## Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting Annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as moderator. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the association.

## By-Laws

### ARTICLE I— DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

### ARTICLE II— COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers, and such other



officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

Missions committee given by Bro. George Gaddie. Bro. Gaddie moved the adoption. A week of emphasis on missions was announced by Bro. Danny Flanagan, to be held at College. Lake ministry report given by Randy Karshner. Bro. Karshner moved the adoption of his report. Evangelism report given by Bro. Ray Vinson. Bro. Vinson moved the adoption. Stewardship report given by Bro. Donald Gowin. Bro. Gowin moved the adoption. Congregational singing was led by Bro. Jim Campbell as we sang "We're Marching to Zion." The Kentucky Baptist Convention has a large commitment to Christian Education through five different institutions: Clear Creek Baptist School, Oneida Baptist Institute, Campbellsville College, Cumberland College, and Georgetown College. Because of its proximity to us and because of the large number of its graduates who are serving in the churches of our Association, Campbellsville College is especially significant to many of us.

How can Taylor County Baptists help to strengthen the cause of Christian education through Campbellsville College?

(1) By continuing generous gifts to the College through our association. These gifts not only help the College immediately, but they also inspire other associations and churches to do more.

(2) By individual churches putting the College in their budget or increasing the annual amount if already budgeted.

(3) By encouraging members to remember the College in their wills. Set up an appointment for such members to talk with Al Hardy or someone else from the Growth and Development Office of the College.

(4) By observing Christian Education Sunday and taking a special offering for the College if your church doesn't have it in your budget.

(5) By apprising your members of the fact that many companies match employee's gifts to the College. A list of such companies is available from the College.

(6) By praying for the College, promoting it through your good words, and sending as many of your young people to it as possible.

(7) By leading your church to vote to give \$200 in matching scholarship for the first year of any member's beginning education at Campbellsville College. If proper application is made before deadlines, this will be matched by \$200 from the College and usually \$200 from the Kentucky Baptist Scholarship Matching Fund of the Convention.

Enrollment for the training programs of our association was 830. Again in behalf of the associational organization and the Kentucky Church Training Department let me offer our services to any church that does not have an organized training program.

## **CHILD CARE PROGRAM REPORT**

The work of the Board of Child Care is but one facet of the Convention's program of outreach and ministry, and we are delighted that Kentucky Baptists continue to call this agency forth to deeper and better ministries than ever before. This is felt by questions and concerns that are voiced, by points of affirmation, and especially has been seen in the Thanksgiving Offering this past year, which totaled \$421,000.00. This is a record offering and the largest in the history of the agency. For this kind expression, the staff and board are grateful to God and to Kentucky Baptists, and covenant to be the best possible stewards of your contributions.

This year marks the beginning of implementation of a ten-year Long-Range Plan adopted and approved by the Board of Child Care. Part of this plan has been the establishment of two regional offices in Madisonville and Lexington for the purpose of getting our services more closely related to those who need them and to speed up the process of getting children in our Homes. We have been able to use existing staff by simply transferring them to these locales. We have had very positive and supportive experiences with the associations in those areas, especially with the Little Bethel Association in Madisonville and the Elkhorn Association in Lexington. During the coming year it is our plan to move one of the two staff members who serve the metropolitan Louisville area from the Middletown office and establish a fourth regional office. The regional offices have resulted in better communication and understanding

with our constituency and have speeded up the process of ministering to children and families in need.

The programs at the two Children's Homes continue to grow and increase in significance and number. On Spring Meadows Campus we have operated two cottages, containing twenty beds, as emergency shelters, and have served over one hundred different children during the past months. These children come to us out of emergency situations and stay for a very short period of time. Many find their way into the regular cottages at Glen Dale or Spring Meadows or into other aspects of our program; others are referred to more appropriate agencies or are often able to return home when the crisis is passed. Emergency Shelter has proved to be one of the most significant ministries we have developed in recent years.

