- 4. One-Day Evangelism Crusade – November 10, 2019**



### Lighthouse Update—August 2018 through July 2019

Lighthouse Counseling Center at Campbellsville Baptist Church begins its 14<sup>th</sup> year of ministry in August 2019. Our goal is to offer the counsel of Heaven on earth to persons who are in need of healing and guidance. It is our belief that for counselors to be most effective, great hearts for Christ and people are foundational, coupled with skills borne of disciplined preparation and training.

C.S. Lewis wrote, “If you think of this world as a place intended simply for our happiness you will find it quite intolerable. Think of it as a place of training and correction and it’s not so bad.” Beyond symptom reduction, pain relief, and heightened functioning, our belief is that there is more to this Great Adventure than meets the eye. Our goal is to help persons deal with this life in such a way that they are better prepared not just for today but for the Life to Come.

**This past year (August 2018-July 2019) was most unusual in that Dr. Wigginton was on sabbatical in Sydney, Australia from February through July 2019 and thus did not provide counseling in the United States in those months. Instead, he taught two master’s classes in the counseling department at Morling College, supervised six master’s practicum counselors, and worked on a book project. Ms. Brainard picked up a significant portion of the load with Dr. Wigginton’s absence such that their combined counseling load was still 720 hours of counseling to individuals, couples, families, and groups (versus 800 last year). Over one-half of Dr. Wigginton’s and about one fourth of Ms. Brainard’s sessions were marriage counseling. There were at least 12 different ministry families who were served. During the year, Dr. Wigginton supervised four individuals who are working towards licensure as professional marriage and family therapists (not including Australia). Two were post-Masters and two were completing their master’s degree. Currently Dr. Wigginton leads a bi-weekly case conference group with three participating therapists.**

Lighthouse Counseling continues to receive referrals from a variety of individuals, churches, and organizations in our community. Presenting concerns are quite diverse, including: depression, anxiety, life management, substance abuse, marriage, family, parenting and pre-marital counseling. In addition, persons have sought help for bulimia, sexual abuse, grief and loss, infidelity, restoration to ministry, post-traumatic stress, spiritual warfare, job loss and adjustment, career, school problems, spiritual concerns, and various relationship issues.

Campbellsville Baptist Church, in partnership with other churches in the Campbellsville and Central Kentucky area, began this counseling ministry in July 2006 when Dr. Scott Wigginton

assumed the position of Minister of Counseling and Director of the newly formed Lighthouse Counseling Center. He currently provides 6-10 hours per week of counseling to individuals, couples, and families. To date, Lighthouse has provided almost 8000 hours of face-to-face counseling.

Counseling services are open to all persons in the community regardless of church affiliation. Referrals can be made by calling Dr. Wigginton or Ms. Brainard at (270) 465-8115 (Ext. 216). Fees are \$75 for persons referred by a local church. **The “Lighthouse Fund” is a way for area churches, as well as other organizations and interested individuals, to tangibly care for persons in our community who need counseling but who could not otherwise afford it. Churches and other interested parties are encouraged to make a yearly donation to the fund to defray the costs of both their members and those from the community who need services.** Checks may be sent to “Campbellsville Baptist Church Lighthouse Fund” and marked to the attention of Dr. Scott Wigginton.

**The Lighthouse Counseling Ministry is possible because of generous support from Campbellsville Baptist Church, Taylor County Baptist Association, and other individuals, churches, and organizations. The Kentucky Baptist Convention partners with us at times in helping with pastors’ and ministers’ fees for counseling. Lighthouse also has a small endowment fund through the Kentucky Baptist Foundation that we hope will ultimately grow to provide help for any person, regardless of income, to have access to affordable and competent Christian counseling in the Central Kentucky area. If you or someone you know would like to contribute to this fund, please have them contact Dr. Wigginton.**

**Dr. Scott Wigginton** serves in a full-time capacity as Professor of Pastoral Ministries & Counseling and Associate Director of the Marriage and Family Therapy Master’s Program at Campbellsville University. A licensed marriage and family therapist, he served from 1993 through 2004 as Executive Director of LifeCare Counseling Center and Counseling Minister at Walnut Street Baptist Church in Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Wigginton has been married to Elizabeth for almost 34 years and they are the proud parents of Auburn, Hope, and Caleb. In addition to his B.A. from Western Kentucky University, he has earned M.Div., Th.M., and Ph.D. degrees from the The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and is a clinical Fellow and Approved Supervisor of the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy. He is a member of the American Association of Christian Counselors and a clinical member of the American Group Psychotherapy Association (inactive), and a Clinical Fellow with the American Association of Pastoral Counselors (inactive). Besides counseling and teaching, Dr. Wigginton penned a family column for the Western Recorder, the weekly newspaper for the Kentucky Baptist Convention, from 2001 until 2019. Before coming to Campbellsville University, he taught adjunctively at The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary for almost 10 years and served full-time as Associate Professor and Chair of the Counseling Area at Boyce College for two years.

