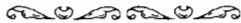

Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in

office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as moderator. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Association. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all

Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

Proceedings

Of the Seventeenth Annual Session

Monday Night

The session was called to order by Moderator Darrell Hunt. James Campbell led in the singing of a hymn. George Gaddie read a passage of scripture and led in prayer. L. D. Kennedy made a motion that the printed program, subject to any necessary changes, be adopted. The motion carried. J. B. Crawley moved that messengers already registered plus any who would later register be seated and make up the body authorized to transact business for the association. The motion carried. The Moderator recognized Richard DeBell as a new pastor in the association and made mention of the fact that Thurman Eaton had been called as new pastor of the Pleasant Hill Church and was in the process of moving on the field. Jeremiah Cox read the finance report which was approved as read. In the absence of Joe Asher, Auditor, the clerk read the Auditor's Report which was approved. Charles Harris read the Report of the Budget Committee and moved that it be approved. The motion carried. The digest of letters was given by George Gaddie. Ken Forman reported on plans for the World Mission Conference in March 1975. George Gaddie read the report of the Executive Board. The moderator called attention to the proposed change in the constitution that would allow the retiring Moderator to serve on the Executive Board for one year following his retirement. Marshall Black made a motion that the proposed change be approved. The motion carried. After the singing of another hymn George Gaddie gave a report on Christian Education and J. B. Crawley spoke to the report. Dr. Badgett moved the report be approved and that the association accept the challenge of joining other Kentucky Baptist churches in attempting to underwrite the \$72,000.00 per year payments on Carter Hall. The report was approved. Dr. W. R. Davenport gave a report on Campbellsville College. Richard DeBell moved that the Christian Education Committee be instructed to set a day sometime before Thanksgiving and designate it as Campbellsville College Day. The motion carried. S. C. Blackburn gave a report on Christian Publications. The Moderator appointed the following committees: Time, Place and Preacher Committee—James Fox, Chairman, Landon Hadley, and Homer Kirtley; Resolutions Committee—L. D. Kennedy, Chairman, David Nelson, and Marshall Black; Committee on Committees—Ken Forman, Chairman, J. B. Crawley, and Charles Harris. Special music was provided by Isaac Frye. The Monday Evening Session was concluded by a message by Richard Shields using as his Text 2nd Corinthians 8:11.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

After the singing of a hymn Richard DeBell read scripture and led in prayer. Hardin Hosey gave the Sunday School report and James Fox followed with the Training Union report. Wilma Gaddie presented the W. M. U. report and James

Campbell gave a report on music. Richard Shields reported for the Missions Committee which included the following recommendations: In the event the association does not secure a Program Director the Missions Committee be instructed to secure someone to lead in a Lake Ministry and that this be done in advance of the time for the camping season to begin. The report was approved. Jim Pickens gave an oral report on his ministry at the K. O. A. Camp Grounds. H. C. Crabtree read a report on Benevolent Institutions. After the singing of a hymn William E. Amos, representative from the Child Care Board, spoke concerning the Child Care Program. The next item was the election of officers. Richard Shields was elected moderator, Jerry Kibbons, first assistant moderator, and James Fox, second assistant. George Gaddie was elected clerk and Ken Forman assistant clerk. Jeremiah Cox was elected treasurer and Hardin Hosey assistant treasurer. During the period of miscellaneous business Richard DeBell proposed an amendment to the constitutions that would allow churches to send alternate representatives for either the pastor or elected Executive Board members to the monthly board meetings. The motion was tabled until the next annual meeting. After several announcements the meeting was adjourned.

TUESDAY NIGHT SESSION

The meeting was called to order at seven fifteen. After the singing of a hymn Otis Bently read some scripture and led in prayer. D. L. Druien read the report In Memoriam. W. R. Davenport gave the Brotherhood report outlining seven objectives to work toward. J. B. Crawley reported for the Committee on Committees. L. D. Kennedy moved that the Committee on Committees be instructed to complete the report and be prepared to report to the next Executive Board meeting. The motion carried. William Rogers, representative from the state office, gave a report on State Mission activities. Homer Kirtley reported for the Resolutions Committee. George Gaddie announced that the Christian Education Committee had selected November 17 as Campbellsville College Day in the churches. Chester Badgett reported on State, Home, and Foreign Missions. William Binder, missionary on furlough from Nigeria, brought the missionary message. New officers were installed and W. R. Davenport closed the session with prayer.

