## Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the

evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auziliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

## By-Laws

### ARTICLE I--DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

## ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

# Proceedings

## OF THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION

### Monday Night

Called to order by Moderator, Darrell Hunt at 7:00 p.m. James S. Campbell led the congregation in singing "The Solid Rock." H. C. Crabtree led in a devotional. Dr. J. Chester Badgett made a motion that all messengers already registered plus those who would later register make up the body authorized to transact business for the Association. J. B. Crawley made a motion that the program as printed be adopted as the order of business plus any necessary changes. The Moderator recognized the following new Pastors: Otis Bentley, Saloma; Richard Shields, Palestine; James K. Fox, South Campbellsville. He also recognized Ronald Roberson as the new Program Director for the Association. The Treasurer's report was read by Jerry Cox and approved. Joe Asher gave the auditor's report stating that he had found the Treasurer's books in good condition. J. V. Mullen read the report of the Budget Committee and a budget of \$6,430.00 was adopted. George Gaddie gave a report of the Executive Board and a digest of the letters. James Campbell led in the singing of another hymn. George Gaddie gave a report of the Christian Education Committee. Other members of the committee, J. B. Crawley and J. Chester Badgett, spoke to the report. J. B. Crawley gave the following notice to the Association concerning a proposed change in the constitution, "That the immediate past Moderator of the Association will serve as an Executive Board member one year immediately following his term as Moderator." Dr. Randy Davenport gave a report on Campbellsville College stating that he felt the school had the highest quality of students that had been there since he became President. Jerry Kibbons gave a report on Christian publications. The Moderator appointed the following committees: Nominating Committee: L. D. Kennedy, Homer Kirtley, Ken Forman. Committee on Committees: Hardin Hosey, Howard Lewis, Gene Hall. Time, Place and Preacher Committee: J. B. Crawley, Hershel Stearman, Charlie Devine. James Campbell provided the special music and Charles Harris preached the annual sermon.

### Tuesday Afternoon

James Campbell led in the singing of a hymn and Landon Hadley read some Scripture and had prayer. Bill Beard read the Sunday School report which was



followed by the Training Union report by Ken Forman. Ken Forman also read the Brotherhood report in the absence of Samuel Crawley. Mrs. Ken Forman read the W.M.U. report. L. D. Kennedy gave the report on Evangelism. Richard Shields gave a report on Temperance and Morals with some recommendations. In the absence of Marshall Black, Missions Chairman, George Gaddie read the report of the Missions Committee. James K. Fox gave a report on Benevolent Institutions. After the singing of another hymn the Moderator recognized Brother J. D. Hernden, a representative of the State Office. His work is primarily with the Child Care Program. Brother Hernden challenged the Churches to support our institutions. The next item of business was the election of officers. J. Chester Badgett notified the Association that he planned to propose a change to the constitution that would allow all registered members of any of the Churches in the Association to act as messengers to the Association. Al Hardy asked the Association to go on record as approving Baptist Student Day at Campbellsville College on November 10, 1973. The motion was approved. There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

### Tuesday Night

James Campbell led in the singing of a hymn and Isadore Childers read Scripture and led in prayer. The In Memoriam Report was given by S. C. Blackburn. Ronald Roberson gave a report on the Lake Ministry and A. B. Colvin spoke on the Cooperative Program and our stewardship. The reports of the Nominating Committee, Time, Place and Preacher Committee and the Committee on Committees were read and approved. After the singing of another hymn J. Chester Badgett gave the report on State, Home and Foreign Missions. Dr. Davenport presented Wilburn Hoglen, a Missionary on furlough from Venezuela, as the Missionary speaker. This was followed by an invitation hymn and F. F. Hall closed the session with prayer.

REPORT FOR  
THE TAYLOR COUNTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, 1973

"It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord and to sing praises unto thy name, O most high." Psalm 92:1

As I report for Campbellsville College, I want to give thanks to God and to praise His name for every accomplishment at the College. It is a privilege to be asked to report each year to the Taylor County Association. We are grateful for this close relationship between the College and the churches of the Association.

During this past year the Association's new Committee on Christian Education has functioned well and I want to express my appreciation for it. As you know, the Committee was authorized at the Annual Meeting one year ago. Rev. George R. Gaddie is the chairman with Mr. J. B. Crawley and Dr. J. Chester Badgett as the members. Churches in the Association have been challenged to a higher level of financial support for the College than ever before. Many have already responded and others of you are considering our needs in terms of this challenge from your Committee.

