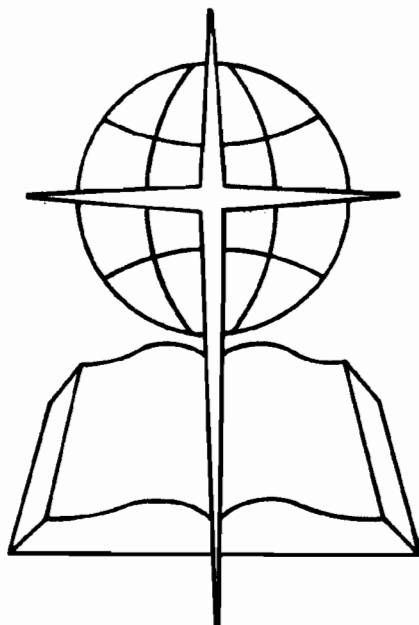

Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting Anually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as moderator. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the association.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

Program adopted as moved by Gene Hall with whatever changes may be necessary. Roll called - all churches present first night. Bro. John Pennington and Bro. Jakie Carmicle recognized as new pastors in Taylor County. Clerk reported. Treasurer reported - adopted. Auditor's report approved with the correction of Treasurer's first name. Budget presented and adopted. Bill Rodgers brought message as State representative. Bro. Gaddie appointed the following committees: Resolutions, J. Chester Badgett, Ch., Dr. D. L. Druen and Homer Kirtley; Time, Place and Preacher, Ray Vinson, Ch., Jakie Carmicle, Arthur Antle; Committee on Committees, Don Gowin, Ch., David Nelson, Bill Dillon, Earl Barnett. Special music by "Joyful Sounds." Bro. Thurman Eaton preached a sermon that should wake up some Christians.

Brotherhood report given and adopted. Music report given and adopted. Mission report given by Bro. Don Gowin and adopted. Lake Ministry report given by Bro. Gowin and adopted. Christian Publications report given by Brantley Parsley and adopted. Stewardship and Cooperative Program reports given by Bro. Harris and adopted. In Memoriam given by Ray Vinson. Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus led by Bro. Rolando Raganas. Committee on Committees report given by Darrell Hunt and adopted. Ky. Baptist Benevolent Institutions report given by Odell Leigh - adopted. Evangelism report given and adopted.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The 1979-80 Sunday School program in cooperation with Bold Mission will have two major emphases, each with four suggested projects. They are as follows:

Emphasis I: Bold Bible Teaching and Learning Projects

(a) Bible Venture Campaign

- (b) **One night Curriculum Workshop**
- (c) **Read the Bible through in 1980**
- (d) **Sunday School Leadership Diploma Plan**

Emphasis II: Bold Evangelism and Sunday School Growth Projects

- (a) **October--Outreach Month**
- (b) **Sunday School Evangelism Workshops**
- (c) **Adult-Start-a-Class**
- (d) **Starting new Sunday Schools**

I recommend that the Taylor County Association and churches seriously consider the above emphases and projects to be used in reaching more people for Bible study and growth.

Your State Sunday School Department assists churches through area-wide or statewide meetings, associational meetings, individual church conferences, and with personal consultation. Also, your association will have an assist team (Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team) that will be trained this year to work with each church in helping churches grow through Sunday School. Contact your Associational Sunday School Director if you need assistance.

The following associational events were conducted this year:

1. Leadership Training Clinic at the Lowell Avenue Baptist Church. There were 83 present representing 12 churches.
2. Vacation Bible School Clinic at the South Campbellsville Baptist Church, total attendance--140.
3. Sunday School Pastor/Director Workshop held at Campbellsville College; led by Tom Huls. There were 13 present with seven churches represented.
4. Ten churches and two missions participated in the BibleVenture Campaign. All churches reported a positive experience with BibleVenture Campaign and were looking forward to a good year in Sunday School work. Those churches participating were: Campbellsville Baptist, Elkhorn, Good Hope, Green River Memorial, Lowell Avenue, Pitman Valley, Pleasant Hill, Salem, South Campbellsville, and missions, Raikes Hill, and Yuma.

There are twenty Sunday Schools in our Association with a total enrollment of 3,720. This is an increase of 10 over last year's report.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

Sixteen of our seventeen churches in our Association held Vacation Bible Schools. All three missions held Vacation Bible Schools giving us a total of nineteen out of twenty churches involved in VBS. The total enrollment was 1,623, an increase of 36 over last year's report. CHURCH TRAINING REPORT 1978-1979

Examining Ephesians 4: 11-16 one sees that Church Training exists for the purpose of developing disciples. This is accomplished with both some old and some new approaches.