DIGEST OF LETTERS

We are happy to report that letters have been received from all the twenty churches and missions in the association.

The letters reveal that progress has been made in most areas. Enrollment was up in Sunday School, W.M.U., Brotherhood, Church Music, and Vacation Bible Schools. Total receipts were up and giving to missions was up by over \$42,000.00. However there was a decrease of 36 in total baptisms and 108 in Training Union enrollment.

Several churches listed important historical events in the last year:

Brother Maurice Butler, pastor of the RAIKES HILL MISSION, was ordained to the gospel ministry.

Brother William Lee Wise was ordained as a deacon by the ELKHORN CHURCH.

The GREEN RIVER MEMORIAL CHURCH redecorated the interior of their building and installed a new sound system.

The FAIRVIEW CHURCH purchased a mobile home for their pastor.

After the resignation of Brother W. R. Beard, the LOWELL AVENUE CHURCH called Brother Richard DeBell to be their pastor.

Roy Hewlett resigned as pastor of the LIBERTY CHURCH and Brother D. L. Druen was called as pastor.

The SOUTH CAMPBELLSVILLE CHURCH ordained Douglas Clark, Donald Dabney, Jerry Inman, and Joe Ford as deacons. The South Campbellsville Church also put a new roof on their church auditorium and installed new carpeting in their nursery.

The CAMPBELLSVILLE CHURCH continues to sponsor three missions, all with pastors and regular services. The Campbellsville Church also purchased more land to be used for additional parking.

A total of 43 persons who were members of the Taylor County Churches passed away during the past associational year.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

First the committee would like to express appreciation to the churches for their cooperation and support of the efforts of the Christian Education Committee.

Sixteen of the twenty churches and missions in the association reported gifts over and above the amount going through the Cooperative Program for Christian Education.

The total amount reported through the church letters that was designated for Christian Education was \$31,601.00. Some of the churches were very liberal in their gifts. In light of the pressing needs of our schools we feel that these churches are to be commended.

The committee would like to make the following recommendations:

FIRST That we seek to enlist every church and mission in the association in making a contribution to Christian Education over and above the amount going through the Cooperative Program.

SECOND That each church be encouraged to elect one or more Christian Education representatives to work with the associational committee and to promote Christian Education in their church.

THIRD That we encourage each church in the association to set a goal equal to \$10.00 per resident member to be designated for Christian Education and that this amount be a part of the over all goal of \$72,000.00 to go to Campbellsville College designated as payment on dormitory debts.

“Now unto him who is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, unto him be glory...” Eph. 3:20, 21a.

Certainly God has blessed in wonderful ways in this past year at Campbellsville College. It is a privilege to report to you on some of them. Many problems and needs still face us. We accept these as opportunities for further service to you and to our Lord.

The major task of Campbellsville College as a Christian and Baptist institution is that of MINISTRY. We are in the business of serving the educational needs of Christian young people. Even in this sense of ministry, there is a more narrow and older concept which assumed that this ministry was primarily confined to providing what was called "an educated leadership."

While this is still a very vital phase of our operation, there is a much broader concept in which the ministry of Christian education should be viewed. Not only for those who will be the "leaders" as in the sense of pastors and other full-time Christian servants, but also for a much broader segment of our Christian population do we have a responsibility. We must serve as a bulwark against the cultural and social drift which is away from those values, truths, and concepts given by God in Biblical revelation. We have a responsibility to equip more people with a Christian world view. In this sense we are in the business of providing developmental opportunities for Christian young people.

Some would argue that such an approach to education is unrealistic and impractical. They persuade that to be mature as Christians, individuals must experience all of the attacks of the secular non-Christian world. Of course, there IS a danger in overprotection without adequate preparation.