Significant work was accomplished this year as we completed the ten-year self study and hosted the Visiting Evaluation Team for continued accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Final results of their analysis regarding our accreditation will be shared with us at the annual meeting in December. The appointment of several new Ph.D.'s (or equivalent doctorates) was required by the Evaluation Team. I am pleased to report that we have been able to achieve these appointments.

I am thrilled that the number of students committed to Christian vocations enrolled at Campbellsville College continues to increase significantly. This number has risen from 102 to 196—almost double—in only four years. This is even more significant in face of a decline in overall enrollment. This indicates that we are attracting and serving more of the Christian students who have selected Campbellsville College because of its Christian purposes.

Dormitory occupancy shows a tendency to stabilize and possibly increase. This is helpful as we experience our heaviest financial pressures from the dormitory accounts. When we receive adequate funds to pay for these buildings our financial burdens will be dramatically eased.

Many church groups have been served through the Conference and Retreat Center at the College. In fact, utilization of this empty dormitory has been beyond our fondest expectations. Church groups from Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Georgia, in addition to many from Kentucky, have become acquainted with the campus through this facility.

The 1972-73 year was encouraging from a financial point of view. Although the declining enrollment picture continues to create financial pressures, income was 99.5% of expenditures. Included in the expenditures was approximately \$200,000 for debt servicing and retirement. Increased gift support from our Growth and Development emphasis, better collections from students, and internal economies (effected largely by no salary raises and by staff reduction) combined to give a strong year financially. For this we "give thanks unto the Lord."

We continue to urge and plead with individual Kentucky Baptists and our Kentucky Baptist churches to reassess priorities and to channel additional financial support to Christian education. Only 10 cents per week from each of the 680,000 members would produce over 3.5 million dollars for Christian education each year!

Our major purpose continues to be meeting the educational needs of Christian

young people. There is renewed emphasis on spiritual awareness on the campus as God is working out His will in the lives of many of these young people. The faculty and staff count it a privilege to serve God at Campbellsville College as we serve you and these students.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

During the past associational year the Christian Education Committee has tried to accomplish three things. First, we have tried to create a more favorable attitude toward Christian Education among Taylor County Baptists. Second, we have attempted to interest more Baptist students in attending a Baptist college. Thirdly, we have tried to enlist our Baptist Churches in making a larger financial contribution to Campbellsville College.

To help the committee in working toward these goals each Church was asked to appoint a Christian Education Committee. A dinner was planned for high school seniors to better inform them about the Baptist scholarship program. Each Church in the association was encouraged to consider a goal equal to \$10.00 per resident member to be raised for Campbellsville College in 1973. Several of the Churches adopted the goal and others either took a special offering or increased their percentage to the college.

The committee cooperated with the Admissions Department at Campbellsville College in promoting BAPTIST STUDENT DAY. Baptist high school students from Churches all over the state were invited to visit the campus for a Friday night and Saturday morning. We feel that this was a success and hope to do it again this year.

Dr. Davenport reports that the greatest burden on the administration at this time is the debt owed on the dormitories. This debt requires a semi-annual payment of approximately \$80,000.00. He feels that if it were not for this debt the school could easily operate within its income. We hope that through the Churches, the Taylor County Business community and other sources a way will be found to remove this burden from the administration.

Last year Dr. Davenport promoted special nights for Churches in the association to be guests at home basketball games. This year the Christian Education Committee would like to enlarge on this and seek to have every Church be represented at one of the basketball games.

The committee feels that we have made a good beginning but feels that there is much work yet to be done.

## CHILD CARE REPORT

This year has been one marked by excitement and change. Reverend C. Ford Deusner retired after serving 25 years with this agency. In October, the board elected Reverend Bill Amos as the Executive Director of the Child Care Program. In response to changing needs, major plans are underway to reorganize the entire agency.

A total of 938 persons requested services this past year. Of these, 267 were cared for on our two campuses, Spring Meadows and Glen Dale Children's Homes. The remaining 671 persons received the services of the Foster Home, Adoption, Family Aid and Family Counseling Departments, or were referred to other agencies better equipped to meet their needs.

In an effort to share more dramatically with Kentucky Baptists what the Child Care Program is doing, the CHILDREN'S MESSENGER was transformed in April, 1973 into CONTACT.

The Thanksgiving Offering went over its goal of \$375,000.00. Kentucky Baptists across the state gave a total of \$380,856.50.

## HOSPITALS REPORT

The Kentucky Baptist Convention operates its program of hospital ministry through a Board of Directors of Baptist Hospitals, Inc. Dr. H. L. Dobbs is President and Mr. Homer D. Coggins serves as Assistant to the President. The Convention allocates approximately \$40,000.00 each year from the Cooperative Program to this program and promotes the Mother's Day Charity Offering through the Sunday School.

