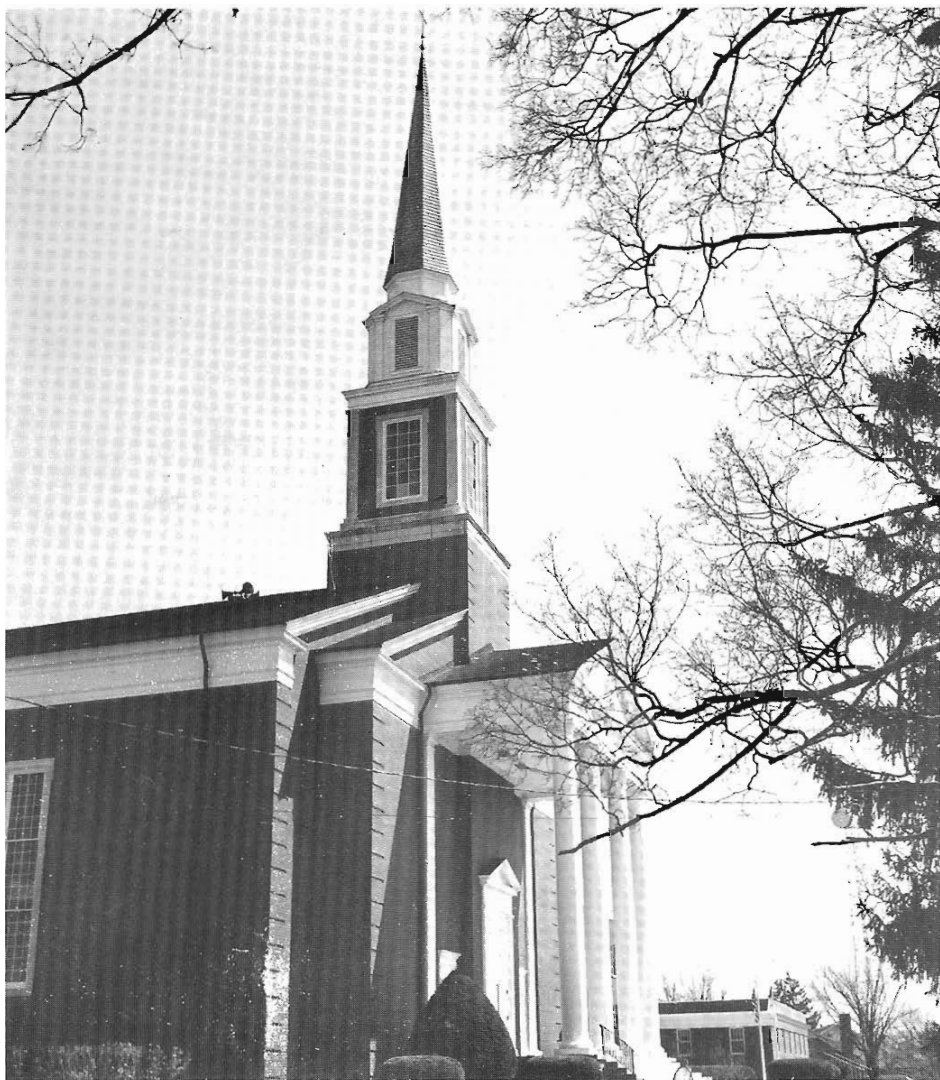

TAYLOR COUNTY ASSOCIATION OF KENTUCKY BAPTISTS CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.

Article 2. Each cooperating church shall be entitled to four (4) messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) members, plus four (4) messengers from each mission sponsored.

Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.

Article 4. The body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any cooperating church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.

Article 5. The Time, Place, and Preacher Committee shall, in addition to the annual meeting, select a time and place for a spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the next associational year, at which time the body shall elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising hand vote: Moderator; First Assistant Moderator; Second Assistant Moderator; Clerk; Assistant Clerk; Treasurer; Assistant Treasurer; and Auditor; whose duties shall be as custom imposes on their respective offices. The Nominating Committee shall also make its report at this time and all auxiliary directors shall be elected. All officers shall continue in office until superseded by their successor, but none shall be eligible to the office of moderator for more than two successive terms.

Article 6. Churches desiring fellowship in the association must make application to the executive board at least six (6) months prior to the annual meeting. The application shall be referred to a Credentials Committee who shall be responsible for examining the church's articles of faith and record of mission support. The committee will also be responsible for bringing a preliminary report to the Executive Board and a final report to the Annual Meeting.

Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of cooperating churches and missions and one lay member from each church. All general associational officers, auxiliary heads, and committee chairmen will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as moderator. Each associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the work of the association between the annual sessions. Quorum of the Executive Board consists of nine (9) members.

Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Executive Committee shall consist of Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion demands.

Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency, the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting. In addition to the annual meeting, the body shall meet in spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the following associational year.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: *Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order* is a guide of the parliamentary order followed by the association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1--DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. Officers elected at the spring session shall assume their duties at the close of the last session in the fall meeting.
2. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association which shall include statistics from August 1 through July 31 immediately preceding the annual meeting covered by the minutes, send five copies to the Secretary of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, send copies to various other Baptist agencies, and keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association or money received from other sources, shall make reports to the Association and the Executive Board covering the Associational year of August 1 through July 31 and shall make disbursements as authorized by the Association and the Executive Board, and shall be authorized to pay all bills and salaries established by the budget adopted at an annual meeting until the next budget is adopted at the following annual meeting. He shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the association.
4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II--COMMITTEES

1. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a monthly report on the progress of their program.
2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.
3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, Associational W. M. U. Officers, Associational Church Training Officers, Associational Brotherhood Officers, Church Music Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.
4. The standing committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee; Program Committee; Missions Committee; Evangelism Committee; Christian Education Committee; Time, Place, and Preacher Committee; Resolutions Committee; Youth Committee; and the Nominating Committee which shall be responsible for nominating all Standing Committee Members. Members of the Standing Committees will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year, with the exception of the Missions Committee which shall have, in addition to the three members, a representative from the Women's Missionary Union and a representative from the Brotherhood selected annually. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless specified by special motion.

AUGUST, 1990--It was announced that the Baptist Telecommunication Network would cease operation at the end of September. Materials would still be available at a higher cost. However, the association has a good supply of material on hand which was taped over the past several years from the network.

SEPTEMBER, 1990--FALL MEETING--Bro. Tom Gupton took the gavel as the fourth layman to serve Taylor County Association of Baptists as their moderator at the conclusion of the meeting.

OCTOBER, 1990--Rev. Eugene Smith reported that one had been saved at the jail on the previous Sunday. He gave a brief testimony of the young man who had accepted Christ.

NOVEMBER, 1990--It was announced that the association had received a gift of an almost new Bell & Howell 16 mm projector with take-up reel.

DECEMBER, 1990--The association approved a motion that each church in Taylor County select or elect a minimum of two laymen to comprise a Taylor County Associational-Campbellsville College Relationship Council to serve as a liaison between the association and Campbellsville College to determine ways the association could assist the college. Dr. Forest Shely was named as chairman of this council.

JANUARY, 1991--It was reported that churches in the association had responded with an excellent Lottie Moon Offering for the year.

FEBRUARY, 1991--Rev. Jack Palmer presented a program on the Sunday School *Breakthrough* Growth Campaign. He explained a foundation upon which the campaign could begin.

MARCH, 1991--Mission Committee Chairman Dr. J. Chester Badgett announced some tentative plans for the World Mission Conference. He reported that housing might be a problem with Campbellsville College because of an increased number of students.

APRIL, 1991--Discipleship Training announced that Miss Bonnie Moore and Miss Laura Campbell, both of Campbellsville, had represented the association in the Youth Speakers' Tournament and Youth Bible Drill respectively.

MAY, 1991--SPRING MEETING--All of the elected officers of the association were reelected to their present positions, after which Mike Crain delivered the sermon for the annual spring meeting. It was entitled "Marks of a Christ-filled Church" and was based on Acts 4 and 5.

JUNE, 1991--Tom Gupton and Ray Flewellen reported on their experiences in the lay-led revival in Troy, Missouri. Several other men from Taylor County had been involved with the meeting.

JULY, 1991--People from churches in the association were involved with the booth on the Fourth of July. Several hundred Testaments and tracts were distributed.

