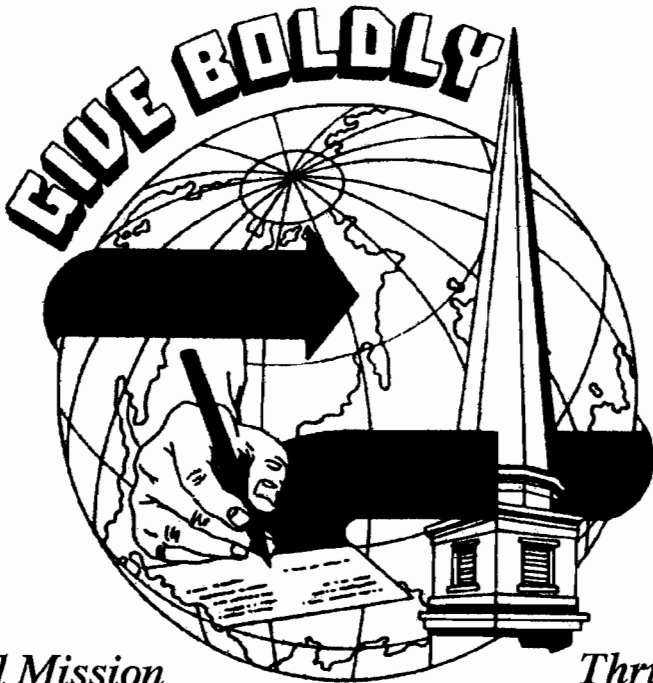

**CONSTITUTION**

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. This body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting Annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as moderator. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the association.

#### BY-LAWS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected, with the exception of the clerk who shall assume office immediately following his election.

2. The clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association; send five copies to the Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists in Kentucky; keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the Association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association, or money from any other sources; shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or Executive Board and the Association; he shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the Association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

#### ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, all Associational W.M.U. Officers, all Associational Training Union Officers, all Associational Brotherhood Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. The moderator during the first session of the annual associational meeting shall appoint the Committee on Committees. This committee in turn will appoint all standing committees. All other committees shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise specified by a separate motion.

**PROCEEDINGS**  
**FRIENDSHIP**  
**September 13, 1982**  
**7:00 P.M.**

1. Moderator Marshall Black called the first session of the twenty-fifth Annual Association of Taylor County Baptist to order at 6:59 P.M. in the Friendship Baptist Church.
2. Bro. Allen Mills led the congregation in singing "To God Be the Glory."
3. Host Pastor, Bro. Charles Harris, welcomed the Association to Friendship, read I John 3:1-3, and led in prayer.
4. The clerk moved that the present registered messengers as well as those registering later be enrolled. The motion was seconded and carried.
5. Bro. L.D. Kennedy, chairman of the Program Committee, moved that the printed program be adopted as the order of business for the association with adjustments to be allowed when necessary. The motion was duly seconded and carried.
6. The moderator recognized Bro. Bob Martin, spokesman for the specially appointed Credentials Committee, who read a letter from the Yuma Baptist Church requesting membership in the Taylor County Association. He then read the committee report in which the committee moved that Yuma's request be accepted. Dr. J. Chester Badgett seconded the motion and it carried.
7. The clerk called the roll of churches. All were represented except Pitman Valley and Raikes Hill Mission.
8. Dr. J. Chester Badgett, the association's first moderator, spoke commemorating this meeting as the twenty-fifth in the history of the Taylor County Association of Baptist in Kentucky. Dr. Badgett spoke of the early days of the association, its struggles between its historical ties with the Russell Creek Association and the desire to progress in the service of the Lord, and of some of the early members of the associational leadership.

Eleven people stood when he asked how many had attended the first associational meeting.

There were also eight of the association's moderators and three of its clerks—including those presently serving—present at the meeting.

Dr. Badgett spoke warmly of Bro. W.T. Chandler, the first clerk of the association, who was severely ill at the time of the meeting.