CENTRAL BAPTIST HOSPITAL, Lexington, was established in May, 1954. In September, 1972 an addition costing \$6,000,000.00 which provides 297 beds and 31 bassinets was opened and dedicated. Medical service is provided by 633 employees and 275 physicians. A total of \$15,901.00, provided by the Sunday School Charity Fund, was used to help 24 patients with hospital bills.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST HOSPITAL, Louisville, began its ministry in November, 1924 and has a bed capacity of 410. Medical service is provided by 1,054 hospital employees, 1,200 auxiliaries and 570 physicians. The hospital extended \$17,684.55 to 37 charity patients. The School of Nursing has an enrollment of 209. Practical Nursing and Pastoral Care programs are available.

WESTERN BAPTIST HOSPITAL, Paducah, opened in October, 1953. A medical staff of 100 and 684 full and part-time employees provide medical services to persons in Western Kentucky. A total of \$8,340.00 was given to 21 charity patients.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL EAST, St. Matthews, is now under construction at a cost of \$14,000,000.00. It is scheduled to open in the Fall of 1974.

The Church Study Course for Teaching and Training is a vital part of the Church's training program. The book, "Church Leader Training Handbook," by Jimmy P. Crowe, is a very helpful tool for developing a sound leadership training plan. "M" Night this year will be on November 26 at the South Campbellsville Baptist Church.

According to the digest of letters 18 Churches and Missions in our Association reported a Training Union. Enrollment was 1056.

We would hope that this new associational year would see active Training Unions in all Churches and Missions in our Association.

Our Vacation Bible School leaders attended the State V.B.S. Clinic in Lexington and it was followed by our Associational Clinic at Lowell Avenue Baptist Church. According to reports we are 100% in the number of Bible Schools for our churches and missions.

Sunday School Preparation Week activities are planned for the week of September the 23rd. Dr. Roy Boatright of the State Sunday School Department will lead us in a conference on Sunday afternoon, September 23rd. This afternoon will be followed by conferences on Monday night through Wednesday nights at 7:00 p.m. A vital need of our churches is leadership training and this preparation week clinic should be very helpful.

People-to-People remains the theme of our Sunday School work. The plan for reaching people can be summarized in five brief imperatives: (1) Make a commitment to reach people. (2) Go find people. (3) Prepare for people. (4) Witness to people. (5) Involve people in reaching people. Textbooks and guides are available for study and follow through on all of these subjects.

Two years have passed since we held our Associational Sunday School Revival. We need to up-date our census files and prospect files to be ready to carry out our people search and follow through this Fall.

We recommend that we have an outreach clinic and a witnessing clinic early in the new year.

### STEWARDSHIP REPORT

In looking over our total receipts for 1972-73 I see a total of \$543,979 or approximately \$88.82 per member for the year. According to the Bible and the average income listed by the United States Government, we are surely stealing some of God's money.

In examining our Treasurer's report I see a total of \$3,873.17 given by our Churches to the association this past year. We were able to stay in the black but we cannot this year with the same income because of added expenses. One percent of last year's total receipts would have brought \$5,440.00 into the association. Let me challenge each Church to give at least 2% of their general offering to the work of our association.

In looking over the stewardship reports for the past year I notice that percentage-wise we gave from 0 to 27% of our regular offering to the Cooperative Program. This, with designated giving, we gave a total of \$143,074.00 to mission causes in 1972-73 or approximately \$23.20 per member for all mission causes. If your Church is not giving at least 10% of its total budget to mission causes let me challenge you to raise it to that amount at once.

Each Church is challenged to increase its gifts in each of the next three years through the Cooperative Program by at least 1% of the total Church income.

## EVANGELISM REPORT

If we love our Lord as we ought, we will be concerned for the lost people for whom He died. Witnessing is every Christian's responsibility just as training his members to witness is a prime responsibility of every Pastor.

This year the Churches of our association reported 140 baptisms which was a decrease of 45 over last year. But not only did we have 24% fewer baptisms; five Churches reported no baptisms this year compared to only one Church last year.

The Churches of Kentucky baptized 22,466 people last year, an increase of 2,578 over the preceding year. A survey reveals that the increase came from every type of Church. There were small and large Churches, rural and city Churches, all having increases and none having decreases. It came from every section of the state. It came because more and more lay people took seriously the Great Commission and shared their faith with others.

