## CONSTITUTION

**Article 1.** This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

**Article 2.** Each cooperating church shall be entitled to four messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) members, plus four messengers from each mission sponsored.

**Article 3.** The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

**Article 4.** The body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any cooperating church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

**Article 5.** The Time, Place, Preacher Committee shall, in addition to the annual meetings, select a time and place for a spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the next associational year, at which time the body shall elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising hand vote: Moderator; First Assistant Moderator; Second Assistant Moderator; Clerk; Assistant Clerk; Treasurer; Assistant Treasurer; and Auditor; whose duties shall be as custom imposes on their respective offices. The Nominating Committee shall also make its report at this time and all auxiliary directors shall be elected. All officers shall continue until superceded by their successor, but none shall be eligible to the office of moderator for more than two successive terms.

**Article 6.** An opportunity may be offered for other churches to unite with this body, and visitors shall be invited to sit with us with no power to vote.

**Article 7.** The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of cooperating churches and missions and one lay member from each church. All general associational officers and auxiliary heads will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as a moderator. Each associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the work of the association between the annual sessions. Quorum of the Executive Board consists of nine members.

**Article 8.** In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Promotional Committee shall consist of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion may demand.

**Article 9.** This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency, the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting. In addition to the annual meeting, the body shall meet in spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the following associational year.

**Article 10.** This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is the guide of the parliamentary order followed by the association.

## **BY-LAWS**

### **ARTICLE I—DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

1. Officers elected at the spring session shall assume their duties at the close of the last session of the fall meeting.

2. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association, send five copies to the Secretary of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, and keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association or money received from any other sources, shall make reports to the Association and the Executive Board and shall make such disbursements as authorized by the Association and the Executive Board. He shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

## ARTICLE II—COMMITTEES

1. The Promotion Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report of the progress of their program.

2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.

3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, Associational W.M.U. Officers, Associational Church Training Officers, Associational Brotherhood Officers, Church Music Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.

4. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee, Program Committee, Missions Committee, Evangelism Committee, Christian Education Committee, and the Nominating Committee which shall be responsible for nominating all Standing Committee Members. Members of the Standing Committees will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year, with the exception of the Missions Committee which shall have, in addition to the three members, a representative from the Women's Missionary Union and a representative from the Brotherhood selected annually. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless specified by special motion.

## PROCEEDINGS

### SALOMA

September 9, 1985

1. First Assistant Moderator Darrell Hunt called the first session of the Twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Taylor County Baptist Association to order at 6:58 P.M.
2. The associational Music Chairman, Bro. John Ayers, led those assembled in the singing of the hymn, "The Banner of the Cross."
3. Bro. James Fox, the pastor of the host church welcomed those present to the church, read from Ephesians 3, and led in the opening prayer.

- B. An amendment to Article 5 of the constitution which was deferred from the 1984 session was read. After its reading, Dr. J. Chester Badgett moved for its adoption. This motion was seconded by Bro. Howard Beauman. It was approved. Article 5 now reads as follows:

The Time, Place, and Preacher Committee shall, in addition to annual meetings, select a time and place for a spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the next associational year, at which time the body shall elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising of hand: Moderator; First Assistant Moderator; Second Assistant Moderator; Clerk; Assistant Clerk; Treasurer; Assistant Treasurer; and Auditor; whose duties shall be such as custom imposes on their respective offices. The Nominating Committee shall also make its report at this time and all auxiliary directors shall be elected. All officers shall continue in office until superceded by their successor, but none shall be eligible to the office of moderator for more than two successive terms.

- C. An amendment to Article 9 proposed at the 1984 session was read. After its reading, the clerk moved for its adoption. This motion was seconded by Bro. Bill Clement and was approved. Article 9 now reads as follows:

This body shall meet annually, according to adjournment, but in case of emergency, the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting. In addition to the annual meeting, the body shall meet in a spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the following associational year.

- D. A proposed amendment to By-Law I was read: Officers elected at the spring session shall assume their duties at the close of the last session of the fall meeting. After its reading, Bro. Howard Beauman moved for its adoption. Seconded by the clerk, the amendment was adopted.
- E. The Budget Committee recommended that the Associational Financial

Fiscal Year run from September 1 through August 31. Bro. Howard Beauman moved that this recommendation be adopted. There was a second by Bro. Tony Rodgers. Discussion followed in which it was clarified that this motion only affected the associational finances and not the records submitted to the association by the churches. The motion carried.