Upon the conclusion of Dr. Badgett's commemorative statements, Bro. Edgar Russell spoke briefly concerning Good Hope and Mt. Gilboa, which had entered the association from the East Lynn Association. He also gave the titles of the first two annual sermons.
9. Five pastors assuming duty since the last association meeting were recognized: Bro. Gabriel Collett—Palestine, Bro. Gilbert Sapp—interim at Liberty, Bro. Howard Beauman—Lowell Avenue, Dr. J. Chester Badgett(?) supply at Meadow View, and Bro. Howard Davenport—South Campbellsville. Bro. Grady Randolph, from the Kentucky Baptist Convention, was recognized as a visitor.
10. The clerk moved that the "Executive Board" report distributed as messengers registered be approved. Bro. L.D. Kennedy seconded the motion and the report was adopted.
11. Dr. Paul Horner moved that the "Digest of Letters" and "Historical Events" distributed upon registration be approved. The motion was duly seconded and these reports were adopted.
12. Bro. Jeremiah Cox, treasurer of the association for eleven years, brought the treasurer's report. Bro. Darrell Hunt moved for its adoption, and with Bro. Gabriel Collett's second, it was so ordered.

13. The Auditor's report was postponed, Dr. J. Chester Badgett moved that the books be audited and that the report be made to the executive board in time to be placed in the minutes. The motion was duly seconded and carried.
14. Bro. Homer Kirtley, chairman of the Stewardship Committee, brought the proposed 1982-83 budget to the assemblage and moved for its adoption. Dr. Chester Badgett seconded the motion. Discussion followed as Bro. Kirtley spoke to the item on the Baptist Hour and Bro. James Fox spoke concerning small amount set aside for Youth and lack of an allotment for Library. Several questions were asked and answered. At the "Question" the Budget was approved.
15. Bro. Mills led the congregation in singing "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing."
16. Bro. Grady Randolf, Kentucky Baptist Convention Representative, spoke first of all concerning the Kentucky Baptist Foundation. He then spoke of the Cooperation of Kentucky Baptist Associations with Bold Mission Thrust. He informed the association that \$1,209,000.00 had been received at Middletown in August through Kentucky Baptist Churches participation in the Cooperative Program. He concluded with reference to II Corinthians 8 as an example of "Boldness" and a basis for the Cooperative Program.
17. The moderator appointed the following committees:
  - a. Resolutions Committee: Dr. Chester Badgett, Chairman; Liz Shaw; and Vontress Jones.
  - b. Time, Place, and Preacher Committee: Bro. Harold Smith, Chairman; Darrell Blair; and Bro. Jesse Parker.
  - c. Committee on Committees: Bro. Don Watson, Chairman; Brian T. Wise; and Edgar Russell.
18. The special music was provided by the "Campbellsville College Singers," a group of six students, who sang a moving arrangement of "Heavenly Sunlight" and then "The Eyes of God Are Upon Me."
19. The moderator introduced Bro. Don Watson, who brought the annual sermon. The sermon title was "John Worked No Miracles." The main points to his sermon which entreated the listeners to "tell others of Jesus Christ" were:
  - A. Service is Superior to Signs.
  - B. Position is Preferred above Performance.
  - C. Rewards are more Real than Recognition.
 His text was from John 10:39-42 and he concluded his message with the statement, "May God bless you as we tell others that 'Jesus Saves!'"
20. Bro. George Ray Gaddie, former clerk and moderator of the association brought the first 1982 session to a close with prayer.

24. Mr. and Mrs. Chris Clark brought special music entitled "Because He Lives."
25. Moderator Black mentioned three items for possible consideration in the miscellaneous business session later:

- B. The possibility of amending Article 2 of the Constitution.  
 C. The possibility of appointing a committee to review various items on the Baptist Hour.
26. Bro. Darrell Hunt, First Assistant Moderator, accepted the gavel to preside over a portion of the afternoon session.
  27. Sunday School Director Don Gowin, gave the Vacation Bible School report and moved for its adoption. Bro. Black seconded the motion. It was adopted.
  28. Bro. Gowin then gave the Sunday School report and moved that it be adopted. With Bro. Jim Fox's second it was so ordered.
  29. The Church Training report was given by Bro. Bob Martin, who made the motion it be approved. Bro. Jeremiah Cox seconded the motion and it carried.
  30. Baptist Women's Director Helen Gray gave the report of Baptist Women. Bro. Don Gowin moved it be adopted. Duly seconded, the motion carried.
  31. Dr. Forest Shely, Brotherhood Director, gave the Baptist Men's report. He moved for adoption of the report, and with Dr. Chester Badgett's second, it was approved.
  32. Bro. Allen Mills, Music Chairman, gave the Music report and moved for its approval. Jim Campbell seconded the motion and it carried.
  33. As Missions Committee Chairman Don Watson was unable to attend the afternoon session, Bro. Don Gowin gave this committee's report and moved it be adopted. After Bro. Black's second, several items were added, after which the report was approved as amended.
  34. The KOA Summer Campground Ministry report was given by Bro. Tim Miller who moved for its adoption. The motion was duly seconded and carried.
  35. Bro. Howard Davenport gave the Christian Publications report and moved it be approved. The motion was duly seconded and carried.
  36. A. Bro. Gabriel Collett gave the Stewardship report. He moved it be adopted and with Dr. Chester Badgett's second, it was so ordered.  
 B. He then gave the Cooperative Program report and moved it be adopted. With Bro. Lynwood Kessler's second, the motion carried.
  37. Bro. Marshall Black again assumed the post as moderator and recognized Bro. Hunt to give the In Memoriam report. Bro. Hunt read the list of members deceased since last the association met and led in an In Memoriam prayer. He moved the list of names be included in the minutes. Jim Campbell seconded the motion and it carried.
  38. Bro. Allen Mills led in a unison reading of several verses of scripture, and then led the congregation in singing "To Worship, Work, and Witness."
  39. Bro. Jerry Kibbons, chairman of the Committee on Committees made the following motion:

