We honor Rev. Marshall Black, a man who has been involved in Ministry since 1929, when he was licensed by his home church, Brunner's Chapel, while a student at Union College in Jackson, Tennessee.

His early preaching was in the local jail at the County Workhouse in Jackson.

He became pastor at Salt River Baptist Church, South District Association, in 1932, preaching two Sundays a month at no salary with the agreement that they would give \$100.00 that year to the Cooperative Program. He was later called to pastor the Deep Creek Baptist Church on the other two Sundays. Marshall pastored at Deep Creek for 16½ years, from 1937-1953.

Brother Black has the distinction of having served on the Constitution Committee when the Mercer County Association was formed out of the South District

Association in 1953 and on the Committee when the Taylor County Association was formed out of the Russell Creek Association in 1957.

He also served as the first Sunday School Superintendent of this association. Brother Black was an approved State Sunday School worker while serving in South District, Mercer County, Russell Creek and Taylor County Association.

He worked in Sunday School Enlargement Campaigns in Atlanta, Georgia; New Orleans, Louisiana; St. Louis, Missouri; and Louisville, Kentucky with Roy Boatwright who for many years was "Mr. Sunday School" in Kentucky.

Brother Black pastored the Palestine Baptist Church from 1956-1966 during which time their beautiful new building was built, and he pastored at Good Hope from 1969-1978.

He preached before the Annual Association in 1962 while pastor at Palestine and again in 1976 while pastor at Good Hope. Having preached twice before this Association puts him in the illustrious company of D. L. Druien, J. Chester Badgett and L. M. Hamilton.

He has served on various committees of the association and served as the immediate past moderator presiding over the 1982 and 1983 Annual meetings.

Brother Black has served as a bi-vocational pastor throughout his years of ministry, serving in education as well as pastoring. He taught in schools in Mercer County, at Campbellsville College, and Taylor County. For three years before coming to Campbellsville College he was Minister of Education at Harrodsburg Baptist Church.

My grandfather used to praise his best horses by saying, "He works good anywhere you hitch him." I submit to you my friends that Marshall has served his Lord and his denomination well anywhere he was hitched.

Constitution

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each cooperating church shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) members, plus four messengers from each mission sponsored.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. The body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any cooperating church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot or raising of hand: Moderator, First Assistant Moderator; Second Assistant Moderator; Clerk; Assistant Clerk; Treasurer; Assistant Treasurer; and Auditor; whose duties shall be as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors. But no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of cooperating churches and missions and one lay member from each church. All general associational officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as a moderator. Each associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of

the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the work of the association between the annual sessions. Quorum of the Executive Board consists of nine members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed in the association.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- 1. Officers elected at the annual meeting shall assume their duties at the close of the meeting at which they were elected.
- 2. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association, send five copies to the Secretary of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, and keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the association.
- 3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association or money received from any other sources, shall make reports to the Association and the Executive Board and shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association and the Executive Board. He shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the association.
- 4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

- 1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.
- 2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.
- 3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, Associational W. M. U. Officers, Associational Church Training Officers, Associational Brotherhood Officers, Church Music Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.
- 4. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee, Program Committee, Missions Committee, Evangelism Committee, Christian Education Committee, and the Nominating Committee which shall be responsible for nominating all Standing Committee Members. Members of the Standing Committees will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year, with the exception of the Missions Committee which shall have, in addition to the three members, a representative from the Women's Missionary Union and a representative from the Brotherhood selected annually. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless specified by special motion.

Proceedings

YUMA September 10, 1984—7:00 P.M.

