Special Music

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each member church in this body shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members above the first one hundred (100) members.

Article 4. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. The body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any member church for engaging in practices not

considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting Annually, elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this

body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of member churches, and one lay member from each church. All general Association officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as a moderator. Each Associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time

and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the

parliamentary order followed in the association.

# By-Laws

# ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties as the close of the meeting at which they were elected.

2. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association, send five copies to the Secretary of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, and keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association or money received from any other sources, shall make reports to the Association and the Executive Board and shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association and the Executive Board. He shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the

Association.

# ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

- 1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.
- 2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.
- 3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, Associational W. M. U. Officers, Associational Church Training Officers, Associational Brotherhood Officers, Church Music Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.
- 4. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee, Program Committee, Missions Committee, Evangelism Committee, Christian Education Committee, Nominating Committee, and the Committee on Committees which shall be responsible for nominating all Standing Committee Members. Members of the Standing Committees will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless otherwise specified by special motion.

# **Proceedings**

# MEADOWVIEW September 12, 1983 - 7:00 P.M.

- 1. Moderator Marshall Black called the first session of the Twenty-sixth Annual Association of Taylor County Bapist to order at 7:00 P.M. in the Meadowview Baptist Church.
- 2. Bro. Allen Mills, Associational Music Director, led the congregation in two choruses, "O How He Loves You and Me" and "O How I love Jesus." He then led in the singing of "Crown Him With Many Crowns."
- 3. Host pastor, Bro. Chris Mueller, welcomed the association to Meadowview's facilities. He then read Acts 16:6-10 and led in prayer.
- The clerk moved that the presently registered messengers as well as those registering later be enrolled. The motion was seconded by Bro. J. B. Crawley and carried.
- The roll call of churches revealed that seventeen of the eighteen churches of the association were represented. Only Pitman Valley and the two missions were not.
- 6. Bro. J. B. Crawley presented several thoughts honoring Dr. D. L. Druien, long-time pastor in the association and the second moderator of the body. At the conclusion of the special recognition, Dr. Druien, who spoke a few words, received a standing ovation.
- 7. Bro. Chris Mueller was recognized as the only pastor present who had assumed the pulpit since the last meeting of the association. Bro. Gary Shockley was also mentioned, but was absent. (He was able to attend a later session.)
- 8. The clerk moved that the Executive Board Report, The Digest of Letters, and the Historical Events distributed when the messengers arrived be approved. Dr. James E. Jones seconded the motion and all were approved.
- 9. Treasurer Jeremiah Cox brought the treasurer's report and moved for its approval. With Dr. Jones second, it was so ordered.
- 10. Auditor E. Poe Young brought the auditor's report and moved for its approval. Seconded by Bro. Howard Davenport, the motion carried.
- 11. Bro. Gabriel Collett, Stewardship Chairman, presented the proposed budget for the 1983-1984 associational year. He presented a brief explanation of two items on the budget. After his motion for adoption and Bro. Allen Mills' second, the budget was approved.

- 12. Bro. Mills then led the congregation in the singing of "Footsteps of Jesus."
- 13. Bro. Robert Carr, Associate Director of the Brotherhood Department of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, brought greetings from the Convention personnel and challenged those present with emphases which will be stressed by the Convention during the next several years. He compared Kentucky Baptists' attitude concerning Bold Mission Thrust with that of Nehemiah. As Nehemiah contemplated the rebuilding of the wall, he prayed, wept, organized, and then worked day and night until the task was completed.
- 14. Moderator Black announced the appointment of the following committees:
  - A. Committee on Committees—Bro. George Gaddie, Chairman; Bro. Homer Kirtley; and Bro. Richard Reed.
    - B. Time, Place, and Preacher Committee—Bro. Don Watson, Chairman; Bro. John Wagster; and Bro. Howard Davenport.
  - C. Resolutions Committee—Dr. James E. Jones, Chairman; Bro. Tom Gupton; and Bro. Bob Martin.
- 15. The special music for the evening consisted of two parts. First, Bro. Chris Clarke, Music Director at Pleasant Hill, led the congregation in the singing of the chorus, "Do, Lord." Secondly, Bro. Clarke and his wife sang "My House is Full, But My Fields Are Empty."
- 16. The annual sermon was delivered by Bro. Bob Martin, pastor of Pleasant Hill. His sermon, "Neglected Tasks," was based on Ephesians 4:11-13. He listed the two great tasks which are attempted by Baptists: Evangelizing the World and Nurturing the people into their full capabilities and fullness of discipleship. The second of these was stressed throughout his message. After reemphasizing several of the programs mentioned by Bro. Robert Carr, State Representative, he concluded his message with the statement, "God, help us to develop believers who will go into the fields."
- 17. The opening session of the 1983 meeting of the Annual Association of Kentucky Baptists in Taylor County was brought to a close as Bro. David Turner, pastor of Yuma, led in prayer.

# SOUTH CAMPBELLSVILLE September 13, 1983 - 4:00 P.M.

- 18. Moderator Marshall Black called the second session to order at 4:00 P.M.
- 19. Bro. Allen Mills led the congregation in the singing of "How Firm a Foundation."
- 20. Host pastor, Bro. Howard Davenport welcomed those present and made several announcements as to the facilities and the evening meal. He then asked the congregation to stand and join him in the recitation of John 3:14-18. He then led in prayer.
- 21. Bro. Allen Mills made several comments about records in Taylor County Association this year and then brought a solo, "Have You Done the Things I Said?"
- 22. The associational Sunday School Director, Bro. Don Gowin, brought his report and moved for its approval. Seconded by the clerk, the motion carried. Bro. Gowin lauded the report as the greatest report a Sunday School Director in this county had been privileged to make.
- 23. He then brought the Vacation Bible School Report and moved for its approval. The motion was seconded by Bro. Homer Kirtley and the report was approved.
- 24. Bro. Jim Collison, Church Training Director, brought his report and moved for its approval. The motion was duly seconded and carried.
- 25. The Women's Missionary Union Report was brought by Director Helen Gray. Mrs. Gray moved for its approval, after which the motion was duly seconded and approved.
- Bro. Eugene Smith brought the Brotherhood Report and moved for its approval.
   Seconded by Bro. Homer Kirtley, the report was adopted.