The program of Christian Education at Spring Meadows has proved to be a most rewarding and productive kind of experience for the young people on that campus. Baptisms and professions of faith are an evident part of the program through local churches in the communities around Spring Meadows and Glen Dale. We are seeing an interesting number of children come to the campuses, already professing Christians, who move their letters and identify and establish themselves in local churches.

Glen Dale continues its very fine program of services to basically dependent and neglected children. We have seen a greater number of younger children coming into the program than we have for the last four or five years, resulting in two cottages at Glen Dale and one at Spring Meadows for elementary school-age children.

The Board of Child Care continues its program of infant adoption and ministry to unwed mothers, and has placed some thirteen infants for adoption in Baptist homes across Kentucky. The kind of healing that has happened in our foster home for unwed mothers — not only in the lives of the young women but within their families — makes our ministry there very worthwhile.

The staff expends a great amount of energy in this mission effort of Child Care with the realization that it takes more than just energy and strength. The power and presence of the Holy Spirit is a very vivid reality; for without it, none of our staff could do what they are presently doing. Kentucky Baptists are encouraged to continue their support of this ministry through prayers, personal involvement, the Thanksgiving Offering and the Cooperative Program.

### **BAPTIST HOSPITALS REPORT**

Baptist Hospitals, Inc. operates the hospital ministry of the Kentucky Baptist Convention. The Board of Directors of Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is elected by the Convention. Homer D. Coggins serves as President. The combined expense budget for operations this year exceeds \$51,000,000. The Convention allocates \$40,000 each year from the Cooperative Program and promotes the Mother's Day Offering through the Sunday Schools.

CENTRAL BAPTIST HOSPITAL, Lexington, Kentucky was established in May 1954 and in 1977 celebrates its twenty-third (23) year of health care service.

The report for the past year indicates 13,962 adult admissions, 2,084 babies delivered, 9,082 surgical procedures, 333,053 laboratory tests, 41,608 x-ray examinations. The hospital received from the Sunday School Charity Fund \$9,616.02 and used \$4,641.20 in helping patients admitted for care under the Fund. The sum of \$252,058.76 was charged off as bad debts, discounts and other charity.

WESTERN BAPTIST HOSPITAL, Paducah, Kentucky, is in its twenty-fourth year

of continuously serving the health needs of the community. An addition and extensive renovation program has been completed and with these improvements the community will be provided with some of the most up-to-date equipment and technology available in the health care field. The bed capacity is now 319 plus 27 bassinets.

During the past year there were 11,868 admissions, 1,653 babies born, 6,773 surgical procedures, 234,066 laboratory tests and 40,693 x-ray examinations.

The hospital received \$12,300 from the Sunday School Charity Fund and used \$21,732 to assist patients admitted to the hospital under this Fund. An amount of \$342,609 was charged off to bad debts, discounts and other charity.

Other information regarding services and programs of the hospital may be secured by writing H. Earl Feezor, Executive Vice President.

THE LOUISVILLE BAPTIST HOSPITALS include Kentucky Baptist Hospital on Barrett Avenue; Baptist Hospital East in St. Matthews; Mallory-Taylor Hospital in LaGrange; the Kentucky Baptist Hospital School of Nursing; the H. Hart Hagan Clinic at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and the Baptist East Doctors Building. Over 1,400 persons are employed by The Louisville Baptist Hospitals.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST HOSPITAL provided services as follows: Admissions 7,371; Outpatient Visits 16,031; Surgery Procedures 2,807; Laboratory Procedures 83,150; and X-Ray Procedures 26,601. The Sunday School Charity Fund provided \$14,485 for patients in need.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL EAST provided services as follows: Admissions 11,779; Outpatient Visits 38,774; Surgery Procedures 6,073; Laboratory Procedures 128,754; and X-Ray Procedures 37,504. The Sunday School Charity Fund provided \$8,650 for patients in need.

MALLORY-TAYLOR HOSPITAL provided services as follows: Admissions 378; Outpatient Visits 1,470; Laboratory Procedures 2,946; and X-Ray Procedures 2,405.