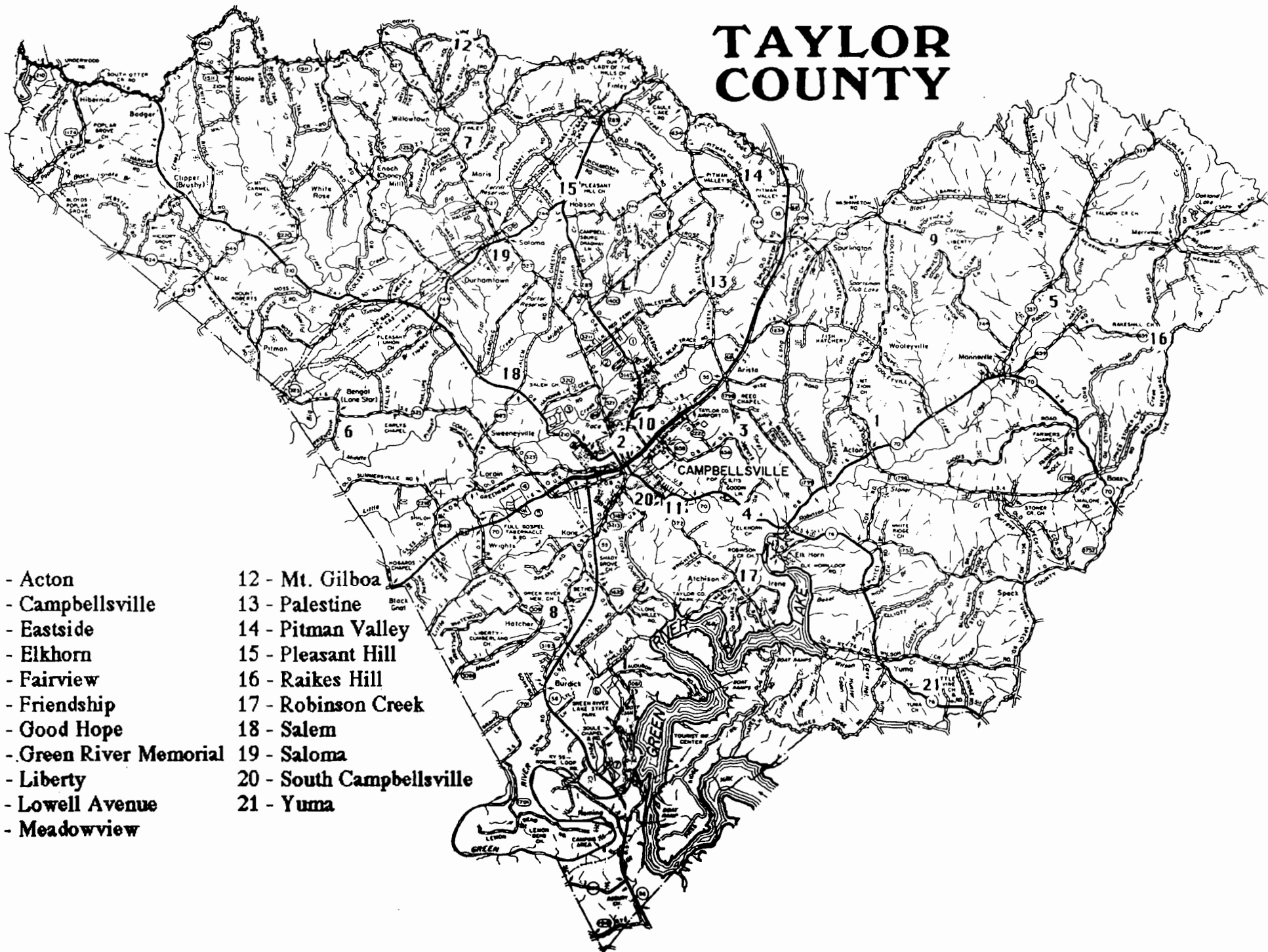

MUSIC REPORT

It has been my responsibility to serve for the last two years as associational music director. I would like to brag on the great accomplishments I have had, but I cannot. Instead, I will give you the facts concerning the state of our music ministry here in Taylor County Baptist churches.

In 1990-1991 we had fifteen churches with no children enrolled in a music education program. In 1989-1990 there were thirteen churches with no children enrolled. In 1989-1990 our churches enrolled a total of one hundred seventy-three children from preschool through sixth grade. nineteen churches had a total of fifty-nine children (or three children per church). This past year we enrolled two hundred fifteen children. Nineteen churches enrolled eighty-seven children (or four children per church). This pattern of non-children music program reflected in the youth enrollment, seventy-six total. It is no surprise that six churches reported no adult choir enrollment.