In order to give continuity and stability to the work of our Committees and the work of the Association we recommend that each standing committee be composed of 3 members to serve on a rotating basis.

That this year the members be elected to 1, 2 and 3 year terms and that 1 new member be elected each year hereafter to a 3 year term of service.

In the event of a resignation, move, or death, the Committee on Committees recommend to the Executive Board a replacement to fill out the remaining term of service.

We further recommend that the Moderator serve as an ex-officio voting ber of the Program Committee.

And, that the Treasurer serve as an ex-officio voting member of the Stewardship-Budget Committee.

The motion was seconded, at which time Moderator Black turned the gavel over to Assistant Moderator Hunt and spoke to the constitutionality of the motion. Bro Kibbons, Dr. Randy Davenport, and Dr. Chester Badgett also spoke to the motion. At the question, the motion carried by a vote of 25 to 23.

- Bro. Kibbons then presented a list of names composing the various committees and the terms of service of each member. He moved these be elected. With Bro. Gabriel Collett's second, the committees were elected.

    - G. Assistant Treasurer—Bro. L.D. Kennedy nominated Mrs. Margaret Redmon for this position. Bro. Darrell Hunt moved for her election by acclamation. This motion was duly seconded and carried.
    - H. Auditor—Bro. Jeremiah Cox nominated Bro. E. Poe Young for auditor. Jim Campbell moved for election by acclamation, and with Bro. Darrell Hunt's second, the motion carried.
  43. Miscellaneous Business Session. The following business was transacted.
    - A. Dr. J. Chester Badgett made the motion that the moderator appoint a committee to write a history of the first twenty-five years of the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptist. Bro. Jerry Kibbons seconded the motion and it carried.
    - B. Jim Campbell recommended that the association change Article 2 of the Constitution to read "Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members or major fraction thereof above the first one hundred (100) members. Note: the italicized words are to be added. The action on this recommendation will be taken at the 1983 annual session.
    - C. Bro. Jerry Kibbons moved that the moderator appoint a committee to study the By-Laws and to bring possible recommendations to the 1983 session. Bro. James Fox seconded the motion and it carried.
    - D. Bro. Don Gowin moved that the moderator appoint a committee to study the acceptance of the **Baptist Hour** as to whether it merited the size allocation in the Budget it receives and to consider youth needs with possible recommendation of more funds provided in the budget. Bro. James Fox seconded the motion. Bro. L.D. Kennedy moved to amend the motion that it also include a study of the feasibility of the K.O.A. Ministry. The



amendment was seconded by Bro. Jeremiah Cox. Bro. Jerry Kibbons and Dr. Chester Badgett both spoke to the motion and its amendment. At the question on the ammendment, it carried. There being no further questions a vote was taken on the motion as recommended. It carried.

- E. Bro. Jim Fox moved that the Committee on Committees select a Youth Committee who would in return suggest a Youth Director who would be elected by the executive board and responsible to the youth committee. Bro. Bro. Jerry Kibbons seconded the motion and it carried.
44. There being no further miscellaneous business, the session was adjourned and Bro. George Ray Gaddie led the closing prayer, which also served as a blessing on the bountiful meal which followed.

**AUDITOR'S REPORT**

Dear Sir:

I have studied the financial statements presented by you to the Taylor County Baptist Association for the year ended July 31, 1982.

During the course of my study, nothing came to my attention that would lead me to believe that there has been mispresentation to the association concerning the above.