**Whitney Brainard**, a 2010 graduate of the Masters of Science in Counseling program at Campbellsville University, works alongside Dr. Wigginton as a professional counseling associate. She received her undergraduate degree through the University of the Cumberlands and is a licensed marriage and family therapist who is also a member of the American Association of Christian Counselors. A long-time active member of the Beacon Hill Baptist Church in Somerset, Kentucky, Ms. Brainard also offers counseling through Beacon of Hope Counseling Center at her home church.

**Gather 78** – large group/small group discipleship meeting every Monday from 7 p.m. until 8 p.m.

**Small Group Discipleship** – In addition to the Gather 78, a number of small groups are available for students to join. Groups may be gender-specific or mixed gender.

Additional ministry opportunities include:

**"Tuesday Night Live"**, the University's campus version of the long-running television program. TNL happens once per month.

**Men's Ministry and Women's Ministry** - students are tasked with planning gender-specific events which will enhance fellowship and discipleship within these groups.

**International's Ministry** –working with the university's Center for Global Engagement to reach out to our international students seeking to include them in the life of the university. The BCM International Student coordinator, Katelyn Senesi, is currently holding a weekly bible study just for our internationals.

**Outreach Ministry** – Outreach/evangelism events to reach our campus and the Campbellsville/Taylor County area for Jesus Christ.



### **Mission Trips**

There will be mission trip opportunities during break times in the academic year. Domestic trips may be available during Fall Break, Christmas Break and Spring Break. Look for international mission trips at Christmas Break, Spring Break, and in May following the end of the spring semester. During the 2018-19 academic year mission trips were taken to:

Arlington, TX – “Mission Arlington”

Panama City Beach, FL – Beach Reach

Central & southern FL – Women’s Prison ministry, in cooperation with Sports Reach

Central & southern FL – Men’s Prison ministry, in cooperation with Sports Reach

Ghana – worked with Great Mission International

Mexico – in cooperation with Buckner International

### **“CU Crew 1 and C U Crew 2”**

For the summer of 2019 a second ministry team (now CU Crew 1 and CU Crew 2) was added. CU Crew 1 still traveled primarily through Kentucky leading/helping with Vacation Bible School, worship, and camp programs. While the CU Crew 2 has basically the same purpose, it also had as an underlying intent to help support those churches who have previously hosted one of our Church Outreach teams. For the summer of 2019 these teams saw 56 professions of faith

**Fellowship of Christian Athletes** (FCA) The purpose of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes is to present to athletes, coaches and all whom they influence, the challenge and adventure of receiving Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, serving Him in their relationships and in the fellowship of the church. All interested student-athletes are welcome to participate.

### **Relationship to Church Outreach**

Church Outreach teams are really an outgrowth and evolution of what used to be called “Revival Teams”, which were a part of BCM. Currently, the director of Church Outreach, Jasmine Barnett, is also the Associate Campus Minister. Jasmine’s primary task with Campus Ministries is coordinating our weekly worship experience, The Vine. She will also do weekly conferencing with two or three BCM Council members.

Another direct/indirect connection is the participation of many students in both areas. Students are not required to be a part of BCM in order to work with Church Outreach and vice-versa.

One of the initiatives undertaken during the spring semester of 2019 was addressing how campus ministries could provide comparable ministry, specifically student-led worship, opportunities at regional campus sites. On April 1 Jasmine Barnett, Aron Neal (her Assistant in Church Outreach), and I traveled to Harrodsburg and Somerset to discuss this topic. In Harrodsburg we met with Kevin Maples, associate director and Fontez Hill, residence hall director. In Somerset we met with Angie Travis, director and Greg Gover, volunteer campus minister and local director of Fellowship of Christian Athletes. We talked about the dynamics at each location and decided we would do “trial run” worship experiences at each site.

We conducted our sample at Somerset on April 16. The optimum time was from 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. on a Tuesday. We provided the music leadership and Greg Gover contacted a local minister to speak. There were between thirty and thirty-five students in attendance. Angie and her team had arranged for students to enjoy a meal while the service was taking place

In Harrodsburg we had more time to work with so we planned a cookout followed by a service for Tuesday, April 23. Fontez arranged the meal. Again, we brought students from the main campus to lead in the singing while a local minister, actually the basketball coach for CU-Harrodsburg, spoke. Three were twenty to twenty-five students in attendance.

We considered student response in both locations to be good. Our desired outcome is that, at least initially, as the 2019-2020 academic year begins students from the main campus might drive to each campus and assist with a monthly worship experience. Each location would still utilize local personalities to speak.

### **Student Involvement in Mission Trips**

Another subject we discussed at each location was the inclusion of regional students in mission trip opportunities. It was decided at both locations that students would be informed of mission trip possibilities and details. Participation would then be up to individual students working with specific team leaders to finalize details.

### **Chapel**

Previously, I had gone to Harrodsburg to discuss their Chapel program with Tommy Valentine, a local pastor who was volunteering his time to construct a regular Chapel program for the campus. We looked over the, then unfinished, chapel area. It will serve the needs there very well. This program would be similar to the one offered on the main campus as it would be aimed at providing the campus family – students, faculty and staff- a regular opportunity to worship together. We discussed format and frequency among other things.