The SCHOOL OF NURSING continues to operate one of only two hospital based nursing training programs operating in Kentucky. In May of 1977, 58 students will be graduated.

In the spring of 1977, the Kentucky Baptist Hospital entered into a sharing cooperative arrangement with St. Anthony Hospital whereby the two hospitals will attempt to cut the costs of health care by sharing expensive medical equipment and services. The area will be renamed the Highlands Medical Center with each hospital retaining its name, legal identity and religious identity. An office building will be built next to the St. Anthony Hospital on Barret Avenue with a skyway connecting both hospitals into this office building for physicians. This is an exciting venture and should do much to keep the health care services on Barret Avenue viable for a long time. B. R. Brewer, Executive Vice President.

### **SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT**

The 1977-78 Sunday School emphasis will cover two major thrusts for Kentucky Baptist Churches and Associations: Outreach/Enlargement and Teacher Improvement. A growing Sunday School program includes planning and execution in one or more of the following five areas:

1. Administration and Organization
2. Enlisting and Training Workers
3. Providing Space for Enlargement
4. Outreach
5. Visitation and Follow Up

We recommend the following areas of special emphasis be considered a part of the long-range plan for growing and building a better Bible Study program:

1. Sunday School Preparation Week, September 25-October 2, 1977
2. Reach Out Enrollment Week, October 23-30, 1977
3. High Attendance Day, October 30, 1977

For the year 1977-78 special emphasis will be given to Adult Start-A-Class projects, Think Senior Adult, Small Church Sunday School Conferences and Action Campaigns.

The State Sunday School Department assists churches through area-wide or state-wide meetings, associational meetings, individual church conferences and personal consultation. In addition the department can assist local churches and associations in Church Architecture work, Vacation Bible School Clinics and workshops, Bus Outreach and other Bible Study ministries.

The department is staffed by Director, Fred E. Halbrooks, Associate, James E. Rennell, Office Supervisor, Mrs. Wayne Catlett and Office Secretary, Mrs. Velma Jeffries.

There are 17 church and three mission Sunday Schools in our association with a total enrollment of 3551. This is an increase of 59 over last year.

#### **VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT**

Sixteen of the seventeen churches in our association held V.B.S. this year. The one remaining church has a school scheduled for the first week in October. They have been in a remodeling and enlargement program in their building since early summer.

Four mission schools have been held giving us a total of twenty. The enrollment for all schools was 1,499, average attendance 1,213. These schools were in session 104 days or 257.5 hours the equivalent of 312,347.5 for one student. The total cost of the schools was \$2,374.60. The mission was \$550.21. There were six professions of faith and eight rededications and 131 new prospects for our Sunday Schools located.

I think the State Department of Evangelism is doing a wonderful job in keeping us informed what is going on, but we just fail to use some of the material which has been tried and proven to work.



Every Pastor in this Association tries to prepare his people for Revival. Well, "Lighting Revival Fires" is a wonderful program that you can use five Wednesday nights in a row in preparing your people for Revival.

Every Church should be concerned with reaching those who have been born again, but who are out of fellowship with God, or those who are not enrolled in any Sunday School. The ACTION Plan has been proven to be successful.

Growth Evangelism will be promoted throughout the year. Resources for assistance in church revivals, revivals in small churches, youth evangelism, lay witness ministry are available from the Dept. of Evangelism in Middletown.

The Kentucky Baptist State Evangelism Conference will be held January 16-17, 1978 at the Severns Valley Baptist Church in Elizabethtown.

Rev. Jay Brown was called to become the New Evangelism Director for the Kentucky Baptist Convention. Bro. Brown began his ministry April 1, 1977. Let's all pray for Bro. Brown as he begins his work. May we also pray for the men of our own Association who will be leading us in this field of work this next year.

## **MISSIONS REPORT**

### **DIRECT MISSIONS REPORT**

One of the characteristics of the Direct Missions Department is that it is always changing and seeking to encourage churches and associations that are being supported by the Direct Missions Department to move toward self-support or at least to pick up whatever amounts they can toward their own support.

