Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

Proceedings

OF THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION

Monday Night Session

Called to order by moderator, Landon Hadley at 7:00 p.m. Rolando Raganas led the congregation in singing BLESSED ASSURANCE. Charles Harris led in a devotional. Charles Harris made a motion that all messengers registered at that time plus those who would later register make up the body authorized to transact business for the Association. S. C. Blackburn made a motion that the printed program be adopted as the order of business plus any necessary changes. Raymond Bell read the Treasurer's Report. A motion by Isadore Childers that the report be approved carried. Joe Asher reported that the treasurer's books had been audited and found to be in order. L. D. Kennedy read the Budget Committee report and moved that it be adopted. A motion by Joe Asher that the report be amended to include \$200.00 for the Treasurer's fee and a motion by Chester Badgett that the

last paragraph of the report be deleted and use of excess funds be left to the discretion of the Executive Board carried. The report with these amendments was approved.

The following committees were appointed by the moderator. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES—Isadore Childers, Ken Forman, and Hardin Hosey. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—Charles Harris, J. B. Crawley, and L. D. Kennedy.

In the absence of Dr. Drewry Meece, Jerry Kibbons read the report on Christian Education. Dr. W. R. Davenport gave a report on Campbellsville College. W. R. Beard made a motion that the Association take a standing vote to approve the report of Campbellsville College. The report was approved by unanimous vote. Dr. J. Chester Badgett made a motion that the moderator appoint a Christian Education Committee, that this be a standing committee composed of three members, one member to serve one year, one member to serve two years and one to serve three years. Thereafter each member will serve for a three-year term one rotating off each year. The committee to be responsible for promoting participation by all our churches and missions in the scholarship program of our State Convention, Baptist Colleges, and Churches. The committee will be responsible for seeking ways to improve the relationship between the churches in the Taylor County Association and Campbellsville College. The committee is to work diligently to seek to involve churches and individual Baptists in Taylor County in the support of Campbellsville College with their prayers, their students and their finances.

The Annual Sermon was preached by Hardin Hosey from the Elkhorn Baptist Church.

Tuesday Afternoon Session

James S. Campbell led the congregation in singing ON JORDAN'S STORMY BANKS, Paul Prather read scripture and led in prayer. Bob Elliot, from the Spring Meadows Childrens Home was recognized by the moderator.

The following reports were given: Sunday School by W. R. Beard, Training Union by Darrell Hunt, W.M.U. by Mrs. Ken Forman, Evangelism by Paul Prather, Temperance and Morals by Charles Harris, Missions Committee report by George Gaddie, Kentucky Baptist Benevolent Institutions report by J. V. Mullen. William Rogers brought a message on Church Organization in Faith and Conquest. Darrell Hunt read the report of the Nominating Committee. This was followed by the election of officers. The following persons were elected to serve as officers of the Taylor County Association for the 1972-73 associational year. Darrell Hunt, Moderator; Isadore Childers, 1st Assistant Moderator; Jerry Kibbons, 2nd Assistant Moderator; George Gaddie, Clerk; Ken Forman, Assistant Clerk; Jerry Cox, Treasurer; and Charles Porter, Assistant Treasurer.

Hardin Hosey made a motion that the Committee on Committees be abolished. Dr. Badgett made a substitute motion that the committee be retained and be responsible for nominating all standing committees.

L. D. Kennedy made a motion that By-Law article IV No. 4 be amended to read "The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will nominate all members of all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion."

Ken Forman made a motion that the Missions Committee be instructed to seek for a replacement for the Program Director and be ready to give a report at the next Executive Board meeting.

Paul Prather made a motion that the 1973 annual sessions follow a time schedule similar to the one followed in 1972. The session was adjourned with prayer.

Tuesday Night Session

Harold Smith read the scripture and led in prayer. The report In Memorial was read by James Hunt. Woodrow Wilson gave a report of his work at the Lake. Dr. Badgett read a report prepared by Homer Kirtley on Christian Giving. Grady Randolph brought a message on the Cooperative Program and Stewardship. W. R. Beard read the report of the Time, Place and Preacher Committee. The time is to be September 10 at the Robinson Creek Church and September 11 at the Pleasant Hill Church. Charles Harris is to bring the Annual Sermon.

