Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting Anually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as a moderator. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the association.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptist in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all

Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4 The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

Proceedings

FIRST NIGHT AT PLEASANT HILL

1. The 23rd annual meeting of the Taylor County Baptist Association, composed of messengers from the churches, convened at 7 p.m., Sept. 15, 1980, with Pleasant Hill Baptist Church.

2. James S. Campbell led in singing "The Sweet Bye and Bye."

3 In the Absence of host pastor Thurman Eaton, Bro. Gene Hall, associate pastor, welcomed the congregation to their facilities. He read Luke 10:25-37 and led in prayer.

4. Upon motion by Bro. Joe Asher, it was declared that all registered messengers plus those who might register later make up the body to transact business. The clerk announced that 90 messengers and 30 visitors (not counting the College Chorale group) had already registered.

5. James Campbell moved that the program with necessary changes be adopted. Motion carried.

6. The clerk called the roll of churches. All were represented except Meadowview, Robinson Creek, and Pitman Valley.

7. Visitors recognized were Hobert Reynolds, pastor of First Baptist Church, Inez; Harold Holderman from the Child Care Program; and Forrest Sawyer, state Brotherhood Director. New pastors recognized were Bro. James Collison, Elkhorn, and Dr. Paul Horner, interim pastor at Campbellsville Baptist. Also recognized was Bro. Howerton, minister of music, Pleasant Hill.

8. The clerk's Digest of Letters was read and approved. Bro. Kennedy also read the Executive Board Report, which was approved.

9. The Treasurer's Report was read by Bro. Jeremiah Cox and adopted.

10. The Auditor's Report by Joe Asher was approved.

11. Bro. Charles Harris read the Proposed Budget for 1980-81 and moved its adoption. He noted that nothing was in it for continuation of The Baptist Hour radio program presently sponsored by the Association over WCKQ. Bro. Donald Gowin moved that we table Bro. Harris' motion until time of miscellaneous business. Approved.

12. "He Hideth My Soul" was sung by the congregation.

13. The moderator introduced Bro. Forrest Sawyer, secretary of Brotherhood work in Kentucky. Bro. Sawyer promoted the Bold Mission Church Leadership Meeting, requesting that we have it in our association. He also emphasized the importance of Bold Mission Thrust.

14. The moderator invited Bro. Holderman to speak about the Child Care Program. Holderman mentioned that they are now engaged in a building program.

15. The moderator appointed the following committees: Resolutions Committee--Jakie Carmicle, Chm., Marshall Black, James Hunt; Time, Place and Preacher Committee--James Collison, Chm., Alan Todd, Lynwood Newton; Committee on Committees--Ray Vinson, Chm., Charles Porter, Darrell Hunt, Don Watson.

16. James Campbell introduced the College Chorale directed by Dr. Larry Reid. The group sang several beautiful pieces: "Be Thou My Vision," "Did Christ O'er Sinners Weep and Shall Our Cheeks Be Dry?" and "Christ Whose Glory Fills the Skies."

17. Jerry Kibbons delivered a stirring annual sermon on "Meeting the Challenge of the Great Commission," from Mt. 28:19-20. He urged a revitalization of the pastoral and lay ministries of the churches, a reunderstanding of the meaning of and commitment to discipleship, and a strengthening of stewardship and the teaching ministry of the churches.

18. Bro. Charles Porter dismissed the session in prayer.

4 P.M., TUESDAY, SEPT. 16, 1980, AT MT. GILBOA

19. Steve Lamb, Green River Memorial's minister of music, led the congregation in singing "The Church's One Foundation."

20. Alan Todd read 2 Cor. 3:1-18 and James Collison led in prayer.

21. The Sunday School Report given by Donald Gowin was approved. He expressed concern that average attendance in Taylor County Baptist Sunday Schools has remained about the same for several years.

22. Vacation Bible School Report was given by Donald Gowin and approved. He announced that all churches and missions of the Association had a VBS this year. He urged VBS directors next year to send their reports to him.