- 1. Moderator James Jones called the meeting to order at 6:58 P.M.
- 2. Bro. John Ayers led the congregation in the singing of "All Hail the Power."
- 3. The host pastor, Bro. David Turner, welcomed those present, read Hebrews 2:9-3:4, and led in prayer.
- 4. The clerk moved that all presently registered messengers, as well as those registering at subsequent sessions, be enrolled and seated as messengers. The motion was duly seconded and carried.
- Bro. George Gaddie moved that the printed program with revisions as necessary be adopted as the program for the twenty-seventh annual meeting of Taylor County Baptist Association. Bro. Homer Kirtley seconded the motion and it was approved.
- 6. The clerk called the roll of churches. Seventeen churches and two missions were represented. Only Pitman Valley was not. There was also a large delegation from Eastside Baptist Church.
- 7. A. Bro. George Gaddie brought a recommendation from the Credentials Committee and moved that Acton Baptist Church, formerly Acton Mission of the Campbellsville Baptist Church, be received into the fellowship of the Taylor County Baptist Association and that their messengers be seated. Dr. Chester Badgett seconded the motion and it was approved.
 - B. Bro. Gaddie brought a second recommendation from the Credentials Committee and moved that Eastside Baptist Church be received under the watchcare of the association. This motion was seconded by Bro. Bill Clement and carried.
- 8. Dr. Jerry Kibbons asked Bro. Marshall Black, immediate past moderator of the Taylor County Baptist Association, to be seated on the platform. He recognized several accomplishments of Bro. Black and in conclusion shared that Bro. Black had served excellently in every capacity in which he labored.
- Dr. Jones recognized three new pastors this year who were present: Bro. Bill Clement, Bro. Roger Alford, and Bro. Kenneth Wells. One other pastor, Bro. Jim Morgan, was not present.
- 10. Bro. Rolando Raganas announced the preview showing of a Billy Graham film slated for the following morning for pastors and other church leaders.
- Dr. Jones announced three committees he had previously appointed: Credentials Committee—Bros. George Gaddie, Chairman; Howard Beauman; and Jim Campbell. Time, Place, and Preacher Committee—Bros. - 13. The moderator read the treasurer's report at the request of the treasurer and prepared by him. Bro. Jeremiah Cox moved that it be adopted. With Bro. Don Gowin's second the motion was approved.
- 14. Bro. E. Poe Young brought the auditor's report and moved for its approval. The motion was duly seconded and carried.
- 15. Bro. Bob Martin brought recommendation from the Nominating Committee for Department Leadership. When there were no further nominations from the floor he moved that those nominated be elected. The motion was duly seconded and all were elected by vote of the messengers.
- Bro. Jim Fox presented the report of the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee and moved it be adopted. This motion was duly seconded and approved.

- 17. Dr. J. Chester Badgett brought the In Memoriam report. He read Revelation 14:13 and after a few comments read a list of those departed during the 1983-1984 associational year. He asked the congregation to stand in memory of the deceased and after a few moments of silence led in a prayer of thanksgiving for their lives and leadership.
- 18. Associational Music Chairman John Ayers led the congregation in the singing of "Take the Name of Jesus with You."
- 19. Bro. Eldred Taylor brought a message from the Kentucky Baptist Board of Child Care.
- 20. Bro. Grady Randolph reported on the Baptist Foundation.
- Dr. Franklin Owens presented a report on the purposes and progress of Boyce Bible School.
- Bro. John Ayers and his wife, Cathy, sang, "Step into the Water," as special music.
- 23. Bro. Richard Reed, pastor of Robinson Creek, brought the annual sermon, entitled "The Christian's Responsibility toward the Gospel." His text was II Timothy 1:11-18. As he spoke of the Christian's responsibility he pointedly reminded the association that it took 42.3 church members to reach one soul for Jesus Christ during the past year at a cost of \$6,066.12 each. His challenge was that our churches and membership should be better steward's of God's time, talent, and money.
- 24. Second Assistant Moderator Darrell Hunt dismissed the first session of the twenty-seventh meeting of Taylor County Baptist Association with prayer.

- 25. The moderator, Dr. James Jones, called the meeting to order at 3:01 P.M.
- 26. Bro. Rolando Raganas, Minister of Music at Campbellsville, led the congregation in the singing of "Since Jesus Came into my Heart."
- Bro. Don Gowin, pastor of Green River Memorial, read John 1:1-12, and led in prayer.
- A. Bro. Gowin presented the Sunday School Report and moved for its adoption. Seconded by Bro. Bill Clement, it was approved.
 - B. Bro. Gowin then presented the Vacation Bible School Report and moved for its approval. Seconded by Bro. Tom Gupton, the motion carried.
 - C. The clerk read the Church Training Report prepared by Bro. Jim Collison, past director, and moved for its approval. Duly seconded, the motion carried.
 - D. The Women's Missionary Union director, Mrs. James Fox, gave the W.M.U. Report and moved for its approval. The motion carried after Dr. Jerry Kibbons' second.
 - E. The Brotherhood Report, prepared by Director Eugene Smith, was presented by Bro. Glen Canada, who moved for its approval. Bro. Lynwood Kessler seconded the motion which carried.
 - F. Bro. Chris Clarke presented the Youth Report and moved for its approval. With Bro. Richard Reed's second the motion carried.
- 29. A. 1. Bro. Gabriel Collett, Missions Committee Chairman, presented a report from that committee and moved for its approval. Bro. Howard Beauman seconded the motion and the report was adopted.
 - As a part of the Missions Committee Report, Bro. Jeff Smith presented a report of the KOA Campground ministry. A motion to adopt the report was duly seconded and passed.
 - B. The report on Christian Publications was presented by Mrs. Ruby Curry.