- 27. Bro. Allen Mills, associational Music Chairman, made the music report and moved for its adoption. After a second by the clerk, the motion carried.
- 28. Bro. Harold Lee brought the report of the Missions Committee. He moved that it be approved, and after a second by Dr. James Jones, it was so ordered.
- 29. Bro. David Smith brought a brief report on the K.O.A. campground summer ministry. Bro. J. B. Crawley moved for its approval, and with Bro. Allen Mills' second, it was adopted. (An addendum to this report is also included in this volume. It was prepared by Bro. Buddy Lee.)
- 30. The Christian Education report was presented by Mrs. Dora Lee Wagoner, Associational Librarian. She moved that it be adopted, and with Bro. Homer Kirtley seconding the motion, it was approved.
- Mrs. Nell Wise presented the Stewardship and Cooperative Program report and moved that it be adopted. Bro. Kirtley seconded the motion and it was so ordered.
- 32. In respect for those who went to be with their Lord during this associational year, IN MEMORIAM was presented by Bro. Gilbert Sapp. Bro. Sapp made a few comments about being thankful about the gift of life and thanfulness for those who are no longer in our midst and their influence. He read the IN MEMORIAM list and ask the congregation to stand as he led in a memorial prayer. With his motion for adoption and a second by the clerk, the report was approved.

- 36. The Evangelism report was given by Dr. James E. Jones. With his motion for adoption and a second by the clerk, the motion was approved by a show of hands.
- 37. The report on the Singles Ministry was brought by Ms. Debbie Oliver. As she made her report she showed slides demonstrating the various activities of the Singles. With her motion for adoption, a second by Bro. Al Hardy, the report was approved.

# 38. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

# A. MODERATOR

Bro. Homer Kirtley nominated Dr. James E. Jones. With no further nominations, Bro. Howard Beauman moved that he be elected by acclamation. With Bro. Allen Mills' second, it was so ordered.

# B. FIRST ASSISTANT MODERATOR

Bro. L. D. Kennedy placed the name of Bro. Gabriel Collett in nomination. Bro. Jerry Kibbons moved that nominations cease, and with a second by Bro. Homer Kirtley, Bro. Collett was elected by acclamation.

C. SECOND ASSISTANT MODERATOR

Bro. Jeremiah Cox nominated Bro. Darrell Hunt. Jim Campbell moved that Bro. Hunt be elected by acclamation. Seconded by Bro. Lloyd Parrott, it was so ordered.

# D. CLERK

Bro. Jerry Kibbons nominated present clerk, Jim Campbell, to the position. Bro. J. B. Crawley moved that nominations cease. Seconded by Bro. Al Hardy, the present clerk was elected by acclamation.

# F. ASSISTANT CLERK

Bro. Gabriel Collett nominated Bro. Richard Reed to continue serving in that position. Bro. Don Gowin moved for election by acclamation, and with a second by Bro. Homer Kirtley, he was elected.

# F. TREASURER

Dr. James Jones placed the name of Bro. Jeremiah Cox to serve in this position. Bro. Al Hardy moved for election by acclamation, and with Bro. Rolando Raganas' second, Bro. Cox was elected for a thirteenth term as treasurer.

# G. ASSISTANT TREASURER

Jim Campbell nominated Ms. Margaret Redmon to this position. As no further nominations came from the floor, Moderator Black declared the floor closed. Ms. Redmon was elected unanimously.

# 39. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Bro. George Ray Gaddie, Chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Revision Committee, presented the report of his committee. He referred to copies distributed at the session and suggested that By-Laws be considered first. He moved that the By-Laws revisions be approved. The motion was duly seconded.

Bro. Jerry Kibbons, a member of the committee, offered a substitute motion that each By-Law revision be handled independently. Bro. Howard Beauman seconded the substitute motion. Bro. Gaddie's motion and its second were withdrawn and the substitute motion carried.

# A. BY-LAWS CHANGES

1. Officer elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected.

Bro. Bob Martin moved for the adoption of this reworded By-Law, Bro. Don Watson seconded the motion and it carried.

2. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association, send five copies to the Secretary of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, and keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the association.

Bro. J. B. Crawley moved for the adoption of this reworded By-Law, and with Bro. Hardin Hosey's second, the motion carried.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association or money received from any other sources, shall make reports to the Association and the Executive Board, and shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association or the Executive Board. He shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the association.

Bro. Howard Beauman moved for the adoption of this reworded By-Law, and with Bro. Edgar Russell seconding the motion, it was adopted.

At this point, Bro. Jeremiah Cox, treasurer, noted that he had never been bonded at any time in his twelve years of service as treasurer. Bro. Beauman moved that this matter be referred to the October executive board meeting. Seconded by Bro. Gabe Collett, the motion carried.

# B. ARTICLE II--COMMITTEES CHANGES

 The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, Associational W. M. U. Officers, Associational Church Training Officers, Associational Brotherhood Officers, Church Music Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

Dr. James Jones moved that the article be reworded as proposed. Bro. Hardin Hosey seconded the motion and it was so ordered.

2. 4. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee, Program Committee, Missions Committee, Evangelism Committee, Christian Education Committee, Nominating Committee, and the Committee on Committees which shall be responsible for nominating all Standing Committee Members. Members of the Standing Committees

will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless otherwise specified by special motion.

Bro. Jerry Kibbons moved that the proposed change be amended to include the bold-face portion. Bro. George Gaddie seconded the amendment and it carried. Jim Campbell moved for the adoption of the proposed change as amended, and with Bro. L. D. Kennedy seconding, the change was adopted.