23. Report of the Church Training Program by Jerry Kibbons was approved.

24. Mrs. D.P. Curry presented the WMU Report. Approved.

25. Bro. Harold Lee gave the Brotherhood Report in the absence of Dr. Forest Shely. Approved.

26. Music Report submitted by James Campbell was read by the clerk and approved. Bro. Raganas spoke to the report.

27. Missions Committee Report given by Jackie Carmicle was approved. Ken Bolin gave the Lake Ministry Report. Approved.

28. The Western Recorder Report was read by the clerk in the absence of Cary Pickett and approved.

29. "In Memoriam" Report led by Dr. Paul Horner was approved.

30. Congregation sang "To God Be the Glory."

31. Donald Gowin gave the report of the Committee on Committees. All nominees were elected.

32. John Pennington gave Kentucky Baptist Benevolent Institutions Report (as printed in the **Book of Reports**, pp. 6-7). Approved.

33. Gene Hall read the Evangelism Report in the absence of Thurman Eaton. Approved. Bro. John Pennington spoke to the report saying that South Campbellsville Church wishes to issue a challenge to the Association by setting the goal 100 baptisms.

34. Nominated by Jerry Kibbons, Bro. L. D. Kennedy was elected moderator. Dr. D. L. Druen nominated Gene Hall as 1st assistant moderator but Bro. Hall declined because of a conflict. Darrell Hunt, a layman from Mt. Gilboa, was nominated by Jeremiah Cox as 1st assistant moderator and elected. Dr. Druen nominated Charles Harris as 2nd assistant moderator but he declined. Gene Hall nominated Bro. John Pennington, who also declined. Bro. Donald Gowin, nominated by Coy Kidd, was elected.

35. James Collison was nominated as clerk but declined. Jerry Kibbons moved that the Executive Board be made responsible this year to elect a clerk and assistant clerk from their own group. Motion approved.

36. After nomination by Darrell Hunt, Bro. Jeremiah Cox was re-elected

treasurer. L.D. Kennedy nominated Margaret Redmond as assistant treasurer. Motion carried.

37. Donald Gowin's motion to extend time of this business session for 10 minutes carried.

38. Marshall Black moved the Association continue sponsoring The Baptist Hour program over Radio Station WCKQ for 30 minutes each Sunday morning. Gowin, Pennington, Raganas, Kibbons, Druien, and Kennedy spoke in favor of the motion. Motion passed.

39. Bro. Charles Harris, seconded by Dr. Paul Horner, moved we amend the Proposed Budget for 1980-81 to include underwriting The Baptist Hour. Motion passed.

40. Donald Gowin moved we bring the original motion on the Proposed Budget off the table. It was so ordered. Bro. Black moved we approve the Budget as amended in the previous act. Motion passed.

41. Host pastor L. D. Kennedy welcomed the Association to Mt. Gilboa's facilities and made announcements about the meal, restrooms, etc.

42. Dr. D. L. Druien led in prayer and blessing for the food.

7 P.M. TUESDAY, SEPT. 16, AT MT. GILBOA

43. James Campbell led the congregation in singing "The Lily of the Valley."

44. Bro. Don Watson read Psa. 63:1-4 and led in prayer.

45. Moderator recognized Bro. Hobert Reynolds from Inez, Ky., as visitor at this session.

46. Sunday School Recognitions were made by Donald Gowin. Churches that have increased in Sunday School enrollment: Fairview, Lowell Avenue, Mt. Gilboa, Liberty, Palestine, Robinson Creek, Saloma, Green River Memorial, Meadowview, and Elkhorn. Churches that have increased in Sunday School average attendance: all of the above ten churches plus South Campbellsville; Churches with the largest numerical increase in Sunday School enrollment: Mt. Gilboa, Lowell Avenue, and Fairview; Churches with the largest percentage enrolment gain in Sunday School: Mt. Gilboa, Liberty, and Fairview; Churches with the largest numerical average gain in Sunday School: Elkhorn, Green River Memorial, Saloma, Palestine, and Lowell Avenue; Churches with the largest percentage average attendance gain: Saloma, Lowell Avenue, and Fairview.