 A motion to approve the report was duly seconded and carried.
 - C. Bro. Howard Beauman gave the report on the Cooperative Program and Stewardship. After his motion for adoption, the motion was duly seconded and approved.

- Bro. Rolando Raganas led the congregation in the singing of "Standing on the Promises."
- 31. A. Bro. George Gaddie brought the nominations from the Committee on Committees. With no further nominations, he moved for the acceptance of the nominations. Duly seconded the motion carried.
 - B. Bro. Howard Davenport brought a report on Benevolent Institutions and moved for its approval. Seconded by Bro. Don Watson, the motion carried.
 - C. The Evangelism Committee Report was presented by Bro. Richard Reed, who moved for its approval. Duly seconded, the motion carried.
 - D. Bro. Homer Kirtley presented a report from the newly formed Christian Life Committee and moved for its adoption. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

32. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- A. MODERATOR—With First Assistant Moderator Gabriel Collett presiding, Bro. Howard Beauman placed the name of Dr. James E. Jones in nomination for Moderator. With no further nominations Bro. George Gaddie moved that nominations cease. With Bro. Jim Fox seconding the motion, Dr. Jones was elected to his second term as moderator by acclamation.
- B. FIRST ASSISTANT MODERATOR—With Dr. Jones again taking the gavel, Bro. Beauman placed the name of Bro. Gabe Collett in nomination for First Assistant Moderator. The clerk moved for his election by acclamation and with the motion duly seconded Bro. Collett was elected.
- C. SECOND ASSISTANT MODERATOR—Bro. Tom Gupton placed the name of Bro. Darrell Hunt as nominee for Second Assistant Moderator. Bro. Beauman moved that nominations cease, and with several seconds, Bro. Hunt was elected by acclamation.
- D. CLERK—Bro. Homer Kirtley nominated Jim Campbell as Clerk. Bro. Marshall Black moved that the present clerk be reelected by acclamation and the motion, duly seconded, carried.
- E. ASSISTANT CLERK—Bro. Howard Beauman nominated Bro. Richard Reed to be Assistant Clerk. A motion was made, duly seconded, and carried that Bro. Reed be elected Assistant Clerk by acclamation.
- F. TREASURER—Dr. Jerry Kibbons placed the name of Bro. Jeremiah Cox to be nominated as Treasurer. He then moved for reelection by acclamation. This motion was duly seconded and carried.
- G. ASSISTANT TREASURER—Bro. Howard Davenport nominated Ms. Margaret Redmon for Assistant Treasurer. The clerk moved that nominations cease. The motion was duly seconded and Ms. Redmon was elected by acclamation.
- H. AUDITOR—Bro. Jeremiah Cox nominated Bro. E. Poe Young for Auditor. A motion for election by acclamation by Bro. Howard Beauman was duly seconded and passed.

33. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

- A. The clerk, Jim Campbell, moved that the Executive Board Report distributed at the afternoon session be approved for printing in the annual book of minutes. Bro. Bill Clement seconded the motion and it carried.
- B. Constitutional Changes referred from the 1983 meeting.
 - 1. Article 2—Bro. George Gaddie read the proposed Article change and moved that it be approved. After a second, discussion followed. Dr. Kibbons, a member of the Constitution Revision Committee moved to amend the proposed change to delete the words "not to exceed ten messengers from each church." This motion was duly seconded and carried. After further discussion Dr. J. Chester Badgett moved to change the word in the last phrase from "for" to "from." This

motion to amend was carried after a second. The following was read as amended:

Each cooperating church shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) members, plus four messengers from each mission sponsored. This Article was adopted as a change to Article 2 of the Constitution.

2. Article 5—Bro. Gaddie read the proposed Article change and moved that it be approved. This motion was duly seconded. Bro. Bob Martin spoke to the motion and noted that since the Auditor was also being elected at the time of the Election of officers, this position should also be added. He then moved that the Article change be amended to include the Auditor being elected at the annual meeting. The motion to amend was seconded and approved. The following was read as amended:

This body shall, on meeting annually, elect by nomination and private ballot or raising of hand: Moderator, First Assistant Moderator; Second Assistant Moderator; Clerk; Assistant Clerk; Treasurer; Assistant Treasurer; and Auditor; whose duties shall be as custom imposes on their respective offices. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successors, but no one shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.

This Article was adopted as a change to Article 5 of the Constitution.

