. began their new year with a Leadership Clinic in October. Highlight of the January meeting, a supper meeting, was our speaker, Mrs. David Jester. Our April meeting featured a magazine workshop taught by our regional leaders. Our July meeting was a combined family fellowship with the Brotherhood.

Of the 17 churches and 3 missions, 13 churches have W. M. U. organizations. There are 11 Baptist Women organizations; 7 Baptist Young Women; 11 Acteens; 12 Girls in Action; and 9 Mission Friends.

Total Week of Prayer offerings for Taylor County Association-Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, \$9,533.34; Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, \$1,296.22; and State Missions Offering, \$1,609.46.

Let us do our part in winning the lost for Christ, and in engaging our men and boys in an outreach ministry in the total life for all of Taylor County, and on out in the world.

May we, with God's help and leadership, make this year a better year in our Associational Brotherhood work.

4. We should seriously consider beginning a downtown listening center and the possibility of a weekday Bible study program.

5. There needs to be a stewardship emphasis in our churches and in the Association in order that God's cause may be supported adequately.

#### DIRECT MISSIONS REPORT

Direct Missions is a vital part of the world mission program of Baptists. This phase of missions is closest to the churches and the associations. Almost every association is touched by some part of the ministry of Direct Missions. In many instances the district, associational, county, and local missionary is supported in part and in some places almost completely through gifts of the Kentucky Baptist Convention.

The annual pastors' and laymen's conference that is held at Campbellville College is financed through this channel and the college. This department helps awaken the churches' responsibility within the association to the service that they can render in extending the Kingdom of God.

Approximately 150 workers are involved in direct missions in Kentucky under the direction of A. B. Colvin, secretary, and his associate, Robert C. Jones, who is also the Director of the Mountain Mission Program. These missionaries' service resulted in 750 people making a professional of faith and joining Baptist churches last year. These dedicated servants are engaged in preaching, teaching, counseling sessions and special ministries within communities of their fields of service.

Brother Colvin and his fellow workers are ever willing to assist this association in our mission program.

### COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The Cooperative Program is a voluntary plan of world missions which Southern Baptists created to meet human needs. It is democratic in design, flexible in nature, and economical to operate. It is a channel for financing the work of both the Southern and Kentucky Baptist Conventions. It is an excellent means for regular and continuing financial support of all Baptist Cooperative work.

In the Taylor County Association all of the churches contributed to the Cooperative Program during this associational year. Our churches increased their total gifts to the Program by \$5938. During the 1969 associational year, the Taylor County Churches gave 11.8% of their total receipts. This year this was increased to 12.4%.

Pleasant Hill contributed the largest percentage of total receipts, 24%. Other churches contributing 10% or more of their total receipts were: Acton Mission, 10%; Campbellsville, 16%; Friendship, 12%; Good Hope, 13%; Green River Memorial, 10%; Mt. Gilboa, 15%; Palestine, 12%; Robinson Creek, 11%; and Salem, 10%.

As a practical expression of our belief in the practice of missions and in the support of the Cooperative Program, let us determine that each church shall try to do more in the coming year than it ever has before. Let us increase our giving to worldwide causes with the goal of the immediate future being that each of our churches strive to give a minimum of 10% of its total receipts through the Cooperative Program. Each church already giving more than 10% should strive to increase their contributions by at least 2% during the coming year. Let each church "lay by in store as God hath prospered."

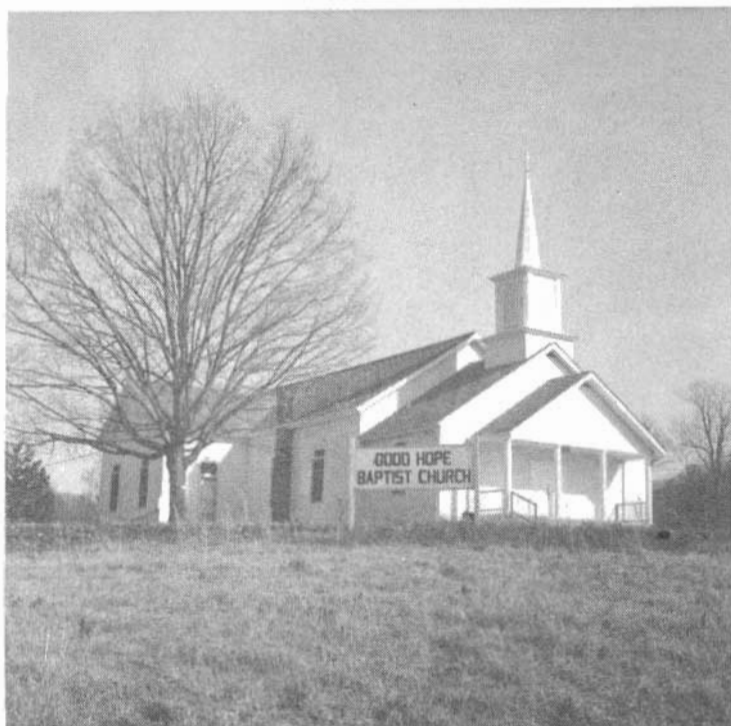
