

CONSTITUTION

- Article 1. This body shall be called the Taylor County Association of Kentucky Baptists.
- Article 2. Each cooperating church shall be entitled to four (4) messengers, one of whom shall be the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) members, plus four (4) messengers from each mission sponsored.
- Article 3. The business of this body shall be, when assembled, to hear reports from the churches with regard to their condition as to members, prosperity, etc., to consult together for their development and growth in all matters pertaining to the evangelism of the world, and shall hold and control such property as shall come into possession of the association.
- **Article 4.** The body shall exercise no authority over the local churches, and recognizes their complete autonomy. The Association reserves the right, as final action, to sever relations with any cooperating church for engaging in practices not considered Biblical.
- Article 5. The Time, Place, and Preacher Committee shall, in addition to the annual meeting, select a time and place for a spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the next associational year, at which time the body shall elect by nomination and private ballot, or raising hand vote: Moderator; First Assistant Moderator; Second Assistant Moderator; Clerk; Assistant Clerk; Treasurer; Assistant Treasurer; and Auditor; whose duties shall be as custom imposes on their respective offices. The Nominating Committee shall also make its report at this time, and all auxiliary directors shall be elected. All officers shall continue in office until superseded by their successor, but none shall be eligible to the office of Moderator for more than two successive terms.
- Article 6. Churches desiring fellowship in the association must make application to the executive board at least six (6) months prior to the annual meeting. The application shall be referred to a Credentials Committee who shall be responsible for examining the church's articles of faith and record of mission support. The committee will also be responsible for bringing a preliminary report to the Executive Board and a final report to the Annual Meeting.
- Article 7. The Executive Board of the Association shall be composed of all pastors of cooperating churches and missions and one lay member from each church. All general associational officers, auxiliary heads, and committee chairmen will by virtue of their office be members of the Executive Board. The retiring Moderator will be a member of the Executive Board for the year following his active service as a moderator. Each associational officer shall hold the same office in the sessions of the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall be responsible for the work of the association between the annual sessions. A quorum of the Executive Board consists of nine (9) members.
- Article 8. In the appointment of committees, individuals shall be named instead of churches, and on each committee named, one or more members shall be laymen. The Executive Committee shall consist of Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, heads of the Associational Organizations, and such other members as the occasion demands.
- Article 9. This body shall meet annually, according to adjustment, but in case of emergency, the Executive Board may call a special session, and also change the time and place of the meeting. In addition to the annual meeting, the body shall meet in spring session for the purpose of electing officers for the following associational year.

Article 10. This Constitution may be altered or amended (except Article 4) at any meeting of the body, upon one year's notice, by concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Parliamentary Rules: Kerfoot's Parliamentary Rules of Order is a guide of the parliamentary order followed by the association.

BYLAWS ARTICLE 1--DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Officers elected at the spring session shall assume their duties at the close of the last session
in the fall meeting.

2. The Clerk shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and the Executive Board, superintend the printing and distribution of the minutes of the Association which shall include statistics from August 1 through July 31 immediately preceding the annual meeting covered by the minutes, send five copies to the Secretary of the Kentucky Baptist Convention, send copies to various other Baptist agencies, and keep a file of the minutes and other important papers of the association.

3. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributed by the churches to the Association or money received from other sources, shall make reports to the Association and the Executive Board covering the Associational year of August 1 through July 31 and shall make disbursements as authorized by the Association and the Executive Board, and shall be authorized to pay all bills and salaries established by the budget adopted at an annual meeting until the next budget is adopted at the following annual meeting. He shall be bonded and the bonding fee paid by the association.

4. An auditor shall be secured by the Executive Board to audit the Treasurer's books and attest his annual report. The auditing expense, if any, shall be paid by the Association.

ARTICLE II--COMMITTEES

- The Executive Committee shall be responsible for planning, developing, and promoting a
 program of activities for the year in all phases of church work. This committee shall give a
 monthly report on the progress of their program.
- 2. The Program Committee will plan the programs for the annual meetings and shall report as far in advance as possible.
- 3. The Nominating Committee, after consulting with the Auxiliaries of the Association, shall recommend to the Association at its annual meeting nominations for all Associational Sunday School Officers, Associational W. M. U. Officers, Associational Church Training Officers, Associational Brotherhood Officers, Church Music Officers, and such other officers as the body may from time to time assign them.
- 4. The standing committees of the Association shall be Budget Committee; Program Committee; Missions Committee; Evangelism Committee; Christian Education Committee; Time, Place, and Preacher Committee; Resolutions Committee; Youth Committee; and the Nominating Committee which shall be responsible for nominating all standing committee members. Members of the Standing Committees will serve three years on a rotating basis with one member rotating off each year, with the exception of the Missions Committee which shall have, in addition to the three members, a representative from the Women's Missionary Union and a representative from the Brotherhood selected annually. All other committees shall be appointed by the Moderator unless specified by special motion.