3. Article 7—Bro. Gaddie read the proposed Article change and moved that it be approved. This motion was duly seconded. After discussion the following proposed Article change was read:

The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of cooperating churches and missions and one lay member from each church. All general associational officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as a moderator. Each associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the work of the association between the annual sessions. Quorum of the Executive Board consists of nine members.

This Article was adopted as a change to Article 7 of the Constitution.

- 4. Bro. Gaddie then moved that the words "member churches" be changed to "cooperating churches" in all articles in the Constitution. This motion was duly seconded. After a question as to the constitutionality of changing Article 4, the motion was approved.
- C. Constitutional changes to be referred to 1985 session.
 - 1. Bro. Gaddie read the following proposed change to Article 5.

The Time, Place, Preacher Committee shall, in addition to the annual meetings, select a time and place for a spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the next associational year, at which time the body shall elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand: Moderator; First Assistant Moderator; Second Assistant Moderator; Clerk; Assistant Clerk; Treasurer; Assistant Treasurer; and Auditor; whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. The Nominating Committee shall also make its report at this time and all auxiliary directors shall be elected. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successor, but none shall be eligible to the office of moderator for more than two successive terms.

He then moved that the proposed change be referred to the 1985

session. This motion was seconded by Bro. Bob Martin and passed.

2. Bro. Gaddie read the following proposed change to Article 9.

This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency, the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting. In addition to the annual meeting, the body shall meet in a spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the following associational year.

(A proposed change in the By-Laws was not given at this time, but will

be taken into consideration at the 1985 meeting:

The proposed change to By-Law 1 will be "Officers elected at the spring session shall assume their duties at the close of the last session of the fall meeting.")

D. Long Range Planning Committee Chairman Bob Martin presented a list of fifteen (15) recommendations which that committee had given to the executive board in May of 1984. After a comprehensive explanation of the Director of Mission's duties, salary, and compensations plus an outline of the cost of establishing an office with a secretary, he made the following motion:

We move that we follow the recommendation of the executive board that we go forward in the employment of a part-time Director of Missions, the establishment of an Associational Office, the employment of a part-time secretary, and that we urge all of our churches in our association to give 2% of their undesignated funds to the associational work so that we might be able to support all of our mission program.

This motion was duly seconded. After a lengthy discussion of all aspects of the motion, the motion was carried.

- E. Nominations were made for Kentucky Baptist Convention Executive Board Member. Bro. Bob Martin placed the name of Dr. James E. Jones in nomination. Bro. Don Gowin placed the name of Bro. Howard Beauman in nomination. Dr. Chester Badgett moved that nominations cease. This motion was duly seconded and carried. The presently elected Kentucky Baptist Convention Executive Board will elect one of these two men to serve as Taylor County Baptist Association's Executive Board Member.
- F. Bro. Jeremiah Cox, after some prefacing remarks moved that the associational financial year be changed to not coincide with the associational year, but run from September 1 through August 31. This would empower him to pay bills, etc., which came due during the time from the end of the regular associational year (July 31) until just before the annual session. He presently is forced to write checks without the authorization of the association as the budget has expired. This motion was seconded by Bro. Homer Kirtley. After discussion and an explanation that the Stewardship Chairman would provide for this in a motion at the time of the adoption of the budget, Bro. Gabriel Collett moved that this motion be tabled until after the adoption of the budget at the evening session. The motion carried after a second by Dr. Chester Badgett.
- G. Bro. Howard Beauman questioned whether the Constitution Revision Committee had considered the fact that our association had no guidelines as to accepting a church which had not been a mission and had set a precedent by admitting Eastside under the watchcare of the association the previous evening. The matter was referred to the existing Constitution Revision Committee.
- H. There being no further business, it was decided to adjourn by common consent.
- 34. Bro. Roger Alford, new pastor at Mt. Gilboa, dismissed the second session of the Taylor County Baptist Association with prayer.

CAMPBELLSVILLE September 11, 1984—7:00 P.M.

- 35. The moderator, Dr. James Jones, called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.
- 36. The congregation, under the leadership of Bro. Rolando Raganas, sang "We're Marching to Zion."
- 37. Bro. Bill Clement, new pastor at Friendship, read Matthew 28:19,20, first in Spanish and then in English, and led in prayer.
- 38. Moderator Jones welcomed the visitors and messengers to the meeting.
- 39. Associational Sunday School Director Don Gowin recognized churches who had achievement in Sunday School during the past associational year. The following churches had 2.7% or greater increase in membership: Acton, Campbellsville, Elkhorn, Good Hope, Green River Memorial, Liberty, Lowell Avenue, Meadowview, Mt. Gilboa, Raikes Hill Mission, Robinson Creek, Salem, and South Campbellsville. The association had an average of 5% gain over all.