The Louisville campus developed a few years ago a Chapel program which meets its needs. However, Dave Walters – temporary supervising director of the Center for International Education on the main campus – and I did travel on April 12 to Louisville to meet with Mark Mann, CU-Louisville director and Kyle Post, Campus Crusade regional coordinator. We strategized how we might enable ministry to the more than 400 MSITM students who travel to Louisville every weekend for classes. That is a different 400 students every weekend over the course of a sixteen week semester. Here is a brief outline of our discussion:

As we consider the direction of our ministries for the next year, I want to express my thanks for being able to represent and advocate for the ministry in Northwest Russia by our brother and colleague, Dr. Nickolai Syrovatko.

Nickolai has kept in touch with me as both a friend and a leader among his Christian brothers and sisters. He recently sent us a letter of report that contained 40 more photographs, which provided a close look at the impressive work being done in that area. It is a real blessing to have such a record of the ordinary Church fellowship and worship. He has used the long summer days for his very active schedule during the "white nights" and during the vacation from schools for the summer.

Nickolai has kept up an active summer with preaching and leading in several churches in the Northwest Russia region. He has preached, led training studies, held leadership programs in church and Sunday school development, and done extensive travel away from home. He does not have a car, and uses a very efficient public transportation program to travel, along with some help from other leaders who have a car.

Nickolai continues his writing ministry and has produced at least two new books in the past few months.

Nickolai reports that he has been able to continue using his card at the bank. Let us hope that process continues to go smoothly.

I want to commend the churches and the Christian sisters and brothers who contribute to this most effective and important ministry. It may well be the most significant outreach work we support as the Taylor County Baptist Association.

WMU DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Taylor County Baptist WMU is doing great. This year I was attended the KY Baptist WMU Annual Meeting in Bowling Green. Our Associational WMU Staff met several times to plan for our Taylor County Associational WMU Annual Meeting, we also met with the WMU directors in our Association referencing our Annual Meeting, which was held on August 17<sup>th</sup>, at Saloma Baptist Church with 47 in attendance. Our speaker this year was our new KY Baptist WMU Executive Director-Treasurer, Ms. Liz Encina. We had a wonderful meeting and are looking forward to what God has in store for us next year.

Our mission project for our annual meeting this year, was to aid Green River Memorial Church in collecting school supplies for the Campbellsville Independent, and Taylor County School Districts. We chose to collect glue sticks. We also used our Associational Eliza Broadus funds to purchase erasers for the schools. We collected and delivered 1,653 glue sticks, Green River Memorial purchased 1,380, with 10 churches participating, the total glue sticks were 3033, and we purchased, 15,000 end cap erasers.

We are again collecting backpacks for Eastern KY, and our send city, Cincinnati. Since KY Baptist started the backpack ministry in 2012, almost 6,000 spiritual decisions have been made. Many of those decisions were made by parents of the children receiving the backpacks. The KY Baptist and WMU goal this year is 10,000 backpacks. I believe some 44 boxes of backpacks were delivered to our collection point last year, plus some churches delivered their own to the collection point or to their mission. **Our Associational Collection Point for backpacks is Salem Baptist Church, and the Collection date is October 25<sup>th</sup> from 3 P.M. – 6 P.M.**

**The Hispanic Baptist Bible Institute  
Report to the Taylor County Baptist Association  
September 15, 2019

The Hispanic Baptist Bible Institute began in 2005 in Kentucky when a group gathered to create a Bible Institute for training pastors and leaders for our Spanish-speaking Baptist churches in the commonwealth. Since 2014 the Taylor County Baptist Association has been partnering with us—for which we are extremely grateful!

From the time when the Institute began just fourteen years ago, God has expanded our ministry to several other states and countries. We currently are serving approximately 250 students in 11 centers in Kentucky, Alabama, and Cuba. Additionally, as of this year, we are offering classes by internet that reach additional students in Mexico and other states. We are also providing some logistical support for a small Institute in Guatemala.

In Kentucky, we have three centers: two in Louisville that offer different levels of study and different schedules as well as another center in Lexington. We have students who travel from around the state to attend classes in these centers—while also maintaining their secular jobs, ministries, and families. It takes a lot of dedication on behalf of our students and professors.

We also have six Institutes in Cuba. There is a movement of the Holy Spirit in Cuba, despite all of their political and economic struggles. New churches are planted almost daily in backyards, carports, and apartments. In fact, one pastor told me that it is almost impossible to find a church in Cuba that is not growing! Our role is to come alongside the Cuban churches and our fellow Christians to provide training for their leaders who are so deeply invested in living out the Great Commission. We also collect over-the-counter medicines such as Neosporin, Tylenol, pepto-bismol, etc. to take down to our pastors since it is almost impossible to find these in Cuba currently. If anyone would like to join us in this effort, please let me know.

Again, we are deeply thankful for the support of the Taylor County Baptist Association over these last five years and look forward to our continued collaboration. You are indeed our partners in fulfilling the Great Commission of “making disciples of all nations,” and we value your partnership more than you will ever know. May God bless each church of the TCBA!

with the plan God has for us. Further, we resolve to make Taylor County and Campbellsville a place where God is honored and served.