The emphasis in our Churches remains on evangelism. The theme for 1973-74 is "Share the Word Now." The major activities of the new year center around (1) finding and cultivating people who need to hear about Jesus. We call it "People to People." (2) Training Church members in how to share their faith with these people. We call it "Witness NOW." (3) Going where the people are and establishing Bible fellowships and Missions. We call it "Extend NOW." This is all evangelism.

The state Department of Evangelism will continue to give help in the field of lay witness, Life-Style Evangelism, and Renewal Evangelism. Feel free to call or write Thomas H. Shelton, the Director.

## W. M. U. REPORT

### BROTHERHOOD REPORT

For the second successive year Brotherhood enrollment has increased in the Southern Baptist Convention and in Kentucky. This is good. We thank all who have contributed to the increase.

During the next 10 years our goal will be 50% of our Churches with one or more units of Brotherhood . . . Baptist Men, Royal Ambassadors, better yet, BOTH. Churches can start by electing a Brotherhood Director.

We are aware that there's more Brotherhood work being done by more men in more Churches. A goodly percentage of the work is not in an organized Brotherhood. We would request that each Church's leadership be aware of the need to stabilize and mature this interest by providing a basic vehicle whereby it can be done; Brotherhood.

During the past year some of our men have been directly involved in state activities. The state Brotherhood Convention at Campbellsville, a mission tour to Mexico, the prayer breakfast in the interest of Home Missions in Atlanta, the planning for a medical mission trip to Trinidad, the collecting of books for the libraries at two Bible schools, the camping programs for boys, weekend evangelistic revivals, rest home services, the use and distribution of Brotherhood periodicals, participation in World Missions Conferences, the observance of Baptist Men's Day the 4th. Sunday in January, observing Royal Ambassador Week last November, involvement in Bus Ministries, transporting boys to camp and congress meetings, sharing in special Church offerings, on-and-on. Teaching, preaching, praying, giving, demonstrating Christian concern, developing an awareness of human need, all these constitute a life style of Christian discipleship being experienced by more Church men with each passing day. The emphasis Brotherhood places on the need for lay involvement in all a Church does, providing the organizational mechanism for doing it, and sharing helpful ways and means of accomplishment, as joined by His Spirit, enables men and Churches.

We want our association WELL represented at the Brotherhood Convention in Owensboro November 23-24. 1973 marks the 90th. anniversary of the first boys organized for missionary education. It was at the First Baptist Church in Owensboro. A free, char-broiled steak supper will be served to the first 5,000 men and boys attending this convention by the immediate past state Brotherhood President, Floyd Dievert of First Baptist Church, Danville. Further news on this will be forthcoming.

Our association has 11 churches and missions with Brotherhood work. The enrollment is 230. The Brotherhood Director for the next year will be Haven Harris. Assistant Director will be W. R. Davenport and Jimmy Graham will be the Royal Ambassador Leader.

Each Church has about 5 available sources of help; a neighboring Church, the men already mentioned, the Associational Program Director, the State Brotherhood

Department in Middletown, and the Brotherhood Commission, SBC in Memphis, Tennessee.

### REPORT OF STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

As Baptists, we are involved in missions, because we take seriously the command of our Lord, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." Missions is sharing the Gospel with a needy soul whether in the community where we live, or in some uttermost part of the earth. The Lord makes it clear that He expects us to be missionaries and that He expects us to support missionaries and missionary endeavors.

The division into foreign, home, and state missions is purely for the sake of enabling us to concentrate on a particular area of need. One is not to be emphasized over another, but all are to be carried forward simultaneously. The percent of our Cooperative Program allocations for missions and our response to the special offerings indicate that we are truly concerned in missionary outreach. We have in excess of twenty-five hundred foreign missionaries scattered in seventy-eight countries around the world. There are well over twenty-two hundred missionaries operating in our home mission territory. We also have a hundred and fifty persons working in the ministry of our Direct Missions Department here in Kentucky.

While we rejoice in our achievements, let us never overlook the fact that there are unmet needs and calls for help which go unheeded in the local community, in the state of Kentucky, across these United States, and in the countries around the world. God will hold us accountable for our withholding the Gospel, due to our own unconcern or selfishness, regardless of where that lost soul may be. Our missionary concern, according to Biblical instructions, must envelop a ministry to the total man.

Sitting at the feet of the great W. O. Carver many years ago, impressed upon my mind that we are not to ask what part will missions have in the life of my Church, but rather what part will my Church have in God's missionary outreach, since the fulfillment of God's eternal purpose in the redemptive program is larger than any local congregation.