The moderator named the following persons to serve on the Christian Education Committee. Geroge Gaddie is to serve a three-year term and to serve as chairman. J. B. Crawley is to serve a two-year term and Chester Badgett is to serve a one-year term. Dr. Badgett gave a report on State, Home and Foreign Missions and then introduced J. F. McKinley, missionary to Bangla Desh. After special music by Rolando Raganas, Brother McKinley told about the experiences of his family during the civil war in Pakistan. Following this Darrell Hunt was installed as the new moderator and the session was adjourned.

HISTORICAL EVENTS

ELKHORN BAPTIST CHURCH ordained Donald A. Dudgeon as a deacon.
FRIENDSHIP BAPTIST CHURCH purchased new carpeting for the living room of the parsonage, new chairs for the choir loft, new chairs and tables for Sunday School rooms and painted the sanctuary.

GOOD HOPE BAPTIST CHURCH celebrated the 175th anniversary of the church. GREEN RIVER MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH began a ministry at the KOA camp ground.

LOWELL AVENUE BAPTIST CHURCH completed a new sanctuary and had a dedication service on April 9.

ROBINSON CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH resurfaced the parking lot and installed new wall-to-wall carpeting in the sanctuary, installed stained glass windows, put aluminum siding on the outside of the building, erected a new church steeple, and added a two-car carport to the parsonage.

CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE REPORT

“And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up.” John 3:14

We are pleased to have the privilege of reporting to the Taylor County Association in its annual meetings.

At Campbellsville College it is our desire to so lift up our Lord in and through the academic institution so that all people may know Him and be drawn to Him. Even though we never intend to lessen our proper emphasis upon scholarly pursuit and educational endeavor, we believe that the first reason for which a Christian college should exist is to honor God and to “lift up” Jesus.

I am pleased to report a significant increase in the number of our students who are preparing for Christian service. In the past three-year period we have seen the number of ministerial students increase from 48 to 70; and the total number committed to Christian vocations jump from 102 to 163. This 60% increase has occurred even in face of a decline in over-all enrollment. There seems to be an increasing sense of Christian concern and spiritual commitment among the new students now coming to the Campbellsville campus. I strongly believe that this is the proper direction for us and that it will continue.

The major administrative problem for Campbellsville College continues to be adequate financing. The decline in enrollment has seriously reduced income since approximately 80% has been derived from students. During the past year, we have more than doubled gift income for the College over the previous year with total of \$113,328.76.

Special gratitude is expressed to the entire Convention and the leaders of Taylor County Association who assisted in the action of the Kentucky Baptist Convention Executive Board in granting to Campbellsville College the supportive and supplemental granting to Campbellsville College the supportive and supplemental appropriation of \$100,000. There are five basic areas in which we were quickly and definitely benefitted by this grant:

- a. We were greatly assisted in meeting the immediate financial obligations of the 1971-72 year.
- b. Rumors of our closing were, hopefully, dispelled and our position of permanence was greatly undergirded.
- c. Our own morale and that of many friends and other supporters was significantly uplifted.
- d. This reinforced the confidence of Kentucky Baptist leadership and of the Kentucky Baptist Convention in Campbellsville College and in the direction in which we are moving.
- e. We are assured of further time and opportunity to implement our programs of financial development and student recruitment which are underway.

As an economy, the faculty number was reduced for 1972-73 and until the student body size again increases to need other teachers.

As part of the ten-year appraisal for continued accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the College has completed a detailed self-study

and prepared a preliminary report. The final report will be drafted and the SACS evaluation completed during the 1972-73 year.

Since one dormitory was not needed for housing students, it was utilized this past year as a Conference and Retreat Center. Many church and school groups have used the facilities, bringing hundreds of persons to the campus. Not only has this program assisted the churches, it has encouraged our recruitment efforts.

The Growth and Development program launched last year continues to receive emphasis. Although many churches and individuals have responded in financial support and we have seen gift income for the College more than double, we have not completely met our needs nor have we progressed as far as we had dared to hope. It is our hope and prayer that many other dedicated and able supporters will rise to meet this financial challenge.