I would also like to take this opportunity to make the following recommendations:

1. The association should consider converting its regular checking account at Taylor County Bank to a Now Account. During the year from August 1, 1981 to July 31, 1982 the association maintained an average balance of \$2,097.28. This average monthly balance would have earned approximately \$10.00 per month at 5.25% interest or \$120.00 for the year. The conversion from a regular checking account to a Now account would cost nothing.
2. The savings account at First Federal Savings & Loan should be included in your monthly treasurer's report.
3. The savings account maintained at First Federal Savings & Loan has had no activity, excluding interest income, since the initial deposit of \$1,000.00 on

January 29, 1980. This account should be converted from a passbook savings account to some kind of time deposit account, such as a 90-day certificate, to maximize the earnings of the money.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT**

The theme for 1982-83 is 'Church Growth.' This has been adopted by both the Southern Baptist Convention and the Kentucky Baptist Convention. In order to fulfill its part, the Sunday School Department has two emphasis:

I. Sunday School Growth Projects:

1. 8.5 by '85 (8½ million enrolled in SBC Sunday Schools by 1985) Kentucky's goals are: Victory Goal of 398,472; Challenge Goal of 426,105; and Hallelujah Goal of 466,195.
2. October--Outreach month.
3. Sunday School Growth Campaigns
4. Starting New Sunday Schools
5. Standard Recognition (Sunday School, Department, Classes)
6. People Search

II. Improvement of Teaching:

1. Associational Sunday School Leadership Training Schools
2. Weekly Workers Meeting
3. January Bible Study

It is suggested that we as an Association and as churches choose to study the above projects that will enable us to reach more people for Bible Study.

The Kentucky Sunday School Department stands ready to assist Associations and churches in any of these areas. Also our Associational Assist team is ready to help individual churches incorporate any of the suggested projects into their program. Your Associational Assist Team are:

This past year your Associational Assist Team led in three Preparation Clinics using the Basic Book Series of study. Total attendance was 114 persons with just a small percentage of our churches participating. Our Assist Team led in the Vacation Bible School Clinic.

At our Annual Associational Meeting last year we recognized the following churches: Largest percentage enrollment gain went to Pitman Valley with 38%; largest numerical gain went to Elkhorn with 49; largest numerical average attendance gain went to Elkhorn with 41; and the largest percentage of average attendance gain also went to Elkhorn with 44%.

The total enrollment of the Sunday Schools in our Association is 3,787 with an average attendance of 2,193. This is a total increase in enrollment of 129 over last year's report.

Last year a challenge was made to set the following goals for our Association: Victory Goal of 3,693; Challenge Goal of 3,782; and Hallelujah Goal of 3,898. We reached our Challenge Goal and exceeded it by five. **TO GOD BE THE GLORY!!**

Recommendations for this year:

2. That each church set a goal to increase their Sunday School enrollment by 2.7%.

### VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

This year 16 of our churches held Vacation Bible Schools with a total enrollment of 1,582. This is a total increase over last year of 85 pupils enrolled.

The really bright spot in our report is that 16 professions of faith were recorded in our Vacation Bible Schools. Out of the eight schools that sent in reports, 296 prospects were discovered.

We held our Vacation Bible School Clinic at Campbellsville Baptist Church. There were 52 people in attendance with nine churches represented.

Three (3) churches held either a Mission Vacation Bible School, or a Backyard Bible Club. Four (4) churches reported having an **Advanced** Vacation Bible School this year.

Only eight (8) out of 17 of our churches reported the results of Vacation Bible School this year. So all of the statistics except enrollment are probably low and incomplete.

### CHURCH TRAINING REPORT - 1982

Church Training can take place anytime, anywhere a study group gets together. The first few weeks in a convert's life are most crucial and there is a need to get a solid foundation from the start. The "Survival Kit for New Christians" can be studied individually or in a group and is a good way way to get new members grounded in their faith.

Church Training not only provides training for new Christians, but opportunities for all Christians to grow in discipleship. In addition to the current Church Training materials ordered from Materials Services, the Church Training Department offers:

Equipping Center Modules in six different areas

Bible Drills for Youth and Children

Masterlife, an 'in-depth' discipleship course for Adults

DiscipleYouth, a discipleship and evangelism course for youth.

Kentucky churches have shown an increase in Church Training for the last four years. Last year, 53 Kentucky associations had an increase in enrollment this year, 1982, our enrollment is 1,043 for an increase of 210 over last year. Thirteen Children qualified to attend the State Children's Bible Drill at Cedarmore. Four young people qualified for the State Bible Drill and two of them came away with top honors. Two young people, (Malissa Jones of Lowell Ave. and Steve Cave of Good Hope), won the associational Speakers Tournament and represented the association at the state level.

