Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as moderator. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the Association.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- 1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.
 - 2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the

Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies of minutes to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

- 3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.
- 4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II - COMMITTEES

- 1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.
- 2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.
- 3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.
- 4. The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

Proceedings

MONDAY NIGHT

The session was called to order by Moderator Richard Shields. James Campbell led in singing "Heavenly Sunlight." David Freshour read some scripture passages and led in prayer. J. Chester Badgett moved that all messengers present plus those who would later register be seated and make up the body authorized to transact business for the association. A roll call of churches revealed that eighteen of the twenty churches and missions were represented. J. B. Crawley moved that the printed program be adopted with whatever changes might be necessary to expedite the proceedings. The Moderator recognized David Freshour as a new pastor in the Association. The treasurer's report was read by Jeremiah Cox and approved as read. In the absence of Joe Asher, the auditor's report was read by the clerk and approved. The budget was presented by Gene Hall. Dr. Badgett moved that the prepared budget be amended so that the clerk's and treasurer's fees be \$250 instead of \$300. The budget was approved with the amendment. George Gaddie gave the digest of letters and the report of the Executive Board. After the singing of a hymn Homer Kirtley presented the Christian Education report. Dr. Randy Davenport gave a report on Campbellsville College. Ken Forman moved that the Association commend Dr. Davenport for the outstanding job he is doing as president of Campbellsville College. S. C. Blackburn gave the report on Christian publications. The moderator appointed some committees and the clerk reported that 91 messengers and 12 visitors had registered. Special music was provided by Marilyn Mays from Campbellsville College. Dr. Badgett delivered the annual sermon. The meeting was adjourned by prayer.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The session was called to order by Assistant Moderator Jerry Kibbons. After the singing of a hymn James Fox read some scripture and led in prayer. Department reports were read as follows: W.M.U. report by Wilma Gaddie; Brotherhood report by Dr. W. R. Davenport; Music report by James Campbell; Evangelism report by J. Chester Badgett; Mission report by Darrell Hunt; Lake Ministry report by Jim Pickens, Marshall Black made a report on Benevolent Institutions. The first part of the report was approved. Dr. Badgett moved that in place of the second part of the report, which had some recommendations, that the moderator appoint a committee of five persons to study the Child Care program and voice complaints to the Child Care Board and report back to the Executive Board. Following a congregational hymn, T. H. Shelton showed a filmstrip which gives emphasis to the 200th year of preaching in Kentucky. The following persons were elected as officers for the 1975-76 associational year: Richard Shields, Moderator: Jerry Kibbons, First Assistant Moderator: Marshall Black, Second Assistant Moderator: George Gaddie, Clerk; Ken Forman, Assistant Clerk; Jeremiah Cox, Treasurer; Hardin Hosey, Assistant Treasurer. Following the election of officers there was a miscellaneous business period. The following items were dealt with. The Moderator called attention to a proposed amendment to the constitution which would allow churches to have substitute lay board members. Dr. Badgett moved that the matter be tabled indefinitely. The motion carried. The Moderator appointed the following persons to serve on the special committee to investigate the Child Care program: Chester Badgett, Marshall Black, Darrell Hunt, J. B. Crawley, and Thurmon Eaton. There being no further business, the session was adjourned.

TUESDAY NIGHT SESSION

The session was opened by Moderator Richard Shields. After a hymn Gene Hall read some scripture and led in prayer. Mr. and Mrs. Tom Moore were recognized as visitors representing the Child Care Board. Charlie Devine gave the report "In Memoriam." Special music was provided by Richard Joiner from Campbellsville College. The clerk reported that all together 126 messengers had registered and 33 visitors. The following committees made reports: the Committee on Committees report was given by Charles Harris; the Nominating Committee report by Hardin Hosey; the Time, Place and Preacher Committee by Thurman Eaton; and the Resolutions Committee report by D. L. Druien. The Moderator recognized Tom Moore and asked him to say a few words about the Child Care Program. Following a congregational hymn J. B. Crawley gave the report on State, Home, and Foreign Missions. Special music was provided by the Campbellsville College Chorale led by Dr. Larry Tead. Bobby Evans, missionary on furlough from Malaysia, brought the missionary message. The Moderator recognized the newly elected officers. Dr. Badgett moved that the session be adjourned and Landon Hadley led in the closing prayer.