The Largest Enrolment Increase: Elkhorn-62; Lowell Avenue-47; and Salem-40. The Largest Percentage Enrolment Increase: Acton-24%; Elkhorn-20%, and Liberty-17%. Twelve churches showed an increase in average Sunday School attendance during the year: Campbellsville, Elkhorn, Fairview, Green River Memorial, Liberty, Lowell Avenue, Mt. Gilboa, Pitman Valley, Robinson Creek, Salem, Saloma, and South Campbellsville. The Largest Average Attendance Gain: Campbellsville-64; South Campbellsville-19; and Green River Memorial and Salem-16. The Largest Percentage in Average Attendance: Liberty-19%; South Campbellsville-17%; and Salem-15%.

- 40. Bro. Gilbert Sapp, chairman of the Christian Education Committee presented the clerk with a written report and moved that it be included in the minutes without reading to grant extra time to the Campbellsville College report. This motion was seconded by the clerk and carried.
 - Dr. Davenport gave the Campbellsville College report dealing with the impact of a Christian college in a community. He gave a brief history of the Russell Creek Baptist Academy, the parent institution of Campbellsville College, and cited the projected growth (or lack of it) of the college.
- 41. A change in the program was made at this point to allow for some unfinished business from the afternoon session.
 - A. Item 5 of the Long Range Planning Committee recommendations, read by Bro. Bob Martin, referred to a proposed By-Law change.

Mrs. James Fox moved that By-Law Article II, Number 4 be changed to read:

The Standing Committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee, Program Committee, Missions Committee, Evangelism Committee, Christian Education Committee, Nominating Committee, and the Committee on Committees which shall be responsible for nominating all Standing Committee Members. Members of the Standing Committees will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year, with the exception of the Missions Committee which shall have, in addition to the three members, a representative from the Women's Missionary Union and a representative from the Brotherhood selected annually. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless otherwise specified by special motion.

This motion was seconded by the clerk and carried.

- B. Mrs. Fox further moved that these two extra representatives be allowed to be elected at the October meeting of the executive board. This motion was duly seconded and carried.
- C. Bro. Al Hardy moved that the Taylor County Baptist Association go on record supporting American Christian Television System and, that we as Taylor County Baptists, do all we can to support a decent alternative on

television and radio and, that the Committee on Committees officially appoint as a standing committee a Radio and Television Committee to serve as a liasion between Taylor County Baptists and local Radio, Television, and Cable Television for the purpose of promoting the Gospel of Jesus Christ and a decent alternative in Radio and Television. This motion was seconded and carried.

D. Bro. Bob Martin moved to further amend By-Law Article II, Number 4 to abolish the Committee on Committees and transfer their duties to the Nominating Committee. This motion was seconded by Committee on Committees Chairman George Gaddie and passed. The amended By-Law Article II, Number 4 now reads as follows:

The Standing Committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee, Program Committee, Missions Committee, Evangelism Committee, Christian Education Committee, and the Nominating Committee which shall be responsible for nominating all Standing Committee Members. Members of the Standing Committee will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year, with the exception of the Missions Committee which shall have, in addition to the three members, a representative from the Women's Missionary Union and a representative from the Brotherhood selected annually. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless specified by special motion.

- E. The clerk moved that the Annual Minutes contain a Music Report and a Singles Report when they are submitted. This motion was duly seconded and carried.
- 42. Budget Chairman Gabriel Collett presented the Proposed Budget and moved that the proposed budget be approved and empower the treasurer to write checks for bills incurred until next year's budget, 1985-86, is approved. - Bro. David Turner presented the State, Home, and Foreign Missions Reports and moved they be approved. Bro. Richard Reed seconded the motion which carried.



Disciple Youth, a discipleship and evangelism course for youth?

These and other resources are the ways in which Church Training develops believers.

Let me share with you briefly now about what has already happened this year in Taylor County amoung our Church Training ministries. We had 77 in attendance this year at our "M" Night service. Also, we had 14 participants in our Children's Bible drill. 13 of these were associational winners. These went on to take part in the state drill, and 10 of our Taylor County children were state winners. I would also like to thank the parents and churches for their support of these children. In our associational drill we had our largest crowd in attendance. We had 87 people present.