Seventy-three participated in the Church History Writing Conference held at Campbellsville College. "M" Night services were held with the Elkhorn Baptist Church. Eighteen churches were represented by 105 people.

## CHURCH MUSIC REPORT

"Reaching children through music" has been our theme for 1981-82. It was also the theme in our shoptalks (associational church music leaders conferences) which were held in 60 associations and were attended by 1,189 people from 460 churches. In these shoptalks the leaders set goals for beginning a new children's choir or youth choir in 154 of the churches.

Our association had 28 persons representing 13 churches at our shoptalk held as a dinner meeting at the Topper Restaurant on February 25, 1982. Mr. Don Spencer, Associate Director of Music for the Kentucky Baptist Convention led the Shoptalk which focused on curriculum and organization of children's choirs.

The ongoing enrollment in church music personnel in churches, reported on the annual church letter, increased from 74,677 to 80,818 statewide this past year. Seventy-nine churches reported their enrollment for the first time bringing the total to 1689 churches in Kentucky.

Here in Taylor County we had increases in several of our churches with 18 churches reporting a total music enrolment of 861 - an increase of 98 over last year. The summer of 1982 saw the beginning of an associational Youth Choir as well as excellent participation in the Associational Crusade Adult Choir.

The theme for the coming year's emphasis is "The Instrumentalist in Our Churches."

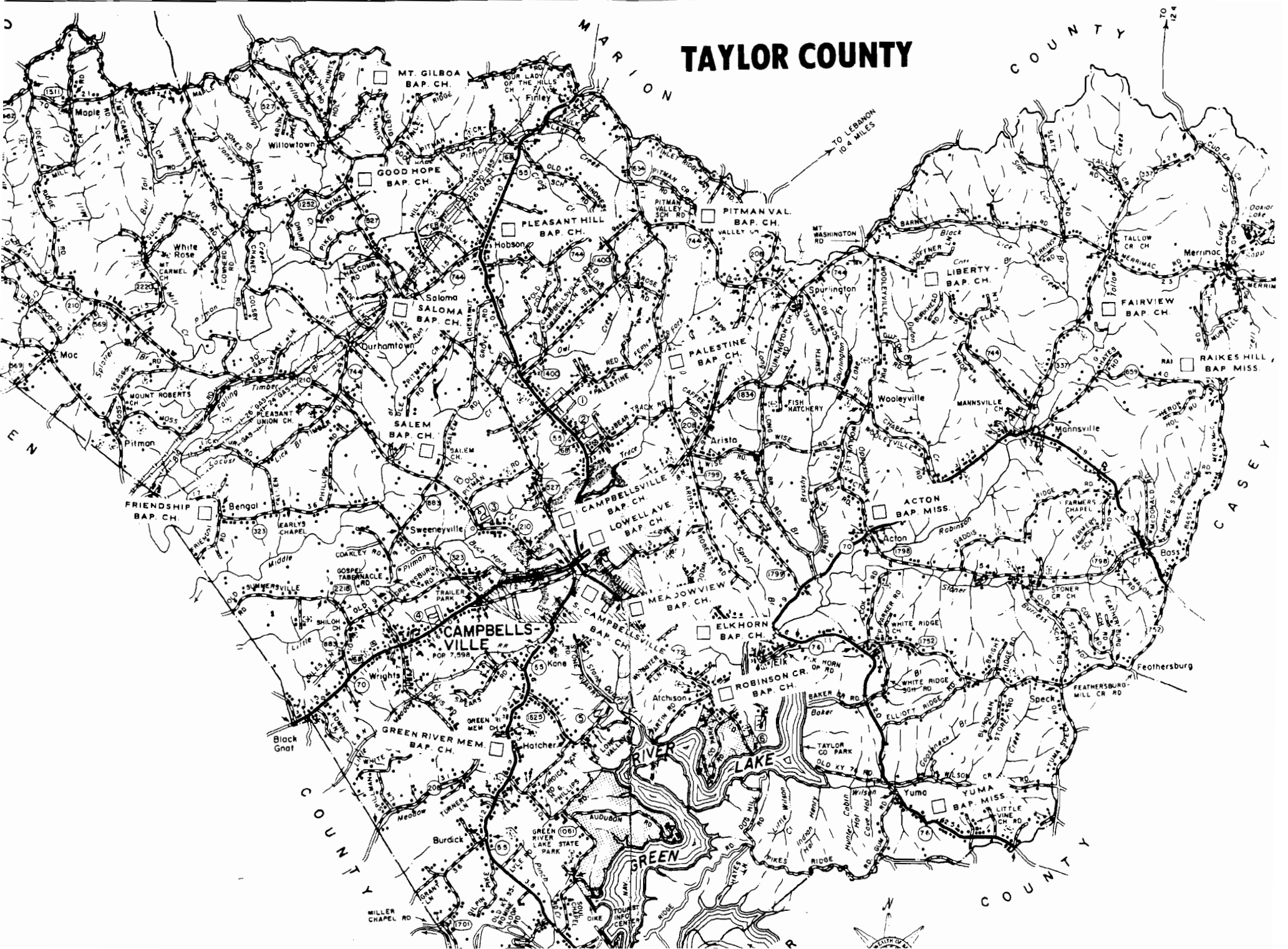
## COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

## MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

Several of our churches were involved in mission work or activities during the associational year.

Campbellsville Youth involved themselves in painting Fairview, and Buddy Lee served as a journeyman missionary in Kenya. Several members went to Ohio and were involved in a mission project. Forty youth sang in the churches throughout Kentucky and other states on a choir trip.

Elkhorn Youth visit Metzmeier Nursing Home and lead a devotional each Tuesday.

Robinson Creek through a project raised \$500.00 which was sent to Lonnie Turner, missionary in Zambia, for the purchase of Bibles.

### EVANGELISM COMMITTEE REPORT

In 1981 Kentucky Baptist baptized 21,148. This was 426 fewer than the year before, but is still commendable. We did not reach the Bold Mission Thrust minimum goal of 10% increase for our state.

The total baptisms in our association was 158. This is equal to the year before.

In 1982 the major evangelistic thrust for Kentucky Baptist was a Statewide Simultaneous Revival effort April 4-25. These revivals were conducted in fifty-two associations.

Statewide Evangelism Seminars were conducted in Ashland, Somerset, Hartford, and Princeton. The subjects discussed at the seminars were: Building Evangelistic Worship Services; Evangelistic Preaching; Evangelistic Invitations; Evangelistic Music, and Evangelism Planning.

The State Evangelism Department also held eight Interfaith Witness Conferences this year in Elizabethtown, Danville, Richmond, Corbin, Henderson, Paducah, Walton, and Carrollton. Subjects discussed were: Mormonism; Jehovah's Witnesses; The Way, International; and The Unification Church.

A Youth Witness Training Conference held June 4-5 in Louisville used the basic materials of the WOW School. Youth were trained to use a short model gospel presentation and to give an invitation to accept Christ.

From 1982 through 1985, there are four goals for evangelism in Kentucky:

1. Increase baptisms 15% per year.
2. Each church should conduct one or more revivals each year.
3. Each year, two hundred (200) Churches should begin Continued Witness Training.
4. Train 5% of the resident membership in the Kentucky Baptist churches each year in personal witnessing.

In 1982, the Taylor County Baptists took seriously these state goals and participated in the Statewide Simultaneous Revivals with nine of our seventeen churches participating. We conducted a county-wide Evangelistic Crusade for Christ at the Taylor County High School Football Stadium with Dr. Ray E. Roberts, Asheville, North Carolina as the evangelist. R. L. and Beth Sigrest, Yazoo City, Mississippi, were music evangelists. All of Taylor County's Southern Baptist Churches and missions supported this crusade.

Every pastor, church leader, and church member is asked to pray for and participate in a continued effort to reach people for Jesus Christ.

### **BENEVOLENT INSTITUTION REPORT**

There is an increasing need today for wholesome Christian care of dependent, neglected, and abused children. The reason the need is greater than ever before is the tremendous impact of a changing socio-economic order. The relaxing of moral/ethical standards, as well as many other pressures, has taken its toll on the American family. Children who are deprived of family and home can be helped. Assisting children and young people grow into healthy, well-adjusted, mature and responsible individuals is the purpose of this ministry. Baptist Homes for Children provides excellent facilities, a positive atmosphere, and supervision to enhance the children's development of their inborn, God-given talents, believing that a person can know the good life only if rightly related to the Source of goodness—the Lord Jesus Christ.

The lives of 751 children representing approximately 676 families have been affected in a significant way by the total services of the Homes for Children during the ten month period of September 1981 through June 1982.