AUDIT REPORT 1974-1975

This is to certify that the undersigned has on and prior to this date made a careful examination of the records of Brother Jeremiah Cox, Treasurer for Taylor County Association of Baptists, covering the fiscal year of August 1, 1974 through July 31, 1975, and that he finds the books in good order and records of receipts and disbursements are correctly shown; that ledger, bank deposits, and record of disbursements have been checked and that all appear to be in complete balance, with checking account in Taylor County Bank balance as of today of \$3,046.99; that there was on deposit in First Federal Savings & Loan Assn. account # S-15416-3 as of 3-28-75 the sum of \$2,104.77, and in account #S-8680-3 the sum of \$673.66 as of 4-18-75.

HISTORICAL EVENTS

The SOUTH CAMPBELLSVILLE CHURCH purchased a church bus, rearranged some rooms, and did some painting. They also called a Minister of Music to serve on a part-time basis. MT. GILBOA installed new storm doors and windows, painted the outside trim and put a new roof on the building. MEADOW-VIEW completed their program of debt retirement. LOWELL AVENUE licensed Steve James to the gospel ministry. GREEN RIVER MEMORIAL licensed Mike Melton to the gospel ministry. GOOD HOPE purchased a new church bus and gave \$1,000 to a church near Mount Vernon, Kentucky. FAIRVIEW started a bus ministry and a radio ministry. The CAMPBELLSVILLE CHURCH purchased a \$40,000 lot to provide more room for parking and installed a new sound system. PLEASANT HILL purchased a new church bus, installed chimes, and began a radio ministry.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

On May 2, 1972, the Executive Board established the Kentucky Baptist College Scholarship Fund to assist Baptist students who wish to attend a Kentucky Baptist College. This is a united effort of Kentucky Baptists, a Baptist student's local church, and the Kentucky Baptist College of the student's choice with each providing \$100.00 per semester for a first year, full time, Baptist student. This makes available \$600.00 for the first school year. Campbellsville College has 76 of this type scholarships.

Among all of the private institutions of our state, total enrollments declined about 1 per cent. However, when we compare the enrollment of our Baptist colleges with the other private schools, there is a glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel showing a slight increase in enrollment. We are happy to report an increase at Campbellsville College. The present figure is 709, with 388 of these students residing in dormitories. Approximately 200 of these students are committed to full time Christian vocations.

The 1974-75 Kentucky budget allocated \$276,698 for capital needs and \$664,712 for operating expenses. This is only a small percent of the amount necessary to operate three colleges and two schools.

At the May, 1975 Executive Board Meeting the Christian Education Committee asked that as a general goal, 30 per cent of the Cooperative Program funds for Kentucky causes be allocated to Christian Education. The Executive Board approved this request. This will give our colleges some additional help.

Taylor County Baptists contributed to Christian Education this past year \$34,578. This represents approximately 10% increase over the \$31,601 that was given the previous year.

CAMPBELLSVILLE COLLEGE

"For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to do battle?" I Cor. 14:8.

This is my seventh report to the Taylor County Baptist Association as President of Campbellsville College. More than ever before my desire is to sound the right signals of leadership for Campbellsville as a Baptist College.

Some signals from these past years are evident as they relate to such factors as: the educational quality of our program including reaffirmation of regional ac-

creditation for the next ten years; the composition and Christian commitment of the student body including the lifestyle for the residence halls; the qualifications and commitment of the faculty; the relationships with our churches and the Kentucky Baptist Convention; and the rearrangement of our administrative structure to provide for significant outreach activities in the Advancement Program. There may be others.

I am pleased to present to all members of the Campbellsville College family this report of the college life and operation for the past year. My hope is that it will help every reader to know more fully what we are doing, to feel more deeply the sense of urgency for meaningful Christian education, and to respond more completely with prayers, gifts, and influence in meeting our needs.

No brief report like this can adequately bring to you the living, pulsing heartbeat of the campus and its people. In our presentation, however, we want to

make Campbellsville College live for you to the best of our abilities.

God is doing great things among the students, alumni, and faculty of your College. There is a spirit of commitment and achievement which is thrilling to see and to feel. Pastors and churches are sending students and gifts to support them in increasing numbers. Gift support has reached its highest level. Twenty-eight percent of the students are committed to Christian vocations — the highest percentage known to us in the college history. The enrollment decline which was so serious from 1967-1973 seems to have been stemmed and there is cautious optimism for a reversal of that trend.

Our greatest pressure remains in the financial area. The drop in enrollment naturally reduced income critically. Inflationary trends and rising costs have eaten away at the gains we have made in increased fund-raising. Heavy commitments from current operational income for debt service and debt retirement continue to keep us in a "crunch." Only a very small portion of the scholarship help which our students must have in order to attend college is funded by gifts.