Bold Mission Thrust depends on increased missions support, involvement and knowledge. Robinson Creek sent Rev. Richard Reed, pastor to Erie, Pennsylvania for a revival and are planning to help sponsor a revival in Southern Illinois in October, 1984. Salem helped sponsor a revival in Erie, Pa. and conducted a remote VBS in Taylor County.

Jeff Smith, a student of Campbellsville College was selected to serve in the KOA Campground Ministry. A Worship Service was conducted at 9:00 A.M., each Sunday morning from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend.

In May, Taylor County Baptists experienced a World Missions Conference. It was the highlight of the year with nearly all of the churches participating. Our missions department worked long and hard hours planning for this highly successful event with total attendance for the week in all churches being 4,712. The speakers were excellent and each person who heard them has a better understanding of all missions.

The executive board voted upon this committee's recommendation to involve the association in the Ohio Partnership and the Kenya Linkage to the extent each church wanted or felt led to be involved. This committee recommended that a W.M.U. and Brotherhood representative be on the Mission Committee next year

in order to have better overall representation.

We commend the churches that have planned and that are in the process of carrying out their plans to get involved in Missions. It is our prayer that many will hear God's Call and respond to it to serve in Associational, State, Home, and Foreign Missions; not forgetting that Taylor County is a great mission field for each of us and that each Christian has a great PERSONAL responsibility and opportunity as the Holy Spirit leads.

In my limited time I would like to mention briefly the characteristics of a few. **Open Windows** is a Southern Baptist guide for personal devotions. The reading if followed will take you through the entire Bible. It also contains a missionary prayer calendar in which all missionaries and their birthdays are listed.

Home Life is a Christian family magazine. It is geared to help couples as they build a Christian home life together and rear their children in a spiritual atmosphere. It includes Family Bible Study and Family Worship.

Mature Living meets the need of senior adults. It stresses ways for older people to handle depression, traveling, exercise, or other spiritual occupations. It

contains short stories and other interesting reading.

The Commission is the magazine of the Foreign Missions Board. This magazine tells what Baptist missionaries are doing around the world. The October-November issue reports on how Baptists are faring in Nicaragua, El Salvador and Honduras.

The publication that we are most familiar with is **Western Recorder** which has been in existence as such since 1851. It is a reliable source of information on what Baptists believe and what Baptists are doing in Kentucky and throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. The major news this year is the coming of the new editor, Dr. Jack Sanford who replaces C. R. Daley, the editor for twenty-seven years. The back page is special for church, college or associational news. 60 churches are now using this space.

REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP/COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

This year's Stewardship emphasis is called, "Give Boldly: Demonstrating My Growing Commitment." Developing Christian stewards is not an option but an imperative if Bold Mission Thrust is to be a reality. "GIVE BOLDLY" includes stewardship development, Cooperative Program Promotion and Endowment and Capital Giving. Through this emphasis, it is hoped that church members will grow in their awareness of opportunities for ministries at home and around the world and in their commitment to the Lordship of Jesus Christ.

As Associational Stewardship Chairman, I would share three items that

would be helpful in magnifying giving through the local congregation.

*The Church Stewardship Committee planbook is available for churches wishing to thoroughly plan a stewardship development program. This planbook, the filmstrip AV-2, the Church Stewardship Committee, and the video tape, the Values of a Church Stewardship Committee provide adequate resources for training this committee.

*The Stewardship Standard is a guide for evaluating and planning stewardship activities and emphases that will help members in their spiritual development. The Stewardship Standard may be acquired from Jesse Stricker in the stewardship office to help strengthen stewardship develop-

ment and mission support in each church.

*Christian Stewardship in Action. This stewardship study course book is a 'how-to' for stewardship leaders in the church. It covers leadership responsibilities through stewardship education, mission support, budgeting, and accounting of funds received.

PLANNED GROWTH IN GIVING

Recently you may have been hearing a lot about "Planned Growth In Giving." Planned Growth in Giving is a 15-year, 1985-2000, growth-in-giving plan. The growth plan is simple. Each individual/family is encouraged to adopt for each of the years a bitesize growth in the percentage of their income given through their churches. Each year's goal should be attainable, and at the same time, be a significant step toward the 15-year growth target.

Churches are asked to outline and adopt a similar 15-year, 15 step growth plan for their support of associational missions and a 15-year set plan of percentage increase of the church income given to missions through the

Cooperative Program.

The same 15-year, 15 step pattern is recommended for state conventions in dividing funds with the Southern Baptist Convention's Cooperative Program and by the Southern Baptist Convention in reaching the adopted goal of 75% of Cooperative Program funds for the two mission boards.