While we thank God for every achievement by individual Christians, local Churches, or any division of our missionary outreach, let us also honestly face the claims of Christ for greater personal involvement in missionary outreach to those who can be touched by us individually. Let us search our own souls as to whether or not we have been faithful stewards of the money and abilities with which God has entrusted us. Have we given a fair share in the work of our Lord? As we take a close look at the budgets of our local Churches, have we let needs closest to us crowd out the cry of lost men and women around the world? Let us make sure that we have gone as far as we can go in the share that we have our Church income through the Cooperative Program and through our special offerings. Let us use the same kind of approach to our state convention budget and to the budget of the Southern Baptist Convention, making sure that God's missionary concern is adequately expressed in every budget. Let us remember that the degree of our faithfulness will be in the light of the One who so loved us that He gave His all for us by shedding His blood on a cruel cross.

## TEMPERANCE AND MORALS REPORT

A report on "Drug Use In America: Problem In Perspective," released March 22, 1973 by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare is summarized:

"Alcohol dependency is without question the most serious drug problem in this country today. Alcohol users far outnumber those of all other drugs and are found along the entire continuum of dependence. The prevalence of intensified and compulsive use among the entire alcohol-using population is roughly 10 percent and a serious decrement in social functioning is noticeable in roughly half this group."

The answer to the problem of alcoholism is not more and more freedom for the purchase of the drug, as is happening in many cities where liquor-by-the-drink can be purchased on Sunday, but a dedicated effort on the part of Christians to speak out against the use of this drug, and to live out the kind of life Jesus would have us to live. I am sure that if Christian people refused to purchase or use any form of alcoholic beverage the sales of this damnable drug would drop immensely.

How sad it is to see a fine group of young men, most of whom are professing Christians, stop by a Nite Owl store at about 10:00 p.m. and purchase ice to cool down a container of beer and pour the ice on the beer in your presence. Here is the problem today. How can we impress upon the hearts of Christians that alcohol is a drug and one should not allow himself to come under the influence of such? How

sad it is to drive along the highways and constantly be reminded of the drinking population by the beer cans and whiskey bottles seen on the side of the road.

I am sure that there are many bills that could be passed for the purpose of hurting the liquor industry, but this will never solve the problem in the hearts of men. Before one can stop habits of the unregenerate heart, he has to be born again. We need to stress in our pulpits and in our living that Christ does make a difference and show that there is real joy in this new life in Christ.

Recommendations:

1. That we ask the merchants who sell paperback books to refuse to allow x-rated books to be placed in the racks or shelves where our young people can browse through them or purchase them to take home.

2. That we endeavor to get a more concentrated effort by the county and state police forces, in the patrolling of the Lake area for the purpose of a greater control of the use of alcoholic beverages, and a greater control in indecent exposure.

#### CLERK'S REPORT

During the past associational year the executive board has considered several items that should be of major interest to the churches of the Taylor County Association.

In the October meeting the Missions Committee was authorized to contact Rev. Ronald Roberson concerning the work as Program Director for the association. After receiving a favorable response the board approved a recommendation that Brother Roberson be called as Program Director with a salary of \$140.00 per month with the possibility of working out some kind of lake ministry also. He was to begin his work at the beginning of the associational year.

Also in the October meeting the committee approved a recommendation from the Christian Education Committee that a goal of \$50,000.00 for the churches in Taylor County be set for 1973 to go to Campbellville College and that each church be encouraged to set a goal equal to \$10.00 per resident church member as their share of the \$50,000.00 goal. Many of the churches adopted that goal. Others have increased their percentage for Campbellville while still others have taken special offerings for the college.

The following actions were taken by the board since the annual meeting last year:

1. In the February meeting the Board asked the State Brotherhood Department to help the association in planning a World Mission Conference in the association March 23-30, 1975. This date has been approved and plans are being made for the conference.

2. Also in the February meeting the board voted to work out plans for a bus to go to Glorietta for Foreign Mission Week August 9-15, 1973. These plans were completed and the bus made the trip with 28 persons going. The Campbellville Church bus was used and the association paid for traveling expenses. Each person going paid his own expenses except travel.

3. In the March meeting the board voted to invite Dr. Stuart Arnold back to the association for the January Bible Study again this year.

4. In the May meeting it was agreed to ask Walter K. Ayers to be the evangelist in a community wide tent revival in August 1975 and to ask Jerry Moore to be in charge of the music.

5. In the August meeting Brother Beard announced that Dr. Boatwright would lead the adults in a three day Sunday School Preparation September 23, 24, & 25 and that other workers would be provided to lead other age group leaders.