Although the over-all enrollment has experienced further decline for 1972-73, the spirit of the new students is most encouraging. We continue to work for achievement of the four points which are embodied in our College purpose: To be Christ Centered in program, To be Church Connected in relationships, To be Community Conscious in attitudes, and to be Curricula Coordinated in operation. The thoughts of Col. 2:8 undergird our total function, "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world and not after Christ."

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

Kentucky Baptists are involved in the support of Christian Education at several levels of educational study. Oneida Baptist Institute is a Christian high school with more than 150 high school students. Mr. Barkley Moore has recently become President. There are nearly 4,000 students enrolled in our three Christian colleges—Campbellsville, Cumberland, and Georgetown. We also help support Clear Creek Baptist School designed to provide training for adult students and their wives who have responded to the call of a church related vocation. At the graduate level we help support our six seminaries one of which is located in our state. Through the Co-operative Program and Foreign Missions offering we also help support Christian Education on a world-wide scale.

I would especially call your attention to the new Kentucky Baptist College Scholarship Fund. This is for help to first-time, full-time Baptist students recommended by their churches and supported by them to the extent of \$100 per semester. In turn the Kentucky Baptist Convention will provide \$100 and the college which the student attends will provide \$100. This would mean a \$600 scholarship per year. This plan will begin in the Fall of 1973. To help finance the Convention's portion, the churches will be encouraged to take an offering in February on Christian Education Sunday.

These schools need the support of our prayers, the entrustment of our youths, and the increased financial giving.

CHILD CARE REPORT

During the past year the Board of Child Care, Glen Dale, and Spring Meadows were involved in trying to help 1,058 children. Of these, 437 were referred to agencies or institutions more suited to their needs, or for their resources were

discovered within the family or local community. The other 621 were in the care of our institutions and foster homes, or were receiving extended case work services through the Child Care Center located on the Spring Meadows campus in Middletown. At the present time we have approximately 325 children and young people under care and supervision.

Those we are receiving for institutional care increasingly are children with behaviour problems. Many of them have been unwanted, unloved, and undisciplined. These feel their rejection keenly, and resent what they consider to be the interference of "outsiders". They have a low self-image, and some few seem bent on self-destruction. Working with them requires love, knowledge, skill, and patience, and those who do are indeed "the servants of Christ."

Last year 43 children living at Spring Meadows and Glen Dale made professions of Christian faith and were baptized. Presently 7 of our young people are college students; 5 of these are in Kentucky Baptist Schools. This spring we shall have 9 to graduate from high school. These figures measure to some degree the success achieved in spite of the difficulties encountered in our Child Care Ministry.

We also derived considerable satisfaction last year from the adoptive placement of 51 infants born to unwed girls who sought our help in the time of need.

We were disappointed that the 1971 Thanksgiving Offering fell short of the goal which had been set by nearly \$19,000.00, and that actually \$6,575 less was given than in the preceding year. Nevertheless, we are grateful for the \$356,116 which was contributed by our churches throughout Kentucky. Our goal this fall will again be \$375,000. Our present allocation in the Cooperative Program is \$100,000. The balance of our budget must be underwritten by bequest, memorials, and other special gifts.

HOSPITALS REPORT

The three Baptist Hospitals in Kentucky are managed by the Board of Directors of Baptist Hospitals, Inc., H. L. Dobbs, president. While most of the income is from patients, the Convention allocated \$40,000 this year from the Cooperative Program and promoted the "Mother's Day Charity Offering" through the Sunday Schools and churches in May. This offering needs to be increased greatly.

CENTRAL BAPTIST HOSPITAL in Lexington is a short-term acute hospital dedicated to render service to patients without regard to race, creed or color. During the past year the following statistics are noted: Adult admissions 12,633; Newborn 2,126; Non-resident patients 32,089; Operations 6,655; Full-time personnel 600; Part-time personnel 82; Sunday School Charity Fund \$8,940.22; Bad debts, discounts and other charity \$412,945.00. Central Baptist Hospital has been in an enlargement and remodelling program since August 1970 and will be 300 beds when completed in August of 1972.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST HOSPITAL is a 410-bed acute care hospital with four major services: Surgical, Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Psychiatry. It renders care to patients without regard to race, creed or color. During the past year 146,100 patient days of care were provided with 2,663 babies delivered. 23,898 patients were seen on an out-patient basis. This service was provided by 1200 hospital employees, 1200 auxiliaries, and 550 physicians.