Together, all units provided homes for 317 children, representing 287 families to whom counseling and other supportive services were given.

Regional workers provided information, counseling and/or referral services to an additional 434 children and their families.

The ministry to dependent, neglected, and abused children requires steady and liberal support. We are deeply grateful for the generous support which Kentucky Baptist have given over the years.

#### **STATE MISSIONS REPORT**

One might normally think a report on Direct Missions would talk about activities that have taken place in the Kentucky Baptist Building, but this is a report of people from every part of the state of Kentucky. It has to do with pastors of local churches where salary is supplemented, with county missionaries where they may serve in a county where there is only one Southern Baptist Church, they may serve as a communities missionary where they pastor a local congregation and work in additional communities. They may be involved in Christian Social Ministries, language missions, associational missions, or they may be a person who receives some travel expense money from school to a church field.

One change in personnel in the Missions Department this year occurred when I. Houston Lanier retired and he was succeeded by F. Ross Figart, Jr., as associate in the department and director of missions in Boone's Creek Association with previous pastorates at Hazard, and at Vanceburg where he served as county missionary. His expertise in working at the associational level and knowledge of people in eastern Kentucky make him adequately suited to do the work in mountain mission program.

Several conferences that were held throughout Kentucky give indication of some very important things that were happening in mission work. A large number of missionaries and pastors attended a meeting at Ridgecrest last September, called Missions in Context. The conference had to do with church growth and how to interpret the census to enable our churches to reach people in their field. A PACT conference is underway in Long Run Association as they seek to do some strategy planning to cope with many of the changes that are taking place in a metropolitan area such as Louisville.

The Mountain Missions Conference was held at Oneida for the 33rd time, a conference where pastors and lay people can come for Bible study, as well as receive new insights into approaching common tasks that prevail in that region. A missions workshop for associational directors of missions provided opportunities for discussion of common problems and ways of solving them. A conference for the deaf was held. It was partly planned by the deaf people as well as those who interpret for the deaf.

The Kentucky-Ohio project has been coordinated through the Direct Missions

department. More than 135 Ohio churches and 115 mission sites were identified by the Ohio Baptist Convention as needing assistance. At the time of this writing, approximately 50 of those needs have been met by our Kentucky churches and associations. With more than 7 million lost people in the state of Ohio, Kentucky has a wonderful opportunity to lend assistance to our neighboring state.

A strong emphasis has been given during the past year toward encouraging churches that are being supplemented by the Kentucky Baptist Convention to move toward self support. During the past year, two such churches assumed full responsibility for the pastor's salary and another promises to do so later in the year. One association will become self supporting.

A strong emphasis has been given to literacy work with the first state literacy workers meeting being held. There have been six literacy workshops conducted during the past year. Regional Bible studies were conducted all across the state for deaf people. During the past 16 months, we have discovered or started a new language group each month.

In the Missions Department and through all the people connected with it out across the state, we continue to urge our churches and associations to do more for missions both at home within the association, the state so that our nation and our world can be reached for Christ and that we can carry out the Great Commission of our Lord.

### **HOME MISSIONS REPORT**

Although not without its problems, 1981 was a banner year in Southern Baptist Home missions...because churches responded to the pressing needs of our land.

At year's end, the Home Mission Board had 3,074 missionary personnel on the field and 274 support persons in Atlanta. More than 30,000 had volunteered to serve as temporary or part-time missionaries through Mission Service Corps and Special Mission Ministries. Over 400 new churches had been started.

Though barely keeping up with inflation, both Cooperative Program contributions to home missions and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering reached new highs.

Work assigned to the Home Mission Board was coordinated through four sections: two program sections, Evangelism and Missions; two support sections, Planning and Services. The assignment included 13 different Southern Baptist Convention programs. Some 1981 highlights follow:

The Personal Evangelism program involved 165 churches representing 30 state conventions in the pilot phase of Continuing Witness Training, a promising new approach to local church, pastor-led witness training.

The Mass Evangelism Department assisted three states in media campaigns and helped Baptist churches conduct a media blitz in two large cities. The department assisted in more than 20 crusades and provided tents to assist five states in revivals/crusades.

Evangelism Development Division assisted 26 state conventions in strategy and budget planning and completed material for a major training course on youth evangelism/discipleship.

Associational Evangelism Department offered training to 110 associational evangelism chairmen. The department gave special attention to smaller churches through a series of small-church evangelism conferences.