During this past year, we had several churches where we have been assisting to grow to the point where they no longer need our assistance and are now self-supporting. When this occurs it enables us to assist other churches and associations that have needs.

During the past year personnel related to the Direct Missions Department showed the following statistics: Revival meetings 190, Sermons and addresses 10,000, Baptisms 900, Additions by letter 425, Other decisions 3,200, Vacation Bible Schools and backyard Bible clubs 254.

Effective June 1, 1977, the Direct Missions Department was greatly strengthened by the addition of I. Houston Lanier who became Mountain Missions Director and associate in the department. He will be working in the 34 counties in eastern Kentucky and directing the Mountain Missions programs.

### **HOME MISSIONS REPORT**

The Cooperative Program and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering are the sources of income which provide the major part of the Home Mission Board's 1977 operating budget of \$24,600,000. A portion of this budget is channeled back into the states to help fund various programs. Kentucky receives such funds each year to assist with the Direct Missions Department budget, the Evangelism Department budget, Cooperative Ministries and with the Summer Student Missionaries in BSU and Direct Missions.

The new executive director-treasurer of the Home Mission Board is William G. Tanner. He is the youngest man to head the SBC agency in a century.

The missionary force increased by 104 during 1976. At the end of the year 2,186

missionaries were on the field, augmented by 1,282 summer workers and 142 short-term adult volunteers.

New work was opened in American Samoa in midyear, in cooperation with the Hawaii Baptist Convention.

Associational Administration Service relates to 1,190 associations across the nation including Kentucky's 80. The department produced an associational committee manual which was made available to all directors of missions. Metropolitan Missions relates to 200 metropolitan areas across the United States. The program seeks to "identify priority needs, discover available resources and to use effective techniques for expanding and strengthening Southern Baptist work in associations related to metropolitan areas. This is enhanced by one priority of Bold Mission Thrust: helping churches minister in transitional-changing-communities."

The magazine **Home Missions**, which has a subscription rate of \$3.50 per year and can be ordered from 1350 Spring Street, NW., Atlanta, GA 30309, will keep you informed on the work of the Home Mission Board.

### FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

Appointments in November 1976 brought the number of Southern Baptist foreign missionaries above the 2,700 mark for the first time with a total of 2,713 missionaries assigned to 84 countries. The medical-dental volunteer program will attempt to fill more than 100 requests in 22 countries this year (not included is a medical project for 30 participants in Grenada).

Volunteers to serve in medical teams ready for immediate activation when disaster strikes overseas include 23 doctors, 7 dentists, 3 registered nurses, a pharmacist, and a surgical assistant.

Relief and Disaster appropriation since the beginning of the year include \$5,000 for earthquake relief in Turkey, \$20,000 for aid in Lebanon, flood relief in Indonesia, \$5,000. Prior to January and during 1976 appropriations totaled \$1,571,396, which is the highest since emergency relief efforts following World War II. Countries receiving aid were Guatemala, Ethiopia, India, Italy, Guadeloupe and Kenya. Funds are still available for emergency relief needs.

The first Baptist-sponsored simultaneous evangelistic campaigns to be held in Abidjan, Ivory Coast, resulted in 461 professions of faith, with 285 presenting themselves for baptism. Recent evangelistic campaigns held in 115 churches in Tanzania resulted in 1,585 professions of faith. Six teams of Baptist Nationals in Kenya have started 89 congregations and baptized 1,328 persons in a 14-week period, going from village to village.