Since BYPU and BTU days, Southern Baptists have conducted training in groups or unions on Sunday evenings. While this continues a new training concept called Equipping Centers was introduced this summer. Small groups, large groups, or individuals can use Equipping Centers for training to meet special interests or needs. Equipping Centers are undated units of study in six major study areas: Evangelism and Missions, Family Life, Christian Doctrine, Leadership, Church and Community, and Christian Growth.

An exciting new dimension has been added to new member training. The Survival Kit for New Christians is an eleven week study designed for daily use by new Christians. It's purpose is to help new Christians make the transition from the old way of life to new way of life.

Church Training enrollment increased last year in Kentucky by 165. From October to April there were seventeen new Church Training Programs in Kentucky. Our association has no new Church Training Programs.

Our Associational "M" Night attendance in 1978 was 261. This year's "M" Night will be November 26, 1979 at Lowell Ave. Baptist Church.

Baptist Doctrine Study is suggested for April 14-18, 1980. The doctrine to be studied is the "Doctrine of Missions".

This year six children and youth participated in the Associational Bible Drills and Speaker's Tournament. Those qualifying to participate in the state event were: Teresa Clark from South Campbellsville Baptist, Teresa L. Skaggs from Pleasant Hill Baptist, and Jeff Arnold, Janice Arnold, and Michelle Jeffries from Salem Baptist.

On behalf of the associational organization and the Kentucky Church Training Department in Middletown, let me offer the assistance of the associational Church Training Director and state workers to any church in improving or beginning a Church Training Program.

KENTUCKY BENEVOLENT INSTITUTIONS

I. Baptist Hospitals, Inc.

Baptist Hospitals, Inc. operates four Baptist hospitals across the state. Mr. Homer D. Coggins serves as president.

The Hospitals are:

- (1) Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington with over 15,000 admissions per year. It has just finished 25 years of service.
- (2) Western Baptist Hospital in Paducah with 319 beds and 26 years of service.
- (3) Highlands Baptist Hospital and Baptist Hospital East serve the Louisville community. Over 19,000 admissions were registered last year in these hospitals, with over 1,500 employees.

Also serving the Louisville area are: The Kentucky Baptist Hospital School of Nursing, the H. Hart Hagan Clinic at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and

Baptist East Doctors Building.

The Sunday Charity Fund continues to provide free medical services for many charity needs from all sections of Kentucky.

II. Kentucky Baptist Board of Child Care

Reverend William Amos is the director of the Child Care Program. The two children's homes at Glen Dale and Spring Meadows stay filled to near capacity. In addition, the child care program provides a home for unwed mothers in Louisville, an adoption service which placed 14 babies last year, a foster home program with 25 spaces available across the state. In addition, up to 18 young people can be housed in emergency shelter for up to 45 days while other placements and permanent plans are made.

The Thanksgiving Offering made by churches across Kentucky this past year was \$473,525.58, the largest ever.

Meeting the needs of children and young people throughout Kentucky continues to be the objective of the Kentucky Baptist Board of Child Care.

EVANGELISM REPORT

We should be excited over the fact that Southern Baptists are taking seriously the command of the Lord to carry the Gospel to every person in the world. The main objective of the Bold Mission Thrust is to witness to every person in America by the year 1982 and to every person in the world by the year 2000. It will take personal commitment, prayer, and sacrificial giving to make this possible. The report of baptisms in Kentucky does not reveal that we are caught up yet in our part of this Bold Mission Thrust since we baptized only 16,016 people in the last reported year. It took 45 Baptists to reach one lost person. If we would make this one person won to Christ for every 28 members we could baptize over 25,000 in Ky. next year. Will you commit yourself to this end?

In Taylor County this last year we baptized 159 people. This is an increase of 54 over last year. We especially commend Pleasant Hill and Green River Memorial Churches for being the leading churches in Baptisms last year. Let us seek to follow the pattern which they have set for us.