# C. CONSTITUTION--PROPOSED REVISIONS ON WHICH ACTION WILL BE TAKEN DURING THE 1984 ANNUAL MEETING

1. Article 2. Each cooperating church shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty members, or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) members, not to exceed ten messengers from each church plus four messengers for each mission sponsored.

After discussion concerning the limitation of ten total messengers from any one church, Bro. Alvin Hardy moved that the proposed change be referred to the 1984 session. Seconded by Bro. Rolando Raganas, the motion carried.

- 2. Article 5. This body shall on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot or raising of hand, Moderator, First Assistant Moderator, Second Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer, whose duties shall be as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.
  - Bro. J. B. Crawley moved for referral of this proposed change to the 1984 session. With Bro. Hardin Hosey seconding the motion, it was so ordered.
- 3. Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of cooperating churches and missions and one lay member from each church. All general associational officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as a moderator. Each associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the work of the Association between the annual sessions. Quorum of the Executive Board shall consist of nine members.

After a question concerning mission pastors, Bro. Jerry Kibbons moved to amend the motion to include the words "and missions" in bold print above. Seconded by the clerk, the amendment carried. Jim Campbell moved that the proposed change as amended be referred to the 1984 session. Bro. Sam Crawley seconded the motion and it was referred by unanimous vote.

Bro. George Gaddie moved to propose the change in the wording of all Articles in the Constitution in which the phrase "member churches" is used to read "cooperating churches." The motion was seconded by Bro. L. D. Kennedy and was passed.

- Bro. J. B. Crawley moved that the meeting be adjourned until the evening session. This motion was duly seconded and passed.
- 40. Bro. L. M. Hamilton dismissed the second session with prayer.
- 41. Due to the lateness of the hour, Moderator Black announced that the evening session would not begin until 7:15 P.M.

# SOUTH CAMPBELLSVILLE - 7:15 P.M.

- 42. After a bountiful meal, Bro. Marshall Black, Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:15 P.M.
- 43. Special Music, "Sing Unto The Lord," was presented by the Lowell Avenue Choir under the direction of Bro. Allen Mills.
- 44. Bro. Gary Shockley, pastor at Fairview, read Isaiah 6:3-8 and led in prayer.
- 45. Due to an oversight in the afternoon session, it was necessary for nominations to be taken at this time for Auditor. Bro. Jeremiah Cox nominated Bro. E. Poe Young. Bro. Don Gowin moved for his election by acclamation, and with Bro. Allen Mills seconding, it was so ordered.
- 46. Several visitors were welcomed at this time.
- 47. Sunday School Director Don Gowin presented the following special recognition awards to the pastors and/or directors of Sunday Schools of churches which had outstanding achievement during the past associational year:
  - A. Largest Numerical Increase in Enrolment--Salem-66, Lowell Avenue-57, and Pleasant Hill-56.
  - B. Largest Percentage Increase in Enrolment--Meadowview-92%, Liberty-82%, and Pitman Valley-63%.
  - C. Largest Numerical Increase in Average Attendance--Meadowview-27, Yuma-22, and Salem-21.
  - D. Largest Percentage Increase in Average Attendance--Meadowview-97%, Yuma 79%, and Salem-25%.
  - Bro. Gowin then presented Sunday School ASSIST awards to the following people: Mrs. Joyce Bottoms, Mrs. Dolly Cruse, Mrs. Joyce Graham, Bro. Harold Lee, and Bro. Gowin also received one.
- 48. Bro. Walter House, former Director of the Temperance League of Kentucky brought a brief report from the Temperance League. He warned those present that Taylor County is the prime target for the factions supporting the sale of alcohol because of the recreation facilities nearby.
- 49. Bro. Darrell Hunt presented the Christian Education Report to the clerk and moved that it be approved without reading to allow the Campbellsville College representative more time. This motion was seconded by Dr. James Jones and was approved.
- 50. The Campbellsville College message was presented by Bro. Alvin Hardy who brought greetings from the college staff and conveyed Dr. W. R. Davenport's apologies for not being present at the meeting. Bro. Hardy's message was an exhortation based upon Isaiah 54:2, 3.
- 51. Bro. Don Watson presented the Time, Place, and Preacher Report and moved for its approval. Duly seconded, the motion carried.
- 55. Dr. James E. Jones brought the Resolutions Committee Report and requested that each resolution be considered separately. The request was granted and Dr. Jones moved that each of the ten resolutions be approved. Seconded by various messengers, each resolution was approved unanimously.
- 56. Bro. Allen Mills led the congregation in the singing of "To God Be the Glory."
- 57. Bro. Lynwood Kessler presented the State, Home, and Foreign Missions Reports.
  - A. After reading the State Missions Report, He moved for its approval and with Bro. Jeremiah Cox's second, it was approved.
  - B. Bro. Kessler presented the Home Missions Report and moved for its approval. Dr. James Jones seconded this motion and it carried.
  - C. The Foreign Missions Report was read, Bro. Kessler moved for its approval, and with Bro. Tom Gupton's second, it was so ordered.
- 58. The congregation was blessed by the singing of "Church Triumphant" by the Lowell Avenue Choir under the direction of Bro. Allen Mills.
- 59. The missionary message was brought by Bro. Jeff Day, pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church in Elizabethtown, Kentucky, who had recently been to Indonesia on a mission trip. His message was taken from Mark 5:8-13 and around the

theme, the apostolic age is not closed for demons are still with us. Bro. Day told of the spiritualistic background of the Indonesian people and how Christians are attempting to combat it there. The main thrust of his message was "If you start with God and stay with Him, He will see you through."

60. The closing prayer for the twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of Taylor County Baptist Association was led by Bro. Howard Beauman, pastor at Lowell Avenue.

#### TRIBUTE TO DR. D. L. DRUIEN

Dr. D. L. Druien (David Louis) must have began life over one hundred years ago if you let him figure it up. The reason I say this is that he will tell you how long he pastored the various churches he has pastored, and if you add up the years it will be more than one hundred. Of course this is because he pastored one, two, three, or more at the same time. His daughter tells that she would often hear the same sermon on Sunday morning at Good Hope, Sunday afternoon at Liberty, the next Sunday morning at Pleasant Hill, and then at Elkhorn on Sunday afternoon or evening. Dr. Druien always said that if a sermon was worth preaching once, it was worth preaching a second time. Most of us have heard both kinds--maybe some of you preachers have preached some of both kinds.