We are so grateful to all who have sacrificed, worked, given, and prayed to make Campbellsville College a wonderful reality for these past sixty-nine years. I want to pay special tribute to the Association's Committee on Christian Education. Rev. George R. Gaddie and members, Dr. J. C. Badgett, and Mr. Homer Kirtley have exerted tremendous effort, not only in our Association, but also in the surrounding area in developing financial support for the College. Their goal is to underwrite the debt on Stapp Hall, the largest dormitory, with basic payments of \$72,000 per year. While the goal has not yet been reached, progress is being made toward that annual figure. We look to you for the prayers and support essential for keeping this splendid program of Christian education available to the young people of today and for those of tomorrow.

GIFT SUPPORT

Revenue from this source has more than tripled over the past five years. For 1969-70, total gifts were \$41,162 while in 1973-74, total gifts exceeded \$141,000. In fiscal 1974-75, more than \$162,000 in gift support was received.

Kentucky Baptist churches and those in other states have contributed more than \$96,000, the Campbellsville business community has given \$10,000, and College Alumni and other friends have given \$56,000.

STUDENT AID PROGRAMS

Although the cost of education has steadily risen in the past decade, opportunities for the student with determination have also multiplied. New programs have become available and old ones are continually being revised to meet the changing needs of students.

In the past academic year more than two-thirds of the students at Campbellsville received some form of financial aid. Most applicants were from Kentucky, and the largest number of out-of-state applicants were from Ohio.

Last year Campbellsville College matched \$200 per student with sixty-three participating churches through the Matching Scholarship Program. Twenty-four of the sixty-three scholarships were also matched by the Kentucky Baptist Convention.

Other church related scholarships include 15 Acteen scholarships, and 85 Christian service grants last year. Five years ago only 30 students received Christian service grants.

The college made numerous other aid awards including seventeen "presidential" scholarships and thirty-seven "trustee" scholarships.

THE ACADEMIC PICTURE

At the present time we have one of the strongest academic programs, with the best faculty that the College has known in recent years — perhaps in its entire history. We are grateful to God for this and want to commend the dedicated members of our faculty and staff for their continued efforts in this regard.

In addition to providing a traditional program in the liberal arts and sciences, we offer non-traditional academic and practical work in basic studies, occupational studies, preprofessional and professional studies.

A number of "internships" or field courses in which students can earn certain credits while they work in practical application of their areas of study have been started and others are planned.

With the addition of a journalism minor to the curriculum this year, Campbells-ville College now offers 29 different majors and minors, plus the 20 or more fields available through our Dual Degree Program with Georgia Tech.

ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

The physical plant at Campbellsville College consists of twelve major buildings situated on a thirty-acre campus. Three of those buildings are dormitories built between 1965 and 1967 with 100 percent financing, at a cost of \$2,068,659.

More than \$750,000 of this amount has been repaid, and the principal amount remaining is about \$1,300,000.

Debts on other campus buildings and other obligations bring the total amount of indebtedness for Campbellsville College to \$2,345,000 as compared to \$2,673,000 in 1969. The estimated value of our educational plant, and our endowment is \$5,700,000.

Though the college has had to borrow from local sources to meet some operating obligations, our total debt has been reduced year by year, as our expenditures for debt service and debt retirement have exceeded the amounts borrowed for operations.

No tax funds have been taken for operation, equipment, or facilities.

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT

Campbellsville College graduates in nearly every field of service, from teaching, Christian service and social work, to law, business and medicine reflect the involvement of Campbellsville's present students.

Nearly one-third of the members of our student body are preparing for Christian vocations in one field or another. Though enrollment has declined, the actual number of Christian vocation students has more than doubled in the past five years. Today 231 students are so committed, compared to 102 students five years ago.

Student service programs are being added and growing each year. Last semester 44 students gave their time through the social work field service program and similar programs are being added in other areas. The "In-service Guidance" program provides practical experience to students in the pastoral and religious education fields.

Seventy percent of Campbellsville students are Baptists. The remaining 30 percent represent fourteen other denominations.

COMMITMENT

* To be "Christ-centered" and "community-conscious" as well as "church-connected" is a large order, yet these are the ideals toward which we work. We believe we exist to meet the educational needs of central Kentuckians young and old, but especially the needs of Christian young people from all over.

* Campbellsville College strives to maintain a position compatible with that of the Kentucky Baptist Convention and its cooperating churches. We want everything

we do to be centered in, and honoring to, Christ.

* We will work constantly to strengthen our ties with our churches, and through our service to them, to be worthy of their students, their support, and their prayers.