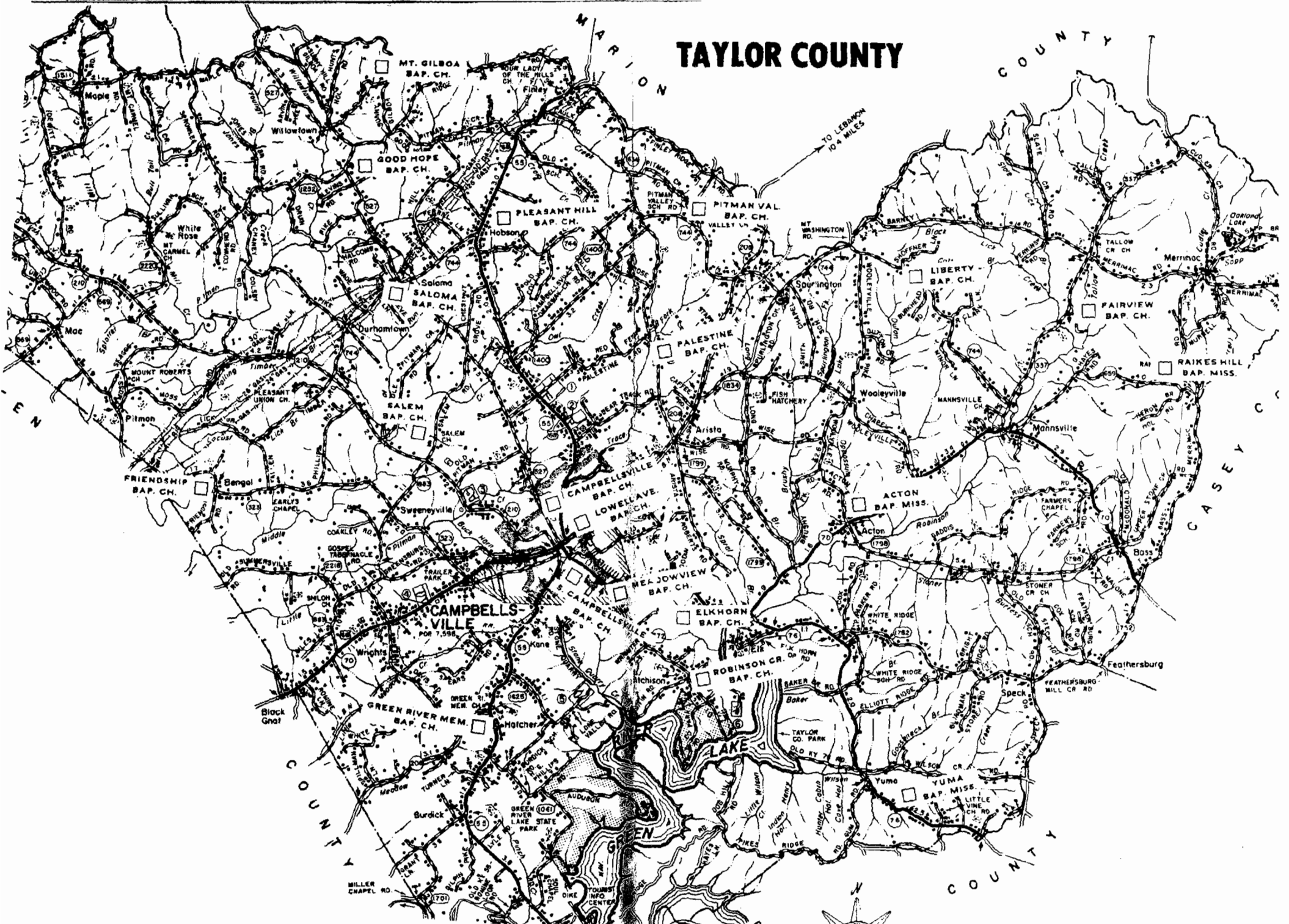

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

Earning a living is important to each of us, but quality education is not so much knowing how to earn a living as it is learning how to live. We begin to live as God intended when God, our Creator, and Jesus, our Saviour, are given first place in our lives. When we have done this, everything else begins to fall in place. This type of education can best be provided by our Christian schools, such as our own Campbellsville College.

One of the greatest needs is for committed witnesses in the world of business, law, government, education, communication, and other areas, as well as pastors, missionaries, and others in church-related vocations. Southern Baptists educational institutions, including those in Kentucky, must be training grounds for Christian citizenship development. Today, students pass through the classroom on the Baptist campus to become leaders of tomorrow's world community.

God continues to call young men and women to Christian service; therefore, our schools and churches must strengthen their partnership in preparing these people to engage in Christian discipleship.

Let us especially support Campbellsville College with our prayers and financial support as it enters the seventy-third year of dedicated teaching and training.