Dr. Druien started his ministry south of Taylor County in such places as Rocky Hill, Aetna Grove, and Three Springs. My father was on the original committe that went through Hart County to hear him for the first time. Willie Collins, Dennis Crawley, and James Dewitt left in Collins' Pontiac (the only one in the community) to drive down to hear him. He came to Taylor County and Pleasant Hill in 1929 (along with the Depression). I'm not sure which was the cause or which was the effect, but Taylor County got both of them at about the same time.

In addition to the above mentioned churches, he has pastored at Pleasant Valley, Summersville, and at Meadowview--several more than once. He has likewise held revivals in almost all Taylor County churches, again several times more than once. He served as Chairman of the Trustees of Campbellsville College for many years, including the time it went from a Junior to a Senior College, and is, to my knowledge, the only Trustee Emeritus of the board.

He was one of the prime movers in the formation of Taylor County Association of Baptists when we seeded from the Russell Creek Association. Some of his dearest friends in Taylor County who had roots in Green County never forgave him for his part in this move...but that is a different story.

Dr. Drujen is the father of four girls, two of whom live in this county, one in LaRue, and one in Hart. His life has touched the life of many, if not most, of us in the county in some way. He has baptized my children, buried my grandparents, taught the Bible to my entire family, worked with the College to help educate many of our teachers and business people of this community, and helped others in many ways.

We wish to take this privilege to honor him for his many years of dedicated service and to give him all our good wishes for the remainder of his sojourn here on this earth with us.

- December, 1982—The board voted to terminate the contract with WCKQ for broadcasting the Baptist Hour and to enter into a two year agreement with television station WGRB and the Southern Baptist Convention Radio and Television Commission for the presenting of At Home with the Bible at no cost to the association except the purchasing of the Video Tapes from the Radio and Television Commission. These tapes are the property of the association.
- January, 1983—This was a supper meeting hosted by Campbellsville College and Bro. Harold Lee shared ways in which our association could become involved in missions. He reminded those present that "If you aren't a missionary, you are a mission field."
- February, 1983—A Youth Committee composed of Bro. Scott Wilkins, Chairman; Bro. Ronnie Webb; and Ms. Joyce Graham was elected.
- March, 1983—It was reported that Melissa Jones of Lowell Avenue had qualified to participate in the State Speakers' tournament and that three young people had qualified to participate in the State Youth Bible Drill. These were Gail Noe and Kellie Pickett of Campbellsville and Sheila Kim Hunt of Mt. Gilboa.
- April, 1983—Super Sunday and High Attendance Day were set for 29 May. This was a part of the Sunday School Enlargement Campaign.
- May, 1983—It was learned that WGRB would be airing At Home with the Bible at 10:30 each Sunday morning. A list of twenty churches of the association will be scrolled at the conclusion of the program.
- June, 1983—Bros. Buddy Lee and David Smith were employed by the association to serve as ministers at the K.O.A. Campground during the summer of 1983. It was further reported that four churches met or exceeded their Enlargement campaign goals. A "Get-Acquainted" meeting with new Kentucky Baptist Convention Secretary, Dr. Bill Marshall, was set for 18 June.
- July, 1983—The executive board voted to participate jointly with the Kentucky Baptist Convention in the Ministers' Emergency Fund (a fund set up to aid pastors dismissed by their churches) using the guidelines recommended by the Missions Committee. (It is hoped that this fund may never have to be used.)

# TAYLOR COUNTY ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS 1983 SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

"Church Growth" is the theme for 1982-85. The Sunday School Department has committed itself to aid the churches of Kentucky to grow by emphasizing:

- I. Sunday School Growth Projects
  - A. 8.5 by '85
  - B. October--Outreach Month
  - C. Sunday School Enlargement/Enrollment Campaigns
  - D. Starting new Sunday Schools
  - E. Standard Recognition
  - F. Vacation Bible Schools
- II. Improvement of Teaching
  - A. Associational Leadership Training Schools
  - B. Preparation Week
  - C. January Bible Study
- III. Helps to the Association and Churches for Sunday School Growth and Improvement
  - A. "Prepare to Thrive in '85"
  - B. "Send I You" Clinics (ASSIST Training)
  - C. Ron Lewis Growth Conference
  - D. Sunday School Weekends at Cedarmore and Jonathan Creek
  - E. Children Leadership Workshops

It is suggested that the leadership of the Association and Churches study the above projects, choose some, and plan to conduct them during the year.

The total enrollment of the Sunday Schools in our Association is 4,236 with an average attendance of 2,220. This is a total increase in enrollment of 449 and average attendance of 27 over last year.

TO GOD BE THE GLORY! In 1981 this body adopted a Victory goal of 3,693, a Challenge goal of 3,782, and a Hallelujah goal of 3,898. Last year we exceeded our Challenge goal. This year we have exceeded our Hallelujah goal by 338. HALLELUJAH! Fourteen churches had numerical increases in enrollment resulting in an Associational increase of 12%. Eleven churches had an increase in average attendance resulting in an Associational increase of 1.2%.

This year's most successful project was an Associational Sunday School Enlargement/Enrollment Campaign. Eleven churches participated in this

director-led campaign with each church reporting statistical and spiritual gains. As a result of this Campaign a total of 355 new people were enrolled in Sunday School and 2,267 prospects were discovered. All of these eleven churches have shown increases in Sunday School enrollment since the Campaign.

Our recommendations for this year's Sunday School program are as follows:

- That the Association provide training for our Associational ASSIST Team;
- 2. That each church set goals to increase Sunday School enrollment by 2.7%; and
- 3. That the churches of the Association adopt the Sunday School Standard as a program of work.

# VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

This year eighteen of our churches held Vacation Bible Schools with a total enrollment of 1,699. This is an increase over last year of 117 pupils enrolled. This gives us 100% participation of the churches in our Association.

We held our Vacation Bible School Clinic at Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. Seventy people attended representing twelve of the eighteen churches. Three pastors were present.

Only twelve churches sent reports to the Associational Sunday School Director, therefore the following statistics will be incomplete:

# CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

"Things are not like they used to be." Have you ever heard that comment? I guess all of us have heard it. Most likely we have made the comment ourselves.

If people say "Training Union" or "Church Training" is not like it used to be, they are correct. Let's look at some things we could say about Church Training today.

- 1) First of all our studies in the literature are based upon Biblical themes. The emphasis this past year has been on family life and ministry. Beginning in October there will be a major emphasis on our beliefs. This will be a doctrinal study on some basic areas of doctrine, such as the doctrine of God, man, salvation, and the Bible. I am hoping this emphasis in our churches will assist in "bringing together belief and behavior," which is the emphasis for 1983-84 in Church Training.
- 2)In the spring each year our Church Training department selects a major doctrine to be promoted for special study. This spring of 1984 the study will be the doctrine of the Holy Spirit. This is a much needed study today in our churches.

- 3)A third change that has taken place is an intensive discipleship study developed by Southern Baptists called Masterlife. This is a six-month study consisting of two hours per week with a group and at least one hour a day individual study. So far in our association there have been two groups working on Masterlife. For those willing to make the commitment, this has been a significant blessing.
- 4)A fourth very successful part of Church Training has been the survival kit. This is a guide for new Christians in beginning a regular habit of quiet time, prayer, Bible study, and Scripture memorization. Separate books are available for children, youth, and adults.
- 5)A fifth approach this year to Church Training has been the Equipping Center. A new one this year is "Equipping Teachers to Teach." This new resource can be used to train folks who work with preschoolers, children, youth, or adults. Another excellent one is "Servanthood: Portraits from the Life of Jesus." This is a Bible study of how Jesus lived the servant type of life as he taught and ministered. In addition to these there are 35 others.

Let me share with you also what the churches of Taylor County Association have done this past year in training.

For the year 1981-82 our Church Training enrollment was 833. For 1982-83 the enrollment was 1,014. This is an increase of 181. Across Kentucky, the total Church Training enrollment has increased for the past five years.

Also this year we had six children and three youth to participate in the Bible drills. One youth participated in the youth speakers' tournament. The following children were associational winners:

Bryan Beauman, Andrew Clerk, Ruth Clark, Sheila Hunt, Anna Osborne

Four of these children went on to become state winners.

The following were associational winners in the Youth Bible Drill:

Sheila Kim Hunt, Kellie Pickett and Gail Noe

Two of these youths were state winners at Cedarmore.

Melissa Jones was our representative in the State Youth Speakers' Tournament at Cedarmore. I believe we can be proud of all of our young people who participated this year.

It has been a joy for me to serve this past year as your associational Church Training Director.

# TAYLOR COUNTY BROTHERHOOD REPORT

The Brotherhood Department of the Kentucky Baptist Convention has as its purpose: helping churches involve men and boys in missions. These opportunities are provided for churches and associations through its calendar of activities for 1983-84.

As your church and the Taylor County Baptist Association participate, these activities will involve both Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors and will encourage participation in missions.

The Kentucky Baptist Convention Executive Board in November 1982 elected W.L. Kaufman of Louisville, as the Director of the Brotherhood Department. Rob Carr serves as associate director and Donna Brinkman as office secretary. This department is ready to serve you and the churches of our association.

The total state Brotherhood enrollment was 21,360 for the year of 1982, showing an increase of 3.9 percent. Kentucky has 732 Baptist Men and Royal Ambassador units.

In 1982-83 our association was served by Eugene Smith as Brotherhood Director, J. D. Meadows as the Baptist Men's President, but no one served as Royal Ambassador director.

Our Associational Brotherhood enrollment is 329. This includes 10 Baptist Men's units and 10 Royal Ambassador chapters (75 Crusaders and 54 Pioneers).

The following Brotherhood events were conducted in our association during 1982-83:


- Oct. 22-23 Our Associational Brotherhood Director attended the State Director's briefing at Cedarmore

# TAYLOR COUNTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION MUSIC REPORT

1982-83 has been a tremendously successful year for church music in Taylor County. "Reaching People through Instrumental Music" has been our theme this year. This was the main topic of emphasis in our associational Shoptalk which was one of 63 held across the State. These shoptalks were attended by 1706 music leaders in 585 churches. Our association held its shoptalk in conjunction with the East Lynn and Russell Creek Associations at the Catfish House here in Campbellsville. There were a total of 76 persons in attendance with 39 of these being from 16 of our Taylor County Churches.

We also held two other associational projects during the year. The first was an Associational Hymn Festival held at South Campbellsville Baptist Church on Jan. 30, 1983. Seven churches and a total of approximately 350 people participated in this project which featured choirs singing hymns and hymn arrangements. It was a quality experience for our association both musically and spiritually. The other project was a music school featuring a music reading seminar led by Dr. Eugene Quinn, the state music secretary and a course on children's choirs led by Prof. Craig Hodges of Campbellsville College. The school was held Feb. 10 and 11 at

Campbellsville Baptist Church.

The ongoing enrollment in church music personnel in our churches, which was reported on the annual church letter from each church, increased from 80,018 last year to a total of 81,378 persons who either sing in a choir, play an instrument, or lead in some way in the church music program throughout Kentucky. The number of churches who reported their ongoing church music enrollment increased from 1,689 to 1,761. We had 18 churches reporting a total enrollment of 881 persons for the year of 1982-83 on their annual church letter, an increase over last year for our association. We again are one of the few associations in the state to have all her churches reporting a music ministry enrollment.

We had 4 churches report active preschool choirs, 7 with children's choirs, 6 with youth choirs and 14 that reported an adult choir organization. One church,

Robinson Creek, reported an enrollment of 38 in its Senior Adult Choir.