47. Darrell Hunt presented the Christian Education Report but yielded his time to Dr. W.R. Davenport who spoke on the Battle for Men's Minds as he promoted Campbellsville College. Report adopted.

48. Ray Vinson gave the Nominating Committee Report. All their nominees were elected: Sunday School Director, Donald Gowin; Church Music Director, James Campbell; Brotherhood Director, Forest Shely; Church Training Director, George R. Gaddie; WMU Director, Barbara Bault.

49. Don Watson gave the Report of the Time, Place, and Preacher, which was adopted.

50. Jakie Carmicle's Report of the Resolutions Committee was passed.

51. Congregation sang "Heavenly Sunlight."

52. James Fox's reports on State, Home, and Foreign Missions were approved.

53. Rolando Raganos, accompanied by Ann Coakley, sang a medley of songs on the theme, "I believe."

54. L.D. Kennedy gave a missionary message illustrated by color slides on "My Short-Term Missionary Stint in Brazil." Extra chairs were brought in to seat the congregation.

55. Terry Vale dismissed in prayer and the Association adjourned.

CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

Church Training takes its mandate from Ephesians 4:11-16 "...equipping the saints for the work of ministry...unity of the faith...knowledge of the Son of God...a mature man...fulness of Christ...no longer to be children...speaking the truth in love...grow up in all aspects into Him...the head, even Christ."

The title Ephesians 4 was used in connection with a series of conferences conducted in 57 associations. This would be something good for us in 1981. This Ephesians 4 Conference examines:

Survival Kit. "Phenomenal" is not an overstatement about the response to the Survival Kit. Many of our pastors have been examining this as a way to minister to new Christians. Also available now is the Leaders Guide for the Survival Kit.

Baptist Doctrine Study. The study area for 1980 is the Doctrine of Missions. In 1981 the doctrine to be studied will be the Doctrine of the Church. The suggested date for 1981 is April 19-24. A church might use this week or another for the age

group studies, or a group might choose to study the book itself. Another approach might be for the Pastor to preach or teach the book on Wednesday or Sunday nights. Some associations have even joined together and conducted the study in one central location.

The State Church Training Department is willing to come and do an Ephesians 4 type of conference in your church. If you are interested in knowing more about this conference or these materials, feel free to discuss it with me or the Kentucky Church Training Department.

Kentucky Church Training enrollment is up for the second year in a row. We all can be excited about over 1,800 additional people in our state enrolled in a discipleship program.

Let me pause here to tell you about what has happened this year in our association. We had twenty-eight attend "M" Night. We had five children and one youth to participate in the Bible Drills and Speakers' Tournament. The associational winners who advanced to the state were: Janet Arnold, Janice Arnold, and Jeffrey Arnold from Salem Baptist Church; and Gail Noe, Cami Moss, and Beth Martin from Campbellsville Baptist.

For 1980-81 Taylor County Association will do the following in Church Training: "M" Night will be held November 24 at _____ church. The theme will be "Equipping for Personal Growth in Bold Mission Evangelism. An associational emphasis on a study on the Doctrine of the Church will be encouraged in the spring. Our association will encourage youth and youth leaders to attend the Youth-Youth Leaders Workshop in Lexington, March 9-10 or in Madisonville, March 30-31. MUSIC REPORT

Our Church Music program this year has been involved in Bold Mission Thrust with the theme, "We Are Called To Be God's People." This missionary emphasis will be noted throughout the report.

The Associational Shoptalk emphasized "Music in Missions," stressing the importance of our church music leaders letting the church know about opportunities for its members to be involved in personal, direct missionary activities in foreign and home mission fields, as well as planning mission projects by choirs and other church groups. 58 Associational Shoptalks were attended by 1103 leaders from 522 churches in 64 associations during 1979-1980.

There were 144 other Associational Projects besides the Shoptalks in Kentucky during the year, with a total of 11,034 persons from 1,239 churches participating.