In 1972, the Kentucky Baptist Scholarship Matching Fund was established to assist Baptist students to attend our Kentucky Baptist colleges. During the 1973-74 school year, 62 students received help. This gradually increased each year with 144 students receiving scholarships this past year. Since the beginning of this program, the Kentucky Baptist Convention has expended \$106,050, the schools have spent \$106,050, and with the churches having met all these requests this means another \$106,050, or a total of \$318,150.00.

The Diamond Jubilee Campaign for Campbellsville College, seeking to raise \$1,920,000, is off to an excellent start. Let each of us resolve to stay on the job until this goal is reached.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

The theme of the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions in 1978 was "Tell It Out With Gladness." This explains the work of the Foreign Mission Board as it works as an agent of the SBC in sharing (or telling) the story of Jesus with people outside the United States. At the end of 1978 Southern Baptist foreign missionaries were assigned to 94 countries and territories, an increase of 4 during the year. Total Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board appointments reached a new high in 1978 for the third straight year. Appointments in all categories totaled 350, an increase of 25% over 1977. The reinforcements included 30 reappointments. The 181 new career missionaries exceeded career appointments in 1977 by 40%. Other new missionaries were 36 missionary associates, 95 journeymen and 8 special project medical workers. The net missionary personnel gain for the year was 130, the largest net gain since 1966. At the end of the year, the missionary staff totaled 2,906. This figure included 224 missionary associates, 183 journeymen and 12 special project medical workers. In projecting Bold

New Plans, which call for 5,000 missionaries on the field by the end of the twentieth century, Southern Baptists plan to do everything possible to reach their ultimate objective — to bring every man in every land around the world to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

Funds for carrying out the ministry of foreign missions come from Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, with some additional gifts contributed for specific purposes such as emergency relief needs. If we want to win the world to Christ, we must pray, give and “Tell it out with gladness” wherever we are.

Taylor County Baptists will want to join all Baptists in paying tribute to and thanking God for Baker J. Cauthen, who has served as executive director of the Foreign Mission Board for 26 years. We will continue our prayer support for R. Keith Parks, who will assume this post of executive director Jan. 1, 1980.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

“Walk in the Spirit” was the theme of this year’s State Missions Week of Prayer. If you would walk with me through Kentucky you would see at work — 42 directors of associational missions, 5 county missionaries, 4 community missionaries, 22 local missionaries, plus a good number of special missionaries.

You would meet 3 In-Service Guidance directors located at Clear Creek Baptist School, Campbellsville College and Cumberland College. These directors provide leadership for students in those institutions who serve as pastors in local churches. They also assist those churches in finding students to serve them. You would also see Christian Social Ministries at work in the Inner City as well as Rural Areas. Four different groups in Kentucky are being helped by the KBC through Language Missions. These groups are Korean, Chinese, Spanish and the Deaf. The International Friendship Programs are also ministering to many different language groups. There are more than 8,200 Internationals living in Kentucky as permanent residents.

We are told that in Kentucky one person out of twelve, 25 years old or older has a fourth grade education or less. In some sections of our state, one person out of five is a non-reader. This is the reason Kentucky Baptists are providing literacy workshops.

Because of our strong Baptist Colleges and Baptist Student Unions, we have a good many college students involved in summer missions — providing leadership in vacation Bible schools, backyard Bible clubs, working in census surveys and camps and resort areas, etc.

The State Missions Department is also charged with the responsibility of working with church building grants and loans. Churches that are involved in building programs can apply to receive a church building grant.

Let us pray daily for Robert C. Jones as he continues to direct our State Missions Department. Let us also, continue our support through the Eliza Broadus State Missions offering.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

Communities without need for special ministry are few. Most any concerned Christian can look around him and discover opportunities for mission service, but there are many obstacles. Southern Baptist leaders have realized from the beginning that we would confront barriers that would make it difficult for a single Christian or church or even state convention to cross alone. Knowing this, the SBC created the Home Mission Board and charged it with the responsibility for developing and promoting a single uniform missions program to assist churches, association and state conventions in crossing barriers to make disciples for Christ in the homeland.

The HMB works in all 50 states plus Puerto Rico and American Samoa. More than 3,075 missionaries, staff and office personnel serve full-time for the HMB. The HMB also involves around 28,070 volunteers and special workers on mission fields every year. The HMB also endorses more than 1,200 men and women chaplains in hospitals, institutions, industry and the military.

The HMB's ministries are funded by Southern Baptists giving through two channels, the Cooperative Program and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. Each one makes up about half of the HMB's total budget.

The theme for the 1978 Week of Prayer for Home Missions was "Dare to Ask." Do we dare ask ourself what we can do to spread the gospel in our homeland?