Several other individual church music efforts need to be recognized. During the course of the year many of our churches held special musical programs featuring their choirs, soloists, instrumentalists and leaders. Campbellsville Baptist Church again sent its youth choir and handbells on tour through the South with 43 people participating as they performed in 10 churches as well as doing a concert at Jefferson Mall during an 11-day period. At least two churches, Lowell Avenue and Pleasant Hill held music reading classes to help increase the musical ability of the church. Lowell Avenue also received both the Merit and Advanced recognitions from the Southern Baptist Convention and the Kentucky Baptist Convention for her Music Ministry.

The coming year's music emphasis is "Reaching Youth through Music." Several important activities are already scheduled on a statewide basis. This Saturday (Sept. 17, 1983) Georgetown College is hosting a Youth Choir Day with a mass youth choir to perform at half-time of their home football game. In October an All-State Baptist Youth Choir will be performing at the State BSU Convention in Louisville. On April 26, 1984 the State Youth Choir Festival will be conducted in Campbellsville at the College.

Several of our churches were involved in mission work or activities during the associational vear.

Campbellsville Baptist sent a team of ten to the Woodlawn Baptist Church. Lima, Ohio where William Nichols, a Campbellsville College alumnus, is pastor. They conducted 7 Backyard Bible Clubs with an enrolment of 150 and had one profession of faith. Three more joined them for a Weekend Revival which had 5 professions of faith and 15 rededications. They engaged in three programs of visitation to promote the activities of the week.

Pleasant Hill Baptist Church sent a group of five adults and 5 youth to conduct a Vacation Bible School in the Panther Creek Baptist Church, Yeager, West Virginia, where Miss Leota Campbell has served as a missionary for some 30 years. Pastor Bob Martin remarked that a large number of adults were present every night in the Vacation Bible School.

Dr. James Jones, Campbellsville Baptist pastor, went on a Preaching Mission to South Korea in October, 1982 at the request of the Foreign Mission Board.

Lynwood and Margaret Kessler served with the Home Mission Board in Tucson. Arizona, for six months. They have been teaching an Ethiopian family to read English. They took a course in teaching the Lauback System at Samford University and will be working with internationals in several areas of Kentucky.

Dr. and Mrs. J. Chester Badgett have gone to Caracas. Venezuela, where he is serving as pastor of an English speaking church.

Students from Campbellsville College went out in great numbers to serve as Summer missionaries. Two recent graduates are serving as journeyman missionaries: Kelly Capps is serving her second year in Jos. Nigeria: Jackie Johnson is serving in her first year in Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

Buddy Lee and David Smith were elected to serve in the KOA Campground Ministry. A Worship Service was conducted at 9:00 a.m. each Sunday morning from Memorial Day weekend through the Labor Day weekend.

We commend the churches that have planned and carried out their plans to get involved in Missions. It is our prayer that many will hear God's Call and respond to it to serve in Associational, State, Home and Foreign Missions.

A golden opportunity to learn more about Missions and meet representative Missionaries from around the World will be presented in the World Mission Conference in our Association May 6 through 13, 1984.

Kentucky is linked with Ohio in the Kentucky-Ohio project. Kentucky is now linked with Kenya in a challenging project. Be much in prayer that God will help us to have a true BOLD MISSION CHALLENGE AND THRUST.

# COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

A dream is only a dream until someone makes it come true. Bold Mission Thrust began as a dream for Southern Baptists in 1976-77—a bold dream of greater mission support and church growth. Many people are committed to make this dream a reality. In order for Bold Mission Thrust to succeed, many more people must adopt this commitment.

Two important questions must be asked and answered: 1—Do we have the will and commitment to persist in achieving what we have voted as Bold Mission Thrust goals. 2—Can we learn to live with our commitments?

Officially, Southern Baptists claimed their Bold Mission Thrust dream in 1977. Looking at the years ahead, we have mixed reactions of excitement and anxiety. The introduction is over. In 1984, we must demonstrate our willingness to make our Bold Mission Thrust dream come true through our bold giving.

Involved in this demonstration are several realities to be considered. 1—Churches need to be faithful in fulfilling their goals of mission giving and church growth. 2—Some churches may need to discover their "special roles" in the bold endeavors they have adopted. 3—Church leaders must lead the people to adjust lifestyles and values in order to achieve Bold Mission Thrust. 4—We need a strong zeal and spirit of cooperation to attain the goal of our 1984 associational missions program. 5—We need a strong commitment to reach the 15.5 million dollar goal for our 1983-84 Kentucky Cooperative Program budget. 6—We need a greater concern for people in order to bring about a new "turn around" in the attitudes and records in church growth and church member development.

The dream is bold. The people are excited. The mission unmistakenably stands before us.

During the past year, 1982-83, the churches of our association gave \$283,453 through the Cooperative Program. Last year, our churches gave \$10,681 for associational missions. Our goal was \$10,983.

In our state, our 1983-84 Cooperative Program goal is \$13,500,000 Operational Goal. Of this amount, \$8,640,000, or 64% will be used for Kentucky state mission ministries. A Bold Mission Challenge Goal of \$2,000,000 of which \$1,270,000 or 63.5% will be used for Kentucky state mission ministries. Of the Operational Goal of

\$13,500,000, \$4,860,000, or 36% will be used for Southern Baptist Convention ministries. Of the \$2,000,000 Challenge Goal, \$730,000, or 36.5% will be used for Southern Baptist Convention mission ministries.

Commitment to Bold Mission Thrust calls for specific action on our part as individuals and churches. Every church is challenged to: 1—Give something through the Cooperative Program for Bold Mission Thrust support. 2—Increase the percentage of its total budget income given through the Cooperative Program. 3—Increase the percentage of total budget income for the support of associational missions.

Let every church in the Taylor County Association demonstrate its genuine concern for an commitment to world mission support through bold living and bold giving.