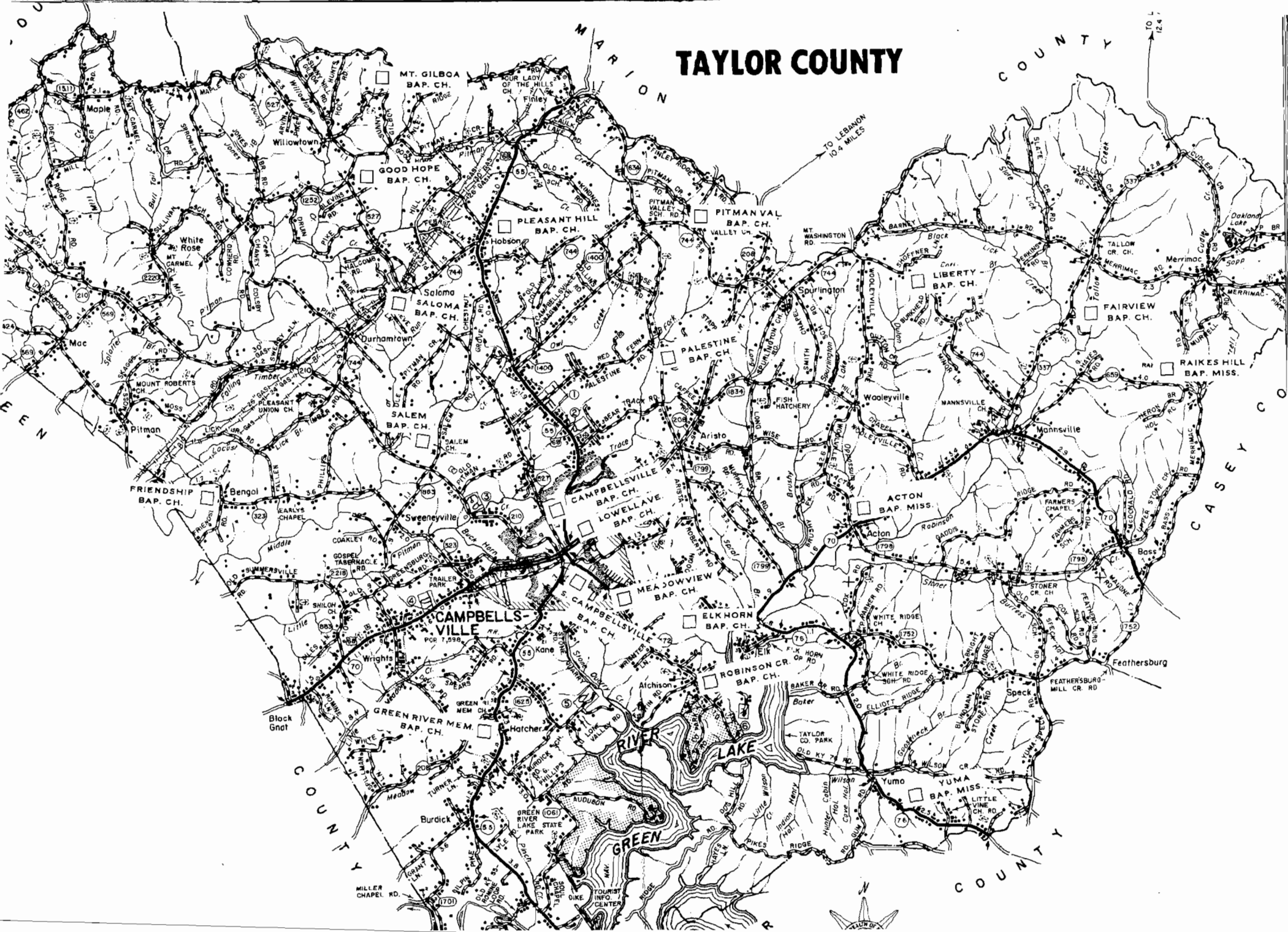
### W.M.U. REPORT

The missions committee of the Taylor County Association, with the assistance of Dr. Mike Watts and Dan Flanagan, visited the K.O.A. Camp and made arrangements with the manager to have services there during the summer months of 1977. Randy

Karschner was secured to lead the services. Services have been conducted there since May of this year.