- F. Due to the problem of selecting treasurer, the election of an Auditor was overlooked at the regular time of election of officers. Therefore, Bro. George Gaddie nominated Bro. E. Poe Young to the position. Bro. Henry Parrott moved that the nominations cease and he be elected by acclamation. This motion was seconded by Dr. J. Chester Nadgett and Bro. Young was elected.
33. After some comments by Bro. Henry Parrott, Bro. Tony Rodgers dismissed the second session of the twenty-eight Taylor County Baptist Association meeting with prayer.

Jesus believed in and practiced Christian Education. One of his favorite titles and roles for himself was that of teacher. The commission given by Jesus charges Christians as they go to teach.

Kentucky Baptists arrived in Kentucky with this conviction. Baptist Schools were begun before we organized a convention.

We have three fully accredited senior colleges in Kentucky. Georgetown College at Georgetown with Morgan Patterson as president. Cumberland College at Williamsburg with James H. Taylor as president. Campbellsville College at Campbellsville with W. R. Davenport as president. Oneida Baptist Institute at Oneida with Barkley M. Moore as president. This is a boarding high school with approximately 500 students. Clear Creek Baptist School at Pineville with Leon A. Simpson as president. This school trains preachers and others who generally have received the call later than the usual age and who need Biblical and theological training.

Campbellsville College by its location in our association naturally claims our special attention. All of our churches are blessed by its location in our midst. The College has just completed a million dollar church centered campaign with gifts and pledges going well beyond the goal. \$750,000. of this campaign is earmarked for permanent endowment to be used for student scholarships.

The College is launching a new campaign with a million dollar goal for increasing our permanent endowment and another half million for much needed campus improvement.

Your committee would congratulate all the churches which participated in the church centered campaign in making it a success and would encourage each church to continue through their church budgets to support the college. We furthermore urge every individual to participate in the person centered campaign by giving and encouraging others to give in the effort to stabilize the future of this worthy institution.

In spite of the fact that only a small percent of our Baptist young people attend our Baptist schools, the majority of our Foreign Missionaries are the products of our Baptist Colleges. This fact alone mandates our support both with our students and money of our Baptist Colleges and Schools.

We congratulate our College Administration and Faculty for their high academic training, their skills being used in such a strategic way as well as their unusual dedication to the Lord and his calling. We are mindful not only of the wholesome influence on the student body, but in our churches and community as well.

We had 13 participants in our Children's Bible Drill, all of which were associational winners. All 13 went on to the state Bible drill and 12 were state winners. Those churches represented were Mt. Gilboa, Campbellsville Baptist, and Lowell Ave.