Much time has been spent in planning the new hospital in St. Matthews and those plans will be culminated soon in a new 230 bed hospital serving the east-end of Jefferson County.

WESTERN BAPTIST HOSPITAL in Paducah continues to operate at maximum capacity of its 214 beds. During the past year ending March 13, 1972,

11,779 patients including 1,655 newborns were admitted. Other interesting statistics recorded during this time are: Surgical procedures 6,126; Laboratory tests 176,447; X-ray examinations 28,453; There are 570 full-time equivalent employees who serve these patients. Bad debts, discounts and charity services increased over last year. The total was \$465,881.30 of which \$343,331.05 was discounted to medicare and medicaid. Eighteen Sunday School Charity Patients utilized \$6,497.11 of the fund in payment of their bills.

CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

One of the most urgent needs facing churches today is for our people to better understand the basic purposes of the educational organizations. Each has a unique contribution to make. Some are tempted to say, "Our church is over-organized." They readily see the wisdom of their church's supporting all of the organizations when they understand how each meets a specific need of the member. What are the purposes of Church Training? What does it contribute to the Christian growth of those participating?

The purpose of Church Training is to provide training in church membership. After a person has become a Christian, Church Training seeks to help him develop toward maturity.

The following tasks make up the training program of a church:

1. Orient new church members.
2. Train church members to perform the functions of the church.
3. Train church leaders.
4. Teach Christian theology, Christian ethics, Christian history, church polity and organization.
5. Provide and interpret information regarding the work of the church and denomination.

This past year our Association held an "M" Night at Campbellsville Baptist Church with 90 in attendance. Our speaker was Bro. Doug Olive, pastor of the First Baptist Church Lebanon, Kentucky.

This year "M" Night will be held at Lowell Avenue Baptist Church on Monday night, November 27.

We had 3 young people to participate in Associational Drills and Events. There were 3 who went on to participate in the state events. They were: Lori Forman, Lynn Kibbons, and Sue Williams.

These events are excellent ways for a church to help its young people to develop skill in handling God's Word. The tracts describing these events are available.

According to the reports for the first 9 months of this year 12 churches from our Association requested 441 awards in all categories.

According to the digest of letters 13 churches and 2 missions in our Association report a Training Union. The enrollment was 1067 which was a decrease of 130. In spite of this our average attendance was up 21.

Again on behalf of the Associational Organization and the Kentucky Church Training Department, let me offer their services to all churches which do or do not have an organized training program.

ASSOCIATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The highlight of the Sunday School program in Taylor County Association during the past year was the Sunday School Revival of November. In our effort for a county-wide census we had the participation of all of our churches but one and in the Director-Led participation we had all of our churches and missions involved but two. The week of Sunday School Revival was a time when the churches had an opportunity to look at their possibilities, their buildings and decide what they would recommend for the remainder of the Sunday School year. Most important was the decision concerning the carrying out of recommendations.

According to the Sunday School reports as recorded in the church letters we have completed the year with a small increase in enrollment. Seven churches were down in enrollment and ten churches were up in enrollment. We had expected a larger enrollment, however, we were thankful that we were not down as we had been in the past several years.

Our Vacation Bible School report is rather discouraging. Our V.B.S. enrollment for the year was 253 below that of the year before. All of our churches and missions reported Vacation Bible Schools except one. Bro. Hardin Hosey and his staff of workers led in a VBS clinic in the spring at the Palestine Baptist Church.

Our main emphasis for the new year is our Associational Bible Conference which will be held the week of February 12-16. We have secured Dr. Stewart Arnold of the Sunday School Board as our Bible teacher for the Adults and young people. The study will be from the various age groups. We would suggest that all of our churches and missions would clear their calendars for this week and that we plan to meet together on Wednesday night as well as the other nights of the week.