But there are also two ways to become immuned to smallpox. One is to experience the dread disease. If you survive, you probably have immunity. This is a very high risk method. Many die. All suffer horribly. The survivor is usually scarred for life. The other way is by vaccination against the disease. Properly administered, a vaccine derived from the world of disease can become the way of victory over the disease.

At Campbellsville College—at any Christian college doing its job—we are in the "immunization" business in many matters that relate to educational, cultural, theological, and a moral diseases. One of our greatest tasks is to identify the malady and then adjust our program and personnel to provide proper immunization in the lives of these precious young people who come as our students. Please notice that I am making a vital distinction between living in a sterile, protected world of make-believe and in developing a condition in the human life that makes for victory over the disease.

I am pleased to be able to report that we seem to be making some significant progress in this direction.

Obtaining adequate financing continues to be one of our major administrative problems. Our income has been seriously curtailed by the decline in our enrollment. God has blessed marvelously with increases in gift support, with the 1973-74 year being the best ever in unrestricted gifts. The gap left by a smaller enrollment, and very low charges for a private college, has not yet been closed, however. I am also pleased to report that the College is the recipient of its most significant endowment gift in our history during this past year. I commend the churches of Taylor County for the response made by many of you in financial support through the Cooperative Program, and as many have gone beyond the Program in special support. I continue to appeal to all to realize that funds must come from sources other than the students to support an adequate college program. During the year it has been necessary for us to borrow certain funds for operating.

Much of the leadership for enlarged support has been given by the Christian Education Committee for the Association. I deeply appreciate these men, their work, and the opportunity of working with them.

While enrollment has not yet begun to increase, occupancy in our dormitories is increasing. This comes from a higher percentage of students living on campus as opposed to those who commute from home.

In December of 1973 the College received full reaccreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. This is excellent. It does not mean, however, that we are free from problems. We are required by the Association to make reports on how we have dealt with many areas in which they made specific demands and recommendations. These areas relate to our Library facilities, faculty salaries, and similar aspects—all of which involve our financial needs.

During the year Mr. Paul L. Rendleman began his work as Advancement Vice President. Coming from the field of banking, with a few years as business manager and minister of education for Ninth & 0 Church of Louisville, Mr. Rendleman brings an unusual combination of ability, experience, and dedication to this vital position. I am pleased with initial responses to his labors among us.

The dreams and plans for a totally distinctive Christian education program at Campbellsville College are being realized. By God's grace we will press on toward the achievement of this goal. We are handicapped by financial limitations, but we are persuaded that you and other of God's people will continue to respond with your prayers, your gifts, your Wills and bequests, and your young people to the end that this handicap will be removed.

We recommit ourselves to the task of serving God and you at Campbellsville College.

BENEVOLENCE REPORT

During the year 1973, the Baptist Board of Child Care has continued to respond to the multitude of needs that have come to us. Last year, 483 individuals inquired about our services. The Foster Home Program served 25 children in approximately 17 foster homes across the state. The Adoption Services dealt with 115 adoption inquiries—even though applications remain closed—and placed 13 infants. Family Counseling and Casework Services dealt with 36 people during this year.

The campus ministry at Spring Meadows and Glen Dale continues to be the focal point of our energy in terms of size, expenses, and program. Last year, the homes operated at near capacity, serving 208 children during the year.

The Thanksgiving offering fell short of the goal this year. We are nonetheless grateful for the \$362,592.00 which came in from across the state. Other gifts, wills, and bequests which we received were greatly appreciated.

The Kentucky Baptist Convention operates its program of hospital ministry through a board of Directors of Baptist Hospitals, Inc. Home D. Coggins serves as president. While most of the income received by the hospitals is from patients, the convention allocates approximately \$40,000 each year from the Cooperative Program and promotes the Mother's Day Charity Offering through the Sunday Schools. Included in this report is statistical information for each of the four Baptist hospitals operated by Baptist Hospitals, Inc.