5,006 persons from 320 churches in 59 associations participated in various types of Regional Projects, including 15 Regional Music Festivals and music classes in 11 Regional Camps where the Church Music Department provided leadership.

Bold Mission Thrust was stressed in Statewide, Nationwide, and International Music Projects throughout the year, where choirs were encouraged to sing missionary messages and leaders were urged to involve themselves and their people in missionary projects in their own area as well as other parts of the world. People from our association were involved in a Missionary Choir Tour throughout parts of the North and East in the United States and in Southern Canada. This Tour was highlighted by a guest appearance in the Baptist World Alliance during the month of July.

Another significant occurrence this year is the increase in the enrollment reported for ongoing Church Music Personnel in our Kentucky Baptist Churches as reported in the annual church letters. 68,373 persons were enrolled this year compared to 62,814 last year—a dramatic increase of 8.85%. The national average increase was only 3% in the Southern Baptist Churches reported this year.

We are proud of the growth of our Kentucky Baptist Music Ministry, and that our Associations' churches are a part of it. The ultimate result is our own personal growth in serving God through the medium of music through our churches.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

Missions and its support is at the very heart of the Church. Just as individuals learn the grace of giving and are encouraged in growth, so must the Church. Helping the congregation to understand Southern Baptist Mission work, and particularly the Cooperative Program is an important task. Without a continuous mission emphasis, the membership will tend to think only of itself, and the many pressing local needs. So a continuous education program on missions and the work of the Cooperative Program is needed in each Church.

Our Southern Baptist Convention Program theme for 1980-81 is: "WITNESS TO THE WORLD THROUGH MY CHURCH."

In Kentucky, our 1980-81 Operational Cooperative Program Goal is \$9,000,000. Of this amount, \$5,850,000 or 65% will be used for State Mission Ministries. Our Bold Mission challenge Goal for Kentucky is an additional amount of \$3,000,000, making a total goal of \$12,000,000. The challenge goal dollars will be divided similarly, 65%--35%. Commitment to Bold Mission Thrust calls for specific action on our part as individuals and churches.

Each church is challenged to:

1. Give some amount through Cooperative Program for Bold Mission Thrust.
2. Increase percentage of the Church's total Budget giving through the Cooperative Program.
3. Increase the percentage of total budget income for the support of Associational Missions.

During the past year 1979-80, the churches of our Association gave \$187,213.00 through the Cooperative Program. Last year our Churches gave \$6,542.05 for Associational Missions. To keep faith with Bold Mission Thrust we need an increase in both of these figures.

Let every Church in Taylor County Baptist Association demonstrate a genuine concern for the commitment to World Mission support through Bold Christian Living and Bold Giving.