Many Southern Baptist Churches will be making a special effort in 1973-74 to expand and increase the effectiveness of their witness and ministry to people. The plan includes three basic goals (1) To reach more people for helpful and exciting Bible study. (2) To establish more Bible study fellowships, missions and churches where the Bible may be taught and Christians may witness to their faith in Christ. (3) To train and send forth more Christians to share regularly and effectively their faith in Christ.

We will be reading and hearing more about the People Search in July and August of 1973. Many associations will be taking county wide surveys as we did last year. The surveys will be followed by Pastor-led enlargement campaigns. The People Search program would be a fine time for us to update our census cards and search for new prospects. We would recommend that every church and mission in the Association plan a week of Sunday School emphasis the week of September 24-30 in 1973.

We can undergird our colleges and seminaries, help support homeless children, share in the ministry of healing, establish missions, organize churches and develop strong church programs all across America and in foreign lands.

The work of the Kentucky Baptist Foundation is supported by the Cooperative Program as a channel for Baptists to serve their institutions and agencies. As a result of this work the year 1970-71 has produced the following results:

The facts regarding the Annuity Board are most encouraging, with record funds held in trust for more than \$292,000,000. as of December 31, 1971. These funds are held in trust for 36,000 retirement plan participants now active in churches and denominational agencies.

Moreover, the Board paid out 25% more in benefits to 7,500 annuitants last year than their contracts required. The extra benefits totaled \$1,339,732.00, which was made possible due to increased earnings from investments.

Let me congratulate Churches of the Taylor County Association, pastors and denominational workers for having enough concern and good business judgement to enter this great plan of protection.

Isn't it gratifying to know that because of our financial support to our church, checks find their way each month to the homes of many of our beloved servants of God.

EVANGELISM REPORT

There are signs of Revival in our midst. One sign is the renewed interest in Evangelism. The laity of our churches are responding to the new emphasis on Lay

The new emphasis on Lay Evangelism has brought out three vital facts. FIRST, that there are many men, women, and youth in our churches who are willing to witness for Jesus when given training. SECOND, that many pastors want to teach and train their people and now that they have the plan and materials, they are doing so. THIRD, that generally our churches are not in contact with the lost people of their community. This is a vital need, that is, to locate and cultivate the friendship of the lost people in the church community. We can then go to them with the Gospel of salvation.

State Director of Evangelism, Thomas H. Shelton, in cooperation with the Church Training Department, has held seven area schools over our state during the past year, and announced that he now has a list of more than 200 people who are trained to direct a Lay Evangelism School. He will be happy to supply this list to anyone so desiring it. We should set a goal of every church in our association having a Lay School of Evangelism during the year of 1972-73.

Taylor County Association was fortunate to have an area evangelism school held at Campbellsville Baptist Church during the past year. Several professions of faith were made as a result and, probably just as important, several lay Christians were trained and challenged in the area of personal soul-winning.

The main emphasis in our churches for the next two years will be Evangelism. The 1972-73 theme is "Living the Spirit of Christ in Faith and Conquest." In order to promote the highly evangelistic thrust of this theme, the term REALIFE has been adopted. The theme for 1973-74 will be "Sharing Christ Through His Word." The phrase, "Share the Word Now!" has been adopted. There will be one day, two session clinics in the associations during February and March of 1973 to present these plans.

The churches of our association baptized a total of 184 people during this associational year. This is an increase of 38 over last year. To God be the glory!

W.M.U. REPORT

The Weeks of Prayer offerings gratifyingly increased during this past year. The Week of Prayer for State Missions offering goal of \$130,000.00 was exceeded by over \$7,000.00. The major portion of the undesignated amount was set aside for much needed expansion at the Girls in Action and Acteens Camp at Cedarmore. The rest was given to assist mission work in the Kentucky mountains. Kentucky churches gave a total of \$550,025 through May this year for the Lottie Moon Christmas offering for Foreign Missions and about 13% more for Annie Armstrong Easter offering for Home Missions, \$184,046.

Emphasis for the coming year will be enlistment and enlargement. Enlistment workshops will be held in every area of the State to help leaders become more informed concerning better methods of enlistment and enlargement.

Mission Action Workshops were held by State and Associational WMU's in preparation for stronger mission action work this year.