CENTRAL BAPTIST HOSPITAL, LEXINGTON, was established in May, 1954. In September 1972, it opened and dedicated an addition at a cost of six million dollars which now provides 297 beds and 31 bassinets. The hospital received from the Sunday School Charity Fund \$11,019.94 and used \$7,122.58 in helping 17 patients with hospital bills. The sum of \$584,143.12 was charged off as bad debts, discounts, and other charity.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST HOSPITAL, LOUISVILLE, will observe its 50th anniversary November 24, 1974. The hospital has a license to operate 450 acute care beds and 47 psychiatric beds. There are 33 bassinets in the nursery. The hospital

received \$15,604.00 and expended \$17,318.00 in helping 29 patients with financial obligations from the Sunday School Charity Fund. The sum of \$588,779.00 was charged off as bad debts, discounts, and other charity. The School of Nursing continues to graduate well-trained nurses and is distinguished by being the largest diploma school in the state. Present enrollment is 221.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL EAST, ST. MATTHEWS, is approximately 70% complete and is programmed to begin operations on or before January 1975. The hospital will have 235 beds and 34 bassinets.

WESTERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS, PADUCAH, in October, 1973, dedicated a 6.5 million dollar addition and renovation program and simultaneously celebrated its 20th anniversary of service in the Western Kentucky area.

A capacity of 283 beds is available, including 5 beds in the cardiac care unit and 8 beds in the intensive care unit. There are 30 bassinets in the nursery area. The hospital received \$11,258.00 from the Sunday School Charity Fund and used \$8,986.00 to assist 12 patients with the hospital bills. An amount of \$488,851.00 was charged off to bad debts, discounts, and other charity.

Enlarge and enrich Church Training

Enlarge and enrich the Sunday evening congregational experiences through innovative methods involving inspirational music, Bible preaching, and Christian fellowship.

Traditionally, Sunday night has been important to Southern Baptists. The informal atmosphere, gospel music, evangelistic preaching, sharing in training groups, and after-church fellowship at church and in homes help to prepare the people who are gathered at the church building to go out to ministry throughout the community and the world.

Your associational officers and/or the Kentucky Church Training Department will be glad to assist churches as they plan their way of promoting Church: The Sunday Night Place.

This emphasis as it relates to all ages of Church Training will be featured in an evening meeting to be announced. In addition, experienced leaders for each age group will be sharing ideas and ways to make Sunday evening sessions exciting for that age.

As we look back over the year we recall that “M” Night attendance was 239. This year “M” Night will be on November 25 at the South Campbellville Baptist Church.

During the year there were no children and youth participating in the associational drills and events.

The Church Study Course for Teaching and Training is a vital part of the church’s training program. According to the reports of the first nine months of this

year, thirteen churches from our association requested 636 course credits in all categories.

According to the digest of letters, twelve churches and two missions out of twenty in our association reported a Training Union. Again in behalf of the Associational Organization and the Kentucky Church Training Department, let me offer our services to any church that does not have an organized training program.

Let's really make CHURCH: The Sunday Night Place for worship, for training, for fellowship. We can do it.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Sunday School Emphasis for 1974-75 will be "People to People," "Hello Baptist," and "Metro Reach." The "People to People" program places emphasis on reaching Adults for Bible study. "Hello Baptist" is a program which assists churches in finding and enrolling in Sunday School non-resident Baptists. "Metro Reach" places emphasis on reaching more people in the cities.

Last September Dr. Roy Boatwright led in three days of Sunday School Preparation for adults while other workers provided leadership for other age groups. Then last March we conducted a Sunday School workers' training course at Lowell Avenue.

There are twenty Sunday Schools in our association with a total enrolment of 3,511. This is a DECREASE of 87 from last year. There were nineteen Vacation Bible Schools this year as compared to eighteen last year. The VBS enrolment was 1,553, which is 50 LOWER than last year.

We would like to make these four recommendations:

- (1) That every church set a goal for an increase at LEAST equal to the number of elected officers and teachers.
- (2) That you make every possible effort to have a Vacation Bible School.
- (3) That you make every possible effort to have a January Bible Study and give it plenty of church-wide promotion.
- (4) That you encourage private and family devotions.