First Building--Located on what is now called Willowtown Creek

It is believed that the actual site of this original building is located about one hundred yards south of the Highway 1252 and about thirty yards west of the creek. Former Good Hope Pastor Marshall Black and Jim Campbell, then music director of Good Hope, discovered a slightly raised and compacted area approximately twenty feet by twenty feet in the field in that location in 1971. This location matched the description of the location of the building that Brother Black had discovered in his research prior to the one hundred seventy-fifth anniversary of the church. Brother Robert Stapp, a teacher of art at Campbellsville College (now Campbellsville University), made the original drawing from which the above picture was taken from a description Brother Black had discovered and a photograph taken at the site. Brother Stapp also made a drawing of the second building of Good Hope at the same time.

Among the fallen churchmen were the following known deacons: Mr. Ray Buckner: Mr. James Hunt, a charter member of his church and willing worker in the association; Mr. Edgar Russell, also a faithful supporter of the associational work; Mr. Lee Gaddie, Mr. Dean Dix, and Mr. Regionald Reynolds. The following women were faithful as deacon wives: Mrs. Doris Taylor and Mrs. Nettie Buckner.

Fortyfour attended a leadership retreat. Held a staff/deacons retreat. Began Solid Rock Cafe. Baptized thirteen in Green River Lake. Lost one hundred fifty members as a result of the revival in spring of 1995. Held Good Friday Service and Resurrection Celebration Sunday for the community in Hamilton Auditorium. Shared Race Relations Sunday with Rev. James Washington and members of Pleasant Union Baptist Church.

FRIENDSHIP—Acquired land as a gift from Theodore Cowherd. Purchased new hymnals. Purchased telephone. Ordained Wendall Bowen and Tim Hayes as deacons. Wayne Orange dedicated life to the ministry.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

- August 1995--A letter of appreciation for support by Taylor County Baptist for Sunday School Work in Russia was read. The letter was from Brother Nicholai Syrovatko.
- September 1995--It was voted to begin a religious census of Taylor County beginning sometime during the coming year.
- October 1995.—The Missions Committee reported there are 1,175 Baptist churches in Russia, but only six hundred fifty pastors. Around the oblast where Brother Nicholai Syrovatko serves there are services in twenty-four cities, and sixteen of them have Sunday Schools. Edgar Russell, executive board member and longtime lay leader in the association, was remembered as the executive board placed Gideon Bibles in his memory. Brother Russell went to be with the Lord shortly after the annual fall meeting.
- November 1995--Ray Flewwellin reported that ten men and four women had recently made decisions as a result of the jail ministry he leads under the sponsorship of the association.
- **December 1995**--Further communications from Nicholai Syrovatko were presented. Brother Syrovatko continued to express appreciation for Taylor County Association's support.
- January 1996—Due to weather conditions, the executive board met the third week in January. It was reported that approximately one hundred boys attended the Annual R. A. Swim and Gym held in the Campbellsville College Gym.
- February 1996--The executive board voted to send enough money for the Russian Sunday School department to purchase a television with video cassette player/recorder to enable that department to present training videos to people who had no experience in Sunday School work.

March 1996-Director of Missions Bill Beard presented a list of missionaries who would be participating in the World Missions Conference and described some of the activities the association would provide for them. The executive board authorized Brother Beard to secure a credit card for the express purpose of making airline reservations for the missionaries.

April 1996--The Evangelism Committee was given the responsibility to begin work on

establishing a census committee.

May 1996--The spring session was at Good Hope, already well into their two hundredth anniversary celebration. After the election of leadership for the coming year, J. Chester Badgett requested personal privilege for two comments. He praised the laymen for their work in the association, but added that pastors need to be more concerned about the proceedings of the association. He further suggested the possibility of eliminating the spring meeting since the Kentucky Baptist Convention ceased training sessions in the spring for associational officers.

June 1996--After noting a deficit for the World Missions Conference, the executive board voted to cover the amount from the Evangelism item in the budget. It was further noted that the

love offering was in excess of \$400.00 per missionary.

July 1996--It was reported that three young people from Campbellsville, Jenny Moore, Ruth Campbell, and Laura Campbell, had participated in the Kentucky Baptist All-State Youth Choir. It was announced that David Walters, Chester Badgett, George Gaddie, Jerry Kibbons, and Jim Campbell make up the Ad Hoc Census Committee that will be working closely with the Evangelism Committee. Chairman Tom Gupton requested that the executive board remember this committee and undertaking in prayer.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Last year I challenged churches to increase their Sunday School enrollment by three percent (3%) in the 1995-96 church year. Instead of an increase in Sunday School enrollment, there was a five and six hundredths percent (5.06%) decline in total enrollment. Twelve churches did show an increase of three percent (3%) or more in Sunday School enrollment this past year, and that is something for which we need to rejoice in the Lord.