* We are committed to provide educational opportunities for those who live in the areas around us; and as the need for life-long education for nearly everyone continues to grow, we hope to meet that need here.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST CHILD CARE

This past year was one of the busiest years in Children's work. Staff members are to be commended for the vast amount of energy and commitment that they have given in dealing with the very lives of children and young people. The needs and problems are representative of the kind of sin and sickness that so characterizes our society. We are grateful that Kentucky Baptists have staked out a claim to be present in the midst of such need in the good, strong name of Jesus Christ.

As the Board and the Homes continue to deal with children and families, the statistics seem almost overwhelming. Last year they had contact with 215 families who inquired about services. The Foster Home Program ministered to and with approximately 150 people, including foster parents, 42 children placed in 25 foster homes, and 41 families of children in foster homes. Family counseling, casework, and family aid dealt with 136 people during the year. Some of these people were helped in the context of their own families or family resources and, therefore, these families were kept from breaking up.

Glen Dale Home has 90 children and Spring Meadows, 75, for a total of 165 in the two institutions. This is less than half of the population served by the two

homes thirty-five years ago.

The Thanksgiving Offering last year was \$392,132.17 which is about 50% of the total budget.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Baptist Hospitals, Inc., operates the hospital ministry of the Kentucky Baptist Convention. The Board of Directors of Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is elected by the Convention. Homer D. Coggins serves as President. The combined budget for operations this year is \$35,773,409.00. The Convention allocates \$40,000 each year from the Cooperative Program and promotes the Mother's Day Offering through the Sunday Schools.

CENTRAL BAPTIST HOSPITAL, Lexington, Kentucky was established in May 1954 and in 1975 celebrates its twenty-first year of health care service.

WESTERN BAPTIST HOSPITAL, Paducah, Kentucky following its twentieth anniversary and dedication of an addition and renovation program, continued service to the community.

THE LOUISVILLE BAPTIST HOSPITALS, Louisville, Kentucky. The year 1974 was an eventful one in the history of the Louisville Baptist Hospitals. In November, an eight-day series of special activities marked the 50th anniversary of the opening of Kentucky Baptist Hospital and School of Nursing.

The School of Nursing had 226 students enrolled during the year. In the School

of Radiologic Technology were 20 students.

In September, 1974, the Louisville Baptist Hospitals assumed operational responsibility for the H. Hart Hagan Clinic in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Through action of the Oldham Circuit Court, the Louisville Baptist Hospitals officially took over the Mallory-Taylor Hospital at LaGrange in Oldham County, Kentucky, on January 1, 1975. That hospital has ten acute care beds, five holding beds, and 16 nursing home beds.

Baptist Hospital East, located on a 53-acre site in St. Matthews, Kentucky, accepted its first patients on March 31, 1975. It opened with 121 acute care beds and will increase to full capacity of 253 by September, 1975. Thirty-four bassinets are available. The hospital will employ over 600 persons. The Baptist East Doctors Building provides office space for 40 physicians, a branch bank, an apothecary, offices for Baptist Hospitals, Inc. and a canteen area.

In all the hospitals, 39,468 patients were admitted for treatment and 24,383 out patients were served. Babies born totaled 5,027 and surgical operations were 21.996.

\$1,777,337.80 was charged off for bad debts, discounts, and charity above the collections from the Mother's Day Offering.

- 4. Discussion in a 'fun' and love atmosphere.
- 5. Teacher knows our needs and interests."

These were the comments of the vast majority in attendance.

Obviously the groups that these youth belong to were performing a ministry—

- a ministry of learning
- a ministry of fellowship
- a ministry of love
- a ministry of understanding

Begin a "new day" with your church training program by using it as a ministry.

If your church does not have a training program, then the associational Church Training director working with Vernon Cole, Kentucky's director of Church Training will work with you in developing a training to meet your church needs.

In our association the "M" Night attendance for 1974 was 152. This year's

"M" Night will be on November 24 across the Convention.

This past year an opportunity was given for churches and missions with no Church Training Programs, in this association, to meet with State and Convention Church Training leaders. The purpose of the meeting was to encourage Churches without Church Training to start this Training Ministry. Six persons representing one Church and one Mission attended.

The Church Study Course for Teaching and Training is a vital part of the church's training program. According to the reports for the first six months of this year, two churches from our association requested 139 course credits in all categories.

According to the digest of letters 11 churches and one mission in our association reported a Training Union. Enrolment was 882.

I am assured by leaders in the Church Training Department, both from Middletown and Nashville, that Church Training is coming alive across the Southern Baptist Convention. I am further assured that churches with large numbers of baptisms have a strong Chruch Training ministry.

It is my prayer that more and more churches will come alive to and through a

Church Training Ministry.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

November 2, 1975 has been designated as High Attendance Day in Sunday Schools throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. It is our hope that every church in Taylor County will set attendance goals of at least 70% of the Sunday School enrollment and make every effort possible to break all attendance records on that date. Total attendance goal for all Sunday Schools in Kentucky is 250,000.