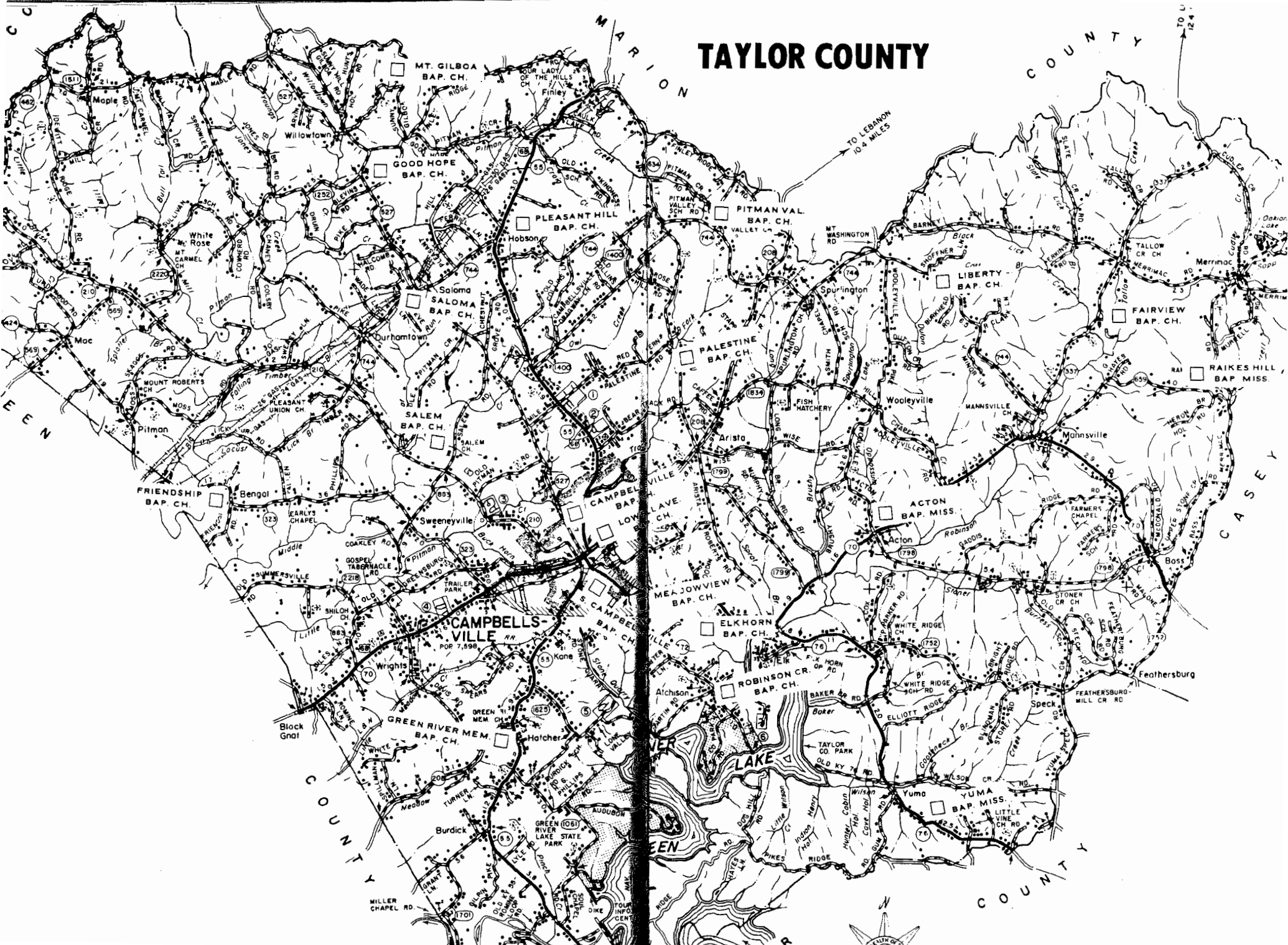

EVANGELISM REPORT

These are exciting times in the life of Southern Baptist and Kentucky Baptist as we take serious our Lord's command in sharing the Gospel to every person in this world by the year 2,000. If we are to witness to every person in America by the year 1982, Evangelism is the arm that can get the job done. It will take personal commitments, prayer, and sacrificial giving to make this possible. The report of baptisms in Kentucky and right here in our own Association does not reveal that we are caught up yet in our part of this Bold Mission Thrust since we baptized only 17,898. This is an increase of 1,882 over last year. It, also, means that it took 40.5 Kentucky Baptists to win one person to Christ. This certainly does not sound like we are setting the world on fire in Kentucky does it?

In Taylor County last year we baptized 169 people. This was 10 above the previous year. We especially commend South Campbellsville and Lowell Avenue Churches for being the leading churches in baptisms last year. Let us seek to follow the pattern which they have set up for us. If every Pastor and every Church and every child of God would take the challenge of Bro. Jerry Kibbon' in last evening's

message and apply it to our hearts we could very easily double or triple the number of people won to the Lord and baptized last year.

A Witness Workshop has been designed to assist churches looking for alternatives to the Lay Evangelism School. This workshop can be used on a weekend or Sunday night through Wednesday night. The sessions include basics in personal witnessing and a time of the practical application of witnessing.