Also, as an association we showed a decrease in average Sunday School attendance of two and fifty-four hundredths percent (2.54%). If you will notice, our Sunday School enrollment and average attendance usually plays an important part in the total number of baptisms each year. When the Sunday School enrollment and average attendance increase, the number of baptisms also increases. When the Sunday School enrollment and average attendance decrease, so does the number of baptisms. This was the case this past year. It is heartbreaking to report the number of baptisms this past year in the association declined by 54 or twenty-seven and sixtynine hundredths percent (27.69%).

As an association, we need to strive to increase our Sunday School enrollment and average attendance. As this report reflects, our church family grows when our Sunday School grows.

I have appreciated the encouragement and support you as churches have given me this past year as your Associational Sunday School Director.


VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

As an association, we had 95.24% participation with only one church not having a Vacation Bible School. However, there was a decrease in enrollment. The total number of children and adults enrolled in V.B.S. this year was 2379 compared to 2749 last year. That is a decrease of three hundred seventy (370) or 14.46%. Only nine churches showed an increase in enrollment over the previous year. Mount Gilboa and Meadowview need to be recognized for increasing their V.B.S. enrollment by more than fifty percent (50%).

Also, Palestine Baptist did Back Yard Bible Clubs and reported an enrollment of one hundred and thirty-seven (137). Back Yard Bible Clubs or Mission V.B.S. is a great way for churches to minister and share the gospel of Jesus Christ with people outside their own congregation. A challenge to churches is to reach outside of your own congregation and conduct a Back Yard Bible Club or Mission V.B.S. next year.

Let's get serious about reaching children and adults with the gospel of Jesus Christ through Vacation Bible School and increase our V.B.S. enrollment by at least three percent (3%) in the upcoming year.

BROTHERHOOD

EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

The Evangelism Committee must report a decrease in baptisms during the 1995-1996 church year. In the previous year we baptized one hundred ninety-five (195) people, and this year we baptized one hundred forty-one (141) people. This is a decrease of fifty-four (54) baptisms, or 27.79 percent. Two churches reported no baptisms in the past year, and ten churches showed a decrease in baptisms. However, eight churches showed increases in baptisms with Meadowview and Yuma showing the largest increases. Also, the member-to-baptism ratio increased this year. Last year in the association it took 41.53 members to reach one person for Christ This year it took 56.9 people (or fifteen more people) to win one person to Christ at a cost of \$15,127.00 to win that one person.

The Evangelism Committee has appointed an *Ad Hoc* Census Committee, and they are currently working together on plans to take a county-wide census in April of 1997. They hope to locate many prospects and have the opportunity to win them to the Lord. We encourage each one to support and pray for this project.

The games brought athletes from one hundred ninety-seven nations to Atlanta. With temperatures higher than most ticket price, volunteers gave cups of cold water in Jesus' name. It was seed planting in hope of bearing fruit in other times and other places.

The volunteers were in all locations to welcome visitors. In the downtown area there were about one hundred professions of faith each week. There were rallies in four Atlanta churches where Olympic athletes shared their testimonies. One gold medalist said, "While winning medals is thrilling, there is no greater for me than knowing God."

About half of the Home Missions Board's support comes from individual Southern Baptist churches through Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. In 1996 the offering totaled \$38,908,339. The goal for 1997 is \$42,000,000. Taylor County churches gave a total of \$20,692 in 1996—a gain of \$402.00 over 1995.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The following are record reports: New churches--2,612; Total churches overseas--39,073; Lottie Moon Offering--\$85,900,000; and largest Lottie Moon Offering Increase since 1989--3.66%. For the last three years, Southern Baptists have set Lottie Moon Offering records.

The following are totals for 1995: Baptisms--287,806; Member:Baptism ratio overseas-14:1, United States--40:1; Countries served by Missionaries--131; Missionaries appointed--544; Missionaries serving--4,129; Short term Volunteers--15,000; and the average member contributes \$5.94 to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. One hundred percent of the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering goes into foreign missions. The 1996 goal of the Lottie Moon Offering is \$100,000,000. Each individual and church needs to increase giving by 12%.

Cooperative Program giving through the Convention has increased each of the last three years, reaching a record \$145,739,489 in 1995. Fifty percent was designated for the Foreign Mission Board.

The 1996 budget of the Foreign Mission Board, supporting almost 4,200 missionaries in 131 countries, is \$192,615,000. The Board uses only 12.8% of its budget for stateside administration and support functions. Of total church gifts, Foreign Missions receives 3.13 cents.