Every church in our association reported music leadership. This lets me know there are adults who want a music ministry. We need to constantly strive to teach our children and youth the importance of singing praises to God. I am afraid that if we don't "wake up" to reality, in twenty years there will be no adults singing God's praises.

I pass the challenge to each of you to begin a children's choir in your church and to support Doug Broome as he becomes available to assist you. Let us not let our children sing only secular music. We need to pass on a tradition of offering praise to God with our voices.

MEDIA COMMITTEE REPORT

The basic purpose of media is to help the churches of Taylor County Association in their outreach ministry. Although BTN no longer exists, a number of new video releases arrive at the associational office regularly.

1. *Southern Baptist Report: Kentucky Edition*--released three times each year, keeps Kentucky Baptists informed of the work and ministry of Kentucky Baptists in our state and the Southern Baptist Convention.
2. *Missions USA*, a Home Mission Board video magazine, tells the mission story from many different viewpoints, and is always filled with helps for the spring Home Mission study.
3. *Foreign Mission Update* is a foreign mission video magazine designed to keep the church informed of events in the foreign mission fields. The fall edition of this magazine aids in preparation for the Foreign Mission study. There is also a tape supporting the adult Foreign Mission study, "Kaleidoscope: Images of a Calling."

The Annuity Board offers materials, including video tapes, to aid in preparation for a personnel budget and planning ahead for annuity and health benefits of a church staff. "How to Build for an Adequate Retirement" is a video included for the pastor.

The Church Audio Visual Equipment plan will not be available after October. It made audio-visual equipment available to churches at a discount price and was used by many of our churches.

The association maintains a video camera, portable video cassette recorder, programable video cassette recorder, film strip projector, 16 mm movie projector, hymn player, and TELL Witness equipment for use by our churches, as well as as a library of BTN tapes.

STATE (DIRECT) MISSIONS REPORT

Listed below are a few of the activities of the Kentucky Baptist Direct Mission Department.

Eighty-eight persons from Kentucky participated in missions in the Kentucky-Brazil Partnership.

Seventeen projects have been assigned in the continuing partnership with Ohio, and thirty projects have been assigned in the new Kentucky-Utah/Idaho Partnership. Every association in Idaho has now been linked with a Kentucky association.

Five new churches, three new missions, and twelve new preaching points were begun between 01 September, 1990, and 31 May, 1991.

In literacy programs, twenty persons have received training in English as a second language, and thirty-six have been trained to teach adult non-readers to read the Bible.

Work with two new ethnic groups has begun along with plans being made to minister to migrant workers in Central Kentucky.

Three metro associations, along with the Kentucky Baptist Convention and the Home Mission Board have sponsored a metro-ministries conference to assist churches in reaching people in the cities. Also seven associations in non-metro areas are involved in strategy planning.

Thirty-six Summer Mission Workers were enlisted, trained, and placed in the field.

HOME MISSION REPORT

The Home Mission Board reports as of August 29, 1991, that we have 5,147 full-time missionaries. There are 1,386 active volunteers on the field for one year or longer in 996 different places of service. We now have full-time missionaries in all fifty states plus Canada, American Samoa, and Puerto Rico.

The 1991 Annie Armstrong Offering goal was \$41,000,000. Through July, \$33,794,026 had been received. Taylor County Baptists have given \$16,647, an increase of seven and four-tenths percent (7.4%) over last year.

Dr. Larry Lewis states that evangelism is a major emphasis at the Home Mission Board, and it permeates all we do. Baptisms increased nine and seven-tenths percent (9.7%) over 1990. In all 355,031 were reported through uniform church letters. Church enrollment surpassed fifteen million, and ongoing Sunday School enrollment topped eight million. Part of this increase can be attributed to the "Here's Hope" revival emphasis. Dr. Lewis states that only 200,000 are baptized each year from the pagan sector, estimated at more than one hundred seventy million people. We need to ask that God give us a burden for the lost in our nation.

Kentucky Baptist Convention has a new partnership with Utah-Idaho and is continuing its partnership with Ohio, but to a lesser degree than previously. These provide opportunities for service for those willing and able to go from Taylor County.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

Dr. Kieth Parks, in his report to the Foreign Mission Board, challenged the trustees to accelerate worldwide evangelistic efforts during this decade of Bold Mission Thrust--Southern Baptists' effort to share the gospel with every person on earth by A.D. 2000.