Outreach remains a major concern. For the year 1975-76 emphasis will still be on reaching adults.

There are 20 Sunday Schools in our association with a total enrollment of 3,772. This is an increase of 261 from last year. The V.B.S. enrollment was 1,573 which was an increase of 20 over last year.

Last December we conducted a January Bible Study preview with Dr. H. E. Coker leading. In April we conducted a county-wide V.B.S. Clinic at South Campbellsville.

EVANGELISM REPORT

The Bible makes it clear that every child of God must bear the responsibility of sharing his faith with somebody else. Cooperating with our fellow Christians we bear responsibility to spread the Good News worldwide.

All of us are encouraged by the fact that for the past several years Kentucky Baptists have increased their efforts to reach people with the Gospel. We are challenged in this Bicentennial Year, as we celebrate 200 years of preaching in Kentucky, to put a major emphasis on preaching the Gospel both privately and publicly. Statewide Simultaneous Revivals have been scheduled for 1976. We have chosen the date in Taylor County, April 4-11. The theme for 1975-76 is "LET CHRIST'S FREEDOM RING." Let us increase the tempo of sharing Christ so that a greater number can know real freedom in Christ Jesus.

We are being challenged to accept as our goal for evangelism to baptize at least five persons per one hundred members. During the past associational year our churches in the Association have baptized 186 people. We thank God that this is more than last year. If we accept the goal of seeking to baptize five people for each one hundred members, our goal for next year will be 315 people.

Our big cooperative effort in evangelism this past associational year was the wonderful tent revival on the campus of Campbellsville College with Walter K. Ayers as the preaching evangelist and Jerry Moore as the music evangelist. There were 15 professions of faith and a large number of re-dedications. In addition to the visible results, the strengthening of the ties of love which bind the hearts of our people and churches were greatly strengthened.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The emphasis for WMU in 1974-75 was mission action. "Love Thy Neighbor" was the WMU emphasis for 1974-75. This is an endeavor designed to involve families in mission action throughout the year and the whole church in at least one mission action project during the last half of the year. Thus, involving more than members of missions age-level organizations.

April 1, 1975, an eighteen-month focus on Training of leaders and members began called TIME, the acrostic of Training in Missionary Education. Concurrently

with this emphasis during 1975-76 will be an all out effort to interest young women (18-29) of all life styles in missions and enlist them in the WMU organization for that age group, Baptist Young Women. At the same time training them in Missionary Education.

The special mission offerings continue to grow gratifyingly due, no doubt, to the offerings and the larger enrollment in WMU and increased number of church-

wide offerings and weeks of prayer.

of the denomination.

MISSIONS REPORT

God and man both recognize that all men everywhere, regardless of race or color, have similar basic needs. First, of course, is the spiritual need to know God through his Son, Jesus Christ. Second, all men have physical needs: food, clothing, shelter, and medical attention. And last, all men need to grow in their understanding of God's will for their lives.

Christ made the mission of His church clear when he gave the Great Commission. He demonstrated by His life His interest in the physical needs of men as He fed them, healed them, raised them from the dead, and gave sympathetic understanding to their problems and frustrations.

One hundred years ago, in the 1874-75 year, Southern Baptists agreed on a plan of voluntary cooperation of churches whereby from the smallest to the greatest congregations could have a part in the world-wide outreach of the church. Just as the circles in a lake reach out from the stone thrown into the water, until they reach to the most distant shoreline, so the outreach of Baptist churches for over 100 years has gone from next door, to the next county, state, nation, and finally to the uttermost corners of the world. Through various state boards and through the Home and Foreign Mission Boards, Baptists continue the ever unfinished business of witnessing for Christ.

In 1974 the Home Mission Board received \$6,939,380.00 from the Cooperative Program and \$8,130,142.00 from the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering.

The Foreign Mission Board received a total of \$44,203,185.00, of which approximately 23 million dollars came from the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. The Foreign Mission Board supports 2,606 missionaries overseas, of which 191 are associate missionaries, 148 Journeymen, and two special medical teams.

Taylor County churches contributed \$96,467.00 this year to the Cooperative Program, compared to \$84,827 last year.

Our total missions offering of all the churches and missions totaled \$193,584.00 compared to an offering of last year of \$183,615.00.

May we continue to encourage the Baptist Men and Boys in the Brotherhood Program, and the Women's Missionary Program, with their Young Ladies Auxiliaries, as they serve as the arms of the churches which informs and inspires our membership to know more about missions and be actively engaged in missions.