Twenty-six churches and seventeen associations reported Distinguished level on the WMU Achievement Guide.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

This past year Brotherhood enrollment experienced a 6.9% increase in the Southern Baptist Convention. In Kentucky our Brotherhood enrollment increased 672. Nine of the 80 associations do not report any Brotherhood work. This work is supported by the Cooperative Program. The Director is Forrest R. Sawyer, the Associate is Calvin D. Fields.

In our association the total Brotherhood enrollment was listed as 217, which included both men and boys in Royal Ambassadors and Baptist Men's units. Nine of our churches and missions reported some phase of Brotherhood work; either men's or boy's or both. For those churches without any Brotherhood work may we urge that you elect a Brotherhood Director. Send his name and address to the state department at Middletown.

Missionary education for our men and boys determines to a great degree how acceptably, to God, a church is missionary in spirit, in attitude, and in practice. Churches of like faith and order, in fellowship, determine the extent of our denominational endeavors through the Cooperative Program and special emphases.

With Missions as the heartbeat of Kentucky Baptist Men and boys, more Brotherhood work is now being done than ever before. This year men and boys across our state have engaged in evangelism thrusts as never before. More jail services are being conducted, more benevolent activities are being engaged in, more awareness of the needs of society is experienced, the need for a healthy, wholesome, Christian fellowship among men and boys is being realized.

In closing this report, we share with you a message of three points from Brother Forrest Sawyer: 1) The need for the awakened spirit of men and boys to be challenged and directed; 2) Herald the areas of mission concern that are being met, and 3) Remember when spiritual energy is expended you refill the void with something good or the devil has a field day. Let's Keep Brotherhood Moving!

Early in the year the committee recommended to the Executive Committee that Brother Jerry Kibbons be asked to continue as Program Director for the Association. When Brother Kibbons felt it necessary to resign the position of Program Director because of added responsibility at the college, the Missions Committee was given the responsibility of seeking for someone to take Brother Kibbons' place as Program Director.

Since the committee had already been thinking of some kind of ministry to the resort area around the Green River Reservoir it was decided to recommend that a young couple from the college be employed to serve as Program Director for the summer months with their major responsibility being to provide a ministry in the resort area. Brother Woodrow Wilson and his wife were secured and provided with a camper. They began their ministry the last of May and continued on a full-time basis through the month of July. REPORT OF STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

When Jesus commanded his followers to go into all the world to preach, teach, baptize and minister, He involved all of us in missions. All that we are and have should be properly related to the Lord in order to be obedient to His commands.

We seek to obey our Lord by individual stewardship of ourselves and our means in the Lord's ministry. This should involve us in personal witnessing and in sharing our means with a minimum of the tithe through our churches.

The two great streams of support are the Cooperative Program and the special offerings for missions. The extent of our involvement is seen in the \$65,540.00 contributed through the Cooperative Program as over against \$57,175.00 last year. Our gifts through the special offering amounted to \$140,036.00 this year as compared to \$113,105.00 last year. This testifies to both individual commitment and the growing vision of our churches in increasing the percentage or amount shared with the world through the Cooperative Program.

In our State approximately 150 people are engaged in mission work sponsored by our churches. These workers witnessed the baptism of 650 people, 350 additions by letter and over 2,000 other decisions for Christ. They assisted in organizing 80 new units of work, in organizing 5 new missions and in the constitution of 7 new churches in our state.

The field covered in Home Missions presents one of the greatest mission challenges in the world with approximately 80 million Americans not identified with any religious group. At the end of the year there were approximately 2200 missionaries under appointment.

The field ministered to by the Foreign Mission Board is made up of 75 countries in which we have 2525 missionaries under appointment. From over the world there come calls which we desperately try to meet. We are never able to answer all the Macedonian calls, but we are grateful for an expanded ministry.

More than half the funds channelled into the treasury of the Southern Baptist Convention through the Cooperative Program goes for missions. Add to this our special offerings and this reaches about two-thirds of our income. This is why we can honestly call ourselves Missionary Baptists.

If we are not honoring God as individuals then seek God's leadership in acknowledging the Lordship of Christ in the area of possessions.