Dr. Parks noted that the Foreign Mission Board has exceeded its target of ten thousand volunteers, and that the current mission force is approaching its goal of 5,000 with a total of 3,899 now on the field. Mission workers have been assigned to one hundred twenty-one countries with a presence or a witness in a total of one hundred eighty-five countries. More than two hundred thousand have been baptized in each of the last three years, and a thirteen percent (13%) growth in the number of churches is encouraging.

God is knocking down walls and opening doors in Eastern Europe, the Soviet Union, and the Persian Gulf. The number of missionaries assigned to Eastern Europe has risen from twelve to forty-nine since 1990, and more are on the way. Soviet leadership received training that resulted in more than one thousand Sunday Schools being established there. In June, Jane and Boyd Robertson went on a mission trip to the Soviet Union. In Operation Desert Storm, at least twelve hundred (1,200) professions of faith were recorded by Southern Baptist chaplains.

The Kentucky Baptist Convention continues its partnership with the Baptist Convention in Espirito Santo, Brazil. A number from Taylor County have served there.

The Lottie Moon Offering goal was \$86,000,000. Taylor County Baptists have given \$49,987, and increase of fourteen and nine-tenths (14.9%). Gifts of \$334,489, an increase of four and one-tenth percent (4.1%), were reported through the Cooperative Program. These give us opportunities to share Christ around the world.

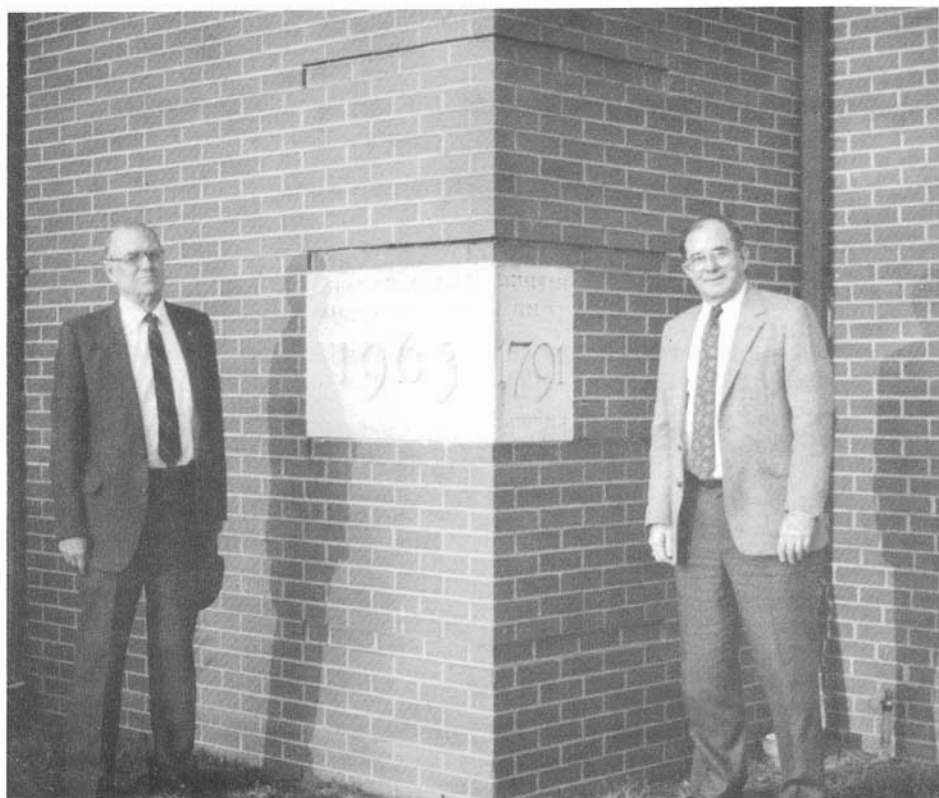

A BRIEF HISTORY OF CAMPBELLSVILLE BAPTIST CHURCH SERVING CHRIST AROUND THE WORLD SINCE 1791

Around the time of the close of the Revolutionary War, a large number of people came from the East Coast to settle in what was then Kentucky County of Virginia. Among these were a number of loyal Baptists. According to tradition, a group of these Baptists gathered in the home of John Harding and organized the Pitman and Robinson Creek Baptist Church in June of 1791, calling **Joseph Anderson** as their first pastor.