# **REPORT ON BENEVOLENT INSTITUTIONS - 1983**

The healing ministry of the Kentucky Baptist Convention is operated by Baptist Hospitals, Inc. in Kentucky. The Baptist Hospitals, Inc. is comprised of: Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington; Highlands Baptist Hospital, Baptist Hospital East, Kentucky Baptist Hospital School of Nursing, Hagan Clinic at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Baptist East Doctors Building, Highlands Doctors Building and the Child Development Center at Baptist East, all in Louisville; The Clinic in Brandenburg; Western Baptist Hospital in Paducah; and Health Data Network in Louisville.

The annual budget for the four hospitals exceeds 130 million dollars. Over 150,000 persons were treated last year at our hospitals and the hospitals employ over four thousand persons daily.

The Kentucky Baptist Hospital School of Nursing will close when the last class

graduates in December, 1983.

Because we care, Kentucky Baptists have a special care for children who have been neglected, deprived, unwanted and are hurting. The Thanksgiving Offering, without which child care could not go on, reached \$625,000 last year, the largest ever.

Many things accomplished in the lives of young people cannot be measured this side of heaven, however, the personnel working with the programs of the Kentucky Baptist Homes for Children serve with the conviction that the seed sown and the good done in each life will bear fruit.

Glen Dale and Spring Meadows Homes are maintaining a high degree of occupancy. Church attendance and involvement is high. The emergency shelter in Dixon is now completed and opened and expects to care for about 100 youth in the next twelve months.

# **EVANGELISM REPORT 1982-83**

Kentucky Baptist churches reported a total of 19,154 baptisms for 1982. This represented a loss of 994 compared to 1981. However, Kentucky was the largest state convention that had more gain in baptisms than by letter or statement. Eight Kentucky churches had over 100 baptisms. The Kentucky gain by letter and statement was 18,961.

Total baptisms in our association this year was 146.

The Bold Mission Thrust goal of baptisms is ten percent increase each year. This means we should set a goal of 161 to reach the Bold Mission goal for baptisms in our association next year.

The Kentucky Baptist Convention, Department of Evangelism, conducted twelve Area Evangelism Conferences across the state in 1983. The subjects of the four group conferences were: Women in Evangelism, Men in Evangelism, The Prayer Seminar, and Evangelism Resources. Our people attended the conference for our area at Louisville, Kentucky.

The State Evangelism Conference, February 21-22, met at Severns Valley Baptist Church, Elizabethtown. It had the highest attendance in the Evangelism Conference history. Speakers were Fred Sampson, H. Ray Wood, Jack Staton, Frank

Crumpler, and Roy Fish. Russell Newport directed the music program.

The State Youth Evangelism Conference was held at Highview Baptist Church, Louisville, April 1-2, 1983. Approximately 1,500 young people heard Felix Snipes of Atlanta, Georgia, as he spoke of the evils of the occult, astrology and satanic powers. Over 2,000 young people were at the conference Friday night and Saturday.

Two Continuing Witness Training Seminars were conducted this year. Two are scheduled for next year. There have been 108 churches that have received CWT training to this date. Three Pastoral Evangelism Seminars were conducted at

Southside Church, Princeton; Bethlehem Church, Greensburg; and Stithton Church, Radcliff.

A "Growing an Evangelistic Church" Seminar was conducted at the Mid-Continent Bible College, Mayfield, May 23-25 this year. Fred Halbrooks and Jay Brown led this conference. Another "Growing an Evangelistic Church" Seminar is scheduled October 10-13, at the Carlisle Avenue Church, Louisville. It will be led by Frank Crumpler, HMB, Atlanta, and Jay Brown. This seminar encompasses the total Evangelism strategy.

Eight Interfaith Witness Conferences were conducted across the state again this year. The subjects of Mormonism and Jehovah's Witnesses were presented in each.

1984 has been designated the year of Lay Witness Evangelism by the State Department of Evangelism. It is suggested that every church consider using a Lay-led Revival team one weekend in 1984. The Evangelism and Brotherhood Departments are available to help enlist a Lay-led Revival team.

Personal witnessing training training programs are available for every church level of commitment. These include: Continuing Witness Training, Lay Evangelism Schools, Tell Witness Training, WOW Schools, Discipline Youth, and the Witness Workshop.

The Prayer Seminar was conducted at the KBC Building for thirty pastors. Two associations have conducted it in their association for pastors. Many pastors have implemented it in their churches.

A four-year evangelism strategy is being promoted by the State Evangelism Department.

1983 - Year of Prayer for Spiritual Awakening

1984 - Year of Lay Witness Evangelism

1985 - Year of Preparation for Simultaneous Revivals

1986 - Year of Evangelism (This includes simultaneous revivals and other events.)

Our Association is planning the following evangelism events for the next year.

Beginning November 2, there will be an Associational Evangelism Rally each Wednesday following the fifth Sunday. This rally will be at a central location under the guidance of the Association Evangelism Committee.

Each pastor and church is urged to participate by having Prayer Meeting with all the other Taylor County Associational churches at this Evangelism Rally. We will have a dynamic speaker, exciting music and a Taylor County Baptist Associational choir composed of all choirs from the churches of the Association.

The first rally will be November 2, Campbellsville Baptist Church, 7:30 P.M. The speaker will be Dr. James K. Pierce, Porter Memorial Baptist Church, Lexington, Kentucky, who has done a tremendous work in evangelism.

February 1, the Rally preacher will be Rev. Bill Hancock, Highview Baptist Church, Louisville, who has consistently led Kentucky Baptists in baptism in the past few years.

The other two dates (personalities not confirmed), are May 2, and August 1.

There will be an Associational Evangelism Seminar for pastors, staff and church leadership, March 5, Campbellsville Baptist Church. Mr. Fred Halbrooks, Sunday School Department, Kentucky Baptist Convention, will speak on Sunday School in Evangelism; Rev. Jay Brown will speak in the afternoon on Evangelistic Preaching. There will be a supper for pastors, staff and key laymen, during which Dr. Tal Bonham, Executive Secretary, Ohio Baptist Convention, will speak. Dr. Bonham will also bring an evangelistic message for a special associational evangelism rally in the evening.