Specialized Evangelism Department helped hold 22 "Growing an Evangelistic Church" Seminars. National evangelism consultants for family, women and ethnics aid training sessions. An average of 360 new persons enrolled in the Correspondence Bible Course each month. Through the Special Assistant in Spiritual Awakening the

first national conference on Spiritual Awakening was conducted in 1981.

The Chaplaincy Division endorses Southern Baptist chaplains for military services, institutions, hospitals and business industry, and provides support and promotion to their ministries.

Church Extension reported more than 1,100 new church-type missions were parted during 1981 and more than 450 were constituted as churches.

Language Missions Division assisted with intensive language missions efforts three cities; 41 new units were started among 17 ethnic groups.

Missions Ministries Division increased emphasis on evangelism and church growth through ministry.

Black Church Relations Department continued to assist: National and Southern Baptist churches, associations and state conventions in cooperative efforts.

Christian Social Ministries Department provided disaster relief funds of \$8,900 of five state conventions. More than \$80,000 in designated hunger relief funds were distributed. Major emphasis for 1982 will be "strengthening family through ministry and for ministry."

### FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

"We are committed to doing evangelism that results in churches. We will often do much more than that, but we will never do less than that."

Bold Mission Thrust must be more than a motto; it is a mandate. It is a contemporary expression of an eternal commission. The Foreign Mission Board is continually looking at ways in which the vision set forth in Bold Mission Thrust can become a practical reality.

The Board's annual report highlights some encouraging signs as well as some sobering realities. The good news is that God has used ordinary Christians, missionaries and national leaders to bring about growth. The sobering picture comes when we view the multitudes beyond the reach of anything we are doing to share the gospel.

**MISSIONARY SUPPORT**—As 1982 began, 3,136 missionaries, including 2,688 career persons, were under appointment to work beside national colleagues in 95 countries. On-the-field support was given by 4,709 Baptist volunteers. Yet, 1,700 personnel requests remained unmet at the end of the past year.

**EVANGELISM AND CHURCH DEVELOPMENT**—For the second time, Baptist churches with whom missionaries work broke the 100,000 barrier in baptisms, reaching 127,337 during 1981. Brazilian Baptists registered over 40,000 baptisms. In the Philippines one person was baptized for every 3.8 members. Significant increases occurred in five other nations. Area with lesser growth nevertheless report victory in face of strong opposition to the gospel.

**SCHOOLS AND STUDENT WORK**—In 528 schools in 59 countries, 122,616 students received general education with a Christian perspective and a clear witness from Christian teachers and fellow students. The Ida Nelson Baptists School of Manaus was chosen by Brazilian journalists as school of the year.

The training of national Baptist leaders for ministry involved 5,643 students in seminaries and theological institutes, another 6,936 enrolled in Theological Education by Extension, and many others attending short Bible conferences or seminars.

**PUBLICATION WORK**—Southern Baptist foreign missionaries worked beside national colleagues to publish the Christian message in several dozen modern languages. Indonesian Baptists planned a new hymnal for 1982 release and produced

new Bible study materials. A new book introducing Baptists appeared in Korea. Special literature presenting Christ to Muslims was produced in several parts of the world. Togo brought out three Royal Ambassador books in French. There was extensive literature distribution in Ethiopia and Sudan.

**HOSPITALS AND MEDICAL CARE**—In hospitals, dental facilities, mobile units and outpatient clinics, attention to physical needs provided opportunities to witness to patients and their families and to medical staffs.

Financial pressures caused the return of the hospital in Gaza to the Church Missionary Society of Great Britain, although the School of Health Sciences remains under the auspices of the Foreign Mission Board. In Indonesia, negotiations were in progress with the government to relocate the Bukittinggi Hospital. The Wallace Memorial Hospital in Korea obtained a building to be adapted as a pediatric clinic.

**BENEVOLENT MINISTRIES**—Benevolent ministries express compassionate concern and open evangelistic opportunities. Expenditures totaled \$373,564 for general relief projects and \$3,154,493 for hunger-related needs. As the year closed, Southern Baptists were cooperating with Baptists of Europe to make food and medicines available to the people of Poland.

**CONTRIBUTIONS**—In 1981 Southern Baptists contributed for foreign missions a total of \$95,480,007 as follows: Cooperative Program—\$39,168,468; Capital Fund—new church—\$20,000; Lottie Moon Christmas Offering—\$44,713,596; World Relief—\$4,760,226; Other contributions—\$6,817,717. The total missionary staff (including journeymen, missionary associates, and special project) totaled 3,136.