If our churches are doing all they can through the Cooperative Program, we should seek God's forgiveness and see that if humanly possible that we increase the

amount or percent in our budgets for the Cooperative Program. A lost world cannot plead its own cause, but dedicated pastors and men and women of vision who love the Lord can see that their cry is heard and heeded.

TEMPERANCE REPORT

Jesus came that we might have life and have it more abundantly. Not only in Christ is there eternal life but in Christ there is joy in living in this life; there is peace; there is tranquility; there is hope; there is purpose, all to be experienced through the present power of the living Christ.

It is tragic that so many have turned to chemical drugs as a "crutch" or a way of life. Although alcohol may not be our most severe drug, it is the drug on which more citizens are dependent than all the other drugs combined.

In testimony before the Senate Subcommittee on Alcoholism and Narcotics, Vernon Wilson, Administrator, Department of Health, Education and Welfare made the following statements:

"It is now estimated that alcohol problems adversely affect the lives of some 36,000,000 Americans."

"Nine million of our citizens are alcoholics or problem drinkers."

"Alcohol related problems are the cause of more than 85,000 deaths in the United States annually."

"Approximately one-half of all homicides and one-third of all deaths reported as suicides are known to be alcohol related."

"In total, approximately one in every three of the 1.5 million patients in the State Mental Hospitals are under treatment for the problem of alcoholism."

"A conservative estimate of the economic drain from the nation is \$15 billion per year."

This gives us an idea of the size of the problem we face. The Kentucky Temperance League was busy last year speaking in over 950 churches, speaking or presenting programs in 55 schools and speaking on college campuses, youth rallies, clubs, teachers' groups, etc. Four local option elections have been held since 1971 and all voted dry. Only two bills favoring liquor interests were passed in the 1972 legislative session but this was two too many.

Are we really concerned about a person if we just say we will help you after you become an alcoholic? We must be working in the area of prevention through education, control of sales and distribution of alcoholic beverages by making it harder to obtain and by encouraging abstinence as the only sure way of avoiding alcoholism.

WESTERN RECORDER AND AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

Kentucky Baptists have always believed in being informed. For this reason Baptist papers were started in Ky. as early as 1825 and were a strong influence in leading churches to cooperate in carrying out the great commission in these early days. For awhile there were several such papers, but in 1851 two of these merged to

form the Western Recorder that since that time has been the spokesman to inform Ky. Baptists of activities in Ky. and around the world.

While the Western Recorder is basically a news magazine, it regularly presents the programs sponsored by the Ky. Baptist Convention and its agencies and institutions related to the convention.

Its editorial page is designed to critically evaluate Baptist issues. Controversial issues are not avoided, and agreement with the editor is not expected. For this reason varying viewpoints regularly appear in issues.

Dr. C. R. Daley is the editor.

Our great concern is to get the Western Recorder in every Baptist home in the state. It is already in the budget of many churches and can be furnished for \$1.75 per person if the church includes it in its budget. In order to help assure its circulation, there is a 90 day plan where the paper will be sent free for any church who will send addresses along with Zip codes of all members. All that is asked is that the church will allow the members to decide at the end of the trial period if they will or will not continue receiving the paper through the church.

The affairs of the Western Recorder are administered by twelve directors elected by the Ky. Baptist Convention. These meet twice a year. In addition to Dr. Daley who has been with the paper since 1957, Bob Terry acts as associate editor and George Price has served as business manager.

The American Bible Society is the arm used by Baptists as well as others to provide the Bible in as many languages and at as reasonable a price as possible for distribution all over the world.

Its success recently with Dr. Bratchers' translation "Good News For Modern Man" has outstripped all expectations. Its first printing went to 150,000 and in two years over eleven million copies were sold or given away.

Just recently someone has agreed to provide all students starting to a Baptist school with a free copy of Good News.

The Gideons, a Christian association of men banded together to spread the Scriptures, buy their Bibles from the American Bible Society. We are very fortunate in this area to have Dr. W. R. Davenport, President of Gideons International, in our area. This group, together with the American Bible Society, provides free Bibles for school children, soldiers, hotels, hospitals and a variety of persons. May we continue to support our Publications and the translating and distribution of the Scriptures.