The church was probably organized by Benjamin Lynn, a Separate Baptist who was busy in the Green River area at this time. This would explain why the church entered the South Kentucky Separate Baptist Association. It remained in this affiliation until 1800, when it joined with several other Baptist Churches in the formation of the Green River Association of Regular (or United) Baptists. In 1802, a group were dismissed to form a church on Pitman Creek under the leadership of **Elder James Hill** and sent separate messengers to the Green River Association. Before the end of the year, Robinson Creek Church again asked to unite with the group at Pitman Creek. The name Pitman Creek was used until the church moved into Campbellsville and became the Campbellsville Baptist Church.

Campbellsville has had three outstanding characteristics from its very inception which have persisted to the present.

First of these, a **strong spirit of evangelism** which was manifested toward winning the lost. Although people trusted the Lord in regular services, the majority of membership has been added during revivals. The church has felt the ministry of outstanding pastors and evangelists from throughout the Southern Baptist Convention.

A strong Sunday School program under such leaders as Lee Edwards and Everette Lee has undergirded the spirit of evangelism and been instrumental in getting many into the church. Baptist Training Union (now Discipleship Training) was reestablished under the leadership of **Dr. Harvey Morrison**, 1943-1949, and has been instrumental in training people for an evangelical witness.

Secondly, a **deep commitment to mission work** manifested itself even before there was a Southern Baptist Convention or a Kentucky Baptist Convention. For many years fifty percent of the regular offering was budgeted for mission causes, and the church operated on the remaining fifty percent. During some of this time, as much as sixty percent went outside the local church for mission causes. When this pattern was broken under the pastorate of G. Dallas Faulkner, a strong effort was made to hold the line, but lost out by a narrow margin. For many years the pastor's and mission pastor's salaries were preferred items, with the remaining balance divided equally between the Cooperative Program and local needs.

During the pastorate of Dr. J. Chester Badgett, a true percentage was shown in the budget, and a strong emphasis was placed on missions. The Cooperative Program percentage of regular offering receipts reached 27 1/2 % during his pastorate. During Dr. Paul Horner's year of interim ministry, this percentage grew to 27 3/4 %. After his tenure, the amount to go through the Cooperative Program was reduced to 25 % against the protest of several of the membership, where it has remained for the last decade. Due to increases in membership, total giving, and inflation, this amount has shown an annual increase, but the church has dropped from fourth to sixth position in gifts through the Cooperative Program in Kentucky. Some of this loss has been gained in special mission offerings, and the church has been liberal in making it possible for pastors to participate in mission projects. Lay members have participated along with the pastors in several mission projects.

In the third area, the Church has always manifested an unwavering loyalty to the denomination. When the first Kentucky Baptist Convention was formed, many Kentucky churches refused to join because many Baptists looked upon a convention as an organization with authority over the local church. Campbellsville, however, cooperated and became an active participant. The original convention was disbanded, and the General Association of Baptists in Kentucky was formed. Because most people had a better interpretation of the term "association," most churches in Kentucky joined. It was not until recently that the General Association dared to change its name back to the Kentucky Baptist Convention.

While many other churches have proven disloyal to the Southern Baptist Convention and have set up a quasi-convention because they cannot control the majority in the convention, Campbellsville has held firm its support for Southern Baptist Convention causes. One of the main reasons that the church will hold firm is that it had a hand in making the convention what it has become.

Campbellsville has had strong pastors throughout its two-hundred-year history. Several went on to become prominent leaders in other areas and institutions of the denomination.

Russell Holman, pastor from 1840-1842, left Campbellsville to go to New Orleans. Finding no Baptist church there, he set about preaching the gospel of Christ in that Catholic stronghold and was instrumental in organizing what became the Coliseum Baptist Church. In 1845, he was elected as Secretary of the Home Mission Board. Since the Southern Baptist Convention was established in that year, he was probably its first Secretary. He served in that capacity from 1845 until 1851 and again from 1856 until 1861, with ill health interrupting his tenure and then causing him to resign for good. He also served as pastor during his time away from the board.