Brother Gabriel Collett is our Associational Planned Growth in Giving Chairman and he will be contacting you in the future about an informative rally and other important facts.

EVANGELISM REPORT 1983-84

Kentucky Baptist churches reported a total of 17,595 baptisms for 1984. This represents a loss of 1,559 compared to 1983. This is the third consecutive year there has been a drop in Kentucky baptisms. Comparing this year's baptisms with that of 1981, there is a numerical loss of 3,699.

There is one baptism for every 42.9 Kentucky Baptist members. In Taylor County Association the figure is only minutely lower—42.3.

Total baptisms in our association this year was 169. This is an increase of 23 from last year's total of 146.

Taylor County Baptists participated in four Evangelism Rallys. These meetings were hosted by different churches within the association. Palestine Baptist Church also hosted an Evangelism Seminar on March 5. This meeting was led by Dr. Tal Bonham, Exec. Secretary of Ohio Baptists.

During this next year we will enter the third step of a four-year Evangelism strategy promoted by the State Evangelism Department.

1983-Year of prayer for Spiritual Awakening

1984—Year of Lay Witness Evangelism

1985—Year of Preparation for Simultaneous Revivals

1986—Year of Evangelism (This will include simultaneous revivals and other events.)

During the February meeting of the Executive Board, it was decided that we would lead the Taylor County Association of Baptists to support this Simultaneous Revival effort during the week of April 13-20, 1986. This Revival effort will have state-wide participation April 6-27, 1986.

The KBC's Evangelism Department reports the following major events took place last year.

Mid-Continent Bible College in Mayfield and Carlisle Avenue Baptist Church of Louisville each hosted a Growing An Evangelistic Church seminar. The Mayfield seminar was led by Jay Brown and Fred Halbrooks. Frank Crumpler, Bob Crumpler, and Bob Campbell led in Louisville.

Twelve area Evangelism Conferences were conducted, the closest one being hosted by the Campbellsville Baptist Church. Conference subjects were: Women and Family Evangelism, Laymen in Evangelism, Resources for Evangelism, and the Survival Kit.

The State Evangelism Conference was hosted by the Walnut Street Baptist Church of Louisville. In spite of the worst snow and ice storm of the winter, interest was high and many came to hear great, inspirational preaching, including that of Dr. James T. Draper, then President of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The State Youth Evangelism Conference was at Highview Baptist Church in Louisville. Three college groups presented a major portion of the program.

It is both the prayer and concern of the Evangelism Committee that pastors,

staff, and churches will greatly involve themselves with Events of Evangelism at both the State and Associational level in order that we may have the best year in Evangelism that we have ever enjoyed.

BENEVOLENT INSTITUTION REPORT

Our Baptist Homes for Children is a giving ministry to children and families which is dear and close to the heart of God. Baptists have been providing special care to dependent, neglected, deprived, hurting children throughout the years. This ministry to children continues as a strong and vital part of Kentucky life. This past year's offering totaled \$614,330. Although an excellent offering, it fell \$10,000 under last year.

Our ministry to children includes caring for the physical, emotional, social, educational, and spiritual needs. Much of the work cannot be reported with

statistics, but for that which can, here are some of the highlights:

Inquiries for help—612 families representing 716 children. Children actually served—407

Unmarried, pregnant girls—45

Placed for adoption—10 infants

Foster Home placement—54 including 15 infants

Emergency temporary shelters-2 provided care for 106 youth

Children's homes—Spring Meadows-84 children; Glendale-104 (Both these homes have a capacity of 60 children at one time.)

Youth involvement in church and church related activities is high. Statistics for this year include 17 baptisms, 33 other professions of faith, 7 transfers of letters, and 30 rededications.

Your Kentucky Baptist Children's homes strive to provide a ministry to children which honors God.

The Healing ministry is provided through four hospitals and several other clinics and agencies.

Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington reports that 18,837 persons were admitted, 24,959 received outpatient treatment, there were 9,101 surgeries performed and that 2,835 babies were born.

Highlands Baptist Hospital in Louisville admitted 5,892, handled 13,984 outpatients, performed 1,716 surgeries, and had over 100,000 Laboratory and X-Ray

procedures.

Baptist Hospital East in Louisville reported as follows: Admissions-15,431, Outpatient visits-46,837, Surgeries-6,787, X-Ray and Laboratory procedures-over 200,000.

Western Baptist Hospital in Paducah is adding 48 beds in a \$9.6 million building project. It reported 13,670 admissions with 100,960 patient days of care.