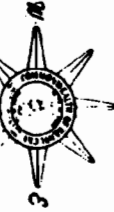
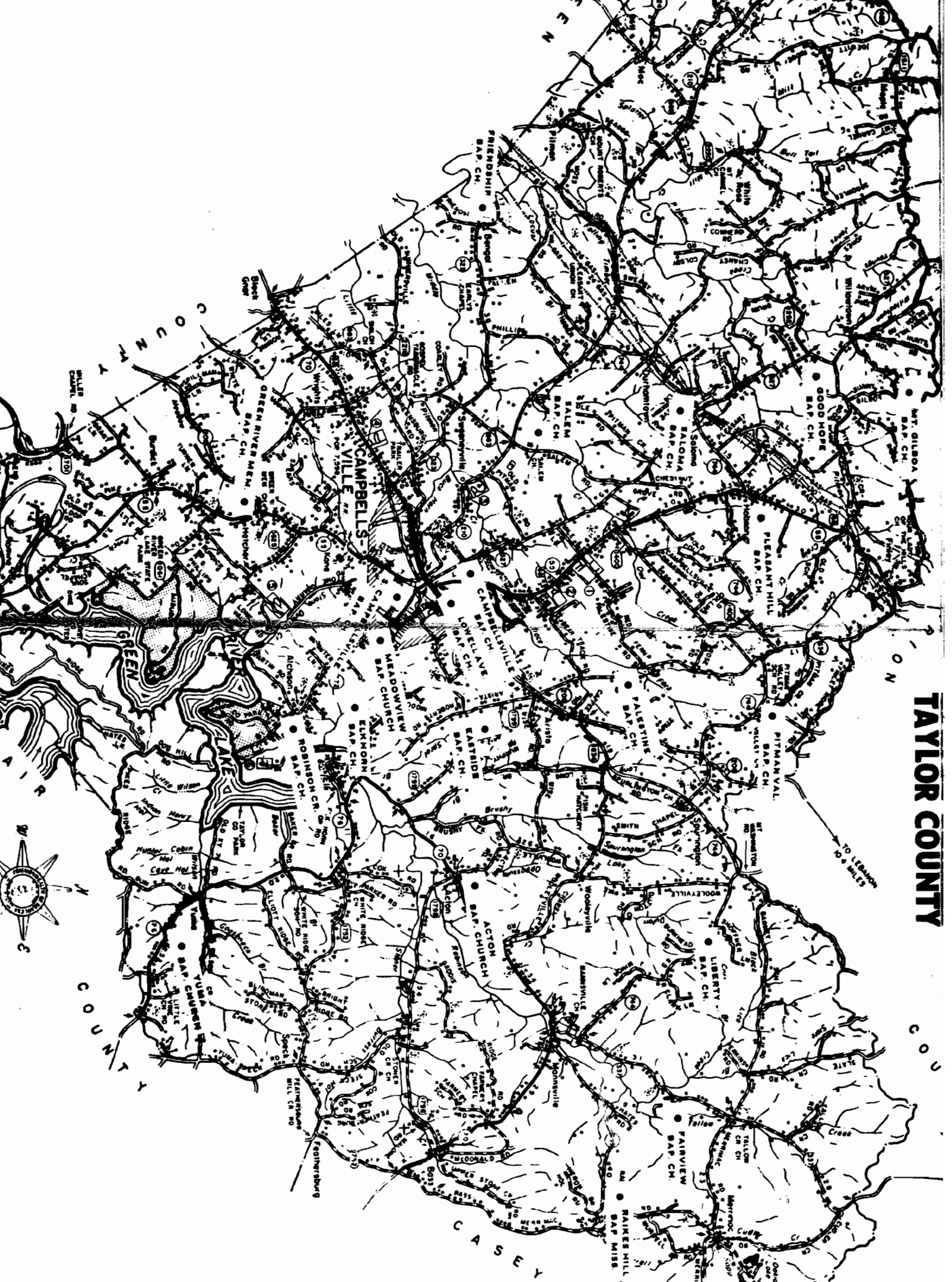
For the year there were great increases. For the year 1983-84 enrollment was 1063. This year the enrollment went up to 1366, an increase of 33%. There were 8 churches who participated in a doctrinal study, 2 more than last year. There was an increase in use of the survival kits from 20 in 1983-84 to 54 this year. Also there was a great increase in enrollment of equipping centers, from 35 in 1983-84 to 185 this year. This is fantastic.

We also had Saloma Baptist Church to place third in the state in training awards received by its members. This great achievement placed them in the top 500 in the Southern Baptist Convention. May God bless their efforts and ours as we work together in the coming year.

## WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

A space shot of the earth's surface reveals the complexity of the world we live in.

Within that complexity WMU members have been "By Love Compelled" to minister and witness in His name. The "By Love Compelled" emphasis objectives are:

1. To involve each church member in a lifestyle of personal ministry and witness.
2. To minister within the complexity of urban life.

Attention has been given to enlistment/enlargement as we sought, and continue seeking, to involve larger numbers of preschoolers, girls and women in the organization of Woman's Missionary Union through the specified age-level organizations.

Woman's Missionary Union, SBC, has set a goal to have 2,000,000 women, girls and preschoolers involved in quality education by September 1988. Kentucky has set an enlistment goal of 100,000.

A goal as ambitious as this requires that associational WMU activities emphasize setting goals, making contacts and nurturing prospects and new members for missions education.

Taylor County associational WMU has set a goal to have 1,552 members by 1988. The present membership is 856, an increase of 51 over last year's report. Twelve churches have increased in WMU membership, and Eastside, Good Hope, Green River Memorial, Liberty, Mt. Gilboa, Saloma and Yuma, these seven churches, are on target or beyond their percentage of increase in membership for the 1988 goal.

During the past year, two new organizations: Eastside and Liberty, have been organized in our association, making a total of 17 organizations. Three churches and one mission do not have WMU.

Taylor County Associational WMU spent money to carry on the work of Woman's Missionary Union throughout the association by training and giving assistance to churches with WMU programs and sharing information with churches that do not have WMU organizations. \$55 went for training; \$45 for operating expenses; \$35 speakers at general meetings; \$108 for age level training and activities; \$56 materials given to local WMU groups. In addition to this \$241 was given for special mission projects through the Associational WMU. The total funds used by the Taylor County Association WMU was \$540. The Association gave the WMU \$300 for the work, the remainder came from the members of local WMU organizations attending the Quarterly meetings or through special contributions from the church WMU to specific mission projects undertaken by the Associational WMU.

Delores J. Gilliland began her work as Executive Director/Treasurer of Kentucky Woman's Missionary Union October 1, 1984. Oneita Connell is now the administrative assistant.