The committee received a request from the Frankfort Baptist Mission in Frankfort, Ohio for some financial assistance. Paul McGuire, a former student at Campbellsville College is pastor. The committee is still in the process of gathering information about the mission and is not ready at this time to make a recommendation. They would like to have permission from the association to consider the request further and in case they feel that we should offer some assistance bring a recommendation to the Executive Board who in turn would be authorized to make a decision as to whether to grant the request or not.

The committee would like to further recommend if that assistance is not given to the Frankfort Mission, the Executive Board be granted the authority to support some other mission cause so long as they stay within the limits of the monies budgeted for that purpose.

The committee would like to commend the administration at Campbellsville College for the strong emphasis on missions and encourage the churches in the association to cooperate with the college in the mission emphasis the first of November of this year.

### **STEWARDSHIP REPORT**

The 1977-78 theme "Bold Believers in Giving Through a Ministering Church" is a stewardship emphasis designed to lead church members to a new bold direction in Christian living and giving, develop a greater awareness of world mission needs, and focus on the church's opportunity for ministry. The organization in your church responsible for carrying out this stewardship emphasis should be as simple and flexible as possible. In an effort to lead church members to become Christian givers, perhaps it would be well to raise two questions and then try to answer them.

#### **"WHAT IS CHRISTIAN GIVING?"**

Proportionate giving is the New Testament concept of Christian giving. Proportionate giving is both the guide and the principle of the distinctly Christian meaning of giving. The spirit of this giving is a full commitment and a joyful sacrifice as love.

The application of this principle and the development of this grace involves:

1. The bold declaration of the New Testament message on proportionate giving.
2. Helping the individual start where he is and grow.
3. A call for continuing individual growth in giving.
4. The Old Testament tithe as a model of proportionate giving.
5. A prayerful anticipation that each believer will become the gracious giver that God wills him to become.

#### **"WHY ARE MOST CHURCH MEMBERS NOT ALREADY PRACTICING THE GRACE OF CHRISTIAN GIVING?"**

1. Lack of understanding of the Biblical teaching of Christian stewardship.
2. Lack of awareness as to the real purpose of Christ's church.
3. The low level of leadership expectancy.
4. Lack of understanding the way the church and denomination handles money.
5. Apathy and selfishness.
6. Undisciplined spending and overextended credit buying.

#### **FACING THE ABOVE PROBLEMS**

Having listed some reasons why people do not give and the problems we face in trying to lead members to become Christian givers, let's attempt to find ways to overcome these difficulties.

1. Teach the Biblical meaning of material things. There is no better way to overcome the heresy that matter is evil or an end in itself, than a thorough study of the Scriptures.
2. An understanding of the purpose of the church. Again, a year-round promotion of the purpose of the church will result in an informed and committed church membership.
3. Leadership expectancy. Church leaders have a responsibility to teach the

Scriptures on giving and to expect a favorable response by the people. In this context, one should never be apologetic when we talk to Christians about the needs that should be supported or as we encourage them to give.

4. Build confidence in the way in which money is accounted. Constant effort should be made to inform correctly as to how the denominational agencies, institutions, boards, and associations operate.
5. Overcome apathy and selfishness. Receiving the proper vision of the purpose of the church and being able to relate each activity and program to the purpose will overcome apathy. A fresh look at the Great Commission with a renewed emphasis on reaching the lost, coupled with the reminder of the present world conditions (war, hunger, droughts, floods, etc.) will help accomplish this. God is a giving God. The Christian has the same nature. He needs to be led into the practice of giving. He is denied the blessings of a selfless life if he is not led to be a Christian giver.
6. Use money management materials. The church must be practical. Many members have gotten themselves almost hopelessly in debt by overspending, or by spending all their income to maintain a standard of living set by the community, and not necessarily by Christian convictions.

In summary, if any one thing is to be emphasized above all others it is leadership expectancy. Teach the people Biblical stewardship.

Some other Christian publications that I would like to recommend highly are **Home Life** and **Open Windows**. **Home Life** is published by our Sunday School Board and should be in every home. **Open Windows** is also a fine publication for daily devotions.