The WOW (Youth Evangelism) Lay Evangelism School TELL Witness Training and the Witness Workshop programs can be arranged through the KBC Evangelism Department.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

The Kentucky Baptist Convention has a tremendous commitment to Christian Education through five (5) different institutions. Probably the most significant or far reaching action in recent years of the Kentucky Baptist Convention was the approval of fund-raising campaigns for our Christian education institutions. The future of these institutions and the future of Baptist in Kentucky will be greatly affected by these efforts.

The fund raising campaigns of our Baptist Colleges are significant and our Institutions may depend on their success for survival. Operating and building costs are rising faster than income. Our Baptist Colleges face much stiffer competition from tax supported schools every year, and increase in tuition and related expense have pushed Baptist School costs out of reach of many families except for scholarships and other financial aid.

All three of our Colleges are engaged in fund raising campaigns. In that they are

all going on at the same time could be an advantage. Ground rules for the separate campaigns for Campbellsville, Cumberland, and Georgetown cover the periods from January 1, 1980 to December 31, 1984. The permission is granted for pledges from churches and individuals for one and five years respectively. In organizing for these campaigns a committee was called together to take care of any measure of cooperation that could be worked out. The committee chose as its slogan "BOLD THRUST FOR KENTUCKY BAPTIST EDUCATION," Which Dr. Owens suggested, is appropriate to our overall engagement in Bold Mission Thrust.

From our College scholarship program 720 students have received assistance from the Matching Funds Program. The total funds expended from the Kentucky Baptist Convention since the program was begun total \$130,850.00. The participating Churches and Colleges each match this amount. The funds for next year seem to be adequate to provide for all students that have applied to date.

Clear Creek Baptist School exists to train men and women called to Christian Service after reaching mature years. Two courses of study are offered' A three year course with a major in theology, Church Music, or Religious Education, and a four year course for those who have high school diplomas or equivalent who earn a Baccalaureate degree in one of the above areas.

Oneida Baptist Institute is the only Kentucky Baptist School for Grades 7-12. It is possible to also have "Special Help" and vocational school opportunities. Twelve varsity sports, A work program, daily worship and Bible study all help to attract students from 18 states and 12 foreign countries.

"FOREIGN MISSION REPORT"

Foreign Mission--Total missionary staff (including journeymen, Missionary associates and special project) was 3,008. Total contributions of Southern Baptist was \$74,976,749. Cooperative Program receipts totaled 30,954,030 and Lottie Moon Christmas Offering amounted to \$36,217,473. Receipts for World Relief were \$3,090,523 with other contributions being \$4,714,723. Kentucky Baptist in the fiscal year 1978-79 gave \$1,402,650.65 through the Cooperative Program with designated gifts amounting to \$1,311,666.03. Kentuckians through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering gave \$1,227,384.94. At the end of 1979 Southern Baptist foreign missionaries were assigned to 95 countries and territories. One new field was entered during the year--Transkei, a new African homeland.

The Program of Evangelism and Church Development is that part of the mission effort central to the objectives of missions. With the help of missionary co-workers and resources from Southern Baptist, disciples will be made and matured in the fellowship of local churches. These local churches are encouraged into a cooperative

effort for continued outreach. The work is accomplished largely by national churches and leaders assisted by missionaries.

The Program of Schools and Student Work involves the training of national leaders which is essential to strong indigenous churches. In some lands where general education opportunity has not been readily available, missionaries and local Baptist have developed extensive school systems. In other lands, schools have developed to supplement the national education available.

The Program of Publication is an integral part of Southern Baptist overseas missions. Adequate supplies of all kinds of Christian literature are needed for the developing of vigorous churches.

The Program of Hospitals and Medical care serves the physical needs of thousands of people who would otherwise be neglected and often opens strategic doors for evangelism.

The Program of Benevolent Ministries handles Social Services ministries and is closely related in motivation and results to medical work. Such ministries include agricultural programs, good will and community centers, orphan homes and direct relief.

The major reorganization of the Foreign Mission Board staff proposed by Executive Director R. Keith Parks in seeking a more functional structure was approved by the board at its April meeting to become effective May 1. Dr. Parks title will become president.