At the 1995 foreign missions rate, total churches will double in ten years from 39,073 churches in 1995 to 78,146 in 2005.

Five Taylor County churches gave over 20% through the Cooperative Program. The average now is about 9% throughout the Convention. Seventeen Taylor County churches are giving above the average. I thank God for all who have kept our Cooperative Program giving "above average."


We gave 3.4% less in 1995 than we did in 1994. By next year we need to start in the positive side. Still, we're doing well.







Good Hope Baptist Church after 1966 Addition

History of Good Hope Baptist, Church 1796-1996

Good Hope Baptist Church has come a long way since the days when only ten or twelve church members lived within a reasonable distance of the church.

Although the Finley community of northern Taylor County is still not heavily populated, a majority of the nearly two hundred people who are a part of the church membership in 1996 have better means of traveling to the little country church than individuals did in 1796. Many travel from the city of Campbellsville.

According to J. E. McFarland, who wrote one of the (if not the) earliest history of the church in 1876, "The ears of these early settlers were often saluted by the gobble of the wild turkey in the woods, the whistle of the deer, and the howl of the wolf."

Changes in the structure have also been significant.

No longer do members sit on log seats (although there are still some of those on the front porch of the church) with Mother Earth as the floor.

No longer do those interested in learning about Jesus's Word gather in a twenty-foot-square cabin made of large round logs with cracks between. This made it unrealistic to meet at the building in the winter; therefore they met at each others' homes.

That first structure had one door, no shutters, no windows, no chimney or stove, and certainly none of our modern conveniences.

After the church congregation occupied the cabin church for a few years, a friendly old man, William McColgan, donated one acre of ground lying about one-half mile northeast of the log cabin meeting place to the church. He appeared to take a great interest in the Baptist cause, although he was a Presbyterian. On this ground the church, though feeble numerically and financially, proceeded to build a second meeting house on which the shingles were hung with wooden pegs. This would seem strange to our generation.

They cut out two doors and a window that were not enclosed with either shutters or glass for several years. They again had Mother Earth for a floor, and on the seats they made some improvements at least from round logs to split ones.

About six years ofter this, the church reised to

About six years after this, the church raised \$12.00, bought some lumber and nails, laid a floor, and made some doors and shutters. However, the house still remained without a stove, fireplace, or even glass in the windows, and the church had to resort to private houses to hold its meetings in cold weather.

In 1833 and 1834, the church membership had increased to about sixty members. They bought a stove and put it in the house and put sashes in the windows. Then they greased some paper so that it would better let in light. This they used in place of glass.

"We then began to think we were fixing up in fine style," said J. E. McFarland.

The year 1929 brought problems and successes. The treasurer reported more than usual difficulty in collecting pledges. According to the April 1929 minutes, in spite of tight money the church bought its first piano and sold the old organ to complete the piano payment.

In the fall of that year a "carbide light plant" was purchased and installed for \$180. Zeb Smith did the installation work, but the building was erected by the members. This plant was a great improvement over the "coal-oil lamps."

According to the August 1966 minutes, one of the next big changes was to build additional Sunday School space. On the south side of a central hall in the new addition, a cloak room and a class room were added. The north side of the hallway included a nursery with rest room facilities and stairway to the basement. A assembly room was added in the basement with a wide hall leading to the class rooms previously constructed under the east portion of the church.

According to the November 1966 minutes, a graceful steeple was placed atop the new structure. At the same time a new covered ramp was constructed outside the door of the old nursery for convenience of worshippers who had difficulty going up and down steps. The old nursery was converted into office space.

New carpet was put in the auditorium and on the stairways, and the interior walls of the auditorium were dry-walled and painted.

In 1980 the church redecorated the auditorium, adding new pews and furniture. New carpet was also installed.

In 1981 the basement was repaired and redecorated. Construction of four new Sunday School rooms was begun in 1986. Remodeling of the existing basement was completed and city water was installed at that time.

An internally lighted sign, four by eight feet, with a fieldstone base on each side with landscaping surrounding it was installed in 1994.

Building indebtedness is still not a thing of the past as the church recently borrowed thousands more to make changes to accommodate existing growth and anticipated future growth. In the morning service of March 12, 1995, a vote to build a Baptistry and choir loft was taken by secret ballot. It was approved by ninety-four percent of those present.

About a year before the church's two hundredth anniversary celebration, the church agreed to install a new public address system.

In the spring of 1996, new light fixtures were installed in the auditorium. This greatly enhanced the beauty of the Good Hope auditorium. Painting in various areas was also done that spring, and new hardware was installed on existing doors.

A stained glass window was added over the Baptistry as a beautiful finishing touch. The church welcomed approximately four hundred fifty people to the little country meeting house for the two hundredth anniversary celebration on June 2, 1996.