It is the prayer and hope of the Evangelism Committee that all pastors, staff and churches will cooperate in making this coming year the best year in evangelism that this Association has ever seen.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

Our Kentucky Baptist colleges and schools are institutions which exist to carry out the Baptist commitment to Christian education. To do this, their program and personnel must reflect a concern for Christian purpose, educational purpose, and denominational purpose. The Christian college or school bases its mission on several Biblical and theological presuppositions. One mistake often is made in the assumption that these basic truths are self-evident and therefore do not need to be stated and examined. Sometimes difficulties arise when we do take these statements for granted and assume that as long as the statement of Christian purpose is in the catalog, nothing more is required.

Christian purpose has as its Biblical base the imperative to teach, and the imperative to evangelize—The Great Commission. Christian purpose rests on theological presuppositions about the nature of God, the nature of man, the preeminence of Christ, and the Christian view of knowledge, morality, ethics, freedom and responsibility.

The purpose of our educational institutions is to educate. In the early 1940s, a volume entitled "General Education in a Free Society" concluded that the purpose of education is to teach men to think clearly, to communicate effectively, and to make relevant judgments and to discriminate among values. There should be no question that transmission of values is central to Christian education-in fact to all education. A part of our educational purpose should be to develop integrity, tolerance, and concern, to recognize the dignity and worth of the individual and to proclaim that all men ought to be free. With all its worth, however, education is but an earthen vessel unless it is filled with Christian values. A student should be afforded an opportunity to develop a Christian worldview, as well as to have instilled in him a thirst for knowledge and a life-long commitment to learning.

The relationship of our colleges and schools to the Kentucky Baptist Convention clearly established a denominational purpose for them. The most important service to our denomination is the development of men and women for effective Christian leadership in the church, the community, and the denomination. Serving denominational purposes calls for an understanding of and a commitment to the program, goals, and objectives of the denomination, of the freedom for diversity which has made Baptists unique, of the historic autonomy of Baptist churches, and of the Southern Baptist sources of unity which come through our commitment to missions, evangelism, and education.

This statement of purpose constitutes the framework within which our schools, colleges and the Kentucky Baptist Convention shall work for the cause of Christ through Christian education.

Kentucky Baptist schools and colleges include Campbellsville College, W. R. Davenport, President, Campbellsville; Clear Creek Baptist School, Leon A. Simpson, President, Pikeville; Cumberland College, James H. Taylor, President,

Williamsburg; Georgetown College, (currently without a president), Georgetown; Oneida Baptist Institute, Barkley M. Moore, President, Oneida. Write to the institution, c/o the president, for any details or if you are planning to attend one of these Kentucky Baptist institutions.

Baptist Seminary and School Day is usually observed the third Sunday in February each year.

On May 2, 1972, the Executive Board established the Kentucky Baptist Scholarship Fund, (KBSF) to assist Kentucky Baptist students who wish to attend Campbellsville, Cumberland, or Georgetown. ## DIRECT MISSIONS REPORT STATE OF KENTUCKY

Kentucky Baptists have 79 associations such as this one across the state, working separately, yet collectively.

More than 140 people have their salaries supplemented through this department. Some of these are fringe benefits, others are outright salary supplements.

We have in-service guidance programs at Cumberland College, Campbellsville College, Georgetown College, Clear Creek Baptist School, and Mid-Continent Baptist Bible College.

Language Missions continues to be a significant part of our work, directed by Kendale Moore.

There are more than 73,000 ethnic people in the State of Kentucky. While ministering in the past to Korean, Chinese, Spanish, Laotian, Thai, Russian and deaf, this year we have added Rumanian. Margaret and I are also literacy missions associates, listed with the Home Mission Board of the S.B.C.; also, with the K.B.C. presently teaching reading, writing and conversational English to 4 Ethiopian students.

The linkup between the State Convention of Kentucky and Ohio has been co-ordinated again by the Direct Missions Department.

Churches from more than 40 Kentucky Baptist Associations linked up with some 77 Ohio congregations to assist their work.

Campbellsville Baptist Church sent a group to work with Woodlawn Baptist Church of Lima, Ohio.

Pleasant Hill Baptist Church had a group that went to Panther Mission at Panther Creek, West Virginia.

In addition to this, we have some 35 to 40 summer student missionaries come to us through the B.S.U. that the Direct Missions Department places.

One of the highlights of the Home Mission Board this year was beginning 1,180 new missions and churches.

The Home Mission force includes 3,430 men and women serving in all 50 states, American Samoa, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands and Canada.

The Board placed an additional 40,226 volunteers in areas of special service last year in which Margaret and I filled two of that number in the Christian Service Corp for six months working with the Yaqui Indians and inter city missions of Tucson, Arizona.

The Kentucky Baptist Convention anticipates receiving from the Home Mission Board's cooperative program allocation of S.B.C. some \$118,871 for mission work through Direct Missions and Christian Life Departments.

The Home Mission Board staff holds seminars, conferences, workshops and other training programs to train lay persons, ministers and missionaries.

Margaret and I just completed a ten day workshop at Samford University dealing completely with language missions, led by the Home Mission Board.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT 1982-83

During 1982-83, Southern Baptist missionaries overseas worked in 96 countries with 1.5 million Baptist members in 27,000 local churches and/or missions, and with 10,000 local pastors.

The Foreign Mission Board continues to plan to facilitate the involvement of every church and each Christian in a total effort to win the world for Jesus Christ.

With intercessory prayer blessed by the Holy Spirit, Southern Baptist missions bore fruit in 1982 with 140,844 baptisms in churches and missions overseas.

Church memberships overseas were up 74,500 over the year before, overseas churches giving \$65.8 million, up \$13 million more than last year.

Baptists around the world averaged 1 baptism for every 11 members, compared to our own Southern Baptist Convention ratio of 1 in 34 members.

There were 700 new churches started overseas in 1982.