It is the will of God that "none perish, but all have everlasting life." Let us join together in prayer that we shall be faithful to the commandments of our Lord in these matters.

"STATE MISSION REPORT"

"The decade of the '80's could be labeled the most pivotal decade in the history of our nation. This is the day for Southern Baptist to exhibit in our sacrifice and servanthood the exciting reconciling awareness that Jesus Christ lives!" So states William G. Tanner, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Home Mission Board. The forward thrust of missions for home and abroad rest squarely upon this present generation. The "Go ye", of the first century is the "Go preach, teach, and heal", for every disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ today.

As Taylor County Baptist we have a blessed privilege to share in the total outreach of denominational missions through the Cooperative Program and other special designated mission offerings. Last year Taylor County Baptist gave a total of \$316,218 to missions. Some are called out to go, many are called on to send. We who stay at home in the local churches have the responsibility and privilege to pray for and supply the financial needs of those who go to tell the Good News that Christ Lives. Together we are engaged in State, Home, and Foreign missions to the Glory of the Living Christ.

State Missions--Personnel of the Direct Missions Department, scattered all across Kentucky, seek to meet the Mission needs of our state. There are approximately 38 directors of missions who serve at the local level in the associations. Five county missionaries serve in under-churched areas in eastern Kentucky. Four community missionaries work in multiple church fields, pastor a church, conduct Bible home fellowships, backyard Bible clubs and distribute literature in several communities. Twenty-one local missionaries pastor congregations in strategic areas where the churches are too small to carry the full load of salary.

In the areas of Christian social ministries, language missions and in-service guidance 11 Home Mission Board related personnel serve. Some 75 people are supported through the Missions Department, and an additional 20-25 special missionaries have salaries supplemented by the Department. 35-40 student summer missionaries serve ten weeks in Kentucky each year.

Bold Mission Thrust opportunities are met by the Missions Department when the department matches larger churches, who have expressed a desire to assist a weaker church that has also requested help, in meeting a need or achieving some project that could otherwise not be realized. Between 75-80 churches have been linked in this endeavor by churches across Kentucky.

Direct Missions provided state missions personnel for the World Missions Conference held in 16 associations in Kentucky last year. A large number of people have been trained this past year in literacy workshops to teach people how to read. Financial assistance is provided to a seminary student who works with the visually handicapped people. Language groups ministered to by the Missions Department include Korean, Chinese, Spanish, Laotian and Deaf. The Department also shares information regarding the resettlement of refugees. Direct Missions Department is charged with the responsibility of administering Church Building Grants and Loans for the Convention. \$25,000 is made available each year for such grants through the Eliza Broadus State Missions Offerings.

If Kentucky Baptist are to bear their responsibility of finding and confronting every lost person in Kentucky with the Gospel by the year 1982, churches at the local level must become involved.

"HOME MISSION REPORT"

Home Missions--The year was marked by outstanding financial support by Southern Baptist for Home Missions. \$14,171,637 was received through the Annie Armstrong Offering, and \$12,549,644 came through the Cooperative Program budget.

On December 31, 1979, there were 233 Mission Service Corps volunteers serving under appointment. The goal for the near future is 2,500. 33,382 short-term volunteers supported mission endeavors. 2,922 persons were on the Home Mission force, and 103 persons were on the elected staff at the Board.

The Specialized Evangelism Department gave leadership for 26 Growing an Evangelistic Church Seminars and led in the production of two 30-minute color films.

Denominational endorsement was granted to 311 chaplains during 1979, for a new total of 837 full-time and active-duty chaplains and 561 part-time and volunteer chaplains.

The Church Loans Division gave counsel on church finance to some 1,600 churches.

Associational Administration Service assisted ten state conventions for continuing education for directors of missions and 30 state conventions for training and conferences to develop associational leadership.