## REPORT ON BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood work in Kentucky is growing. Our Associational Brotherhood Director is Eugene Smith. The Associational Baptist Men's President is Paul Pike and the Associational Royal Ambassador Director is William Glen Canada. We have a total of 541 men and boys enrolled in Brotherhood. This includes 220 Baptist Men, 72 Pioneers, and 105 Crusaders. There was a 13.4% increase from last year.

### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Our report last year clearly identifies seven basic principles as shared by Dr. R. Keith Parks, President, Foreign Mission Board. These principles reflect the Biblical foundation and our clear commitment to a New Testament approach to foreign missions. They are:

1. A Biblical basis for what we do.
2. Our primary purpose: Evangelism that results in churches.
3. The incarnational approach, emphasizing the career missionary who goes to live among and serve a people.
4. The priesthood of believers, meaning that every believer is a witness, thus involved in support of foreign missions (our volunteer program allows personal participation for those who are able).
5. Indigenous approach, meaning, "home-grown" churches with worship and ministry natural to their environment and local leadership.
6. A comprehensive approach, not an emphasis on one single issue or method but outreach through the total scope of ministry to which Southern Baptist are committed.
7. Responsibility to communicate what is happening on the mission fields to Southern Baptists.

Southern Baptist Missionaries in foreign countries have baptized 156,326 people. That is a gain of 7% over 1983 and is an average of 428 persons per day. The missionary force grew 2.57% making the total missionary personnel 3,432. The appointment of career missionaries was the second highest ever and the resignation rate of 1983 and 1984 was the lowest in 20 years.

How can you participate in foreign missions as a Kentucky Baptist? Kentucky Baptist are involved in a partnership with Kenya in such a way that you may go if you are financially, physically and spiritually able. For further information call the associational office.

The greatest way you and I can help meet world needs is to give to missions through the cooperative program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. The need and the call for help is much greater than the supply.

### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Dr. Bill Tanner, President of Home Mission Board, had indicated that we now work cooperatively with 37 state conventions, each with different needs and resources. The diversity in our work is evident, from personal evangelism to Christian social ministries, language mission to black church relations, we preach, witness and minister in 87 different languages: Vietnamese to Apache, Spanish to Chinese.

We have 3,723 Home Missionaries that minister to the total needs of people in the United States. Below is an overview of 12 programs of the Home Missions Board.

1. Associational Ministries — work in 1,200 associations.
2. Black Church Relations — work with black churches in church related ministries.
3. Chaplaincy Ministries — 1,728 chaplains are approved by the Home Mission Board. Some are supported financially.
4. Christian Social Ministries.
5. Church Loans — help build 223 churches and purchased 54 new building sites.
6. Church Extension — 1,984 churches or missions were started.
7. Evangelism — One of the greatest programs we have.
8. Inter-Faith Witness — This is to understand and communicate with people of other faiths.
9. Language Missions — the department works with 84 language cultural groups, speaking in 87 different languages.
10. Metropolitan Missions — numerous missionaries in cities with over 50,000 people.
11. Rural Urban Missions — helping small churches by planning programs and training leaders to work with the people.
12. Special Missions Ministries — assigned 42,416 volunteer mission action programs.

The Home Mission Board cooperates with the KBC in many ways to reach people with the gospel and many other ministries. For more details please look in the book of reports.

## REPORT ON DIRECT MISSIONS

The Direct Missions Department of the Kentucky Baptist Convention is the department which assists in doing mission work throughout the state. Salaries are supplemented to approximately 140 persons who serve in many different kinds of mission endeavors.

Considerable time was given in the past year to the formulation of purpose, objectives and goals as well as action plans for the work of Direct Missions, 1985-90.

During the past year, the Korean Church building at Radcliff was completed. It was partially paid for by the Koreans but principally by the Kentucky Baptist Convention Woman's Missionary Union.

Since the first of January, 1985, 34 additional Kentucky churches have become involved in the Kentucky-Ohio Partnership. Also, four additional associations have linked with associations in Ohio. Approximately 65 persons have either gone to Kenya or committed themselves to go through July, 1985. There are opportunities for an additional 60-65 persons to go during the rest of the calendar year. G. Allen West spends full-time with the daily operation of the Kentucky-Kenya Partnership.

As best we can determine, seven new churches have been organized in the Kentucky Baptist Convention in 1985. Our goal is to start 400 new congregations between 1985 and 1990.

Each Baptist family should have the Western Recorder in their home to offer good reading to their family.

Plans for next year will include a Calendar Committee meeting for the department directors and committee chairmen in the near future. Many other plans will be made for the year before us as I work with all of the associational leaders.