Gary Stringer, representing the Marion County Ministerial Association. The meeting concerned the proposed night club near the Marion/Taylor County line.

Due to the efforts of the Marion County Ministerial Association, an application for a retail beer license by Keysen, Inc. was refused by the Marion County Administrator. The application was taken to the Kentucky Alcoholic Beverage Control Board in Frankfort, Kentucky, for review on May 14, 1984.

In our meeting with Bro. Gary Stringer we learned that the Lebanon Baptist Church, in a large measure, was fighting a battle in the interest of Taylor County. We learned also, that they were in need of funds to continue the litigation against issuance of a retail beer license to Keysen, Inc.

At the Executive Board Meeting on April 4, 1984, this committee recommended that we contribute \$500.00 to the Marion County Ministerial Association which was approved.

We are happy to report that the Kentucky Alcoholic Beverage Control Board refused to issue the license.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION "Go Ye...Teach all Nations..."

Over 70 educational institutions sponsored by the Southern Baptist Convention and individual state Baptist conventions are committed to Christian witness.

A part of the human resource related to these institutions are more than 6,000 teachers and administrators and over 184,000 students who are working and studying in our Southern Baptist Seminaries, colleges and schools.

Located within our state is one of the six Southern Baptist seminaries, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary located in Louisville, Roy L. Honeycutt, President. We have three senior Baptist colleges: Campbellsville College, W.R. Davenport, president, Campbellsville; Cumberland College, James H. Taylor, president, Williamsburg; Georgetown College, Morgan Patterson, president, Georgetown. We also have an adult Bible school, Clear Creek Baptist School, Leon A. Simpson, president, Pineville; and we have one institute, Oneida Baptist Institute, Barkley M. Moore, president, Oneida.

Write to the institution in care of the president if you would like any details or if you are planning to visit or attend one of these educational institutions.

Each year, the third Sunday in February is set aside on the Kentucky Baptist Convention calendar as BAPTIST SEMINARY, COLLEGE AND SCHOOL DAY.

CHECK IT OUT

One of the most popular myths circulating around Southern Baptist circles today is the typical Southern Baptist college-bound student cannot afford to attend a Southern Baptist college. That is just not true.

One cannot deny the tuition and fees listed for state-supported institutions are generally lower than those at Baptist colleges, but THOSE FIGURES DO NOT TELL THE ENTIRE STORY.

FINANCIAL AID TIPS

- 1. Start early. Contact the Financial Aid Office as soon as you have decided on the college, and ask them for all forms and information about grants, loans, jobs, and institutional scholarships.
- 2. Remember to file a Need Analysis Form. There are many versions of this form and you should check with the school you are insterested in attending to see what is required. This Needs Analysis Form is important because it determines the family contribution which is expected from all students.
- Check all sources. Be sure to check with your high school guidance counselor, your state Baptist convention, local Baptist association, pastor, local civic clubs and other organizations about any financial aid programs they might be aware of or offer.

4. Ask about special programs. Many Baptist colleges offer financial aid programs to sons and daughters of Baptist ministers, and to students preparing for church-related vocations. Also special scholarships are sometimes available for active RA's and Acteens. Some Baptist colleges offer special scholarships for children of alumni. Check with the school's financial aid office.

KENTUCKY BAPTIST SCHOLARSHIP FUND

On May 7th, 1972, the Executive Board established the KENTUCKY BAPTIST SCHOLARSHIP FUND to assist Baptist students who wished to attend Campbellsville, Cumberland or Georgetown. For further information concerning qualifications for receiving one of these scholarships, please contact Jesse C. Stricker, Director of Promotion.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

We are in the midst of a large surge by cults and sects, almost 1500 in number, actively seeking disciples in our country. Other countries are sending their own missionaries into the U.S. one such country is Saudia Arabia. They are investing millions of dollars annually hoping to make Islam a viable religion in America. There are over 500 counties in America without any Southern Baptist witness.

The Home Mission Board is attempting to meet these challenges. They are supporting 3,700 mission personnel, and 46,000 volunteers who are working in all 50 states, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Canada, and the American Virgin Islands. Both of these numbers of workers are greater than last year.

The workers and work of Home Missions need our faithful prayers and financial support. Let us see the need and supply the support.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

More than 3,300 mission personnel are serving in 102 countries, an increase from 96 last year. These missionaries proclaim the gospel and assist in starting new churches.

Last year brought increases in our Foreign Mission program. These increases are:

- 2) An average of 27 churches were started each week.
- 3) The total number of churches overseas is now 13,586
- 4) Total missionaries serving the field is 3,346.