Metropolitan Missions program provided urban training by conducting some 31 urban training events. Rural-Urban Missions continued its emphasis to needs of the more than 9,400 bi-vocational pastors by conducting 26 conferences. In-Service Guidance program is active in more than 40 colleges, seminaries and Bible schools in 15 states.

Christian Social Ministries provided \$81,800 to 11 state conventions for disaster relief. Missionaries work with singles in Los Angeles and with those training for the Olympics. Ministries were extended to groups such as the blind, families, and elderly.

Church Extension reported a total of 978 church-type missions started and 395 new churches constituted. At the close of the year there were 2,283 church-type missions in operation, sponsored by 1,548 churches.

Cooperative Ministries with National Baptist conducted four orientation conferences for black Southern Baptist. It held orientation conferences for 28 black seminary students who will be potential Southern Baptist Convention staff.

Interfaith Witness and Language Missions were active in their programs of helping to understand other faiths and to serve ethnic groups. The Home Mission Board assists Kentucky Baptist by returning a portion of Cooperative Program funds to Kentucky through its Direct Missions Department, Evangelism Department, and Cooperative Ministries/Christian Life Department.

SALEM—Ordained Daris Arnold and Jacky Arvin as deacons. Church is well into construction of our new educational building, hoping to have ground level ready for use by Nov. 1, 1980.

SALOMA—Built an addition to the church of nursery, Sunday School room, bathroom, and basement with a dining area.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Executive Board, composed of one pastor and lay member from each church plus all general officers and auxiliary heads of the association, usually meets on the 2nd Monday night of each month. We were unable to have our May and August meeting due to a lack of quorum (9 members). At each meeting the board hears reports from organizations and committees and discusses the work in the association.

At our Nov. 5 meeting the board voted to have an associational tent revival Sept. 7-14, 1980, instructing the Evangelism Committee to select the evangelist.

At our December meeting it was reported that the association had sent a love gift of \$200 to each missionary who had participated in our World Missions Conference.

On Jan. 14, Bro. Hardin Hosey resigned as clerk as he was moving to a pastorate at Buffalo, Ky.

At the Mar. 10 meeting the moderator was instructed to appoint a committee to investigate the possibility of the association sponsoring The Baptist Hour on Sunday mornings. At a called meeting on Mar. 21 the board voted to sponsor the 30-minute program over radio station WCKQ until the next annual meeting of the association. South Campbellsville Church surrendered to us their 8:30-9:00 A.M. time slot.

Motion was made by Dr. Badgett, seconded and passed, that, "In compliance with the request of the South Campbellsville Baptist Church the association hereby agrees that if it ceases to sponsor the Baptist Hour, the South Campbellsville Baptist Church will be given the first opportunity to seek to renew their church's broadcast at this prime time."

Announcement was made at the April 14 meeting that the TELL Evangelism machine purchased by the association has arrived and that the cartridges would come later. The machine will be housed with our other audio-visual equipment at the College Library. Also at this meeting the board approved Bro. Donald Gowin's recommendation that in September Taylor County Baptist have a parade and outside

speakers to celebrate the 200th anniversary of Sunday School. The board likewise approved Bro. Gowin's request that we have an Associational Sunday School Preparation Week in September to be led by regional age group workers if possible.

At a called meeting on April 28 several reservations were expressed about having Evangelist Jerry Brock for the Associational Revival. Decision was made to discontinue plans for the 1980 Associational Evangelistic Crusade.

At the June 2 Meeting, the board upon recommendation of the Missions Committee, voted to employ Bro. Ken Bolin to serve in the campground ministry. Also, to register the board's opposition to the advertising of alcoholic beverages in Taylor County, the clerk was instructed to write letters to the owner of our local billboards, Representative Herman Ratliff, and the local newspaper and radio station. A gift was presented to Dr. J. Chester Badgett for his many years of service to Russell Creek and Taylor County Associations.

WESTERN RECORDER REPORT

Imagine what it would be like not to have any newspaper to read, no radio newscasts to listen to nor television sets with which to see and hear the news. Sometimes we think we would like that but actually we would be bad off and could not participate responsibly in the society in which we live.