William Green, who served as pastor in the church in 1858 and 1859, left Campbellsville to become instrumental in organizing new churches in Illinois and serving as pastor in others. In 1881 he was appointed by the American Baptist Home Mission Board as the first missionary to the Republic of Mexico, facing much opposition there as he performed the first baptism by immersion in Central and Southern Mexico. He served until he was eighty-four years of age and left a tremendous impact for Christ and the Baptist cause in Mexico.

G. Dallas Faulkner, who was pastor from 1927 to 1929, went into California and organized the First Baptist Church of San Francisco with ten members. Faulkner and Isom B. Hodges, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Golden Gate, California, along with six deacons from each church, met on March 31, 1944, to form the Golden Gate Seminary. Dr. Isom became its first president, and Dr. Faulkner became its first Bible teacher. This institution has greatly influenced Baptist life, especially in the West. Dr. Faulkner also established a Baptist paper which later became the official voice of California Southern Baptists.

Dr. J. Chester Badgett, who served the church for thirty years from 1950 to 1980, was elected president of the Kentucky Baptist Convention in 1963. He also served two terms on the Foreign Mission Board (1962-1968), and as its president the last two years on the board (1967 and 1968). He has served on the board of trustees of New Orleans Seminary and also of Campbellsville College. As trustee of the latter, he has worked with Drs. John Carter, J. K. Powell, and W. R. Davenport, and is still working with Dr. Ken Winters. In 1957 he stood with Dr. Carter and helped sell Kentucky Baptists on the idea of Campbellsville College becoming a four-year institution.

Early in his ministry at Campbellsville, Dr. Badgett led in the idea of a new educational building, and in 1962 stood in tears as he, along with his congregation, saw the church auditorium go up in flames. The church met the following morning--a Sunday--in the high school auditorium and proceeded with the business at hand. In one of its first acts after the fire, the church congregation again showed its deep commitment to mission causes by increasing the percentage of undesignated receipts to go through the Cooperative Program.

Upon his retirement, Dr. and Mrs. Badgett served as volunteer missionaries in Hong Kong, after which he returned to Campbellsville, serving as interim in other churches and continuing a leadership role in the Taylor County Baptist Association. He and Mrs. Badgett have also served as volunteer missionaries in Nairobi, Kenya, and Caracas, Venezuela.

The present pastor, Dr. James E. Jones, came to Campbellsville in 1981. He served as president of the Kentucky Baptist Convention in 1989. He has been chairman of four of the six different committees, including the Executive Committee, on which he has served or is presently serving for the Southern Baptist Convention. He has led in the building of a Christian Life Center, which has recently been completed.

Campbellsville has had several meeting houses or sanctuaries. Two of these are still standing. The Campbellsville Public Library is now housed in the second Campbellsville Baptist Church building which stood on that spot, having replaced a wooden structure which was moved to the other side of the court house and became a business building before being destroyed by fire in 1953. The present sanctuary replaced the one which burned in 1962.

Campbellsville has had a tremendous outreach in two areas. Because of its close ties with Campbellsville College, many students of that institution have been members of the church. Many of these young people have gone into areas of ministry throughout the world, serving as pastors, denominational leaders, and missionaries. Dr. Jim McKinley and his wife, noted missionaries to Bangladesh, were members of the church while students at the college.

Also, the church was one of the first in Central Kentucky to use radio and television as a means of outreach. In 1948, the church began broadcasting morning services and an afternoon program over Campbellsville's first radio station, WTCO. The church began telecasting its services over television station WGRB when that station went on the air, and later joined the ACTS network. These avenues of outreach have enlarged the church's scope of influence in Christian witness.

Campbellsville, then in the Russell Creek Association, joined fourteen other Taylor County Churches in the formation of the Taylor County Baptist Association in 1957 and has provided leadership in this body during its thirty-four year history. Dr. Badgett served as moderator of the association for the first two years, and Woodruff Chandler, church clerk at Campbellsville, served as clerk to the association for the first nine years of its history.

Dr. Jones also served as moderator for two years. Others have provided leadership in committees, as directors of various departments, and Jerry Kibbons and Ron Roberson served as program directors for the association while members at Campbellsville. Ken Foreman, an assistant pastor at Campbellsville, served as clerk for the association in 1976, and the present clerk of the church, Jim Campbell, is also serving as clerk of the association.

Campbellsville is to be congratulated in this, the beginning of its third century of Christian leadership in Central Kentucky, throughout the state and Southern Baptist Convention.
